The Division of Delegates.

It is just as impossible to tell how the 100 delegates in the New Mexico constitutional convention will be divided as it is to name the next president of the United States. It is not very difficult to figure out the result in twenty of the twenty-six counties, but the result in the doubtful counties may upset the best calculations. There are eleven counties, with 31 delegates, that the democrats are reasonably certain to carry; and there are nine counties, with 42 delegates, that are just as safely republican. The remaining six counties, with 21 delegates, constitute the battle ground. Using this as a basis, and placing the counties in the three columns, where conditions seem to indicate they properly belong, we have the following result:

The figures to the right in the doubtful column indicate the possible result in the doubtful counties. We believe it to be a fair estimate, and if the calculation holds good the total result would be republicans 55, democrats 45. If the democrats carry Colfax, as they did two years ago, and secure the entire delegation, the representation of the two parties would be almost equal. If the democrats succeed in Rio Arriba—they carried that county two years ago—the republican majority would become a minority. At all events it means a close, hard fight, with a minority in either case sufficiently strong to command attention.

Campaign Headquarters Open.

Santa Fe, N. M., July 21.—The territorial republican central committee has opened headquarters for the constitutional campaign. The headquarters are in the historic Old Palace of this city, now occupied by the School of American Archaeology. In charge is Chairman H. O. Bursum and Secretary Frank W. Shearon.

A vigorous campaign will be urged from now on for the first election, that of delegates to the constitutional convention on September 6.

The Democratic headquarters have been opened at Albuquerque by attorney W. B. Walton, the chairman. The Prohibitionists also have headquarters at

Albuquerque, in charge of Rev. H. E. Seder, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league, who in an interview at Santa Fe said that unless the constitution contained a prohibition clause it would be defeated at the polls.

William Hoyle Killed in Mine.

William Hoyle died in White Oaks Sunday morning at 1 o'clock from the effects of a fall in the shaft of the Boston Bay mine the day previous. Messrs. Hoyle and Watson and Mr. Watson's son were working in a shaft about 40 feet deep. The air became foul, and young Watson went to the surface, but Mr. Hoyle remained for some minutes. Finally the bad air caused him to start up the ladder, but as he got near the surface and encountered a breath of fresh air he lost control and fell to the bottom of the shaft.

The fall crushed one leg, broke his collar bone and bruised head and body. The injured man was conveyed to White Oaks as soon as possible, and Dr. Paden called

from this place, but the injuries were fatal, and the wounded man never regained consciousness. Aside from the injuries mentioned, death was probably more directly due to internal injuries.

The deceased was a native of Ohio, was fifty-six years old and had lived in White Oaks the past nineteen years. William Watson is the only near relative he had in this county at the time of his death. His daughter, Ida, is in Ohio, and is the only one of the immediate family living. Mrs. Hoyle having died seven years ago. The funeral took place Sunday afternoon. The deceased was a highly respected citizen, enjoyed the confidence and esteem of those with whom he was acquainted, and his death in such a shocking manner caused sincere regret among his friends, many of whom live in Carrizozo. To the orphaned daughter and other relatives the News extends sympathy.

Attorney Hamilton and family were over from Capitan Saturday.

Rifle Range Selected.

A new rifle range has been selected for the use of the New Mexico National Guard and also for the Military Institute of Roswell. Col. Wilson, of the Institute and an agent for the government made the selection. The location is near the east point of the Capitan mountains, in this county, and twelve sections will be set aside for this purpose. It is an ideal spot, well protected and amidst beautiful scenery.

The Lincoln Mail Stage Wrecked in the Bonito Stream.

The mail carrier between Lincoln and Roswell came very near losing his life one day this week about seven miles below Lincoln. He was crossing the Bonito, and while in the bed of the stream was struck by a heavy flood. The stage was washed away, the mail sacks lost and one horse drowned. Nicolas Chavez, the driver, had great difficulty in reaching the bank in safety.

TIMELY FARM NOTES.

Every farm should have its patch of popcorn.

When aphids attack garden plants use tobacco water or kerosene emulsion just as soon as the insects appear. Repeat if necessary.

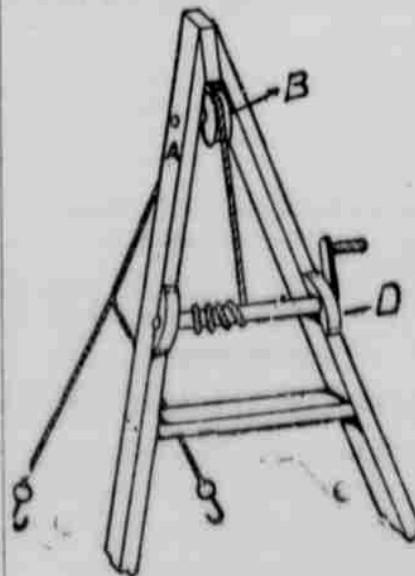
A good time to kill weeds is the day before you see them. A seed which has just thrown out a sprout is very easy to kill, simply moving it does the trick.

"HANDY JACK" FOR HAY RACK

Excellent Arrangement for Those Having Heavy Grain Tanks, Racks or Boxes to Lift.

For the benefit of those having heavy grain tanks, hayracks or boxes to lift off or on wagons or sleighs, and in answer to request of a reader



"Handy Jack" for Lifting.

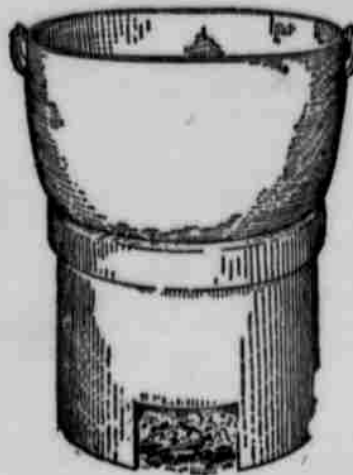
wanting a plan of device for this purpose, I send herewith rough sketch of a simple but convenient article, says a writer in an exchange. The two upright pieces, "A," are 2 by 4 inches, 8 feet long, spread 2 feet 6 inches at bottom and taper towards the top with a grooved wheel, one out of a tackle block, fitted in at top end, B. The roller C can be made of 1 1/2 inch gas pipe with a crank fitted to one end. Cut half diameter of pipe in upright posts, then fit boxes over same at D, fasten your rope to this roller and pass through grooved wheel at top, fasten two hooks to this rope, as per cut and your "Handy Jack" is ready. To use, place this jack as nearly upright as possible at one end

of wagon and lean against your rack. Fasten the two blocks at each side and raise it to the required height, (posts having been set and cross pieces provided to receive same); place your cross piece and lower rack to its place. A hole should be bored through frame near the end of crank with a bolt or pin provided to hold the crank while placing or removing cross pieces under rack.

UNIQUE OPEN-AIR FURNACE

Proves Excellent Where Kettle is Used for Heating Water—Made of Ordinary Tile.

When a kettle is used in the open air for heating water, or boiling maple sirup, there is considerable of the heat wasted, unless a furnace of some kind is built about the fire. The accompanying sketch illustrates a fur-

nace made of an ordinary drain or sewer tile. The diameter of the tile must be of such a size as to let the largest part of the rounding bottom sit inside. Dig out a hole in the earth under the tile or break a piece out of the tile to make an opening to feed the fire and for the draft.

FROG, TURTLE AND TERRAPIN

Demand for These Delicacies Growing Stronger in All Eastern Markets—Bring Fancy Prices.

The demand for frogs, turtles and terrapins is growing stronger in the eastern cities of the United States. Quite a good deal of money is being made by those who have undertaken to supply these markets.

The state of Missouri alone shipped \$445,998 worth to eastern buyers last year.

This state holds first rank as a producer of frogs, and none other ships so many to the east.

The flesh of the frog is white and tender and to many people it is more toothsome than that of fish. Their skins are also valuable, as they are used for making fancy purses and other leather novelties. The Missouri turtle has become famous for its tenderness and delicacy. Many of the streams in Missouri abound with them and it is said when they are shipped to the cities they often become the basis of many green turtle soups.

Most of the terrapins exported from Missouri are products of Dunklin, Pemiscot and New Madrid counties. There is a great area of swampy land in these countries, and here the terrapins grow and multiply very rapidly.

They always meet with ready sales on the market, and bring fancy prices in New York, Boston and other large eastern cities. Many claim that when Missouri terrapin is properly prepared he is as delicious as the salt water variety.

Keep the Ice Box Sanitary.

Make a cheese cloth mat of two thicknesses of this material, and after clearing the ice box out, before placing the blocks there in, lay the mat carefully over the drain pipes and it will collect all matter that would otherwise clog the water pipe.

FOUR GOOD, NEW SALADS

Something Out of the Ordinary and Specially Nice and Appropriate for Luncheons.

The ingenuity of woman has, as yet, failed to discover anything more appropriate than a salad to serve as refreshment at the afternoon or evening party. Here are four novelties for such occasions:

Cherry Salad.—One pint can cherry juice, one cup canned cherries, one dozen pimento olives cut in rings, one small cupful of celery, one-half cupful of black walnuts, one envelope powdered gelatin. Heat cherry juice to boiling point, over gelatin pour three tablespoonfuls of hot juice, stir until dissolved, then add remaining juice. When cold and beginning to thicken add other ingredients. Pour into oblong pan to mold. Serve in slices on lettuce leaf, with wafers and mayonnaise to which whipped cream has been generously added. Will serve eight.

Wholesome Vegetable Salad.—Cut two potatoes into dice. Mix with them any vegetables on hand. Use peas or beans or corn, with no milk with it. If you have an apple, cut it up and toss it in. Add the meat of a dozen walnuts, chopped fine. Add a chopped stalk of celery. Cover with any good dressing, stirring it in lightly and using plenty. Serve on lettuce leaves.

Chicken and Cheese Salad.—Cream together 1½ cupfuls of grated cheese with one cupful of chopped chicken and mix with the following dressing: The yolks of three hard-boiled eggs rubbed to a smooth paste with three tablespoonfuls of salad oil; add a teaspoonful mustard, half a teaspoonful of red pepper, two saltspoonfuls of salt, tablespoonful of vinegar. Garnish with slices of lemon and the whites of the eggs cut in slices.

Jellied Salad.—To two teaspoonfuls of gelatin add enough water to cover it, and soak for a half-hour. Put over the fire a quart of water, bring to a boil, stir in the gelatin and a cupful of sugar, and, when both are dissolved, take from the fire and add the juice of two lemons. Turn into a bowl to cool. When cool and beginning to thicken, stir into the jelly 1½ cupfuls of celery cut—not chopped—very fine. Beat until thoroughly mixed, turn into a wet mold and set aside to form. Turn upon a dish lined with crisp lettuce and serve with mayonnaise.—Harper's Bazar.

THREE GOOD PIE RECIPES

The Kind You Should Paste in the Kitchen Scrap Book.

New Pie Recipe.—Cut stalks of rhubarb in one-half inch pieces. There should be 1½ cups. Mix seven-eighths cup sugar, two tablespoonfuls of flour, and one egg slightly beaten. Add to rhubarb and bake between two crusts.

Strawberry Pie.—Bake a rich crust. When done, and about an hour before serving, sprinkle over the bottom of crust a little flour, then put in evenly fresh strawberries (uncooked), cover with pulverized sugar. Make a thick frosting of whites of eggs and brown quickly to avoid cooking the berries.

Cream Strawberry Pie.—Line a pie-plate with a puff paste, and fill with strawberries. Strew these thickly with sugar. Put a top crust on the pie, first rubbing the edge of the lower crust with butter to prevent their sticking. Bake to a light brown. When cold, lift the cover of the pie and put under this top crust a great cupful of whipped cream. Replace the crust and sprinkle this with powdered sugar.—Harper's Bazar.

Rice Muffins.

One quart flour, one egg, one-half cupful of sugar, one cupful of boiled rice, two scant teaspoons baking powder, one-half cupful of sweet milk, one-half cupful of thick sour cream, in which one-half teaspoonful of soda has been dissolved.

It should be a rather thick batter. Bake in gem irons.

Victor Murdock, the big red-headed insurgent congressman from Kansas, has coined a new word. He says that Speaker Cannon is not only a "stand-patter" but a "stand-stiller."

Attorney E. R. Wright of Santa Rosa, recently appointed associate justice of the supreme court of New Mexico, has, by the supreme court, been assigned to this, the sixth district, with headquarters at Alamogordo.

The regular and insurgent republican candidates in Kansas are furnishing lots of amusement to the people. Claiming to be the Simon-pure article, each representative has his faction, and each is roundly denounced by his opponent.

The first county seat case, appealed to the supreme court last September, has been dismissed at the cost of the appellants. The appeal of the new case, in which Judge Mechem recently rendered a decision favorable to Carrizozo, is still pending in the supreme court, and the date fixed for the arguments is the 25th of next month.

The democrats have gone on record as favoring the initiative and referendum. As a matter of fact, it is what the people demand and is not a party question. Oregon, a republican state, has both in her constitution, and United States Senator Bourne says his state enjoys the best government of any state in the union. Consequently, there is no reason why these features should not be incorporated in our basic instrument, and it is generally believed they will be, if the people elect delegates who will serve the people instead of the interests.

The republican central committee will meet in Lincoln Monday, pursuant to a call by Chairman Hamilton. At the meeting the committee will decide on the date and place of holding the county convention which is to nominate candidates for delegates to the constitutional convention. The names of several republicans have been mentioned in connection with these nominations, but no one, so far as we are aware, has publicly announced his candidacy.

The people cannot be too careful in the selection of delegates to the constitutional convention. Unfortunately, many men do not take the interest in the present campaign that they usually manifest in regular campaigns. In this they are radically wrong, for this campaign is of the utmost importance to the people. Upon the character of the delegates will depend the nature of the constitution, and that constitu-

tion, be it good or bad, will be the basis of our legislation in the future. Every man should give this matter serious thought and lend every aid to good government by seeing that only good men go as delegates.

The following items are taken from the county superintendent's report, which has just been completed: Total enumeration of school children, 2275; total enrollment, 1625; number of teachers employed, male 12, female 34—46; total number of months taught, 221; amount paid teachers, \$13,470.40; all other expenses \$7,380.74; balance on hand July 1, 1910, \$15,339.72, of which \$9,000.00 is from the sale of bonds. WAY TO SET TABLE

SIMPLE DECORATIONS THAT WILL MAKE IT LOOK ATTRACTIVE.

Present Day Table Etiquette in the Placing of Silver Explained—The Hostess Now Serves Herself First.

To make a dinner table look attractive attention must be given to its decoration. For example, in the middle of the table there should be a pot of flowers or cut blossoms, and radiating from the center at four corners there should be candlesticks, glass or silver. About the center may be laid any large fancy silver spoons as ornaments, and four small dishes, glass or silver. In one dish there should be jelly, in two others candles and salted nuts, and pickles in the fourth. One of these dishes should be placed between two candlesticks, only farther from the middle. These are left throughout the meal, except that the jelly and pickles are removed when the crumbs are wiped from the cloth; that is, before dessert is served.

No more than three forks are put at one place nowadays, others being brought in afterward if extra courses require them. A fork and spoon are used with dessert, and plates for each person are arranged before being brought from the pantry. A small dolly is put on each dessert plate, and on that is the finger bowl, also in a little plate. The latter should match the bowl. A second dolly should be placed between the bowl and its plate. A fork and spoon should be placed on each dessert plate, the silver resting on the margin. The fork should be on the left and the spoon on the right side, the handles pointing toward the person who will use them. When this plate is set on the table the guest removes the fork and spoon, putting one either side of the plate.

She then takes the finger bowl, its plate and the dolly under and places them a little to the left in front of the dessert plate, which is thus left ready for the sweet when the maid brings it.

When that course is finished the maid takes off the plates used and puts the finger bowl plates in their proper places before each guest. This serving of dessert plates is the most complicated part of a dinner for an inexperienced maid.

Candles are not passed about the table. If the finger bowl plates are in front of each guest after dessert. The guest raises the bowl, puts it a little in front, thus leaving the plate empty for the candles. If coffee is served at the table it is brought while the candles are being eaten.

A serving plate is used at each plate, which means that the maid, when she removes a plate used, has a clean, empty one in her right hand, which she immediately slips into place. When plates for the next course are brought the empty one is taken up. In this way places before persons at the table are never without a plate.

There is a fad at present for all dishes brought from the pantry to be handed first to the hostess to serve herself instead of to the guest of honor. In these days of complicated and elaborate dishes it is frequently tactful to follow this fashion that others may see how the dish is served. Carving should be done in the pantry and neither meat nor vegetable dishes put on the table.

A good menu for a formal dinner consists of a hors d'oeuvre of sardine paste on toast, clam cocktails, soup, fish, an entree, poultry with two light vegetables, a salad, ices, candies and coffee.

Brown nicely, but do not burn the slices of bread, and pour upon them sufficient boiling water to cover. Let them steep until cold, keeping bowl or dish containing the toast closely covered. Strain off the water and sweeten to taste, putting a piece of ice into it as drank.

WASHINGTON GOSSIP

Seal Coat Problem Up to Government



STENOGRAPHERS and clerks in the government offices in Washington seldom take more than passing notice of the affairs of state that come before the department chiefs for settlement, but a conversation between two young women in the department of commerce and labor a few days ago showed that one subject at least, had aroused their interest.

It is the question of sealskins. The department faces the terrible catastrophe of an increased cost in seal-skin coats for women. The average woman could worry along for a while longer watching prices of meats, eggs and nearly every other article of physical sustenance take flight skyward, but how she is going to survive without a sealskin sacque is what is worrying the benevolently not to say paternally inclined officials of the department of commerce and labor.

"I have been wanting one so badly," Miss Blank was heard to say to the young woman with a great bunch of "rats" in her hair, "but mercy me,

if the price is going up I'm sure I will never be able to get it."

"Oh, what's the use?" snapped the one with hair dressed like a Kafir belle. "I wouldn't have one if you'd give it to me. They're too hot for this climate, anyway."

"Sour grapes," was Miss Blank's comment, as she swept out of the room.

The benevolent, not to say paternally inclined officials of the department, however, were confronted with the problem of whether or not the seal grounds of the Pribilof Islands shall be closed under authority granted by congress. If the grounds are closed the price of sealskin coats will go skyward, along with other necessities. If they are left open the price will remain at the present figure for a while longer, but eventually will go up, as the fur-bearing herds of the Bering sea are depleted. So to the officials of the department the issue has resolved itself into the question as to whether it is best to hold down the price for a while by releasing the sealing rights and letting the women of a future period stand the really high prices.

The lease of the North American Commercial company, which for 20 years has enjoyed the exclusive privilege of taking the seals, expired May 1.

Nearly Half of People Superstitious



WASHINGTON.—"If you pick your teeth with a splinter taken from a tree which has been struck by lightning will you ever have toothache?"

This, and three thousand other varieties of superstitious beliefs, having been investigated by Dr. F. B. Dresslar, professor of psychology in the University of Alabama, he found that 45 per cent. of the people whom he questioned believed in them. This was his declaration in an address before the Medico-Psychological association, one of the branches of the American Congress of Physicians and Surgeons.

Superstitions and superstitious beliefs are still powerful factors in human behavior, he said, and, as far as known, superstition is exclusively a human manifestation, not being known among lower animals. It is due, he added, to an animistic conception of the universe which holds that sticks and stones play a part in the life of man and conspire against him. Man's superstitious beliefs are variable, he declared, changing with his condition of mind and body and even with the weather and time of day, "ghosts existing only at night."
