## DEMOCRATS AND REPUBLICANS HOLD CONVENTIONS.

### A Fusion Ticket Adopted.

#### DELEGATES PLEDGE THEMSELVES TO THE INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM.

The democratic county convention met at Lincoln Thursday morning, and was called to order by W. J. Doering.

The committee appointed to select temporary officers reported as follows: Jno. A. Haley, chairman; Mart Goodin, secretary.

The regular committees were appointed in the usual way, and a motion was adopted authorizing the chairman to appoint a special committee of four to hold the chair to be ex-officio chairman of the committee. The chair appointed A. H. Hudspeth, A. G. Wells, Porfirio Chavez and Geo. Kimbrell as the members, and this committee was instructed to confer with a like committee of republicans and report to the convention whatever action taken by said committee. The convention took a recess until 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

Upon reassembling the reports of the regular committees were read and adopted. A. H. Hudspeth was elected permanent chairman and Wm. S. Bourne permanent secretary. The announcement was made at this time that a committee of five republicans was ready to confer with a like number of democrats, and the convention took a recess in order to permit the special committee named above an opportunity to confer with the republicans on the proposition of fusion.

The republicans convened in the courthouse and effected a temporary organization by the election of Dr. T. W. Watson as chairman and Lee B. Chase as secretary. After the appointment of the usual committees the temporary organization was made permanent.

Both conventions took a recess and in the meantime members of both conventions were busy discussing the proposition of a fusion ticket. Soon after the re-convening of the conventions, the democratic convention was notified that the republican convention had appointed a committee of five to confer with a like committee from the democratic convention on the proposition of fu-

sion. This committee, on the part of the republican convention consisted of the following persons: Manuel Aragon, Samuel Wells, Robert Brady, Robert A. Hurt and W. R. White.

An agreement was reached by the conference committee, and reduced to writing and signed by the chairmen of the respective committees. One of the copies of the agreement was addressed to the democratic convention and one to the republican convention, but in all other respects were identical.

The following is the agreement, and it was so reported to both conventions:

"We your committee appointed to confer with a like committee from the republican convention beg to report as follows: We have agreed to recommend to the democrats in convention assembled that we urge the nomination of three delegates, to-wit: Two to be nominated by the republican party, said two delegates to be acceptable to the democratic convention, and the democrats to nominate one delegate, said delegate to be acceptable to the republican convention, and the said delegates to stand on the following platform, and to pledge themselves personally to use all honorable means to have the following provisions incorporated in the

constitution to be framed at Santa Fe, N. M., to-wit: (1) Initiative and referendum. (2) Direct primary. (3) Corporation commission. (4) Election of all officers including the corporation commission and an equalization board.

"We, the chairmen of the democratic and republican conference committees certify that the foregoing agreement was entered into by said committees, at Lincoln, N. M., on 18th of August, 1910."

The report of the conference committee was duly adopted by both conventions, not, however, without a prolonged "scrap," for both conventions contained members who opposed the proposition. Following the adoption of the report, the conventions again authorized the conference committees to reconvene and report what action had been taken. The republican members reported the acceptance of the committee's action, and that it had named for its two candidates John H. Canning and J. J. Aragon. The democratic members reported the adoption of the report by the democratic convention, and that in compliance with said agreement had named A. H. Hudspeth

as its nominee. The conventions re-assembled, endorsed the action of the committee and regularly named the three men upon the declarations promulgated in the agreement.

By this time the shades of evening were falling, and each convention took a recess for supper. At 7.30 the conventions reassembled, and the conference committees were instructed to select a name and an emblem. The report of the committee was that the name of the ticket should be "People's Ticket," and the emblem should be two flags with crossed poles, the flags flowing from opposite angles, and underneath a clasp of hands. This report was adopted, and the important work of the conventions having been completed, each convention proceeded to the routine work of conditions in the respective parties.

The democratic convention authorized the present central committee to act until the next regular convention, and ratified the action of the committee in the selection of Wm. J. Doering as chairman and Wm. S. Bourne as secretary. A committee, consisting of A. H. Norton, R. J.

### Controlled Newspapers.

The *Atchison Globe* says that no advertiser has ever tried to control its editorial policy, the remark being occasioned by the charge often made nowadays, that the big advertisers direct the editorial policy of newspapers.

The experience of the *Globe* is the experience of most newspapers. The merchant who does a great deal of advertising is more interested in the circulation department of a newspaper than in the editorial department. If a daily paper goes to the homes of the people, and is read by them, he is satisfied, and it may chase after any theory or fad, for all he cares. He has troubles of his own, and he isn't trying to shoulder those of the editorial brethren.

There are newspapers controlled by people outside of the editorial rooms, and a good many of them, more's the pity; but the people exercising that control are not the business men who pay their money for advertising space. The newspapers which are established for political purposes are often controlled by chronic office-seekers, whose first concern is their own interests. There are newspapers controlled by great corporations, and the voice of such newspapers is always raised in protest against any genuine reform.

The average western newspaper usually is controlled by its owner, and he is supposed to be in duty bound to make all sorts of sacrifices at all sorts of times; there are people who consider it his duty to insult his advertisers, just to show that he is free and independent. If he shows a decent respect for his patrons, who pay him their money, and make it possible for him to carry on the business, he is "subsidized" or "controlled." The newspaper owner is a business man, like the dry goods man or the grocer. The merchants are expected to have consideration for their customers, and they are not supposed to be subsidized by the man who spends five dollars with them, but the publisher is expected to demonstrate his courage by showing that he is ungrateful for the patronage of his friends. It is a funny combination when you think it over.—*Emporia Gazette*.

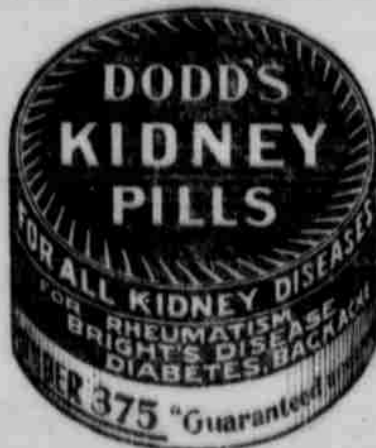

### FOR WINTER SUPPER TABLE

**Preserved Cherries One of the Best and Most Delicious of Put-Up Lunches.**

There is an ancient superstition that cherries and milk are a combination that will insure speedy death. Therefore small boys and girls have been tortured with a most terrible uncertainty when, surreptitiously, they have gorged themselves with the robin's perquisite or the later coming choke cherries, and have then had bread and milk presented to them as their sole choice of evening meal. From a feeling of wish-I-dared to what-do-I-care, they have proceeded to gather the fruit of hidden branches, possessed with that same eerie uncertainty about the future which a boy may have when he courts death with a giant firecracker. Mothers have suffered from frightful apprehensions in cherry time.

Preserved cherries are amongst the most delicious of all the put-up fruits and are as serviceable for pies and puddings as any there are. If one wishes to extend the cherry flavor in this way. The cooked cherry is delicious, and considerably less sugar is required for it than for preserves. To candy cherries requires a good deal more care than most domestic managers can take, but some think it worth while, since the produce has more flavor than those that are articles of merchandise.

To preserve cherries a level measure of sugar to a heaping measure of cherries is a reliable portion. Twenty to thirty minutes is about the time required for cooking them. The old-fashioned long cooking was not necessary and deprived them of their beautiful color. Cook and skim the sugar first before adding the cherries slowly.

### GREEN TOMATOES THE BEST

**For Frying, the Unripe Ones Will Always Be Found to Give the Most Satisfaction.**

Now that the tomato season is here, the fact that green tomatoes are more delicately flavored and more delicious fried than the red ones usually cooked in that way is worth a word of reminder. Jot it down in the household new idea book to be tried for breakfast some morning or at luncheon, with or without a meat dish.

Cut into thin slices some large, perfectly green specimens (they must not have begun to show any sign of ripening, and those freshly pulled are really the best for the dish), sprinkle with salt and dip in cornmeal until covered. Saute in a little butter until a nice brown. Cover the frying pan throughout the cooking process to keep the tomatoes tender. They may be brought to table with the accompaniment of a brown sauce or plain.

### Eggs and Bacon.

Break five or six fresh eggs into cups. Half fill a clean frying pan with drippings of butter, or mixture of equal parts of lard and butter. Slip the eggs carefully into the pan. When the whites are set take them up, trim off the rough edges, and drain them so that no grease remains. Place them in the center of a dish with slices of crisp, fried bacon arranged around them. If preferred, the bacon may be laid on the bottom of a dish and the eggs placed upon them.

### Scotch Shortbread.

One-half pound flour, one-quarter pound unsalted butter, two ounces powdered sugar. Sift flour into bowl, rub in the butter smoothly and add sugar. Knead well with the hand until soft enough to hold together. Form into a ball, press with the palm of the hand until half an inch thick and level the top with rolling pin. Butter a sheet of note paper and lay on a sheet tin. Decorate the edges with the fingers. Bake in a slow oven until firm and pale brown.

## RID FIELDS OF GRASSHOPPER

Ingenious Device Called Hopperdozer  
Excellent Exterminator of In-  
jurious Insect.

A hopperdozer is an ingenious device for ridding the fields of grasshoppers. It is a long, shallow pan of sheet iron, set on runners and having behind it a banner or sail made of canvas or muslin stretched on a wooden frame. The bottom of the pan is covered with rags or old carpet, previously wetted with water. When all is ready, a pint of kerosene is poured over the wet rags, and the banner of cloth is also moistened with kerosene. The dozer is then dragged on its run-



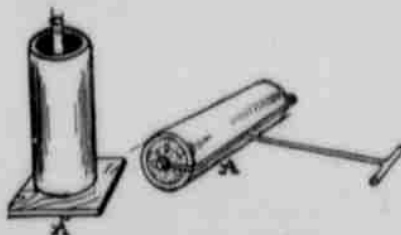
A Hopperdozer.

ners over the field and the grasshoppers either jump in or try to jump over, in which case they strike the cloth at the back and fall back into the oil. A mere touch of the oil kills them; it may take a half a minute if the insect falls directly into it or it may take half an hour if the insect simply alights on the banner moistened with the oil, but no matter whether the insect dies immediately or takes a little time, it is sure to die eventually. The great majority of the hoppers that jump into the pan, jump out again at once but they die just as certainly and almost as quickly as if they remained.

## DURABLE ROLLER FOR GARDEN

May Be Made of Piece of Tiling With  
Vacant Space Filled in With  
Cement and Stones.

A durable garden roller may be made of a piece of tiling. It should be burnt to a glaze and the best size is about two feet in diameter. Set it upon a board and place a piece of gas pipe directly through the center, passing it two inches through a hole in the board. It should project above the tile the same distance. Fill in the

open tile to the top with cement mixed with some broken stones or bits of brick or crockery. Face the ends with the clear mixture of sand and cement. Your blacksmith will make a handle for a dollar and you will have an excellent and handy roller.

### Water for Sheep.

Sheep drink very little water and some persons claim that they drink none at all. In some parts of England, flockmasters do not permit their ewes to drink water during the gestation period. In this country, which is much drier and where sheep get little moisture from the pasture, clean water is necessary at all times.

### Water for Bees.

Plenty of water is absolutely necessary for bees; an abundant supply should be provided, to obviate the necessity of their going to streams and contaminated pools a long distance away. In brood rearing, bees make little progress without plenty of water.

## TO TRANSFER BEE COLONIES

Easily Done if Simple Directions Given  
Below Are Followed—Imple-  
ments Needed.

(By W. R. WRIGHT, Oklahoma Experiment Station.)

Many persons who desire to transfer their bees do not understand the best method to use to make the operation a success, hence detailed directions are given below.

Secure a bee veil, a smoker, a long-bladed knife, the wire from an old broom or two, a pair of wire pliers and cutter, two or three rolls of old cotton cloth, some matches, a piece of stout string, an ax or hatchet, and a pair of gloves, if you wish to protect your hands from possible stings.

Place the new hive near the colony to be transferred and have about half of the frames full of foundation; the remaining four or five frames are to be reserved for holding comb taken, a little later, from the old hive.

The wires may be passed around the frames lengthwise, but such an arrangement will make it necessary to remove the frames from the hive at a later date, after the combs, which have been held in place by the wires, have been securely fastened to the frames.

After starting a good smoke in the bee smoker, putting on the bee veil and gloves, tying down the trouser legs, one is all ready to make the transfer. An assistant is desirable, but not a necessity.

Take from the new hive the frames that are to contain the combs to be cut from the old hive, and place them on a wide board or a small table.

Now go to the colony and puff in some smoke at the entrance, then jar the hive by light blows, then puff in more smoke and jar the hive again.

This should be done four or five times to cause the bees to fill themselves with honey. Bees with well-filled honey sacks are not inclined to sting. A forenoon hour of some pleasant day should be chosen for this operation.

There are some advantages in wrapping strings about frames instead of using wires, for the bees will remove the strings, while the wires will remain until removed by the apiarist.

A small whisk broom or turkey feather will be a great aid in encouraging the bees to travel in the right direction.

After the preliminary smoking and drumming the hive should be turned bottom up and an empty box put on top, and the drumming and smoking continued until most of the bees have passed up into the box.

The new hive, now standing where the old hive stood, will soon have returning workers rushing in and out, so the new hive should be supplied with combs from the old ones as quickly as possible; then the box of bees should be shaken into the top or onto a board or paper in front. Care should be taken that not many bees are crushed and that nearly all get into the new hive, or the queen may be lost, bringing about failure. Scraps of honey should be carried to the house and honey drips carefully washed up, or there may be a bad case of robbing.

### Food for Reflection.

In the making of a constitution for New Mexico we should never lose sight of these facts: We shall be judged according to our work, and much of New Mexico's immediate future will depend upon that work.

There are two extremes to be avoided: that of the unreasoning radicals and selfish conservatives. The former would go too far in the name of the people, and the latter would think of nothing but the rights of property.

The "vox populi" class is the more honest as they see things, but equally unsafe as constitution makers with those who talk too much of "vested rights" and the protection of capital to develop the country.

The rights of man are far above the rights of property and should be considered of first importance. On the other hand, the outcry against corporations is often only a cloak for the attacks of foolish or dishonest people upon all whom they think have too much of this world's goods.

Beware alike of the man who howls all the time about all corporations and monied interests, and of the one who talks only of a "safe and sane" constitution, and calls everything, not satisfactory to such interests, foolishness, fads and isms.

We are on record! Let those who attack the democratic doctrine state why?

If our republican friends oppose our recommendations, ask them why? and what they propose instead?

If you want the people to rule the future state, why not write the principles of the initiative and referendum into the constitution? If you believe in the control of corporations by the people who create them, why not provide in the constitution for a commission for their regulation and control? This is not an attack on railroads and capital in any sense. There are good corporations and bad ones, just the same as there are good and bad men. Many of us are more prejudiced than we think. It is only cowards who are not willing to do justice to all.

A great many people who talk a lot, know as much about the constitution of the United States as they do about that of Oklahoma, and are about as familiar with both as they are with the Hebrew language.

Voters in the territory are beginning to realize that the writing of a constitution is a matter of principle and not party. All democrats and thousands of republicans are going to support candidates who are pledged to the right principles.

Efforts have been made for years in this territory to secure the passage of an election law under the operation of which honest elections would be held, but these efforts have been only partially successful. If the voters of New Mexico want honest elections they can secure the passage of such a law through the operation of the initiative without reference to the action of the legislature. Arrangements have been made for him to lecture on the occasion. A large turn out is anticipated, as in the course of his talk he will dwell particularly, from a non-partisan standpoint, on the initiative and referendum, something which every voter should familiarize himself with during the coming campaign. We are all in favor of statehood for New Mexico, and the more information we can get about the planks that will be used in the building of the constitution, the wiser we will be in casting our ballots. Mr. White, we feel certain, will entertain his audience on the occasion.

### FARM FOR PETTY OFFENDERS.

Petty offenders in Los Angeles will hereafter contribute their mite toward reducing the cost of living. The city has adopted for them the slogan of "back to the land." Los Angeles has bought a suburban farm, and petty offenders will there work out their salvation instead of lying idly and unprofitably in the city jail. There are several good points about this plan. It ought to relieve the taxpayer from giving support to worthless idlers. At the same time it will probably put a curb upon the inclination now manifested by the hobo class to seek cheap food and lodging at the expense of the city through the committing of some petty offense. Should each offender of this sort be required to work his way, he might decide to embrace free instead of forced labor. The suburban farm, too, will probably do something for the petty offender, especially if his trouble is due to some phase of alcoholism. Fresh air and sanitary surroundings with healthful activity might serve as a kind of liquor cure, says St. Paul Dispatch. Who knows but it might be a means of training agricultural labor so much needed in rural communities?

Two big steamers that ply between New York and Boston have given what is regarded as a thorough test of the efficacy of oil as fuel, and the result seems to be accepted as conclusive in favor of oil as against coal. It is announced that coal will be no longer used on these vessels, and it is believed the gain in cleanliness, convenience and in other respects will be marked. This decision, added to the growing preference for oil fuel in our own and other navies, may indicate a complete revolution in the method of generating steam on ships.

Americans, Britons and Frenchmen are taking the lead in aeroplane work. For a long time Britons seemed hopelessly in the rear, but Captain Rolls' feat in flying across the channel and back has restored John Bull's self-respect. Now Rochester fondly hopes that Rolls' flight will inspire Doctor Greene with a determination to fly from Rochester to Toronto this month. If Doctor Greene performs this feat, he will make the record for long flight across water, and so bring new laurels to America.

The fact that the new battleship Florida had to be launched with propeller and rudder in place, and a large part of her armor plating bolted to her lower sides, because the drydock at Brooklyn is too short to receive her for work below the water line, calls attention to a problem that has been troubling navy builders who are bent on keeping up with the procession. Big ships must have docks to match or there will be double trouble when injuries are suffered below light watermark.

Now that one educational institution has demonstrated that a cigar can be made to afford a continuous smoke for one hour and twenty-five minutes, another should institute scientific tests of the maximum duration of a schooner of beer. Thus original research will bring light into the great issues of every-day life.

### ELECTRIC NOTES.

Paper may be made a good electric conductor by impregnating it with carbon.

Japan has now more than 300 telephone exchanges, more than twice the number it had two years ago.

More than 20,000 20-candlepower incandescent lamp filaments can be made from a single pound of tantalum.

A new electric desk lamp has the filament stretched out in a long line to distribute the light over a greater area than usual.

The handle of a new electric torch is magnetized so that it will adhere to metal surfaces, leaving its user's hands free for work.

The largest wireless station in Europe, that on the Adriatic sea at Pola, Austria-Hungary, includes a 300-foot tower built on a foundation of glass.

Two California men have patented an electric flatiron with an automatic cut-off, so that the current is used only when the iron is in actual operation.

Somewhat in line with the electrically lighted scarf pin is one devised by a French jeweler in which images of animals are made to move by motors supplied with power from a pocket battery.

In an address recently made by Prof. John W. Whitehead of Johns Hopkins university it was pointed out that out of 220,000 miles of railroad in this country only 1,000 miles have as yet been electrified.

To permit a motorist to explore dark corners of his car with a light and yet leave his hands free there has been invented an incandescent lamp and reflector to fasten to the forehead and take current from the car's batteries through a cord.

An electric light plant in Nebraska is manufacturing ice as a by-product. The exhaust steam of the plant, which would otherwise go to waste, is utilized in the ammonia absorption process of ice manufacture, and also for distilling water from which the ice is made.

### VARIOUS USES OF SILUNDUM

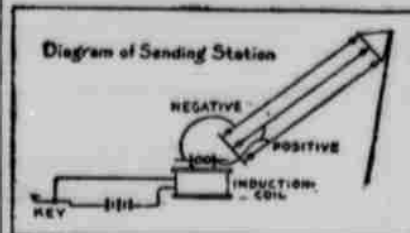
May Take Place of Platinum in Apparatus for Melting Brass and Many Other Metals.

Silundum, the new material for industrial and domestic apparatus made in the electric furnace of F. Bolling, a German engineer, is now being supplied commercially by a special factory in Switzerland. It is a form of silicon carbide produced by saturating carbon with silicon, which is a vapor at about 1,600 degrees C., and the product differs from carborundum, the amorphous or crystalline silicon carbide, it being a very hard and resistant mass retaining the shape originally given the carbon. That is, the carbon, as bricks, rods or utensils, may be coated with or entirely converted into silundum by heating in silicon vapor. Below 1,600 degrees C. silundum does not melt or oxidize, and it is expected to find a large field as a cheap, resisting and durable substance for the heating rods or grids of electric kitchen ranges. As it can be given a high temperature without risk of overheating, the ranges may have the glowing heat of a coal fire. As silundum is not affected by acids or chemicals, it may take the place of platinum for many uses, especially in apparatus for melting brass, aluminum, lead and other metals, and for laboratory ovens requiring high temperature. It is attacked by very hot molten metals, from which it may be protected by a thin coating of platinum.

### WIRELESS OUTFIT IS UNIQUE

Successfully Operated Without Ground Connection at Either End—Apparatus on Bicycle.

The sending of wireless messages through space without a ground at either station has been demonstrated by two inventors of Brooklyn, N. Y., Messrs. I. Wolf and H. Mohler, where they took part in the Memorial day parade with their complete sending and receiving stations mounted on bicycles, says Popular Mechanics. One of the inventors took the position at the end of the procession, while the

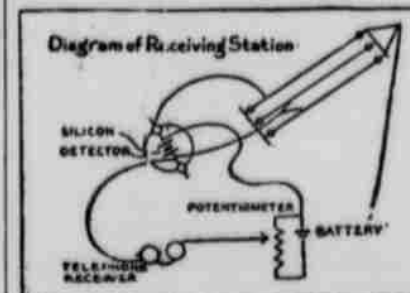


other was leading, making a distance of about 1 1/2 miles between them. No ground wire was used and the rubber tires prevented any connection through the frame and wheels.

The sending apparatus of the station on the bicycle consisted of a two-inch induction coil, a zinc spark gap, a home-made rubber plate multiple-series condenser, which was used for transmission of the electrical waves, and a large wireless key that operated the coil. The receiving instruments consisted of a pair of 3,000 ohm double-head telephone receivers, a silicon detector and a noninductive potentiometer. The entire outfit, including the battery, was mounted on a board 10 by 22 inches, which was fastened to the handle bar of the bicycle as shown in the photographs.

The aerial consisted of a three-wire system mounted on a seven-foot pole, which was attached to the seat of the bicycle. Each of the three wires are ten feet long and insulated at the top and bottom.

The transmitting and receiving instruments were connected with very heavy rubber-insulated wire. The op-



erator would guide the bicycle with one hand and work the key with the other. The interesting part of this outfit was the aerial used for sending the electrical discharges. The wires were divided into two parts; one part consisted of two wires connected to the positive terminal of the induction coil, while the other, or single wire, was connected to the negative. In both diagrams A represents the top of the aerial and B the bottom.

### Electric Smelting.

The success of electric smelting is indicated by its rapid adoption. A German authority counts up 114 electric furnaces that are at work making steel, and his list is incomplete, some important omissions having been pointed out. Of those enumerated 77 are arc furnaces, two generate heat by arc and resistance combined, and 35 are induction furnaces. There are also some pig iron smelting furnaces, Norway and Sweden have two or three. Of the steel furnaces seven are at work in England and a number in America, but the great majority are in France and Germany. Most of the furnaces are of small capacity—only a few tons. They are employed chiefly on high-class steels, for special purposes, but a fair proportion are working on ordinary steels, such as structural steel, castings and railway ties, rails, etc.

## MAKING THE BREAD

### SOME IMPORTANT THINGS TO BE REMEMBERED.

Good Grade of Flour is the First Requisite—Quality and Quantity of Yeast, Etc., Largely a Matter of Choice.

The flour is the first consideration in making a loaf of bread. Good flour should be of a yellowish white tinge, rather granulated and free from bran.

After selecting the flour the yeast must be chosen. It should be strong, sweet and pure. What kind it shall be must depend upon circumstances. Compressed yeast cakes are convenient, and will do the work much more quickly than ten times the amount of homemade or bakers' yeast. Indeed, the compressed yeast is almost indispensable for the quick-raising process, which is now considered the ideal method of bread making.

In making the dough the flour may be moistened with water or milk, or milk and water. If milk is used, it should be scalded (not boiled), then cooled. This is necessary to prevent souring.

If water is preferred, it should be boiled and cooled to lukewarm. If milk and water, pour the boiling water into the milk. Those who prefer water declare that it is not only more economical, but that it preserves the sweet, nutty taste of the flour, while those who believe in milk claim that milk bread is more tender, nutritious and agreeable to eye and palate.

A good rule for mixing bread is as follows:

Put one tablespoonful of butter, one tablespoonful of lard, one tablespoonful of sugar and one and one-half teaspoonfuls of salt into a large bowl, pour on one cupful of scalded milk mixed with one cupful of boiling water; when lukewarm add one yeast cake dissolved in lukewarm water; to this add five cupfuls of sifted flour, then stir until thoroughly mixed, using a knife; add one more cupful of flour, mix, and turn on a floured board, leaving a clean bowl; knead until mixture is smooth, elastic to touch, and bubbles may be seen under the surface. Knead quickly for about fifteen to twenty minutes. Return to the bowl, cover with a clean cloth, then with a board or tin cover. Let rise over night in a temperature of about 65 degrees Fahrenheit.

In the morning cut the dough with a knife, turning over and cutting several times. The dough may be again raised, and recut, if not convenient to shape into loaves and biscuit at the first cutting. Toss on board lightly floured, knead, shape into loaves and biscuit, fill pans, slightly greased, half full. Cover, let rise again to double its bulk, and bake in a hot oven.

If the oven be too hot the crust will brown before the heat has reached the center and prevent further rising; the loaf should continue rising for the first fifteen minutes, when it should begin to brown and continue browning for the next twenty minutes. When bread is done it will not cling to the sides of the pan, and may be easily removed.

Biscuits require more heat than loaf bread; should continue rising the first five minutes and begin to brown in eight minutes. Bread may be brushed over with melted butter three minutes before removing from the oven if a tender crust is desired. This recipe makes two small loaves, or one double loaf and a pan of biscuit.

## Anchovy Sauce.

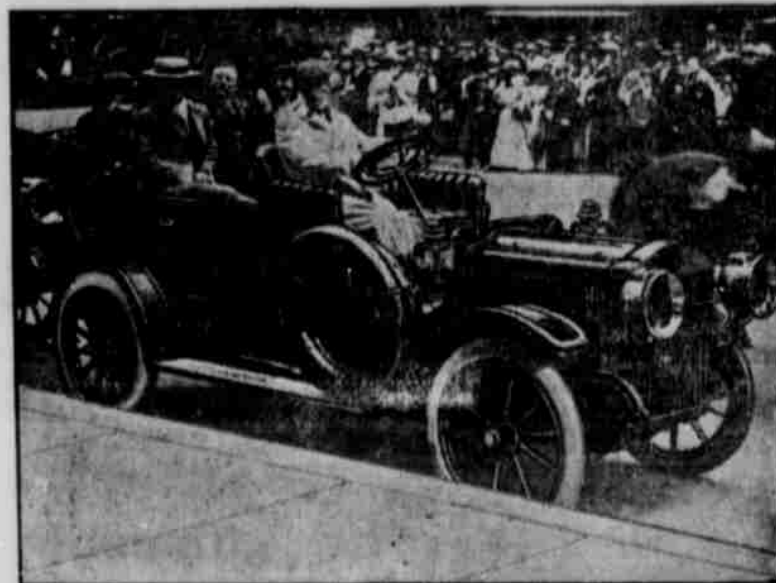
Wash eight anchovies in cold water, split open and remove the bones. Wipe dry and pound to a pulp in a mortar.

Add two egg yolks, then dilute slowly with two tablespoonfuls of olive oil and two tablespoonfuls of vinegar or lemon juice. Add white pepper, minced parsley and serve cold.

The incidents of the day in New York were many, but perhaps none better illustrated the nervous energy and vitality of the man, the near-mania to be up-and-doing, which he has brought back to us, than the discarding of horses and carriages for the swifter and more reliable automobiles. The moment the Roosevelt family and

#### Murdered in His Cell.

It transpired tonight that the murderer and the murdered man were acquainted with each other in former years and were bitter enemies, because the murderer was instrumental in separating the murdered man from his wife several years ago.

An inquest will be held tomorrow, and several physicians will examine the murderer in an effort to determine whether or not he is really insane.
