STATE'S OUTPUT OF METAL ON INCREASE

More Than 33 Million Dollars Worth of Metals Produced in New Mexico During 1917.

BIGGEST GAIN IN OUTPUT OVER 1915 IS IN COPPER

The output of New Mexico mines for eleven months of 1916, with an estimate for December, as reported by the United States Geological Survey, Department of the Interior, indicates a yield of \$1,350,000 in gold, 1,800,000 ounces of silver, 7,100,000 pounds of lead, 91,400,000 pounds of copper, and 35,500,000 pounds of zinc, valued in all at \$33,469,400 as compared with a total value in 1915, for the same metals of \$19,279,468.

The Mogollon district, Socorro county, continued to be the most productive district in New Mexico in the output of gold and silver. There was a great deal of development work in this district in 1916, but the yield decreased appreciably. The Socorro and Mogollon mines were active. All the ore was milled in the district by concentration, sliming, and agitation and percolation in cyanide solution, the bulk of the product being cyanide precipitates the balance being high grade gold-silver concentrates. The Elizabethtown district, Colfax county, from the Aztec mine alone, was also a very large producer of metallic gold, gold bullion, and gold concentrates.

The Cossak cyanidation mill in the Bland district, Sandoval county, closed in December 1915 was started up again in the spring of 1916, and contributed a considerable yield of silver-gold bullion. Gold bullion continued to be produced at the amalgamation mill, on the North and South Homestake mines, at White Oaks Lincoln county. The Lordsburg district, Grant county, which has also been steadily increasing its shipments of siliceous gold and silver bearing copper and dry ores, again greatly increased its tonnage shipped. The copper concentrates of the Chino Copper company containing as they do small quantities of gold, contributed to the gold yield. The continued activity of the mines and matte smelter, at San Pedro, Santa Fe county, also added an increased quantity of gold to the New Mexico yield. Shipments of copper ores from the Jarilla district, Otero county, carried some gold.

The principal metal produced in New Mexico is copper, and since 1910 the yield has been chiefly from the Chino Copper company low grade copper deposits at Santa Rita. The ore is milled at Hurley in a large concentration plant. During 1916 the largest tonnage in the history of the company was treated and the gross output was 75,500,000 pounds. The Burro

Mountain Copper company's new concentrator began operations in April and started running at full capacity June 1, 1916. Much development work has been done at this property and the reserves are sufficient to supply the mill for years. The Santa Fe Gold and Copper company's 125-ton matting plant, at San Pedro, added a considerable quantity of copper to the output. Copper ores were also shipped from the Organ Mountains district, Dona Ana county, where the Phelps-Dodge company has secured a large area which it has been developing during 1917. This district will produce all five metals. A large tonnage of low grade copper ore with calcite gangue was shipped from the Apache mine, Hachita.

The yield of lead showed an appreciable increase. Lead ores were shipped from the Central, San Simon and Pintos Altos districts, Grant county, and Cooks Peak and Victorio districts, Luna county. Considerable tonnage of lead carbonate ore was shipped from Kelly, Socorro county. The principal producing mines were the Kelley, Graphic, and Juanita. The Ozark mill was operated continuously up to the fire in August. The Kelly magnetic mill was operated from May throughout the year.

At Hanover, zinc carbonate ores, were shipped from the Hanover mines and others, and from June on, zinc sulphide concentrates were shipped from the Hanover magnetic separation mill, at Pinos Altos, was operated steadily. A mill was erected in the revived Steeplecock district, Grant county, and some shipments were made. Zinc carbonate ores were shipped from the Magdalena, Hanover, Cook Peak, Florida Mountains, Tres Hermanas and Pinos Altos districts. Shipments of zinc ore and concentrates from New Mexico were 73,900 tons of 30.15 percent grade, as compared with 41,852 tons of 36 percent in 1915.

Hobbs Buys Partner's Interest in Grocery Store

RECALLING THE 80'S IN LINCOLN COUNTY

Writer's Comparison of Two Christmases Shows Quite a Contrast in 36 Year's of Time.

LINCOLN COUNTY THEN AS LARGE AS KANSAS STATE

Block Ranch, Dec. 25, 1916. Christmas in 1916 in little old Lincoln county! How different from a Christmas spent at White Oaks in 1880, and another spent at the Jones ranch on Seven Rivers in 1881! 36 years have passed and gone, but that same spirit of good cheer remains—even on Gov. W. C. McDonald's Block cattle ranch, where white-faced cattle roam as of yore, on a thousand hills, and where the man with the hoe is fast crowding these same white-faced cow brutes to the top of the hills.

Lincoln county of today is not what it was 36 years ago. Then she had 150 miles square of free range, and not more than ten cow brutes to the square mile. Then she only had two towns—Lincoln, the county seat, and White Oaks, a mining camp of 1000 souls. Within her borders were, also, the most daring young outlaw of the age, "Billy the Kid," and one of the most fearless law-officers, Pat Garrett, who ever trod in shoe leather. In those days Lincoln county was almost as large as the state of Kansas. Within her then borders are now located the city of Roswell, Alamogordo, Carlsbad, Artesia, Dexter, Portales, Fort Sumner, Texico, Lovington, Carrizozo, Capitan, Corona and Tularosa. The latter was a village, and so was Roswell in the early '80's but the others were not on the map at that time.

That prince of cooks, Jack Hondo, made Christmas of 1916 come one day ahead of time by serving the turkey dinner on Christmas eve. And you can bet your bottom dollar it was some dinner. Everything one wish for was on the table. It was a feast for the gods and then some. Around the table sat Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Taylor and their little daughter, Ruby, and her chum, little Miss Long. Then there were Mr. and Mrs. John Mocho and baby girl and Mr. and Mrs. Henry Harber and their three kiddies.

The Block boys who dug into the fat turkey and chickens were Frank Ellis, "Red" Dale, Tom Wilders and Jim Woodland, alias Jim Redman. Could you have seen the pile of turkey bones on the writer's plate you would know he, also, was present. During the afternoon Jim Woodland and the writer harked back to the hurrah days of White Oaks when we were chums together. Now that Mr. Hondo's Christmas dinner has passed and gone, and the genuine eve has

come, we are fixing to take another shot at Christmas turkey. Mr. and Mrs. Taylor and daughter and Mr. Hondo go to Capitan to sample Mrs. Julian's egg-nog and dinner, while the writer will hike down to the U. S. Forest Ranger Station, Mr. and Mrs. Parks' cozy home, to fill up again. Thus, will this sanctified Christmas day pass into oblivion so far as a few of us mortals are concerned.—"Dull Knife" in Capitan Mountaineer.

SAYS COUNTY DIVISION IS NOT PRACTICAL

Another East-Sider Opposes Plan to Create New County of Eastern Portion of Lincoln.

SUGGESTS UNITY AND ALL BOOST FOR GOOD ROADS

Dr. S. M. Johnson, of Ruidoso, was in Carrizozo Tuesday on business. Dr. Johnson is another one of the East Siders who is against the movement to divide Lincoln county. He points out that one-third of the taxes are paid by the railroad company and that the new county which is being advocated would have no railway line to help them support the county government and thus the taxation on the people of the proposed new county would be much heavier than it now is.

Dr. Johnson suggests that instead of the division that there be unity of action and that all pull together and construct a system of good roads leading to the county seat. This can be done by voting for the bond issue for roads. If the bond election carries, it will provide the money, dollar for dollar, for the roads the Federal government will be expected to help build. This will release a considerable amount of the general road funds of the county to apply to other needed roads, so that in a year or two, by united effort, every community in the county could be connected with the county seat by a good road.

Sermon to Boys and Girls is Feature at Methodist

According to announcement of Rev. Arthur Marston, pastor of the Methodist church, one Sunday in each month will be devoted to a special service for the boys and girls. Last Sunday was the first under the new arrangement and Rev. Escaped Lincoln Prisoner Returns to Penitentiary

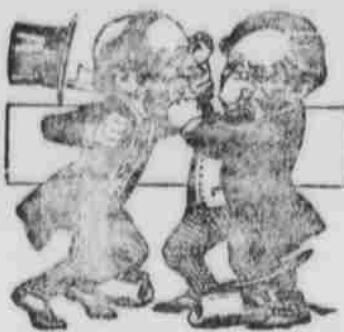

Articles of Incorporation.

We, the undersigned, in order to form
a Corporation for the purposes hereinafter
stated, under and pursuant to the pro-
visions of an Act of the legislative as-
sembly of the State of New Mexico, en-
titled: An act to regulate the formation
and government of Corporations for min-
ing, Manufacturing, Improvement and other
purposes, approved March 15th, 1905, do
hereby certify as follows:

I. The Corporate name is Oscuro Co-
operative Improvement Company

II. The principal place of business of the
Corporation is in the County of Lincoln, New
Mexico, the name of the Agent in
charge of the office is H. E. Riddle

III. The object for which the Corpora-
tion is established are primarily, Devel-
oping of Townsite and Orchard in vicinity
of Oscuro, Mining in all its branches, own-
ing or operating, buying, selling, leasing
of machinery, buildings, equipment and
appliances, telephones, telegraph or Rail-
way lines, real estate or personal property,
producing and dealing in oils and other
natural products.

As subsidiary to, and in connection with
the above, the Corporation may:
Manufacture, purchase or otherwise ac-
quire goods, wares, merchandise and per-
sonal property of every description, and
hold, own and mortgage, sell or otherwise
dispose of, trade, deal in and deal with
same. Acquire and undertake the good
will, property, rights, franchises, contracts
and assets of every manner and kind, and
the liabilities of any person, firm or asso-
ciation, corporation, either wholly or
in part, and pay for same in Cash, Stocks
and Bonds of the Corporation or other-
wise. Enter into stocks, contracts and
other agreements, and for any lawful purpose
perform

Issue Bonds, debentures or obligations of
the Corporation, and as the agent of the
Corporation, to secure the same by
mortgage, pledge, deed of trust or other-
wise.

Acquire, hold, use, sell, assign, lease,
grant, encumbers in respect of mortgage, or
otherwise dispose of letters of patent of
the United States or any foreign country,
patents, patent rights, licenses and privi-
leges, inventions, improvements and pro-
cesses, trade marks and trade names, re-
lating to or useful in connection with any
business of the Corporation.

Hold, purchase or otherwise acquire,
sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or
otherwise dispose of shares of the Cap-
ital stock and Bonds, debentures or other
evidences of the indebtedness created by
the Corporation or corporation, and while
the holder thereof, exercises all the rights

Indemnify any person or corporation
for services rendered, or to be rendered

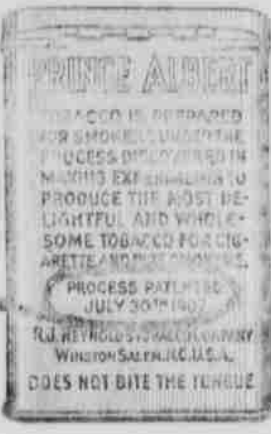

hundred and fifty thousand dollars. The corporation shall be under the control of a board of directors. The names of the first directors of the corporation, who are also incorporators of the corporation, their past-due addresses and the capital stock authorized for by each of them, with which the corporation will commence business, is as follows:

V. The corporate existence of this corporation shall continue for and during a term of fifty years from the date of filing this certificate.

VII. In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by statute, the board of directors are expressly authorized:

To hold their meeting, to have one or more offices, and to keep the books of the corporation within or without the state of New Mexico, at such places as may from time to time be designated by them. To determine whether, and if allowed, under what conditions and regulations the accounts and books of the corporation shall be open to the inspection of the stockholders, and the stockholders' rights in this respect are and shall be restricted or limited accordingly, and no stockholder shall have any right to inspect any account or book of the corporation, except as authorized by the board of directors or by a resolution of the stockholders.

To make, alter, amend and rescind the by laws of the corporation, to fix, determine, from time to time and vary the amount to be reserved as working capital to determine the time for the declaration and payment and the amount of each dividend on the stock, to determine and direct the sale and disposition of any surplus or net profits, and to authorize and cause to be executed mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property of the corporation, provided always that a majority of the whole board concur therein.

Pursuant to the affirmative vote of the holders of a majority of the stock issued and outstanding, at a stockholders' meeting duly convened, to sell, assign, transfer or otherwise dispose of the property, including the franchises of the corporation as an entirety, provided always that a majority of the whole board concur therein.

By a resolution passed by a majority of the whole board, under subchapter provision of the by-laws to designate two or more of their number to constitute an executive committee, which committee shall have the right to sign all checks and drafts and to execute all the powers of the board of directors, which may be delegated in the management of the corporation, and the officers of the corporation shall have power to authorize the seal of the corporation to be affixed to all papers which may require it.

The corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in this certificate in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by statute for the amendment of the certificate of incorporation.
