evident. It was thought by providing for so large a delegation the result would be to popularize the movement; that having participated in forming the constitution, the delegates would feel in honor bound to advocate its adoption; that the refusal of the people to adopt the constitution would be in effect to repudiate the action of the delegates, and a reflection upon them thus placing in the field a large force of boosters for the constitution. I do not suppose an instance can be found wherein a convention to make or amend a constitution was composed of a larger delegation than that composing the legislature of the state or territory which in New Mexico is, I believe about twenty-five. If any difference should exist it ought to be in favor of a smaller number, and that for a reason that I will now state: A very erroneous idea prevails among intelligent people

I have been discussing the financial part of this monstrous, vilest "enabling act," but there is another feature which is more objectionable still. It is that provision which prohibits any public school being conducted in Spanish and which disqualifies any one from holding office either county or state, who does not understand English sufficiently well to conduct the duties of his office without the aid of an interpreter. How about an American officer in a county composed largely of Spanish-speaking people? He may employ an interpreter to enable him to transact business with his Spanish speaking constituents, but if a Mexican is elected who does not understand English sufficiently well, he is not to be allowed to enter upon the discharge of his duties; he is disqualified under a provision of the constitution which the people are not allowed to alter! Now I am not advocating the continuation of the use of the Spanish language in the state of New Mexico, ours is an Anglo-Saxon

did not issue any bonds; we never derived any benefit from them." "That's all right," say the stockholders, but Santa Fe and Grant and other counties did, and as we have not been able to make them pay and as you people want very badly to come into the union, we will hold you up and make you pay them!" I submit if this is a fair statement of the situation, I do not know the amount of the indebtedness that the people are required to pay, as a condition to being received into the union "on terms of equality with the original states;" and I doubt if there is a man in New Mexico who does know. There are a number of counties which for many years have been accumulating debts, which under the terms of this act the other counties will be compelled to pay. No one will for a moment pretend that there is a shadow of justice in this, the sole idea being, that the people are so anxious to get into the union that they will submit to any sort of imposition in order to accomplish that purpose. Large appropriations of the people's funds are made as a bribe to induce them to submit to this outrage. These lands like the million of acres appropriated

tions are formed for the purpose of enabling the people to do their will, to make such laws as they desire to make, while the very contrary is the real and only purpose of a constitution. If the people are to be allowed to make such laws as they desire, then no constitution is necessary let them elect their legislators, send them to the seat of government and do the peoples will without restraint; in order to prevent, this however, a constitution is formed to restrict their power. The constitution of a state and the constitution of the United States are created for precisely opposite purposes. Congress can do nothing which the constitution does not directly or by necessary implication authorize, while a state legislature can do anything which the constitution does not prohibit. As the main, if not the only purpose of a constitution is to throw safe-guards around the people, to guard them against improvident legislation, and especially to protect the rights of the minority against the encroachments of the majority, it follows that a constitutional convention ought to be composed of a few of the very ablest, and best men in the territory.

As the bond holders have

tongue, is in my opinion a wrong
 that ought to be resented, not
 alone by every self-respecting
 Mexican, but by broad-minded
 liberal Americans as well.

I am in favor of statehood, have always been, but not on the terms proposed by the land holders. If I am in New Mexico when a vote is taken on adopting a constitution on lines laid down in the bill, I shall vote against it, for I am still in favor of the territory, and am concerned and can submit a little longer, better stay out of the union than come in under terms that will operate as a disgrace to the people as long as time shall endure.

As long as we are a territory, we are allowed to hope for better things, but once a state, always a state, and if we come in with our hands voluntarily tied we shall remain political slaves to the powers set above us.

Permit me to trespass a little further on your space by adding a word to what I have said on the debt question.

A large proportion of the debt is embraced in what is known as the Brice-Cole bonds. These were bonds issued by the counties of Santa Fe and Grant in aid of a railroad enterprise. It is not denied that they were

With the major portion of the good roads fund being used in Santa Fe county and the millions of dollars contributed by the enabling act, the old pauper county of New Mexico will shortly be in as good circumstances as any of the self made youngsters that have grown up lately.

The announcement of Jas. D. Whelan for delegate to the constitutional convention appears in this issue. Mr. Whelan has given the matter of a constitution much study and undoubtedly knows more than the average citizen about constitutions. Mr. Whelan is well up on all that pertains to the work and if he goes will make a good delegate.

The letter from Judge Freeman published in this issue coming as it does from a former judge of the supreme court of New Mexico, should have considerable weight with the people who do not believe in being buncoed. As the judge is still a citizen of New Mexico, though at present residing in Victoria, B. C., he is unprejudiced and unhampered in his views. While his voice and pen were always outspoken for what he considered right, he never "barked in" when his duty did not require that his views be given without fear or favor.

The year 1910 will, unless heavy rains come in the fall, go down in history as the drouthiest ever known in this section. Since Jan. 1, 1910 only one inch of rain, snow, sleet, hail or other precipitation has fallen in Carlsbad, and it is just a year ago tomorrow since a rain of any consequence has fallen and then only three inches and a fraction fell. The cow men on the west side of the river have been busy moving their cows and calves and are today at their wits end as to how to provide feed. No doubt if the drouth continues there will be many losses and much expense in shipping and feeding.

Chairman Cooper of the Eddy county democratic central committee is out with a call for a meeting of the committee for next week Saturday, July 30, to determine the manner of election of two delegates to the constitutional convention to be held in Santa Fe October 3rd. The members of the committee are: D. G. Gratham, Carlsbad, J. U. McCrary, Artesia, W. L. Whitaker, Hope, J. B. King, Dayton, J. A. Heard, Knowles, T. P. Bingham, Monument, C. W. Larremore, Malaga, E. S. Shattuck, Queen, J. H. Burdett. As Burdett of Lakewood has moved to Artesia and Larremore has left Malaga the precincts of Malaga and Lakewood will probably send others to represent them on the committee. The call published last week was handed in signed by the chairman and was changed by him to the 30th. It is of the utmost importance that representative democrats from all over the county meet with the committee for democracy does not permit any secrecy whatever, so the more democrats that attend to give expression as the manner of nominating delegates the better.

COMMISSIONERS MEET

OFFICIAL REPORT IN FULL OF A BUSINESS SESSION.

Continued From Last Week's Issue.

It was moved and carried that the road supervisor be instructed to open the public road beginning at a point on the Carlsbad road where said road passes the southeast corner of section 30, northeast corner of sections 31 township 23, range 27 east, thence east between sections 29 and 32, 28 and 33, 27 and 34, township 23, south, range 27 east thence north on section line between ranges 27 and 28 east to the northeast corner of section 25, thence east on section line between sections 19 and 30, 20 and 29, township 23 range 28 east to the southwest corner of town of Loving.

A petition having been presented by a number of citizens of the south half of township 18, range 38 and 39, requesting the board to annex that portion of said township to precinct No. 12, it was moved and carried that the south half of township 18 be and the same is hereby ordered to be annexed or attached to voting precinct No. 12.

The viewers appointed to view the proposed road commencing at the southwest corner of section 6, township 22 south, range 27 east, and running thence due south on section line about seven miles, thence in a south and a southwesternly direction intersecting the Texas state line, having filed no report, they were continued as viewers of said road and requested to file their report in this office 10 days before the next regular meeting of this board.

A petition having been presented for the establishing of a public road beginning at the southwest corner, section 20, township 19, south, range 38 east and running on section line due east between sections 22 and 23, thence due east 3-4 mile on section 23, thence 1-4 mile south to the section line between sections 23 and 26, thence due east on the section line to the Texas line, it was moved and carried that the following viewers be appointed: W. T. McCormick, D. E. House and W. L. Sorrels.

It having been shown to the board that the northeast quarter of the southwest quarter of section 27, township 18 south, range 26 east was in the year 1907 sold for the 1905 taxes and that the final receipt for said land was not issued from the land office until December 1905 consequently the land was not subject to taxation that year, and the board being of the opinion that the error should be corrected, the district attorney of this district is therefore authorized to apply to the district court of this county for an order to the Treasurer asking that he issue redemption certificates for the cancellation of the tax sale certificates on said land without cost to the owner of said land.

It having been shown to the board that Mr. John Schrock is the owner of the northwest quarter and the north half of the southwest quarter of section 27, twp. 19 south, range 25 east N. M. P. M. and that said land is unimproved grazing land and not in an artesian well belt, nor subject or adjoining any private or public irrigation system and that for the year 1906 said land was assessed at \$5.00 per acre, when it should not have been assessed more than \$1.25 per acre. The board being of the opinion that the erroneous assessment should be corrected, the district attorney of this district is hereby authorized to apply to the district court of this county for an order correcting said assessment.

It having been shown to the board that the assessment of the

south half of the northwest quarter section 35, township 18 south, range 26 east was assessed for the year 1909 at \$17.50 per acre, when really it should not have been assessed for more than \$5.00, owing to the fact that said land had no water right and was unirrigated land, therefore the board being of the opinion that the error should be corrected, it was recommended that the assessed valuation on the land belonging to Henry Fox be reduced from \$1400 to \$590 and that the District Attorney be requested to apply to the district court of this county for an order correcting the said assessment.

It having been shown to the Board that for the year 1909 the northeast quarter of the southwest quarter of section 26, township 23 south, range 28 east was assessed to Jack Shelby as water right land, valued at \$700, when really it was dry land and should not have been assessed for more than \$1.25 per acre, and that said Jack Shelby having paid in taxes on the \$700 valuation, which was \$31.49 more than he should have paid, it was moved and carried that the district attorney of this district is hereby authorized to apply to the district court of this district for an order to the county treasurer to reduce the valuation of said property on his tax roll and refund the said \$31.49 to the said Jack Shelby.

It having been shown to the board that lots 9, 19 and 11 in block 1 of the town of Loving, formerly called Florence, during the year 1908 belonged to the school district No. 10 of Eddy county, consequently, it was not subject to taxation but through error it was assessed for the year 1908 and sold for taxes for that year under tax sale certificates No. 3836, 3837 and 3839. It was moved and carried that the district attorney be authorized to apply to the district court of this district for an order to the county treasurer cancelling the above tax sale certificates, that they be set aside as naught.

It was moved and carried that the board instruct the treasurer to collect all delinquent taxes on personal property and if same is not paid when sufficient notice has been given that the collector proceed to collect same by sale of said property as provided by law.

It having been shown to the board that during the year 1906, L. S. Osborne owned the southwest quarter of the southwest quarter of the southwest quarter of section 10, twp. 23 south, range 21 east and that he paid the taxes on said land for the year 1906 under receipt No. 870, and for the year 1906 that said land was sold to Eddy county for taxes under tax sale certificates No. 2857, and 2858. It is hereby ordered that the district attorney apply to the district court of this district for an order to the county treasurer to cancel said tax sale certificates that they may be set aside as naught.

It having been shown to the board that lots 15 and 5 block 8 of the Clayton and Stegmen addition to the town of Artesia were advertised and sold for taxes for the year 1907 to Pecos Valley Abstract Company, when really there were no such lots in the said town, that said Pecos Valley Abstract Co. had paid to the county of Eddy for said lots the sum of \$18.00, it was moved and carried that it is hereby ordered that the district attorney be instructed to apply to the dis-

trict court of this district for an order to the treasurer of this county to refund the said \$18.00 to the Pecos Valley Abstract Co.

It having been shown that the lots 1, 2, 3 and 4, block 16 of the original town of Artesia for the year 1907 were assessed to A. V. Logan, and paid for by him, they were also assessed to unknown owners and sold for taxes for the year 1907 to the Pecos Valley Abstract Co. and that the present owner of the above mentioned lots to clear the title on said land was compelled to pay the sum of \$17.56, it is hereby ordered that the district attorney be requested to make application to the district court for an order to the county treasurer to refund the sum of \$17.56 and cancel the said tax sale certificates.

It having been shown to the board that J. O. Cameron had paid the 1909 taxes on the west half of the northeast quarter of section 1, township 22 south, range 26 east and that the said land was included in the J. O. Cameron special assessment, which was on the following described property:

The viewers appointed to view a proposed road commencing at the corner of sections 10, 11, 14 and 15, township 24 south, range 28 east in Eddy county, running thence north on section line between sections 10 and 11, 1-2 mile, thence east along the south line to and across the Pecos river to the center point of the south line of section 1 in township 19 and range as above, having reported that said road was feasible and advisable and that the cost of said road would be \$714 and the Hagerman Development Co. having agreed to do all grade work and grubbing, and construct a bridge across the Pecos river provided that the county commissioners would pay for the material to the amount of \$295, it was moved and carried that said roads be ordered opened and the county accept the proposition made by the Hagerman Development Co. and it being distinctly understood that the opening of the said road and the building of the necessary bridge is not to cost the county more than \$295.
