## America Warns Japan and China

### Open Door Must Not Be Closed "Open Door Policy" Conveyed to Both Governments

PEKING, June 28.—Warning that the United States would not recognize any agreement between China and Japan which impaired American rights in China or endangered the so-called "open door policy" was conveyed to the governments of both China and Japan in an identical note from Washington which was made about May 15. The notes were handed to the foreign offices of both countries a week after China had acceded to the demands contained in the Japanese ultimatum, insisting upon concessions from the former nation.

The United States note, in substance, follows:

"In view of the negotiations which now are pending, between the government of China and the government of Japan, and of the agreements which have been reached as a result thereof, the government of the United States has the honor to notify the government of the Chinese republic that it cannot recognize any agreement or understanding which has been entered into or which may be entered into, between the governments of China and Japan impairing the treaty rights of the United States and its citizens in China, the political or territorial integrity of the republic of China, or the interest policy relative to China commonly known as the "open door" policy. An identical note has been transmitted to the Japanese government.

#### Slaton's Last Day;

#### Stormy Farewell

Atlanta, June 26.—Twenty-six men were brought to the county jail here today by militiamen guarding the county home of Governor Slaton. The state guardsmen said they were arrested while trying to enter the governor's estate.

When Governor Slaton appeared today at the inauguration of his successor, Nat E. Harris, made the final day of Slaton's term stormy. The demonstration at the inauguration was quickly suppressed, and Governor Slaton was cheered when he remarked, on handing over the state seal, that it had "never been abused during my administration." His friends thought this a reference to his commutation to life imprisonment of the death sentence of Leo M. Frank.

Militiamen who brought the prisoners in from the Slaton estate said seven pistols and three clubs were taken from the men after an exchange of shots in which no one was hurt.

#### Rich Mineral Vein

#### Found in Abo Pass.

Dr. C. D. Ottosen, of Willard, tells of a rich mineral vein in Abo pass, near Scholle about twenty miles from Willard, which has attracted prospectors and gives promise that section of the state will be the field of many development plans in the immediate future.

Dr. Ottosen stated that the vein showed a high percentage of gold, copper and silver, running as high as four per cent, and that a Denver assayer, to whom specimens of the ore had been sent, had given a highly favorable report. He stated that there had been many filings in the section and that the outlook was exceedingly bright for the opening up of extensive mining operations in that field.

#### Santa Fe Eagle May

#### Permanently Suspend.

Whether the Santa Fe "Eagle," a weekly Democratic newspaper published and edited at Santa Fe for years by A. J. Loomis, will be published as heretofore, remains to be decided, according to Mr. Loomis, who has returned from a lengthy tour of Colorado. Mr. Loomis is a deputy internal revenue collector. "My work takes me hundreds of miles from Santa Fe," he said, "and I have been relying on J. A. Caruth, I am informed, was taken ill and was unable to furnish copy. For this reason the "Eagle" has not appeared for the last few weeks."

#### Sensational Damage Suit Against Raton Man

A sensational suit for \$20,000 damages was filed in the U. S. district clerk's office today by Pearl Kizer, a citizen of Ohio, against J. L. Hobbs, of Raton. The plaintiff charges that the defendant, as a physician, abused her confidence and under false pretenses induced her to submit to a surgical operation. Paragraph four of the complaint adds that "by reason of the wrongful, fraudulent and deceitful acts of defendant, the plaintiff has been seriously ill and under care of physicians and unable to earn a livelihood; that her health has been seriously impaired and she has suffered great mental and bodily pain and anguish."

The attorneys for plaintiff are A. C. Voorhees and H. L. Bickley.

## Victoriano Huerta Released on \$15,000 Bond

### Public Demonstration in Juarez Meets With Sudden Check When Leader is Detained

El Paso, Tex., June 27.—General Victoriano Huerta was released on \$15,000 bond here tonight, and Gen. Pascual Orozco on \$7,500 bond. Charges of conspiracy to incite a revolution against a friendly country were filed against the accused by special agents of the department of justice.

Formal charges were filed against Huerta and Orozco on instructions from the United States district attorney at San Antonio.

The accused were taken before George Oliver, United States commissioner, and their bond approved and their hearing fixed for Thursday, July 1. Surety was furnished by Ike and Frank Alderete, May Moye and Rudolfo Cruz.

General Huerta and Orozco were released at once from the brigade headquarters at Fort Bliss, where they had been detained since noon. General Huerta was driven to the home of his daughter, Mrs. Luis Fuentes. Orozco was taken to the home of friends.

The release of the Mexican leaders caused nearly as great a stir in Mexican and American circles as did the news of their detention earlier today. Immediately there was a revival of rumors relative to the new revolutionary movement, although Huerta reiterated his statement that he did not intend to attempt to enter Mexico until peace is restored. The general stated that he is here merely to visit his daughter a few days and greet old friends in El Paso.

"I am on my way to Los Angeles and San Francisco," said the general, "to visit the Pacific coast and see the Panama-Pacific exposition. I lived in Oakland, Calif., about twenty years ago, and have not visited the west coast of the United States since then, so decided to make the trip."

#### Mrs. Clarita Sanches.

Mrs. Clarita Sanches, 36 years old, died at Las Vegas Saturday. She was the wife of Elisar Sanches and sister of Mrs. Frank Hubbell. Mrs. Sanches went to Las Vegas to visit friends and was taken ill. The body was shipped from Las Vegas Sunday to Albuquerque.

#### Two More Victims.

Alfredo Griego, 22 years of age, and Jose Ignacio Romero, 19 of age, were two more victims claimed as their toll by the waters of the Rio Grande, at La Joya, this county, last Sunday.

#### City Picture Shows.

The Norwegian Diet recently passed a law providing that the licenses of all motion picture theaters in Norway shall expire in 1916. The cities may then renew the licenses or establish municipal motion picture shows. Many of the cities propose to show educational films in municipilized theaters, thinking the surplus earnings of the theaters will increase the city revenues. The proprietors of the motion picture house will lose their businesses without compensation, although some of the cities are extending the time for canceling the licenses until 1918.

#### Ordinance Officers Are

#### Leaving Service of U. S.

Washington, D. C., June 26. The war department is being caused serious concern; owing to the numerous resignations of ordinance officers and skilled employes at the government arsenals who say they are being offered much more money to work for private firms manufacturing war munitions than their present salaries from the government. Some have been given three year contracts. Secretary of war Garrison has called upon the attorney general for an opinion whether an army officer has an inalienable right to resign in time of peace.

#### Rattler Bites Horse;

#### Kick Almost Fatal.

Moriarty, N. M., June 26.—When a rattlesnake struck a young horse that R. R. Wade, brother of Mrs. J. L. Croosley of this district, was driving, the animal became frantic and kicked Wade in the head rendering him unconscious. It was at first believed that his skull was fractured, but later it was found that his injuries were not serious. He is a resident of Batavia, Ohio, and is visiting his sister and her husband. The rattler struck with such force that the horse was unable to shake it loose for several seconds.

#### Americans in Yaqui

#### Valley Well Armed

Tobari Bay, Mex., June 25.—Americans in the Yaqui valley are well armed with rifles and an adequate supply of ammunition, and are ready to repel any future Indian attacks, according to advices received here today. Some of the Americans have arranged to hire other foreigners to assist in their defense.

## DRY ARGUMENT.

Now comes the psychopathic laboratory of the Chicago Municipal Court, speaking through Chief Justice Harry Olson to the mayors of New York state at Troy, N. Y., and explodes the favorite "dry" argument that drinking alcoholic liquors excessively causes insanity. On the contrary, the laboratory sharks claim, a man has to be crazy before he will drink to excess. "The laboratory has examined hundreds of chronic alcoholics," Judge Olson said, "and we have yet to find the first case where there was not at least a psychophratic constitution, epilepsy, dementia praecox, manic depressive insanity, or feeble mindedness as the basis, with the exception of a few cases where there was a physical basis, such as diabetes or tuberculosis, and the man was whipping up his flagging energy with alcoholic stimulants." Judge Olson claims the laboratory's investigations prove that the cause of excessive drinking will have to be removed before we can cure drunkards. He said the state of Illinois spends 28.1 per cent of its total expenditures for charitable institutions, of which the mental, nervous and insane group make up of 21.8 per cent.

## A NATIONAL CREED.

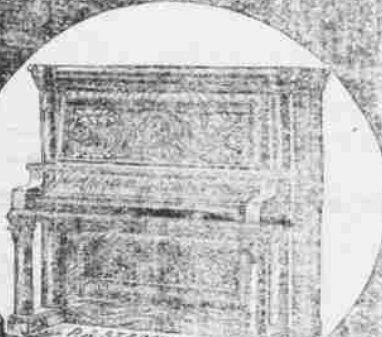

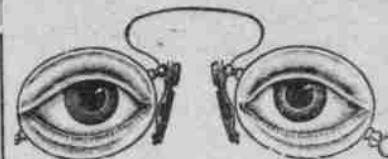
