ON THE HALF SHELL

Those of our readers who are acquainted with the difficulties surrounding us for nearly three months past, will not be surprised to see the LEADER appear this week as a half sheet. Since the last week in August we have had all our type setting and press work to do, and during a major portion of the time had to impress friends to manipulate the ink roller for us on press days. Then with our last issue much campaign timber had to be taken down and stowed away, tickets printed, and other extra work to be done, which challenged all the efforts which our already exhausted frame could meet.

But we feel assured that our readers have but little appetite this week for other than election returns, and those we present as fully as possible.

Next week the LEADER will be in trim again, when expected help will enable us to keep pace with the demands of our patrons and cater to their appetite for fresh, crisp news touching our local and general interests.

On reading the result of the election in White Oaks, as published in to-day's paper, some may be led to suppose that the editor of the LEADER was a candidate for J. P. on Tuesday, and defeated therefor. Such would be in error. It has long been known that the present incumbent of the office, W. F. Blanchard, would not be a candidate for re-election, for the reason that the office did not pay expenses, and when the office was going begging for an occupant we were waited upon by Messrs Brothers and Walters, and those gentlemen representing in their persons the Republican and Democratic parties, on the understanding that there should be no political contest we consented to stand as a candidate. Subsequently we were nominated as such candidate by a non political convention, and tickets with our name thereon were printed accordingly. On the evening before election we learned that fierce opposition to our election was being made by some for the reason that "Democrat" was not burned in upon our flesh, when we withdrew from the contest, being in flexibility opposed to mixing politics in our local affairs, but at no time did we solicit votes, or feel ambitious to fill the office. When we seek an office it will be one that will be self-sustaining, and worthy at least our vote, which inexpensive tribute we did not pay to it on Tuesday. The votes we received were certainly from zealous friends, and cast without the asking. We are glad there were no more of them, at least not enough to have elected us.

THE People's Ticket of this county ran independent of management. For instance, the names of associate candidates for Councilman and Representative were not printed or provided the printer until after all the tickets had been distributed. No wonder defeat met it.

There can be little or no doubt that Joseph is elected to Congress. Prince should be given full credit for such result. Had he, at A buquerque, shown as much party spirit as Rynerson, and less stubborn egotism, a clean Republican would represent New Mexico at the central summit of the Nation.

P. M. Bellomy received a letter from his son, John, to-day, stating that on Tuesday, nine wagons, laden with Rhode's Dry Washer left Las Vegas for this point. Now the Jicarillas can hold up its head. A live Dutchman will resurrect it, and his name in English is, John C. W. Rhode.

President Blaine Rides Triumphant to the White House.

Every night since election, save last night, we were in receipt of dispatches, via Ft. Stanton, thro' our friend J. C. DeLaney, Esq.— As we were holding our paper open expressly for the latest telegrams, our disappointment last night was keen.

We cannot, with the returns before us, holler very loud, but we were charged, and have to fire off our exuberance. Perhaps a day or two's delay might dampen our hopes, but this Saturday morning finds us sanguine that the bitter chalice containing all that is embodied in the person of Cleveland, and the character of the party and principles which he represents, will not be pressed to our lips.

The whole Pacific slope went solid for Blaine.

As yet no Northern State has absolutely broken the Blaine chain but Connecticut, which gave a Democratic majority of about 1,000. Indiana is close, presenting probability to Republicans, and possibility to Democrats.

All hopes now center on New York. Its electoral vote would elect Blaine, and put Cleveland within 6 votes of election. If Indiana has gone for Blaine, and New York for Cleveland, the election will be transferred from the people to their representatives in Washington, in which event the elevation of Cleveland would be but a matter of form.

The N. Y. Commercial Advertiser—a Cleveland paper—in its issue of Thursday evening, said—

Returns from New York continue to come in slowly, and until the last has been received it will be impossible to say with any certainty which party has carried the State. In any event the result will be close. The report that the New York Tribune concedes New York to Cleveland, is officially denied. On the contrary the Tribune claims the State will give Blaine a fair plurality when all the returns are in, and that Blaine is elected President."

Both parties claim New Jersey, but certain it is the Republicans have carried both branches of the Legislature, which secures to them a U. S. Senator.

We hail with delight the news that Maj. Wm. Warner was elected to Congress from the district of which Kansas City is the pulsating centre. True merit has found its reward, and the Democrats of that district did well in dropping their nobody and elevating a Republican giant.

In a word—if we're whipped, we don't know it. Hurrah.

CHARLEY DEAN is in town, and says that such as believed him dead, a skeddaddler, or other than the same old reliable Charlie, are away off, and that in the near by and bye, before the official count is promulgated, he will be in business at the old stand again, making friends happy and envious enemies miserable.

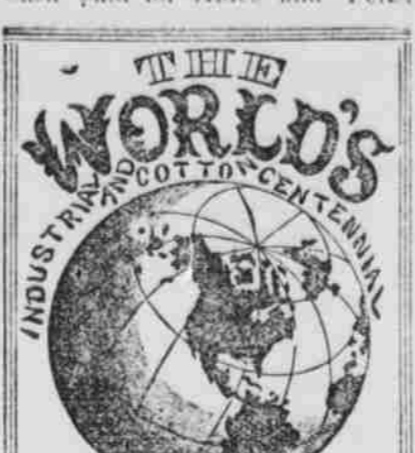
