NINE DIPLOMAS AWARDED

Commencement Exercises of the High School Held During the Past Week in the Auditorium.

EVERY ENTERTAINMENT WAS LARGELY ATTENDED AND HEARTILY ENJOYED

The Baccalaureate Sermon and the Presentation of "Pygmalion and Galatea" by the Graduating Class were Especially Entertaining.

The past week has been a gala one for the pupils of the high school, the grades and the parents and friends of those who were receiving honors for the occasion. The weather has been delightfully cool and pleasant. This, supplemented with an abundance of flowers and the largest class to be graduated from the school, the new auditorium, which furnished an ideal place in which to hold the closing exercises of an eventful school term. Everything worked together for a most satisfactory and successful conclusion.

The opening of the week was the graduating exercises of the eighth grade, which were held in the auditorium last Friday evening. The large room was filled with an appreciative audience which responded heartily to the various numbers. The program consisted of the following:

The little people acquitted themselves in a most delightful manner and soon won for themselves the admiration of the audience. They went through their respective parts with scarcely a hitch and were veritable fairies moving about in fairyland.

Saturday evening the oratorical contest drew a large crowd which enjoyed an evening of pure oratory. The contestants were divided into two classes, the junior and senior class, respectively. The program opened with an instrumental selection by Miss Lambert and was as follows:

The judges were W. H. Woodwell, Dr. Maurice Friedman and Rev. Reece. The award was made in the junior class to Miss Minnie Esby and in the senior class to James Beverly. Beautiful solid gold medals, appropriately inscribed, were presented to each of the winners.

Sunday morning at 11 o'clock at the auditorium the baccalaureate sermon was delivered by Rev. Jas. Gratton Mathen. His address was directed to the graduates and was a strong, forceful discourse replete with good, wholesome advice setting forth the advantages of a thorough preparation for the battles of life and also for the life to come. He brought many valuable lessons which were applicable to his hearers in the congregation as well as to the members of the class. The music furnished for the occasion was exceptionally good, the choir being composed of the combined choruses from the various churches of the city. The following is the program of the service:

Territorial Auditor Optimistic.

Territorial Traveling Auditor C. V. Safford, of Santa Fe, spent a few days in this city, this week, looking after the routine work of his office. He left today for a visit at the other towns up the valley. He stated to a representative of the Current that all of the counties of the territory which he had visited were in the best of circumstances and were in a prosperous and flattering condition financially. The territory, generally speaking, is badly in need of rain, although the northern tier of counties is not suffering as are those farther south, which is largely due to the heavier fall of snow during the past winter months, which has brought out the grass and has also put a better season in the ground for the farmers. Relative to the taxes of the territory he stated that the reduction of the territorial tax from fourteen and one-half mills to eleven mills was an item which alone would mean a saving of many thousands of dollars to the tax payers of the territory. He said also the increase of about eight per cent which was being levied on the property this year would mean a corresponding decrease for next year and that fully forty per cent of the taxes levied and assessed against the property of the territory this year has already been paid which clearly shows the financial condition of the citizens of the territory to be in much better than it has been for years before. When asked his opinion as to statehood he simply crossed his fingers and replied, "Quien Sabe" but followed the elusive expression with an optimistic view of the situation and expressed the belief that some definite and positive action would be taken on the bill now pending before congress before the final adjournment of that august body.

Hadley Science Hall of the University of New Mexico was destroyed by fire Tuesday. Loss \$25,000.00 Insurance \$14,500.

The raising of fine bred hogs is an industry which is receiving the attention of Henry Tipton and W. F. McIlwain under the firm name of Tipton & McIlwain. Their ranch is situated about seven miles southeast of Carlsbad near the river and is attracting the attention of the hog men of this part of the country. They have a fine stocked ranch and are constantly receiving new registered stock, in their endeavor to hold it up to the top notch. Last week they received a pair of registered Jersey-Duroc pigs from the College Hill Hog ranch in Lamar, Mo., which are prize winners. They are "Heroine" and "Pecos" and have come to the Pecos valley to make their future home and will be glad to receive visitors at the Tipton & McIlwain ranch. The proprietors also have a large number of Poland China pigs and hogs which are fine specimens of the hog family. The feed stuffs, including the various grains and alfalfa, are raised on the place and with the thorough understanding of the business of both men it will be only a short time until Carlsbad will become as well known as a hog market

as it is at this time as a cattle and horse market. Among other hog raisers in the country are Jeff H. Johnson, on the Benson farm; Dr. F. F. Osborn, on his La Huerta farm; S. Osborne, on his alfalfa farm, immediately south of the city, and numerous others up and down the valley.

Numerous reports are coming in from various sections of the country of cattle and horses dying from some unknown complaint. An investigation of the cause has been instituted by the territorial veterinary.

Mr. Groves and Party at Knowles

M. S. Groves, the well known popular Pecos Valley lumberman and party, consisting of Mrs. Groves, Mrs. Geo. H. Brady, of El Paso, sister of Mrs. Groves, and Douglas Groves, who spent the past week or two days on the Plains were here this week. M. S. came over Monday from their temporary headquarters at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Mac Arthur in Alamogordo, and remained until Wednesday, when the balance of the party, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Mac Arthur, came over to attend the show. They came out from Carlsbad in Mr. Groves' splendid new Maxwell touring car. Now that he has his "cab" M. S. many friends on the Plains are expecting to see his genial countenance more frequently. Knowles News.

There will be some interesting court cases filed within a short time, wherein the town of Carlsbad will be the plaintiff and a long list of citizens of the town who are dilatory in connecting their premises with the sewer and also who have failed to comply with the ordinance relative to the laying of the cement sidewalks, where ordered, will be the defendants. The city will begin the prosecution with the determination of carrying each case to a final judgment, in order to enforce the ordinance. To permit some few to evade the law is an injustice to the entire city, whose health and comfort has been jeopardized too long already by some few "bull-dozers" and "knockers."

HOW TO DODGE A HOLDUP.

First Be on the Alert. Says a Detective in Chicago.
What is the best thing to do in case you are held up?
"I would bet almost anything I have that if the citizen who is held up should yell 'Police' or 'Murder' the holdup man would run away every time," is the opinion of Detective Captain Wood of Chicago.
"The chief trouble is that people are not on the alert. I always take the outside of the sidewalk when out after dark. Then if any one should happen to be lurking in a dark passage-way I have a good chance to see him in time to be on my guard. If I saw two men come toward me late at night and they separate I would get on the outside of the walk. If they require the time of me I would not give it to them, as this is likely to be merely a ruse to snatch your watch."
"My advice is, When out at night keep on the outside of the sidewalk, keep on the alert, and if attacked make an outcry."
"What is the best thing to do in case you are held up? That depends upon the conditions that enter into the matter, the weapon carried by the hold-up man, for instance," said Assistant Chief Schuetzler. "Some might have a revolver and some a piece of lead pipe. If your assailant is determined looking and has a good sized revolver it is best to surrender."
"If the man held up is of more than ordinary strength and confidence he may sometimes knock his assailant's gun out of his hand and get the better of him. If the proper degree of care is taken a holdup may sometimes be avoided altogether. If a man follows you at night and stops when you stop or walks opposite to you on the other side of the street it is likely that he is a holdup man. The best thing to do in that case is to get among other people or board a car or run into a nearby house."

How to Keep an Iris Bed Sightly.
If you have a bed of iris that is a blot on your garden, while the withered stalks are lying up a store of nutriment for next year's bloom, it is well to plant something in between the plants that will make them look less unsightly.
In between the iris plants the seed of mignonette can be sown about the middle of April and because other flowers can also be used. These plants take less nutriment from the soil and taller growing plants, as their root growth is shallow. They also do well in the partial shade that is needed for iris.

How to Preserve Leather Furniture.

Leather furniture needs constant and intelligent care to keep it from drying out and tearing into shreds or turning to powder. In the first place, don't be afraid to apply a little soap and water to it to wash off the dust and dirt. Use soapy water, a sponge and a palm brush to get into the folds of the leather and the crevices. The soapy water will darken the leather, but only temporarily. When the leather is dry here is a preparation that will do it good. It's simple—just one part sweet oil and four parts benzine. The oil will darken the leather a little, but it will soon dry in and leave it the original color. The surplus oil may be removed by rubbing. Rub into the grain of the leather. This treatment four times a year will preserve both the life and the elasticity of your leather furniture covering.
