FINE COTTON CROP.

A Big Yield of Snowy Cotton is Promised for the Valley this Season.

TWO GINS TAXED TO HANDLE IT.

With the starting of the cotton gin last week commenced the final grand finale of the evolution of the numerous resources of the Pecos valley. Beginning in the early spring the sale and movement of the cotton which has been on the pastures during the winter from a week the business activity for the year, this is followed by the planting and growing of one of the finest crops of cotton which are grown anywhere in the arid states. Just as the cottonseed season draws to a close the harvest begins the cutting and marketing of thousands of tons of alfalfa hay and the harvesting of a seed crop of alfalfa which commands the highest market price, as the seed is grown from alfalfa grown in an irrigated district has become recognized as being far superior in quality to that grown in a rainfall country. Following closely in the wake of the alfalfa crop is the cotton crop which ranks second in none grown elsewhere in the arid states and which each year tips the market in price. The absence of rainfall, irrigated at the proper intervals and the dry late falls makes the cotton growing industry in the lower valley one second to no other crop grown. It takes its place in the seed bank and is, each year, receiving more and more attention by the farmers of the valley, many of whom are from the north and are receiving their kindergarten education in culture of this one of the largest staple crops of the country. Each succeeding season sees an increased acreage of cotton planted. Only two or three years ago one gin easily handled all of the cotton grown in the valley and now the one here at Carlsbad and one at Alameda are taxed to handle the crop.

The gin located west of town started last Wednesday and at the close of business Saturday night had ginned twenty-seven bales and the season has scarcely begun. It is thought that 175 or 200 bales will be ginned before the season closes. The gin is

under the general supervision of H. P. Christian and is operated by W. T. Murray and C. C. Collins.

The business who have arrived the greatest number of bales so far this season are Lawrence Rayburn, of the peranza farm, in La Huerta, P. J. Lippin, W. E. Tucker, H. P. Christian, E. Gutierrez, P. Paros, Percy Forke, F. G. Tracy and M. Montelino.

While it is too early at this time to state just what the yield will be per acre the prospect is most flattering for a bumper crop. The staple is up to the usual standard if not better and with a continued warm weather until the latter part of the present month in which time all of the bolls will have opened and be perhaps picked it is expected that a record breaking cotton crop will have been added to the annals of Carlsbad.

Last season the first bale was ginned the eighteenth day of this month, which makes the first bale to be ginned twenty-one days earlier this season.

Last Saturday the first cotton was shipped to W. O. Cleveland & Sons at Houston, Texas.

Cotton, like wheat, is just the same as having money in the bank and the certainty with which it can be grown in the Pecos Valley and the superior quality, also should appeal to the farmers of the valley to add to its acreage each year until every foot of available ground would be planted to cotton each season.
