Caldwell was on the slab for Lovington with Wright as receiver while Bell put them over for Knowles and Sellers did the gathering.

Every attendant proved to be an enthusiastic rooter and the snap and swiftness of the entire game would have done credit to a league contest. At the end of the ninth inning the score was announced, Lovington 12, Knowles 1 and with shouts, whoops, yells, and whistles megaphones and clanging bells the crowd streamed away to the race course where "Billy Boy" owned by John Gist of Roswell and ridden by Walter Simmons defeated Emory Roberts "Rattler" with Jim Roberts up, for a purse and a side bet of \$500.00 inclusive.

It was a typical plains festa attended by a peaceable jolly, friendly crowd and not withstanding the intense rivalry and heavy betting no disturbance was reported.

Cookery

Points

Rhubarb is at its best at this time of the year, and this product of the garden has many uses and uses for the value but for medicinal purposes says Marion New Harris. The part used is the stem of the stalk of the leaves. The leaves taken up into areas and are carefully boiled the juice of the dried roots as a medicine. Rhubarb is a powerful laxative. When merely placed in the mouth and left unchewed there is a rush of the saliva from the glands to deal with the quantity of acid in the mouth. This is evident in cases where the digestive fluids need stimulation. Any food taken will be absorbed through the pouring out of its gastric fluids. Though a vegetable rhubarb is used in every respect as a fruit. Taken stewed, so that the acids are lost in it, the stalk acts as a food to govt and to rheumatism, for it neutralizes the acid that causes those things. It is also a specific for the complexion. There are many ways of preparing it for the table, and the following recipes ought to be pleasing.

Rhubarb Sponge.

Line a mold with slices of sponge cake, pressed fruits around the inside. Fill up the mold with stewed rhubarb, cut in small squares with sugar, covering the top with more slices of cake, cover with a plate and press down with a weight for a few hours, when the juice of the rhubarb will be absorbed to the cake. Turn out very carefully, decorate with the pieces of angelica and serve with a nice custard.

Compote of Rhubarb.

Wipe the rhubarb with a damp cloth and cut it into lengths of four or five inches. Put into a saucepan two pounds of sugar with two parts of water. Bring slowly to boiling point and stir until thick and add the rhubarb in small pieces. Cook until the rhubarb is tender and the sugar is thick. Turn out and serve with cream or custard.

Cooking for School Children.

When cooking for school children, it is important to use simple and healthy recipes. One recipe for a healthy meal is as follows:

Take a pound of sugar, two pounds of water, and a few slices of rhubarb. Bring to a boil and simmer for two hours. Strain off the liquid and add a little more sugar if desired. This is a healthy and delicious treat for school children.

The Window Shelf.

The housekeeper who has once learned the comfort of a shelf outside her kitchen window will never again be without one. Where there are outside shutters, this should be low enough below the sill to enable them to close easily.

The shelf may be just a plain board, wide enough for pots and bowls, or it may be an exposed position there should be a two inch rim around the edge.

For occasional use a shiftable box nailed to the window in such a way that the inside of the box faces the kitchen is useful to put articles of food in that will overflow the refrigerator. The top and sides of box keep snow, rain and dust from the provisions, yet a low temperature can be maintained. This could not be done with outside shutters.

Matrimony Texts.

Matrimony texts is the title of a new book by an apple dessert of which there are many varieties. This particular apple tart or pudding calls for one dozen apples, a quarter pound of currants picked, washed and dried; two ounces of candied peel chopped fine, a little grated nutmeg, some sifted sugar and puff paste.

Put the core and quarter the apples. Put them into a saucepan with a little water and stew them to a pulp, stirring frequently. Then add the currants, the chopped peel, sugar to taste and nutmeg.

Maine is Democratic.

Portland, Me., Sep. 13—The Democrats of Maine had difficulty today in realizing the magnitude of their victory yesterday in the struggle with the Republicans.

With two score little obscure towns yet to hear from, Frederick W. Plaisted (Democrat) for governor, has 72,711 votes and governor Bert M. Fernald, 64,090. Plaisted's total plurality is estimated at 8500.

Early returns indicated the election of four Democratic congressmen, but revised figures show that Asner Hinds in first district and Frank E. Guernsey in the fourth, Republican, pulled through by small pluralities.

A Sweeping Victory.

There was no uncertainty in the voice with which Maine recorded her preference for governor and her attitude on the issues of the campaign. The plurality given to Plaisted was large, while two congressional districts ordinarily strongly Republican, returned Democratic candidates.

elect, has a plurality larger than that given two years ago to his defeated Republican opponent, governor Bert M. Fernald.

Col. Plaisted was born in Bangor in 1864. He ran for mayor of Augusta five times and won four elections.

The Republican leaders as a rule, are at a loss to account for their overwhelming defeat. The weather was perfect and they offered no excuse along that line. The issues were well understood and most of the speakers had confined themselves to state matters, scarcely mentioning national affairs.

Governor Fernald's administration was stoutly defended against Democratic criticism of extravagance, and most of the voters were given an opportunity of seeing and hearing the candidate, while a few out of state speakers including congressman McKinlay, of California, came here to help.

In the face of the seemingly Democratic victory, the Republican leaders were surprised.

It was the first time since the Republicans of Maine have had in 20 years and by a coincidence, Harris M. Plaisted, father of the present successful candidate, was Maine's last Democratic governor in the year of 1881.

While the election of Plaisted as governor and of two Democratic congressmen seemed a great feat, interest today centers in the makeup of the legislature.

It will be Democratic—there is no doubt about that—and for the first time since 1863 47 years ago Maine will have a Democratic United States senator, as the legislature will choose a successor to senator Eugene Hale.

Complete returns show that the Democrats have secured 21 of the 31 seats in the state senate. The last senate was made up of 23 Republicans and eight Democrats.

The Democrats have also elected 71 representatives out of a total house membership of 151. This assures Democratic control at the legislature on a joint ballot.

"The People Rule."

Governor-elect Plaisted makes the following statement:

"The fight for the people has been won at last. The independent voter was much in evidence in the election and thousands of Republicans deserted their party, as the vote will show. As I have said on the stump, I have made no pledge or promise to any man or set of men and I will conduct the affairs of my office to the best of my ability."

NOT NEAR THE GOAL.

New Mexico is a long ways from statehood yet. The long coveted goal is not yet in sight. There are many questions that will be raised in the constitutional convention which the people are anticipating. Some of these have been made an issue during the late campaign and some are just now coming to the front. Among them is the principles of Direct Legislation, the Initiative and Referendum, the Labor question, Woman's Suffrage, Prohibition and Direct Primary. The members of the convention will have plenty to do and plenty to dodge. In New Mexico there is a strong sentiment in favor of prohibition, and its advocates are going to make a hard fight to get a state-wide prohibition plank in the constitution. In Colfax county there has arisen a peculiar situation, brought about during the campaign just closed by the fight in Raton brought out by the saloon men over Sunday closing of the saloons by the city authorities last spring. They took their fight out into the county and are now confronted with an issue they did not expect to arise. Friends insisted that they desired, but it was done in the face of these protests. There is, it is learned, another situation in the Territory. The prohibition advocates will oppose a constitution which does not include state-wide prohibition, prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors in the new state and the liquor interests will oppose the adoption of a constitution that contains a prohibition plank. And there it is. As to their own interests, the saloon men of Colfax county have made a mistake in allowing this matter to come into the late campaign.

The prohibition question will undoubtedly be one of the arguments the convention will have to deal with as the representatives and opponents of both sides search the arguments for the deciding ground.

The prohibition advocates will argue that the state has never had the value of a large part of the land in the Toyah field. For this reason it is up to the land commissioner to annex whatever value he thinks is just and equitable, having been definitely decided that he has his right under the law.

While the big companies are

unsuccessful in getting possession of the land, either by purchase or lease, the price which the state has paid for the land has not been fixed in actual dollars and cents. The public land commissioner Toyah field has been given the right of operation, and the resulting favorable showing to be found in the field, has caused the attention of the entire state to be attracted to the Toyah country.

Naturally the land commissioner is keeping an eye on the district. When it becomes his painful duty to fix a price on the land which has been taken up around Toyah, it is reasonable to suppose, the Toyahites say, that the commissioner is going to consider the potential oil bearing prospects of the land to be valued.

That means that he is going to put oil land value on public school land not under cultivation.

By doing this he would be making the holders of the land, who are in a majority of instances the oil companies, pay the freight.

That is exactly what the companies are not crazy to do. Hence the report that they may abandon the field until the commissioner or the legislature, or both, have fixed a price on the land and forever settled the knotty problems connected with the mineral and grazing rights carried in the land grants.

Latist From Toyah Oil Field.

Toyah, Tex., Sep. 10. Toyah's virgin oil field may be abandoned, not because there is no oil, but because the state has boosted the prices of land.

This report has been the chief topic for discussion here during the past two days. No definite information can be obtained as the operating companies continue their policy of secrecy regarding their operations, but the report has gained general circulation here that the Texas, the Gulf and the Prairie Oil companies have agreed to abandon the field for the present in order to obtain the concessions they desire from the state.

The story in tabloid form is that the state has never had the value of a large part of the land in the Toyah field. For this reason it is up to the land commissioner to annex whatever value he thinks is just and equitable, having been definitely decided that he has his right under the law.

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That is exactly what the companies are not crazy to do. Hence the report that they may abandon the field until the commissioner or the legislature, or both, have fixed a price on the land and forever settled the knotty problems connected with the mineral and grazing rights carried in the land grants.

Another consideration along the same line of reasoning is that when the tax commissioner makes up his budget of tax assessments, the Toyah land is going to be put in at a figure higher than more public school land not under

cultivation, and used only for grazing purposes. All of which would cost the company dearly. For this reason, say the wise ones who are in touch with the situation, Toyah may be temporarily abandoned and operations discontinued.

The Matagorda, Texas, oil field was abandoned several years ago for just such a reason and work has never been resumed. After the first producing well was brought in, the state raised the price on the land and the drillers loaded up their apparatus and left.
