THE CURRENT has been honored with a complimentary press pass to the 30th Annual New Mexico Fair and Resources Exposition at Albuquerque October 3rd to 8th, for which we thank the association. The Fair promises to be the biggest and most important event ever pulled off in New Mexico.

The republicans have selected a so-called "Mexican" for president of the constitutional convention in the person of Solomon Luna. While offering no disrespect or making any charge that a Mexican is not worthy, the highest office in the gift of the people of the territory such an act on the part of the democracy (which occurred when O. A. Larrazola ran for delegate to congress) was always held by republicans to be a crime to be punished by defeat of the whole ticket. The native people are practically running the republican party in New Mexico.

Owing to the approaching visit of the U.S. Army engineers and the fall term of court, all of which will bring many visitors to Carlsbad would seem opportune to clean up, cut the weeds and generally put on an air of enterprise. If the engineers find a slovenly ill kept town they will not be apt to recommend the expenditures asked for on the Carlsbad Project and it is said they all wear glasses and have a habit of looking through the surface and into problems of great magnitude. The report has reached Alamogordo that Walter Imley was accidentally killed in a mine last week at Copper Hill, Ariz. None of the details or particulars have been received. Town Board Meetings.

Minutes of meeting of Board of Trustees of the Town of Carlsbad, N. M. held Sept. 9, 1910 pursuant to adjournment Sept. 5, 1910.

Present: C. H. McLanathan, Mayor, W. S. Jolly, G. M. Cooke and C. R. Brice, members of Board and J. B. Harvey, Recorder, Absent, R. M. Thorne, Trustee.

The following resolution was offered by Trustee C. R. Brice who moved its adoption:

Resolution.

Be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carlsbad that:

1. Whereas, the Fire Department of the Town of Carlsbad has purchased Block No. 49 of the original Town of Eddy (now Carlsbad) from the Pecos Valley Trust Company, who the Board is advised has the legal and equitable title thereto; and

2. Whereas, there has been a question as to whether or not the property belonged to the Town of Carlsbad, the effect of which has been to cloud the title to said property.

Now, therefore, for the purpose of clearing the title to said property in the Carlsbad Volunteer Fire Department, be it resolved that this Board by a quit-claim deed convey all the right, title and interest of the Town of Carlsbad in and to said property to the Carlsbad Volunteer Fire Department, or any trustees named by them, for and in consideration of the sum of one dollar.

Be it further resolved that the Mayor and the Clerk of this Board be and they are hereby instructed in behalf of the Town of Carlsbad to make a good and sufficient quit-claim deed therefor, for the purpose of carrying out all intents and purposes of this resolution.

Motion was seconded by G. M. Cooke and on roll call those voting aye, Trustees W. S. Jolly, G. M. Cooke and C. R. Brice, nay vote, none; and the resolution was declared adopted.

Trustee C. R. Brice was instructed to file suit to recover the irrigation tax due under Ordinance No. 92 for the year 1909 and foreclose the lien of the town on the property affected.
