## PINTO BEANS ARE WEALTH FACTORS IN LINCOLN COUNTY

New Mexico is Gaining Nation-Wide Reputation as Producer of the Famous Mexican Pinto Bean.

### 60 CARS REQUIRED TO MOVE 1916 YIELD

New Mexico as a producer of beans—New Mexico pinto beans, is attracting attention thruout this country. In this month's issue of "The Earth," the Santa Fe railway's official industrial magazine, the bean industry of this state, including the enormous 1916 production worth more than \$2,000,000, is the subject of an illustrated, two-page article written by H. B. Henning, publicity agent for the New Mexico state land office. Not only is the production of this crop big, but its reputation for high food values and fine flavor assures larger production, greater demand and a continuance of good prices. Buyers are no longer satisfied to specify Mexican pinto beans but demand, for quality, New Mexico pinto beans, distinctly a native production of that state.

"Sheep growers, becoming wealthy with 25 cent wool, cattle growers who have never taken farming in New Mexico seriously before, tillers of irrigated lands with their high priced crops, all have paused to take their hats off to the farmers on unirrigated land who emerged from their bean fields, at the end of 1916, with net profits averaging \$50 an acre," says the article.

"In New Mexico, bean growing is not confined to any particular section but is found in greater or less extent in every county in the state."

While a few far-sighted irrigation farmers planted beans in 1916 and reaped enormous profits the crop has been taken over as the particular crop of the New Mexico "dry farmer."

"It has been demonstrated beyond doubt," says the article, "that the New Mexico pinto bean, which constitutes 90 per cent of the bean crop in the state is the surest unirrigated crop which New Mexico has at its command. . . . A considerable portion of the 1916 bean crop moved to Texas points. Some of it went to Colorado, but the bulk of the crop was marketed thru Kansas City where it was distributed to central and eastern markets. Proper cultivation, and an annual rainfall of 14 inches or more will produce a profitable bean crop anywhere in New Mexico. . . . The Estancia valley, in Torrance county, presents typically favorable conditions and the results there last year illustrate fairly what may be expected in similar altitudes thruout the state. . . . A total of 320 acres of beans were shipped out

of the Estancia valley in 1916, averaging 40,000 pounds to the car."

It took 60 box cars to move the last New Mexico bean crop. The sales reported up to January 1st totaled 24,000,000 pounds. The writer produces figures of actual yields in 1916, to show the beans can be made to yield as high as 1,900 pounds to the acre in New Mexico and already have an average yield of 988.9 pounds.

"Many farmers," he says, "are extending their land holdings with profits from their 1916 crop and are planning to increase their acreage this spring." This insures an increased acreage in 1917, in the state as a whole. In some dry farming districts, it is pointed out, this has had the effect of advancing land prices to some extent.

Good roads men from all parts of the State will be in Santa Fe February 23rd to discuss pending road legislation, and a joint meeting of the Senate and House Road Committees will be held on that date by request. Members of the State Highway Association are particularly requested to attend. Chairman J. V. Tully, of the Senate Committee on Roads and Highways, is anxious that as many as possible from Lincoln county be present on the above date—Feb. 23.

## Freight Agents of Southwestern See Carrizozo

The twelve general agents from all over the United States for the E. P. & S. W. railway, six special coaches, met at Tucumcari Friday morning of last week and went to El Paso, passing thru Carrizozo where they remained for some little time. They returned Friday night to Tucumcari and again passed thru this place Saturday enroute to El Paso where they were banqueted by the Southwestern System. They then went over the Western Division of the line on a tour of inspection. Vice-President T. M. Schumacher, of New York, was with the agents showing them the company's interests.

## Lincoln County First in Payment of Taxes

According to the First Biennial Report of the State Tax Commission of New Mexico, covering the period from March 15, 1915, to November 30, 1916, the table for the 1915 taxes collected to September 30, 1916, for the four counties showing the highest percentage of collections is as follows: Lincoln, 96.86; Luna 96.30; Curry, 95.08; Quay, 94.43. The four lowest counties are: Sandoval, 60.99; Socorro, 72.03; San Juan, 72.59; Rio Arriba 72.75.

## Tuesday Night Witnessed Severe Electrical Storm

Tuesday afternoon was bad—windy, dusty, and on the heels of this Tuesday night, followed the severest electrical disturbance of the season. Rain, sleet, hail and snow, hoisted along to the tune of about sixty miles per hour by a relentless and chilly wind, fell in torrents. Tongues of vivid and sustained lightning illuminated the sky during the several minutes duration of the storm, causing patrons of the local long distance telephone company to think that Manager McQuillen had arranged to receive the war reports direct from Europe. The occurrence has been followed by damp and threatening weather. Considerable snow at White Oaks and elsewhere in the mountains has been reported this week.

## Dr. S. M. Johnson Gives "Whys" and "Wherefores" of Road Bond Issue

The taxpayers of the county should know the "whys" and "wherefores" of the coming road bond election.

Last summer Congress passed the Bankhead-Shackelford road bill which carried an appropriation of \$1,170,000 for roads in New Mexico, upon condition that the State join in the expenditure of an equal amount during a five year building program. The selection of the roads to be improved on this co-operative plan was left by Congress to the State Highway Commission.

Desiring to secure as much as possible for roads in Lincoln county I went to Santa Fe and took up the matter with the State Highway Commission, of which Governor McDonald was chairman. Governor McDonald

was equally desirous of securing for Lincoln county her full share. He advised a county bond issue. So did our state engineer, Mr. French. The present movement, therefore is the State Highway Committee's plan to enable us to secure Federal aid.

The next step was to confer with Dr. J. W. Laws, chairman of the County Road Board. Dr. Laws favored the proposition and requested me to take the lead in starting the movement. I consented. At every step I have consulted with the Chairman of the Road Board and State Highway Commission and nothing has been done without their approval.

What has been done thus far has the approval of the County Road Board, the County Com-

missioners, the State Highway Commission, the county's representatives in the State Legislature, all the heavy tax-payers, all the newspapers of the county, and almost without exception, all the leading citizens of the county.

There are only a few roads of importance that are not designated to share in the bond money. The road south of Carrizozo has just benefitted by over half of Lincoln county's share of the State Road Bond money. Some other roads can be cared for out of the general road fund of the county and were not named because of local dissensions as to proper route. The selections and amounts were fixed by some twenty of the heaviest taxpayers and leading road men of the county and are considered fair to all.—Dr. S. M. JOHNSON.

## EDITORIAL COMMENT

### COMPARING LINCOLN WITH WILSON.

Lincoln's birthday came at a time this year to remind us of some striking similarities between Abraham Lincoln and Woodrow Wilson. There is displayed a patience, an abhorrence of war, a reluctance to ascribe evil motives to others, a deeply seated love for humanity and human rights by President Wilson in dealing with Germany that reminds one strongly of the attitude which Lincoln exhibited toward the southern states and the limits to which he was willing to go before favoring actual hostilities. In Lincoln's first inaugural address he served notice on those who were contemplating secession that if war should come the first blow must be struck by them, and it was not until Fort Sumter had been fired upon that the Lincoln government recognized a state of war. Until that time he had not ceased to hope that war might be averted.

President Wilson's reluctance to break with Germany, his patience in his dealings with that country and his determination not to engage in hostilities until Germany had committed an overt act against American life or property remind one strongly of Lincoln.

Like Woodrow Wilson, Abraham Lincoln's love for humanity took no account of personal foes. It is related by his historians that after the surrender at Appomattox the sight of a column of ragged Confederate soldiers moved him to tears of compassion. Determined to save the Union, just as Wilson is determined to maintain the honor of the country, yet Lincoln had no enemies to punish. He even expressed the desire that Jefferson Davis might escape those Union generals who sought to capture him. He wanted peace with honor, just as the president now does, but not at the sacrifice of principle.

Everybody seems to be of about the same opinion, that Old Mexico is sadly in need of a constitution, also a few by-laws.

Some men are always hunting for trouble. Champ Clark still wants to run for the presidency. Can you beat it?

The time will soon be here for the arrival of the greatest of all dangers and nuisances, the common fly, and an effort should be

made to clean up every place that is likely to prove a breeding ground for these pests. Not only is the fly a deadly carrier of loathsome diseases, but he is the cause of more profanity and general wear and tear and depreciation on the souls of men than almost any other agency. So, for the sake of your physical and moral welfare, you should begin swatting the fly before he has a chance to get in his deadly work.

### ORIGIN OF ST. VALENTINE'S DAY.

There was a Bishop or Presbyter in Rome in the reign of Emperor Claudius, about 270 A. D., who was famous for his love of the people and his charitable gifts to them; thus arose the custom of sending gifts on the anniversary of his birthday. Others say the custom arose from a practice of ancient Rome at the feast of Lupercalia in February, to place the names of young women in a box, from which they were taken by young men, as chance directed. The early church, unable to change the custom, changed its form. On the eve of February 14th, they placed the names of certain young women in a box and those of young men in another, the names drawn together were valentines. Gifts of gloves, jewelry, etc., were made. The custom of choosing valentines existed very early. The exact origin of it, like that of other customs, is vague and uncertain.

The war in Europe will be won by the side that has the most money with which to finance it. There is where this nation comes in strong. While we have about one-sixteenth of the world's population, we have more than one-third of the world's wealth.

Henry Ford says that in case of war he will place his factory, without profit to himself, at the disposal of the United States government. Which shows that Henry is much bigger and a more patriotic man than William Jennings Bryan.

### THE BREAK WITH GERMANY.

It was inevitable that the United States should have broken off relations with Germany, after Germany had declared that it deliberately purposed to do the very thing that the imperial government had been warned would bring about such a result.

The sinking of the Lusitania was sufficient warrant for this country to have broken off relations with Germany, but the apologies and the promises of the German government were accepted and the break postponed. Since then there have been numerous other offenses which the Germans have been guilty of which would have justified the same action that the president has now taken. But with a wish to avert war and a desire to remain in a position where he might act as an agent for peace, the president has accepted the repeated promises of Germany that it would abide by the rules of civilized warfare. But now that the kaiser's government has proclaimed to the world that it will disregard all its former promises and conduct an unrestricted warfare against vessels

of all kinds, the severance of diplomatic relations is the last thing that the president could consistently have done.

If Germany, made desperate by the fortunes of a long and bitter war, should commit that overt act against American life or property which the president has warned will cause him to ask congress for means to defend American seamen and American interests, there is no doubt of what congress will do nor of what the country will do, either. The United States wants the friendship of all nations, but it has reached the limit of endurance with Germany.

### Would Make Mail Order Houses Pay State Tax

A dispatch from Phoenix, Arizona, says that in an effort to arrive at some method whereby mail order houses doing business in the state can be taxed, the state tax commission has asked the attorney general for an opinion as to whether it would be possible to enact a state law requiring that a license tax be paid by mail order houses whose place of business is in another state, and who sell merchandise in that state in competition with local merchants. The commission asks the attorney general to consider in his opinion the feature of interstate commerce, as well as the postal regulations, and the ability of the state to enforce any license tax that might be enacted.

Arizona's action in this matter is being eagerly watched by other states who no doubt will adopt a similar policy toward the foreign concerns.

## INSTRUCTION GIVEN ON FENCING AND GRAZING QUESTIONS

(Continued From Last Week.)

It was evidently the spirit and intent of the Act of 1895 that access to the public domain by those who desire to peaceably enter or establish a residence or settlement thereupon, shall not be obstructed by parties that have no claim or color of title to the lands. That access may be impeded in various ways. It does not necessarily follow that the lands must be completely surrounded by fences constructed wholly upon public lands. The obstruction may be effected by the construction of fences which tie to natural barriers, such as mountains and rivers; by the construction of different parties of fences which join and form an unlawful inclosure; by the construction of so-called drift fences extending for miles in length, which to all intent and purposes, make the public lands adjacent thereto practically worthless for settlement; or even by the construction of fences without gates, or with gates which the public are not permitted to use, wholly upon privately owned lands so as to incidentally inclose public lands. For illustration of a case such as the last mentioned, see *Camfield vs. U. S.* (167 U. S. 518), which is the leading case upon the subject.

The policy of the government with reference to its unappropriated public lands has been uniform and well understood since the establishment of the Republic. That policy has been clearly stated by the U. S. Supreme court in the case of *Bu-*

ford vs. Hout", in which it was stated:

"We are of the opinion that there is an implied license, growing out of the custom of nearly 100 years, that the public lands of the United States, especially those in which the native grasses are adapted to the growth and fattening of domestic animals, shall be free to the people who seek to use them where they are left open and uninclosed and no act of government forbids their use."

Congress evidently did not intend by the passage of the unlawful inclosure act to prohibit altogether the pasturage of the public lands, or to reverse the former practice of the government in that particular.

In view of the fact that sufficient evidence has been procured to establish a prima facie showing that access by prospective settlers to large areas of public lands in the State of New Mexico has BEEN IMPEDED BY FENCES WHICH ARE STILL BEING MAINTAINED IN VIOLATION of the act of February 25, 1885, supra, you are hereby directed to notify all persons reported to be maintaining fences upon public lands in that state, that all unlawful fences and inclosures must be abated and removed on or before April 15th, 1917, and that if the law in that respect is being violated after that date, steps will immediately be taken to effect summary removal of the illegal fences by judicial process. You may give copies of this letter to the press of the state as a matter of news. In the event that the above order shall not be complied with on or before the above mentioned date, you will present the facts involving cases of alleged maintenance of illegal fences coming to your attention to the United States attorney for such action as he may deem necessary under the act. If, in the meantime, you shall be consulted by those having or maintaining fences on the public domain as to such fences and inclosures as are violative of the purpose and spirit of the law, you will lay the facts of such cases before the United States Attorney, and advise such parties in accordance with his instructions. You will also confer with the U. S. Attorney in cases where court action shall appear imperative, and, if necessary, prepare a map or maps for him, showing thereupon the fences which, in your opinion, constitute unlawful inclosures, or obstruct access of prospective settlers, and those fences which have been constructed merely for the purpose of shutting off boggy or alkali lands, or lands upon which are poisonous weeds or quicksands, and which fences do not impede free access to public lands by prospective settlers and the general public. If the question as to whether or not the parties maintaining fences have a claim or color of title to the lands enclosed arises, and you are in doubt as to whether or not the act is being violated, the U. S. Attorney should be consulted, since the question what constitutes a claim or color of title within the purview of the act is one for judicial determination. Many complaints have also been received relative to the manner in which selections have been made by the State of New Mexico and the incidental inclosures.

ing of large areas of public lands thereby. Protests have also been filed in this office against a number of such selections. Much space was given in the above referred to special agents' reports relative to these "shoe-string selections."

The governor is authorized to select for specified purposes by the provision of the enabling act of June 20, 1910, public lands in the state which are subject to selection. Law does not prescribe the form in which selections may be made, nor does it vest authority in the land department to designate the person to whom the selected lands shall be leased or sold by the state. Notwithstanding the fact that apparent hardship to other land claimants may be occasioned at times, yet it is not practicable to prevent the selection of such lands subject thereto, which has been made for special or prospective value to the state because of favorable location or otherwise for the benefit of the particular objects or institutions for which the selection is made. Furthermore, the state is entitled under the act to select such lands subject to selection, in such amounts and localities as it seems advisable, until its right to select shall have been exhausted, and it may lease such lands as it shall have obtained title to, in such manner as the laws of the state shall authorize. Attention has been called to the fact that the state has obtained withdrawals of large areas of unsurveyed lands within the state under the act of Aug. 18, 1894, and that prior to the approval of selections made by the state within such withdrawn areas leases have been made in favor of large cattle companies.—Continued Next Week.
