FANT BUILDING FOR A BANK

The National Bank of Carlsbad Leases Corner Room of Fant Building.

RICHARD LUMBER COMPANY PURCHASES LUMBER YARD

J. R. Fant has leased the corner room of his new building to the National Bank of Carlsbad. The rumor of the deal has been current upon the streets for some time past, but not until Tuesday of this week was it formally closed. The deal was negotiated through the D. B. Fant, of Kansas City, who came here about a week ago, and has been working with his father in bringing matters to a focus. The room is much larger than the one occupied by the bank at present. The constantly increasing business of the institution has made the procuring of more commodious quarters imperative, and with that in view the officers have been seeking another location for some months past. The new corner room just leased answers the purpose and needs required. New bank furniture and fixtures will be ordered immediately and as soon as they arrive and are put in place the bank will move to its new location, which will be about July the first.

Co-incident with, but wholly distinct from the above deal, Mr. Richards, cashier of the bank and also president of the Richards Lumber Company, purchased the stock of lumber owned by the Fant Lumber Company. Mr. Fant, the retiring merchant, has extensive property interests in Kansas, Oklahoma and Missouri, and as his attention to them is demanded, more or less, at all times he wished to be released from the confinement of the lumber business in this city, and the deal with Mr. Richards furnished the desired avenue of escape. The stock, which is greatly depleted at this time on account of the steadily growing business of the yard has just been invoiced at about \$4,000 at which figures it was taken over by the new proprietor. The yard will remain at its present location and the yard heretofore operated by the Richard Lumber Co., at the corner of Easter avenue and Seventh streets, will be closed but retained as a storage yard for the surplus stock. Mr. Harlin who has acted as manager of the Fant yard for some time past will remain with the new owner for a short time, after which he will be succeeded by a brother-in-law of Mr. Richards', Earl Hanson. With the bank on the corner and the yard adjoining, Mr. Richards will have his business interests well centralized and convenient. His many personal friends and the friends of the bank extend their best wishes for the success of the new institutions.

TAFT FAVORS STATE ROADS.

Chief Executive Thinks the Highway Question Not a National Matter.

National aid for permanent roads, a system of national highways connecting the capital of the various states and of state highways connecting the various county seats, use of federal prisoners for building roads and the establishment of roadmaking on a strictly business basis are some of the suggestions made at the good roads convention.

A letter from President Taft declared against national aid to any great extent. The president says: "My own view of the good roads question is that it is chiefly a state function and that all the states ought to unite in an effort to promote good roads. I do not think that the farmers are as much interested in the matter as they ought to be."

"Next to education, the system of good roads is the greatest civilization."

Tip on Road Maintenance.

Foreign countries are years ahead of the United States in road building and road maintenance. They keep men constantly on the roads looking for signs of decay. As soon as a road begins to unravel the spot is repaired. It must be cheaper and better to repair the first indications of deterioration and always have the roads in good shape than to wait until a road is impassable or full of ruts and gullies and then build a new one.

Good Road Movement Spreading.

The split log drag is still meeting favor in many parts of the United States. Good roads associations are being formed all the time, and better roads are making their appearance over many sections of the United States. All this agitation will lead to permanent roads. The quicker the better. Get into the movement.

Use of a Drag on Gravelly Roads.

In soils full of loose stones or even small boulders the drag has done good service. The loose stones are drawn into a windrow down the center of the road, while the earth is deposited around the boulders in such a way that the surface is leveled. The loose stones in the center of the road should of course be removed. Where there is a large proportion of small stones or gravel the drag will keep down the inequalities in the surface.

How to Freshen Up Old Linen.

When table linen becomes worn and shows an open mesh it may be made more presentable if the pieces are ironed while wet. Some recommend using a little weak starch, but good linen has a certain firm texture which, when ironed as above mentioned, restores much of its original beauty and firm texture. While the pieces must be exceedingly damp, every article should be ironed until perfectly dry. Use a No. 9 iron for the purpose. It is large, retains the heat and presses quickly.

Official Paper of Eddy County.

Statehood talk is growing fainter until ere this is read the mere mention of the matter may cause people to sit up and take notice and wonder what it is all about. That the probabilities of statehood were very remote never has been doubted by this paper, for it would be sheer folly for a republican senate to admit two more territories, both of which would undoubtedly send men to both houses of Congress who might not be suitable to the regular republicans. It is difficult at present to control the senate and with four more of unknown leanings it would be impossible. The constitution provides that a territory may become a state when congress is willing to admit it, so it makes no difference how many people we have, or how bad we want in, but it all depends on whether the high and mighty senate and house of representatives want more members from the west or not. Why the republican senate would want to provide a club to beat them out of control is past understanding, and therefore it seems superfluous to discuss constitution making or even an enabling act until the complexion of Congress becomes of a brighter hue for New Mexico and Arizona.

The cattle shipments continue with unbroken regularity. Several train loads have been shipped from the local pens during the past week or ten days. They represent the cattle growers from both sides of the river. The major portion of them are being consigned to northern pastures.

The cutting of alfalfa has again commenced in real earnest in the lower valley. The sound of the mower can be heard on all sides, and the hay is of a fine quality and good color. The prospect for a big yield is more flattering than it was some few days ago, following the recent freezing weather which gave the first cutting a severe setback.

Who Said Base Ball?

The Carlsbad Base Ball Team returned from Pecos last Friday where they played three games, losing the first one by the score of 7 to 6, winning the second by the close score of 3 to 2 (ten innings) and the third and last game 2 to 1. This speaks well for the home boys who have had very little practice this season. There is no reason why Carlsbad could not have as good a ball team as there is in the valley. We have some good material and with some one to take charge of the team we could mix things with Artesia, Roswell, Clovis and other towns. We understand that the above towns have good strong teams. With the assistance of our business men we could get the boys new suits and put the ball park in first-class condition and have some place to go these long summer evenings. Lets get together and have a good team this season that we will all be proud of—who will start it?

The official report of Adjutant General Brooks has been received by Capt. Church and the officers of Company B, First Infantry, N. M. N. G., in which he briefly states the deficiencies of each company recently visited by him on his tour of inspection over the territory. The brevity of his report relative to Co. B, carries with it an implied compliment which is heartily appreciated by the members of the local company. Some few of the oth-

er companies were severely censured, and he even went so far as to recommend asking for the resignation of the officers of a neighboring company.

The graduating class of the high school will side step the usual custom of delivering a few thousand feet of orations, this season, and will present a dramatized rendition of Pygmalion and Galatea. The casts of characters consists of nine which is the number in the class, each member taking a part. The casting of the play has already been made and the rehearsals commenced last week. The innovation promises to be as entertaining as it is novel and unique.

Mange.

Albuquerque, N. M., May 6, '10. To the Cattlemen of Union, Quay, Guadalupe, Roosevelt, Curry, Chaves and Eddy Counties.

Gentlemen: At the range inspection recently made by the U. S. Government, the disease known as mange or scabies was found to exist in several parts of the territory and such ranges upon which animals are infected or exposed have been declared infected districts. Cattle from these districts can only be shipped to market centers as "uninspected, exposed cattle," and go into quarantine at destination, and will not be passed for stocking or feeding purposes until after they have been dipped or sprayed under supervision, once for exposed and twice for infected cattle. If cattle have originated on an infected range.

An U. S. Veterinarian will be furnished upon application and we would advise cattle men to get together and decide as to location and time of complying with the regulations as to dipping or spraying required for each case and each he in readiness for his turn so that there be no delay.

Other states are making efforts to clean up cattle mange and if markets for New Mexico cattle are to be held open in the future it is important that the cattle of this Territory be kept in as satisfactory a sanitary condition as those of other states.

Immediately upon the compliance with this regulation of dipping once for exposed and twice for infected cattle, these ranges pastures or districts will be classed as clean and cattle can be then shipped upon inspection to any point for any purpose. Any animals infected or exposed remaining untreated will be held as security for payment of all costs and expenses incurred in the compliance with this order.
