## KILLING AT MONUMENT

A COUPLE OF SETTLERS DISAGREE AND ONE USES POCKET KNIFE.

## STARTED OVER FENCE

Both Married men With Young Families.

Word reached here Tuesday of the killing of S. R. Hamilton by D. E. House about ten miles east and three miles south of Monument in the Roberts neighborhood. Hamilton was circulating a petition to run a road through House's land, while the present road runs through Hamilton's land, and House objected to the proposed change. Hamilton had built a corral for milch cows, using one side of House's fence, which House objected to, and cut down, Mrs. Hamilton interfering and driving House away. Monday, at about eleven o'clock, House was at the farm of J. W. Waters after some kaffir corn seed, when Hamilton came to have his road petition signed by Waters and his son-in-law, Sumerlin, all meeting in the Water's field. Hamilton started toward House in the presence of Waters and Sumerlin and said he wanted an explanation as to why House abused his (Hamilton's) wife, but House stood still, saying he did not do so. This seemed to enrage Hamilton, who advanced and struck House who pulled a pocket knife and made a slash at Hamilton, cutting the shirt and making an ugly wound from about the backbone around to the left side, then Hamilton still striking, House struck straight out with the knife, cutting one rib in two, three inches under the left nipple, and Hamilton still advancing, House struck again. Hamilton then said: "I am all cut to pieces," while Waters supported him. House did not think he had killed him and says he never intended to do more than keep Hamilton off. House had previously taken a fearful beating from the Kornegay boys, and did not seem to want another one. Hamilton died within three minutes after the men met. House started for Justice Raley's house to give up, but was overtaken by Constable Billbre, who was notified by a boy sent by Waters, to have House arrested. Billbre took House to Monument, and brought him to Carlsbad yesterday.

Both Hamilton and House are aged about thirty-five, and House has three children and a wife, while Hamilton leaves a wife and four children. Hamilton was a Woodman in good standing and has a certificate of \$2,000 insurance. The preliminary will occur at the school house of precinct 12, near well 13, before Justice Raley, Monday, June 27.

**Statehood Bill Passes the Senate**  
Washington, June 16.—The statehood bill was passed by the senate today, as amended.

The bill differs from the house measure and must go to conference unless the house should concur in the senate measure.

Washington, June 16.—The statehood bill was taken up by the senate this afternoon. Beveridge entered on an explanation of the terms of the measure, compared with those of the statehood bill as passed by the house.

Explaining that the indebtedness of New Mexico and Arizona amounted to about seven million dollars, he said the house had donated 3,000,000 acres to each of the proposed states for its payment.

The senate committee, however, had reduced the sum in each case to one million acres, believing that the national government, was under no obligation to pay the debts of either territory.

After pointing out the difference in the two bills on polygamy Senator Beveridge contended that the senate provision requiring the schools to be conducted in the English language, was especially to be desired in order to break up the solidarity of the Spanish-speaking people.

### Died.

Emery Willard Hakes, Friday night, June 10, 1910, at eleven o'clock, of acute pneumonia. Aged, eighty-one years.

Mr. Hakes was born in Sempronius, Cayuga county, New York, July 21, 1826. When he was twenty-one, in 1850, he went to California by way of the Isthmus of Panama, and engaged in farming—raising potatoes and grain for the mines at Bodago Bay, Sonoma county. In 1869 he returned to the states locating in Fitchville, Huron county, Ohio, where he met and married Miss Eva Bowker, Dec. 25, 1871. They left Ohio the night they were married for California, and were snow bound on the Union Pacific near Rawlins being two weeks from Omaha to San Francisco. They engaged in the hotel business at Coulterville, California, where tourists come from the railway station, Merced, going to the Yosemite valley. At this place they were acquainted, for three years, with an uncle of Mayor C. H. McLenathen, John McLenathen owner of the stage line from Merced to the hill, where the trail led to the famous valley. Though they were within twenty-eight miles of the valley they never found time to visit the valley, on account of the rush and care of small children. In 1874 they returned to Ohio where Mr. Hakes engaged in farming and carpentry, where they lived eighteen years, coming to the Pecos Val-

## HOUSE DECORATION.

How to Paper the Walls in an Attractive Manner.

So many mistakes are made in the papering of walls that perhaps a few hints will not be out of place, as spring will soon be here, when repairs are being made everywhere.

Never paper the walls of a small room with large figures. No matter how pretty they are, the whole effect is likely to be crowded and very homely. If the room faces north, use a warm tone, never a blue or a gray or

a green. Yellow is admirable in a dark room, and bright rose makes even a plain, dreary room look rich and inviting.

The fashion in dining rooms at present dispenses entirely with pictures. The walls are either covered with tapestry paper or done in painted effects. Wallpapering is very much the fashion for those that can afford it.

If the chair covers and portieres are of figured material they require a plain paper, and vice versa. A plain paper is much better than a figured one for showing off paintings and engravings.

If the room is very high it is a good plan to do away with the frieze and to bring the ceiling tint down on the side walls at least eighteen inches, when the molding can be placed at the top of the wall paper paper.

The servants' rooms and the kitchen should be papered with a durable color, so that they can be scrubbed thoroughly with soap and water.

It is dangerous to trust the eye in matters of color; therefore the samples of upholstery materials should always be taken along when choosing the paper.

## ASPARAGUS CULTIVATION.

How to Make a Bed of the Edible Young Shoots.

Asparagus is a perennial herb cultivated for its edible young shoots. It is a rugged plant and will thrive under adverse conditions, but to obtain the succulent stalks needed for culinary purposes well drained, rich soil is absolutely necessary. The soil should be well mixed with rotted manures containing much nitrogen and potash.

Prepare the bed by plowing or spading deeply, beginning the work early and looking after the drainage problem carefully. Plants at least one year old should be obtained for this bed. They can be raised from seed, which is sown outdoors in April in drills one foot apart, the seed being covered about one-half inch. Plants suitable for transplanting the following spring may be easily grown this way, or roots may be obtained from one to three years old.

Set the plants in the permanent bed in furrows eighteen inches apart, the plants being the same distance apart in each furrow. Be careful to spread the roots out naturally and set each plant on a little mound of earth in the furrow. Cover at first to a depth of a few inches, gradually filling in as the season advances. In the fall cut back all the stalks to a level with the ground for the winter.

In the second year loosen the soil by shallow spading. When the first shoots appear the rows may be tilled up somewhat. Cut sparingly until the third year, as the plants will be more productive afterward.

The intimate relation which exists between good country roads and rural free delivery of mail cannot be too strongly emphasized. Communities which would enjoy the latter must make and maintain the former. In many instances had roads have prevented the extension of rural free delivery to communities where it was greatly desired.

## Planting Summer Garden.

Every farmer should arrange to plant something for the fall and early winter garden between now and the first week in Aug. It will be found that garden stuff will come up more readily during the summer than in the early spring when the air is usually very dry. Root crops like beets, carrots, rutabagas, turnips, and salsify will start readily and continue to grow all fall and winter. Beets left in the ground until spring will supply very fine greens long before any spring planting can be utilized. Cabbage planted in the next two or three weeks make fine heads of good quality. Beans are often planted around the first of July. Radish, lettuce, mustard, and other quick growing varieties should be planted from time to time through the summer. There are many other things that may be successfully planted in the garden during the summer. It is well to bear in mind, however, that gardens to be successful must have attention.

Those who plan to set out asparagus beds may grow their own plants this season from seed. This may be planted any time between now and the first of August.
