## Court Adjourned Yesterday.

Contrary to expectations, the district court came to a sudden close yesterday. Many criminal cases were disposed of during the session, yet there remains on the docket a number of cases that were continued to next term. Since the report of last week, four jury trials have been had, in which a verdict of guilty was returned in each case, as follows:

Sesario Gutierrez, rape; Murdock Kelly, obtaining goods under false pretenses; Rafael Flores assault, and M. H. Price, perjury.

Several pleas of guilty have been entered during the term, sentences imposed in all, but suspended in some cases.

The following is a complete report of all cases of a criminal nature coming before the court during the session just ended, and the disposition made in each case:

Jose Montoya, forgery, nolle.

Severo Gallegos, assault with a deadly weapon; nolle.

R. E. Ferris, assault to kill; dropped with leave to reinstate.

Allen Wylie, same charge and disposition.

Otojo Gallegos, assault to kill; nolle.

Robert Swan, larceny of cattle; plea of guilty; sentence not less than two nor more than three years; suspended during good behavior.

J. Greer, manslaughter; nolle.

John C. Trapp, Malcom Trapp, and John Trapp, murder; jury trial; Malcom Trapp was found guilty of manslaughter; the other two were acquitted; sentence not less than five nor more than ten years. Appealed.

E. H. Yates, assault with intent to kill; plea of guilty; fined \$100 and costs and sentenced to ninety days in jail; jail sentence suspended.

Rafael Flores, assault, being armed with a deadly weapon; jury trial; verdict of guilty; sentence not less than two nor more than three years.

Pedro Salazar, larceny of horse, plea of guilty; sentence not less than three nor more than five years in penitentiary.

Eusebio Chavez, larceny of a horse; plea of guilty; sentence not less than four nor more than five years in the penitentiary.

Pedro Salas, larceny of neat cattle; plea of guilty; sentence of five years in penitentiary; sentence suspended during good behavior.

Cleve Hibler, assault, being armed with a deadly weapon; dismissed; bail discharged.

Sesario Gutierrez, rape; jury trial; verdict guilty; sentence not less than 15 nor more than 20 years in penitentiary.

Murdock Kelly, obtaining goods under false pretenses; jury trial; verdict guilty; sentence not less

than two nor more than five years in penitentiary.

Eugenio Garcia, same charge; nolle.

Jose Garcia, assault with intent to kill; jury trial; verdict of guilty; sentence not less than 18 months nor more than three years.

Madison H. Price, perjury; jury trial; verdict guilty; not less than two nor more than five years in penitentiary.

J. E. Everett, larceny of cattle, plea of guilty; sentence suspended during good behavior.

A great many motions were heard in civil suits, and a number of decisions handed down by the court. It has been a lengthy term, somewhat irregular in the beginning, but when once fairly started kept actively at it. Taken all in all, it has been one of the most successful terms, from the standpoint of the prosecution, in several years.

### County Decision Withheld.

Our columns were held open until midnight Saturday night, awaiting a decision in the county seat matter. At that hour Attorneys Hewitt, Hudspeth and Barber returned from El Paso, and reported that Judge Mechem had taken the case under advisement. Therefore, all the information we can give our readers is that the case was argued and an early decision promised.

Judge Mechem and the attorneys went to El Paso Thursday, and the case concerning the Lincoln county seat question was heard there. The purpose of going to El Paso was that the attorneys for Lincoln asserted that no library was convenient here from which their decisions could be produced. The attorneys for Carrizozo had all the volumes they wanted, and have been pre-

pared at any time, for the past thirty days, to present their side to the court. However, they, representing the people of Carrizozo, were anxious to have a hearing, and agreed to go to El Paso, Mexico, or even Africa, in order to get it.

### Judge Cooley's Resignation Accepted.

Contrary to reports of last week President Taft decided to accept the resignation of Judge Cooley, and a vacancy, therefore, exists in this judicial district. Three names have been mentioned in connection with the vacancy, viz.: E. R. Wright of Santa Rosa, district attorney for the counties of Quay and Guadalupe; Jerry Leahy of Raton, for many years district attorney of Colfax and Union counties, and who is a brother of D. J. Leahy, the present U. S. District Attorney; and Frank W. Clancy, attorney general of the territory. All these gentlemen rank high as attorneys, and either, it is believed, will make a good judge.

### INDUSTRIAL NOTES.

Eggs from the United States are sent to Europe and the Philippines.

In Spain the old-style charcoal brazier is still in use for heating purposes.

A shovel with high, sharp edges and with a hinged blade that lifts away from the front, has been patented by a New Jersey resident to cut and lift soda.

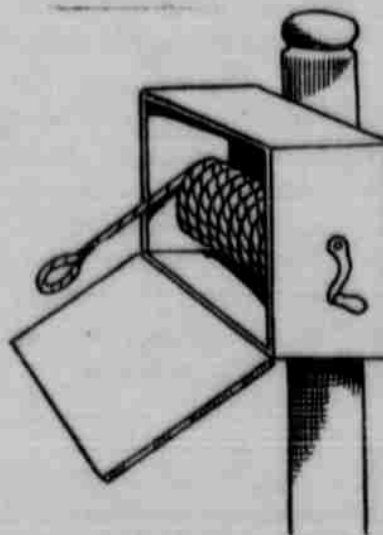

### HANDY CLOTHES-LINE REEL

Implement Any Bright Boy Can Make for His Mother Within a Few Minutes.

Any bright boy can make this reel for his mother after he has studied the picture for five minutes. Set the post firmly in the ground, tamping in broken stone or brickbats to hold it



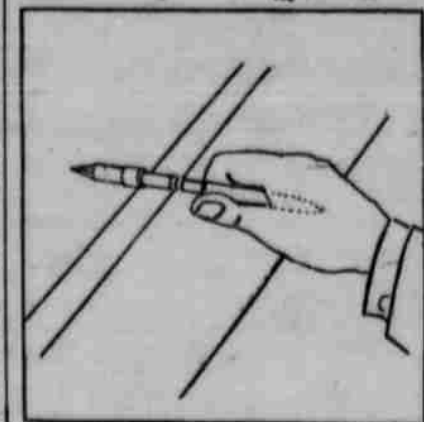
A Handy Clothes-Line Reel.

erect. The box will always keep the clothes-line dry and clean. If one of the posts is set just inside the kitchen porch and another box placed upon it, the clothes-line may be wound up from either end by adding sufficient string to reach the distance between the posts. The reel should be of a stout piece of wood and the box must be strong enough to stand the strain of the line when full of wet clothes.

### PENCIL WITH MANY COLORS

Marking Crayon, Lumber Gauge and Tally Stick Combined in One Piece—Useful Implement.

One of the most ingenious devices recently put on the market is that shown in the cut. This device, the invention of a Maryland man, is a combination marking crayon, lumber gauge and tally pencil. First, there is a long, thin tube with an opening large enough to receive a lead pencil.

At the other end is an enlarged tubular holder for crayon, the crayon receiving end forming a shoulder, which makes the stop when the tube is drawn across the edge of the board, for instance. Along the tube a scale is marked, by means of which the thickness of a board may be measured, as between the shoulder and the marks on the gauge. The crayon is for marking boards and the pencil for recording the various necessary data in the owner's note book. For lumbermen this little implement is very useful, as it relieves them of the necessity of keeping their vest pockets stuffed with a veritable arsenal of pencils, crayons and rules, and also saves them the time otherwise wasted in hunting for each of these implements as it is required.

### BUILDING HOUSE OF CEMENT

Maine Man Constructs Home That is Impervious to Heat or Cold, Or Leak of Rain.

In Belfast, Me., there is a house, built by Frank Hoag, believed by the builder and citizens of that place to be the only one of the kind on earth.

Aside from the blasting and digging for the cellar, the house was built by Mr. Hoag himself. The entire outside is of cement, the mixing of the component parts being undertaken after a long study of the subject. Mr. Hoag finished the inside of the house first. This being done, he lathed the whole outside with wire screen stuff, such as is used for fencing chicken pens. This was firmly fastened. The studing was close, and when the wire was on it gave a rigid surface on sides, ends and the slopes of the roof.

Over this layer of wire he spread a first coat of cement. It was well pressed on, so that it oozed through the meshes of the wire for a clinching hold. When this first coating was thoroughly set another and a heavier one was spread over the surface. Shingle effects were fashioned on the gables and on the roof the cement was shaped and lined, to give an appearance of slating. Then over the whole outside was laid a finishing veneer of cement paint.

The house is as tight as a bottle. It is impervious to heat or cold, or leak of rain; and, as its foundation is a solid ledge, it can defy the frost to wrestle with it. Mr. Hoag says the cost of building was about the same as wooden construction would have been, but he says there will be no great number of repairs.

### KEEPING STOVE IN CONDITION

Will Be Always as "Good as New" If the Following Directions Are Observed.

Every woman when she gets a new stove thinks she will "keep it like that." But few know the best way, and soon get discouraged. Here are some bits from my own experience and the instruction of a stove dealer: The outside is to be kept clean by rubbing it with a newspaper daily, occasionally with a few drops of kerosene on a soft cloth. This cuts off any grime and prevents rust, but it leaves no permanent polish; so once in six months, say, try a coating of linseed oil and benzine in equal quantities. As this is inflammable the stove must be cold when it is applied. Rub on but a little at a time, following this immediately with a soft cloth.

This mixture of linseed oil and benzine is inexpensive, and will be found invaluable for polishing every iron thing, as well as furniture, floors and woodwork of the home.

To prevent rust on the inside of the oven is not so easy, as one does not care to put these ill-smelling oils where they will perfume her baking. The simplest plan is to leave the oven door slightly ajar after using it until the steam is out and the sides dried by air. Indeed, it is well to open the door quite often, as dampness collects quickly, and when rust is once begun the task is doubled.

Constant vigilance, air and oil are necessary to keep this useful member of the household machinery "new-looking."—Exchange.

### REAL THING IN INDIAN PILAU

Proper Ingredients for Preparation of This Extremely Appetizing Dinner Dish.

Three onions, five cloves, a tiny piece of cinnamon, one-fourth pound of butter, three-fourths pound of rice, one small fowl, six hard boiled eggs, two ounces of almonds and two ounces of raisins.

Place the onions, cloves and cinnamon in with the butter in a saucepan and fry them. Add rice and let it fry with them, but do not let it become brown. Boil a fowl in gravy and put it with the rice to boil. Always have at least two inches of gravy above the rice. When the rice is half done put the fowl into the middle of it and let it remain over a gentle fire till well cooked and dry. Then take up the fowl. Put it into a deep dish. Cover the fowl with the rice. Garnish it with the hard boiled eggs cut in quarters, the almonds blanched, and the raisins and cloves. Add also the onions, which have been boiled.

### Twelve O'clock Pie.

This is made with shoulder of mutton, boiled with carrot and onion, then cut up, mixed with potatoes separately boiled and cut up, and put into a baking dish. The crust is made by mixing smoothly mashed potatoes to which a tablespoonful of shortening has been added, with enough flour and water to make them roll out easily. A pie made of a pound of meat will require five or six small boiled potatoes, a cupful of mashed potatoes, and eight or ten tablespoonfuls of flour, and should be baked about twenty minutes in a hot oven. Salt, pepper and other seasoning, as onion and carrot, may be added to taste. A teaspoonful of baking powder makes the crust lighter.

### Tomato Bouillon.

A very dainty soup made without stock: To a can of tomatoes add a pint of water, a slice of onion, a bay leaf and one-half teaspoon celery seed. Boil rapidly for 15 minutes, then strain through a colander. Add the well-beaten whites of two eggs, bring quickly to the boiling point and after boiling five minutes add a teaspoonful of salt and strain through a cheese cloth. Reheat the bouillon, add a cup of whipped cream and serve with croutons.

### Villages without Power to License.

A rather neat point of law was involved in a case heard this week here before Judge Mechem. The matter came before the court on the hearing of habeas corpus proceedings, asking the discharge of Harvey Davidson, who had been arrested at Alamogordo, he having, upon the advice of counsel, opened a saloon in Alamogordo for the Improvement Company, in violation of an ordinance recently enacted by the village corporation, wherein the saloon license was fixed at \$3,000 per annum.

Davidson was represented by Attorney J. E. Wharton, of El Paso, while Judge Sherry, the mayor of Alamogordo, appeared in behalf of the village corporation. Mr. Wharton contended that villages incorporated under the act of 1909, as was Alamogordo, were without power to license saloons; that specific powers were granted to the corporation under that act, but that power to collect a liquor saloon license was not one of them. Judge Mechem upheld this contention, and handed down a decision Wednesday which declared the ordinance in question void.

Upon the receipt from their attorney, announcing the decision, the Alamogordo Improvement Company opened the saloon for business.

### Court Officials Depart.

Judge Mechem, District Attorney Llewellyn, Sheriff Stevens and jurors left yesterday upon the adjournment of court. The judge went to El Paso, accompanied by the attorneys in the county seat hearing, and the arguments are begin in that case today. District Attorney Llewellyn will go to his home at Las Cruces, from which point he will start in a day or two for New York to meet Teddy, when the ex-president lands on his native soil. Sheriff Stevens left at noon yesterday, with his guards, in charge of eight prisoners for the territorial penitentiary at Santa Fe. District Clerk Downs remained over until this morning's train, which he boarded for his home in Alamogordo. The attorneys from outside points have all returned to their respective homes.

### Jury Highly Complimented.

Yesterday morning before discharging the petit jury, Judge Mechem addressed the panel and passed a high compliment upon the members thereof. He told them that in the trying ordeal through which they had just passed, he believed they had conscientiously discharged their duty, and that the verdicts returned showed them to be fair-minded men, imbued with a strict sense of justice, and added that it was one of the best juries with which he had ever come in contact.

The judge, in commenting upon the jury, recalled an old custom in England. He said in olden times, in England, it was the custom of the judge, when he found a good jury, to carry the jury around with him from one place to another, and expressed his regret at his inability to do likewise with the members of the panel he was just discharging. It was a compliment, justly appreciated by the members, and one of which they should feel proud.

#### ADDITIONAL LOCAL.

Miss Francis McDonald returned Thursday from Denver, where she has been attending Wolfe Hall seminary. This is her second term at that institution.

A. R. Treat and C. W. Hyde have opened a meat market in the building on Alamogordo Avenue, formerly called the Carrizozo Meat Market.

R. J. Copeland, Angus; Pete Phillips, Alto; M. S. Crockett and L. R. Lamay, Capitan and Nogal, delivered a bunch of cattle here today to a shipper.

J. G. Riggle, probate clerk, came over from Lincoln Thursday and went to Santa Fe with Sheriff Stevens. Leo Oswald and Francisco Gonzales also went as guards.

The Nkws has been held over a day, or, rather a portion of its columns have been left open, in order to get a report on the result of the county seat decision, which was argued in El Paso today (Friday). Hence it will reach its readers one day late; but we feel the importance attached to this question of sufficient interest to allow readers to justify this action.

Hilario Flores, who had been indicted at this term of court, but whose case was not reached, was started to Lincoln on yesterday morning's Capitan train. At Indian Divide the prisoner stepped off the train, and the two guards, in whose charge he had been placed, failed to get off the train in time to overtake him before he got into the hills. Officers are still in pursuit, and the officers at Alamogordo and El Paso have been notified to look out for him. Sheriff Stevens has offered a reward of \$25 for his apprehension. Flores had not only been indicted on the charge of assault, but had about two months of a jail sentence hanging over him on a misdemeanor charge.

#### Old Mine Story Revived.

Nearly all mining sections in the great southwest has its story of a fabulously rich mine, which was worked many years ago, but its site obliterated and no authentic history left for future generations. Texas has its story in the famous Bowie mine, and the following dispatch may be of interest to many of our readers who have come from that section of the Lone Star State, and to all readers who are interested in fairy tales. The dispatch reads:

Brady, Texas, May 24.—J. T. Morgan has uncovered what he believes to be the famous Bowie mine on his ranch near Menardville, where on a hillside he found a peculiar depression leading into a cave or shaft, which had been carefully covered up on some former occasion. Cleaning it out a distance of 30 feet deep and 50 feet laterally, it showed what was originally a natural fissure that had been worked out artificially. Ancient bones and a glass globe were found at the bottom of the shaft. W. H.

Withers has opened up a similar shaft a few hundred yards distant, in which were found eight human skeletons. These shafts are three miles from the old dam and furnace on San Sabas river, which has been one of the curious sights of Menardville since its first establishment.

History records that during the Spanish occupancy of Texas in the Eighteenth century there were rich silver mines in the vicinity. But the hostility of the Indians was such as to compel their abandonment soon after the Mexican independence. In 1835 James Bowie fitted out a party in San Antonio to reopen these mines. His famous fight with the Indians in what is now McCulloch county, and his agreement with the Indian chiefs to abandon the search for the mine and be unmolested if he returned home, is an incident in Texas history. Since then many have sought for the so-called old Bowie mines, but in vain. The old furnace where the ores were smelted and the old Spanish dam old mining tools, and an old cannon used for defense of the camp have been found near the river, all pointing strongly to proximity of the old mines and lending plausibility to the Morgan discovery.

#### Change in Forest Lines.

President Taft has recently issued a proclamation which makes considerable changes in the boundary lines of the Lincoln National Forest. An addition of 29,738 acres has been made, and 68,348 acres have been eliminated. These changes are the result of an examination made during the year 1909, of the entire forest boundaries, under the authority of the department of agriculture.

The area of largest elimination is a strip north and east of Ancho; a strip near Richardson, and extending around the point of the Capitan mountains to Meek, near the east line of Lincoln county. Smaller areas have also been eliminated along the boundaries of the Gallinas section in this county. The largest addition is on the east of the Gallinas division, northwest of Corona. Some small additions were made in the neighborhood of Church peak, west of Nogal.

The additions will not affect the grazing privilege, so it is said, the present year, and no grazing fee is to be charged on this added area this year. The eliminated area will be restored to settlement and entry as soon as the department of the interior can adjust matters.

## USING THE TRIFLES

PREVENTION OF WASTE ADDS GREATLY TO INCOME.

In This Instance French Housekeepers Rightly May Claim to Be Ahead of Their American Sisters—Some Ideas in Point.

A French woman said that the greatest menace to America's prosperity was not her immigrant problem, but her garbage pails. As long as they were filled with what would keep a French family for a day, we must expect to come to a crash.

Fortunately we are doing better in the matter of scraps. Perhaps it is the corner on food products, maybe the dining into women's ears of the value of left-overs, but our garbage pails are no longer symbols of wastefulness.

A good cook rarely finds anything suitable for the garbage pail. If she does not turn her odd bits of bread into crumbs for frying, she utilizes them for bread puddings, stuffing, croutons and small pieces of toast for under poached or fried eggs. The remnants she throws to the birds and gets new knowledge of her feathered friends from daily feedings.

Next Day's Salad.—Vegetable scraps will be just the thing for a next day salad or if too messy for that they can be molded with a thick white sauce into nice croquettes and fried in deep fat. And the stock pot is ever yearning for vegetables, preferably fresh, but cooked left-overs are not to be despised.

Cold fish makes good salad or croquettes, or can be cut into small pieces mixed with a creamed sauce and baked in individual dishes with a layer of cheese or bread crumbs on top.

Cold meats need not go into the despised hash. There are all sorts of nice souffles and croquettes. Pieces of cold roast beef that are no longer big enough for slicing are delicious when frizzled in a little butter and served with horse radish sauce made from whipped cream. Also the stock pot yawns for the tiny remnants for sauces and gravies.

Saving on Lard.—One should not have to spend a small fortune buying lard and other frying ingredients when the fat from roasts, beef steaks, drippings and the tops of soups can all be turned into a nice frying medium.

When there is fruit that is not nice enough to serve by itself, or there is too little of it, make a compote or add it too a few lettuce leaves and cream cheese for salad. Or it can be stewed and served in the cups of stale cake or pate shells with a little whipped cream on top.

Stale cake is not hopeless as long as you can make fruit sauces or a rich wine sauce to pour over it as a softener.

Rice Into Dessert.—Cold corn starch can be served the next day with a thick chocolate sauce and seem quite like a new dessert, and cold rice can be mixed with egg, cinnamon, sugar and a little butter, molded into croquettes, dipped in bread crumbs, fried and served as Spanish croquettes.

Stale crackers are delicious buttered, spread with cheese and baked in a hot oven.

Cold tea grounds can be moistened again and used with a broom to settle dust in sweeping.

### Cottage Pudding.

One cup of sugar, butter size of egg, one teaspoonful soda in one-half cup of milk, two teaspoons cream of tartar in two cups of flour, one-half teaspoon vanilla, little salt. Beat well and bake in a sheet tin.

Sauce.—Two tablespoons flour and butter size of egg, creamed together. Add slowly 1½ cups boiling water, add one cup of sugar and flavor with lemon, vanilla or nutmeg. No egg in the pudding.

## VARIETIES OF STEW

SAVORY COMPOUNDS MADE AT SMALL EXPENSE.

Many Styles to Select From, and All May Be Recommended—Highly Seasoned Dish is the Spanish Stew.

**Welsh Stew.**—Take one and a quarter pounds of lamb chops off the shoulder. Season with salt and pepper, fry in fat until a light brown, and put in a stewing kettle. Make a gravy by putting a teaspoonful of flour in the frying pan that the meat has been fried in, and one pint of water. Add a pinch of whole allspice to the gravy and pour it over the meat. Let boil up, then add six large potatoes that have been peeled. Let boil for 15 minutes, then add one-half can of tomatoes and boil until meat and potatoes are tender.

**French Stew.**—Put three tablespoonfuls of butter and one large tablespoonful of flour in liquid used for rice soup. Sprinkle with pepper, add boiling water enough to cover one and one-half pounds of veal which has been cut into squares. Serve when perfectly tender.

**Spanish Stew.**—One and a half pounds of round steak, one canned red pepper, onions, butter, carrot, turnip and potato. Wipe and cut in pieces the steak. Put in kettle and cover with boiling water. Cook slowly two hours or until tender. After cooking one hour add one-fourth cup each of carrot and turnip in one-half inch cubes, and one-half an onion cut in slices. Fifteen minutes before serving add two cups of potatoes cut in small slices—previously boiled—and the pepper. One-half a pepper is enough if fresh. Season with salt and pepper. Thicken with a little flour diluted with enough cold water to form a thin, smooth paste.

**Irish Stew.**—Fifteen cents' worth of boiling beef put on to boil in hot water to preserve the juice within the meat. I should boil this small quantity of meat only about half an hour before adding the vegetables, namely: one carrot in slices, two good-sized onions, or equivalent sliced, half a dozen moderate sized potatoes sliced, perhaps eight, and a few slices of turnip cut thin. If the tops of a bunch of celery are added the flavor is vastly improved. A pod of capscum, put in at first with the meat, also greatly adds to the dish, but should be removed before serving.

### Tasty Uncooked Vegetables.

Uncooked vegetables, such as onions, radishes and cucumbers, should always be prepared in an appetizing manner for the table. A large Bermuda onion may be sliced to form sections resembling those of an orange. If these are placed in a saucer-shaped dish and the sections divided with curled parsley, the result will be very pleasing. Cucumbers cut into cubes and chilled are nicely served with olives, surrounded with parsley or upon lettuce leaves. Radishes, especially the small red ones, may be cut into thin slices and mixed with salads. They look tasty among wax beans in a vegetable salad. By cutting the thin skin of a radish into flower-like petals and folding them back, each radish will appear like a miniature rosebud. Cucumbers cut lengthwise and hollowed make pretty receptacles for a vegetable salad.

### Victor Emanuel's Beefsteak.

Take some tender beefsteaks, cut thick. Stew in a saucepan with two ounces of butter, two onions, a sprig of parsley, one carrot and a cupful of broth until the gravy becomes thick. Then place a bowlful of spaghetti in water with a little salt in it and boil till tender. Drain dry and put it in a stewpan with part of the gravy from the steaks. Let it simmer. Place the steaks in a dish and pour gravy over all, and grate over it a little parmesan cheese.
