ACCIDENTALLY KILLED

O. C. Geer Jr. was Instantly Killed Last Monday Evening by a Falling Gun

THE REMAINS TAKEN TO KANSAS FOR BURIAL

O. C. Geer Jr., a young man about eighteen years of age was killed by the accidental discharge of a gun in his hands, near Otis school house late last Monday evening.

In company with his father he was returning to his home in this city riding on an empty hay rack. He was carrying a shot gun and had been shooting rabbits by the roadside. A short distance down the road from where the fatal accident occurred he had just shot a rabbit and reloaded the gun, carrying it with the butt resting in the bottom of the hay frame. A sudden jerk of the wagon, caused the gun to slide and drop through a crack between the boards and in some manner was discharged. The father, although riding beside his son was not a witness to the details of the accident. The former saw the son make a quick grabbing motion also saw him grab the muzzle of the gun as it fell through the bottom of the wagon and at the same instant he heard the report of the gun but did not think, at the time, that his son was injured. He stated the boy looked up at him but did not utter a sound and then fell, death resulting instantly, the load of small shot penetrating the heart. As the accident occurred but a few rods north of the Otis school house he turned his team around and drove back a short distance to a telephone, and told the sad news to E. T. Carter, a personal friend, who left immediately in his automobile and brought the grief stricken father bearing the body of his lifeless son to the city. The body was taken to the undertaking parlors of the Carlsbad Furniture Co., where it was prepared for burial.

When the news was conveyed to the mother and sisters at their home in this city, the former and one sister were so completely overcome with grief that the services of a physician was necessary to care for them.

The family had only recently come to Carlsbad from Kansas expecting to make it their future home.

The young man was just entering upon manhood and had attained that age when he was becoming invaluable as a companion, counsellor and helpmate of his father.

His untimely death comes as an especially severe shock to his parents, sisters and brother, and to the entire community, where although he was scarcely known. All extend their deepest sympathy to the members of the sorrowing family.

The remains were taken to his former home in Paradise, Kansas, Wednesday morning, where they were laid to their final rest.

PLAINS ROAD.

THE SAND ROAD LOOKS PROMISING.

Work to Begin as Soon as Sufficient Amount of Water is Procured in a New Well to Soak the Road.

John W. Lewis and Meede Neel, both representing the territory of New Mexico, left last Wednesday morning to inspect and outline the procedure of constructing a road across the twelve mile stretch of sand, east of Carlsbad.

About four thousand dollars has already been raised to defray the expense of building a road which is approximately about one-half enough, but it will be impossible to state the exact cost until the details of the work has been more fully determined. They propose to sink a well either in the sand or at the edge of it, and then construct a road of red clay alternating layers of red clay and sand thoroughly soaked with water supplied from the new well. It is thought that by pursuing this method a roadbed, solid, substantial and well suited for the traffic to the plains country, can be easily constructed.

The work, with the exception of sinking the well, will be done on force account and, it is thought, the work will be com-

A Candidate For Delegate

The Santa Fe Eagle in discussing the selection of a Democratic candidate for delegate to congress makes some very pertinent remarks, as the Eagle usually does. It says, after disposing of the statehood problem:

"The availability of a candidate for delegate should be carefully considered. In the first place the democratic candidate for delegate should be a man whose democracy is not of the Roosevelt variety, or the Taft variety, or the Curry variety. The Roosevelt democrats, the Taft democrats and the Curry democrats may follow this year, but the leader of the democratic forces this year should be a man who is just an old fashioned democrat without any of the modifying adjectives.

"The democratic candidate must be a man in whom the democrats of the territory have confidence and one who will inspire confidence among the masses. The voters of New Mexico have had enough of broken promise within the past ten years and want a man who will promise less and do more. New Mexico has had a Sphinx in congress long enough. It is time that this territory should be represented by a man who, when he wants anything, can get up and tell what he wants, not one whose eloquence is of the same variety as that of an oyster.

"The democratic candidate should be a man who is known over the territory and who will not have to spend the major part of the time of the campaign in getting acquainted. There are dozens of such democrats in New Mexico, but there is one who lives down in Lincoln county and whose name is A. H. Hudspeth, who fills the bill exactly. Nobody ever questioned his democracy. He can tell what he thinks in vigorous English, the meaning of which can not be mistaken. This was proven without question when he was a member of the house of representatives three years ago when he gave the republicans more trouble than any member of the minority ever gave them before. His ability is unquestioned and he is such a man as the democrats of New Mexico might feel proud of in congress."

The senate has at last passed an enabling act for the territories of New Mexico and Arizona, that, no doubt, Beveridge hopes the people will reject when they express their choice, by their votes, of statehood with such an enabling act or no statehood until a reasonable measure can be passed. The house will no doubt concur in the measure, and it will soon be up to the territories to have their say. In the meantime the present county officials will hold over, and there will be no change until January 1912.

The Knowles News's Plains Special reached Carlsbad this week, and it is probably the best gotten up and neatest publication ever published in the county. The people of Knowles and the plains should be proud of so handsome a newspaper which vies with high class magazines in appearance.

New Contract Calls for Thirty Dollars Per Day

The new contract mail carrying of the Roswell Automobile Company, covering four years and effective July 1, brings a substantial increase over the old four year contract which expires July 1. The following proceedings were had, to-wit:

M. L. Dannelley, Scavenger, reported all alleys cleaned, and in good condition, and that he had the assistance of a number of citizens in performing this work.

M. L. Dannelley's salary was raised \$10.00 per month, temporarily, for the expense of keeping one extra horse in performing his work.

G. M. Cooke has appointed a committee to interview automobile owners relative to getting their assistance in cleaning streets.

M. L. Dannelley was instructed to clean the streets of the town.

A motion was made by G. M. Cooke and seconded by R. M. Thorne that an Ordinance be drafted to repeal Ordinance No. 85. The same being the Bawdy House Ordinance.

HOUSE DECORATION.

How to Paper the Walls in an Attractive Manner.

So many mistakes are made in the papering of walls that perhaps a few hints will not be out of place, as spring will soon be here, when repairs are being made everywhere.

Never paper the walls of a small room with large figures. No matter how pretty they are, the whole effect is likely to be crowded and very homesick. If the room faces north, use a warm tone, never a blue or a gray or

a green. Yellow is admirable in a dark room, and bright rose makes even a plain dreary room look rich and inviting.

The fashion in dining rooms at present dispenses entirely with pictures. The walls are either covered with tapestry paper or those in painted effects. Wallpapering is very much the fashion for those that can afford it.

If the chair covers and portieres are of figured material they require a plain paper, and vice versa. A plain paper is much better than a figured one for showing off paintings and engravings.

If the room is very high it is a good plan to do away with the frieze and to bring the ceiling tint down on the side walls at least eighteen inches, when the moulding can be placed at the top of the wall paper proper.

The servants' rooms and the kitchen should be painted with a durable color, so that they can be scrubbed thoroughly with soap and water.

It is dangerous to trust the eye in matters of color; therefore the samples of upholstery materials should always be taken along when choosing the paper.

ASPARAGUS CULTIVATION.

How to Make a Bed of the Edible Young Shoots.

Asparagus is a perennial herb cultivated for its edible young shoots. It is a rugged plant and will thrive under adverse conditions, but to obtain the succulent stalks needed for culinary purposes well drained, rich soil is absolutely necessary. The soil should be well mixed with rotted manures containing much nitrogen and potash.

Prepare the bed by plowing or spading deeply, beginning the work early and looking after the drainage problem carefully. Plants at least one year old should be obtained for this bed. They can be raised from seed, which is sown outdoors in April in drills one foot apart, the seed being covered about one-half inch. Plants suitable for transplanting the following spring may be easily grown this way, or roots may be obtained from one to three years old.

Set the plants in the permanent bed in furrows eighteen inches apart, the plants being the same distance apart in each furrow. Be careful to spread the roots out naturally and set each plant on a little mound of earth in the furrow. Cover at first to a depth of a few inches, gradually filling in as the season advances. In the fall cut back all the stalks to a level with the ground for the winter.

In the second year loosen the soil by shallow spading. When the first shoots appear the rows may be filled up somewhat. Cut sparingly until the third year, as the plants will be more productive afterward.

The intimate relation which exists between good country roads and rapid free delivery of mail cannot be too strongly emphasized. Communities which would enjoy the better mail service and maintain the faster, in many instances had roads have prevented the extension of rural free delivery to communities where it was greatly desired.

Planting Summer Garden.

Every farmer should arrange to plant something for the fall and early winter garden between now and the first week in Aug. It will be found that garden stuff will come up more readily during the summer than in the early spring when the air is usually very dry. Root crops like beets, carrots, rutabagas, turnips, and salsify will start readily and continue to grow all fall and winter. Beets left in the ground until spring will supply very fine greens long before any spring planting can be utilized. Cabbage planted in the next two or three weeks make fine heads of good quality. Beans are often planted around the first of July. Radish, lettuce, mustard, and other quick growing varieties should be planted from time to time through the summer. There are many other things that may be successfully planted in the garden during the summer. It is well to bear in mind, however, that gardens to be successful must have attention.

Those who plan to set out asparagus beds may grow their own plants this season from seed. This may be planted any time between now and the first of August.
