DISTRICT COURT QUITS

ADJOURNED LAST NIGHT AT ABOUT MIDNIGHT

Nine Culprits Sentenced to the Penitentiary

The continuation of the court proceedings of the district court from last Thursday are as follows:

The case of Tom Carroway charged with larceny was continued over the term. The defendant gave bond for his appearance in the sum of \$500. In each of the cases of A. R. Lenau vs. H. N. Frost and of C. C. School vs. H. N. Frost a motion to quash was sustained by the court.

Territory vs. Jas. D. Davis charged with issuing worthless checks the defendant was arraigned in open court and plead not guilty. His cases was set for hearing October 20th.

Territory vs. Tom Carroway and Junius Tulk charged with larceny of cattle was continued over the term.

The civil case of Mrs. C. C. Rogers vs. Benj. F. Pearman was continued over the term.

George F. Wagener vs. Carson Ratliff was taken to Chaves county on a motion for change of venue.

The jury in the case of territory vs D. E. House charged with murder failed to agree and was discharged.

Neal Willie was arraigned in open court on the charge of carrying a deadly weapon. He plead guilty to the charge.

J. B. Stallings was fined five dollars and costs for contempt of court. He failed to answer and appear when summoned.

B. A. Schwerdtfeger was given the same fine and costs on same charge.

Territory vs. Leonard Reyes, the first count charged against the defendant was nollied and on the second, the defendant withdrew his plea of not guilty and entered a plea of guilty.

Fernando Reyes charged with larceny the jury returned a verdict of guilty.

Cruz Lujan withdrew his plea of not guilty and entered a plea of guilty. He was charged with unlawfully carrying deadly weapons.

The charges against Tirso and Hilario Gomez of larceny were each nollied.

The third week of the Fifth Judicial district court opened Monday.

José Madril, the Mexican who escaped from the jail last June by crawling through a hole in the ceiling where the plumbers were at work was apprehended this week at Zaragoza, Texas, and was brought back to Carlsbad by Deputy Sheriff Waller. He was being held on the charge of assault with intent to kill.

The case of the Territory vs Cam Dow, charged with larceny of cattle was tried Tuesday and the jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

In the case of the Territory vs. John P. Windowes the defendant withdrew his plea of not guilty and entered a plea of guilty.

A motion for a new trial was over ruled in the case of Charles B. Wilburn vs. the Penasco Reservoir and Development Co. & D. J. McCann.

The Norvell-Shapleigh Hardware Co. obtained judgement against the Toole-Heard Mercantile Co. in the sum of \$412.18. A divorce was granted Anna

Post from David L. Post and the custody of the child was given to the plaintiff.

In bank of Dayton vs. Charles Davis, Josephine Davis, et al, a judgment in favor of the plaintiff was rendered in the sum of \$1284.55 with interest at 12 together with the cost of the suit.

Pauba and Loder obtained judgment against B. A. Nymeyer and were awarded the sum of \$55 which they claimed was due.

J. L. Gibson charged with breaking into a car was tried yesterday, and the jury brought in a verdict of guilty and he was sentenced to not less than six months or more than three years in the pen.

James Gilroy, the circus attache, who attached himself to several articles of wearing apparel at Joyce-Fruits store last week was given a hearing before Judge Cunningham last week and was sentenced to thirty days in the court jail for his undue familiarity.

George Jimenez was given thirty-five days in jail this week by Justice Cunningham. The charge entered against him was that of being drunk and disorderly and also for resisting an officer.

The fall term was concluded by the court about midnight last night and Judge Pope and officers left on the early train this morning for Roswell.

José Angel Madril, from one to two years in the pen.

Cruz Lujan, \$50 and cost.

Leonardo Reyes, from eighteen months to two years in the pen.

Juan Saucedo, eighteen months to two years in the pen.

Tobe Long was given one year in the pen for seduction, for having a young girl in his possession for immoral purposes.

John Lee, from one to five years in the pen.

F. C. Greenwood, forgery, eighteen months to three years in the pen.

Fernando Reyes, from one to two years in the pen.

Torvivo Olgium, three months in jail.

The management of the Lyric theater have just completed the task of having their building overhauled and remodeled and but is first class shape for a play house and one which is a decided improvement over the one heretofore used for that purpose. A stage, larger in every direction has been constructed and equipped with suitable settings, an orchestra pit, an inclined floor and good comfortable seats make the accommodations well suited for the needs of the town. The present seating capacity is now slightly over four hundred. FARMERS PICNIC A FINE TIME

The board of army engineers came, and saw and departed, and as yet the smoke of the battle has not cleared a way and just wherein lies the victory remains a disputable question, nor will it be known until the report of their investigation to the Secretary of the Interior has been made public.

Last Saturday was a busy day in Carlsbad and the officers and members of the Pecos Water Users' Association and the citizens of the town who were delegated to receive and entertain the board of engineers were faithful to the trust imposed upon them and exerted every energy to entertain their distinguished guests in a manner worthy of the honor and creditably to themselves and the community which they represent.

Before eight o'clock Saturday morning many of them, like the drivers of a race, were trying out their machines and getting them in true running order preparatory to the trips down the valley and up to the dams and reservoirs. Eleven autos filled with the members of the army

The men of the valley also are entitled, in no small way, to much credit for the magnificent showing of farm products which were on exhibition bearing testimony to the products which can be and are grown under the Carlsbad project.

One of the largest individual exhibits was that furnished by F. E. Bryant, manager of the Bolles farm. Mr. Bryant has proven to his entire satisfaction and also that of his neighbors and others that this section of the valley has no rival in the matter of growing garden produce. He has experimented with most all of the known varieties of garden stuffs and with any special preparation for this exhibit, but simply taking from his garden what he had growing at this time he had twelve different articles on exhibition which not only attracted the attention of the board and other guests, but held it, as did also the other exhibits. The Bryant exhibit consisted of two varieties of celery, twenty-five onions which weighed twenty pounds, five sweet potatoes

board, their clerks and stenographers the reclamation officers and subordinates and the rail road officials started about nine o'clock for a visit to the McMillan and Avalon dams and returned about noon. With only a brief stop in the town the journey was continued down through the lower valley visiting the all sections, of both the improved, well developed farms and also that section of the valley which has not been developed, and on through the Loving district to the home of P. J. McShane where an out-of-door reception and picnic dinner was served. A large number of the farmers of the valley accompanied by their wives and children had congregated and had prepared a lunch consisting of barbecued beef, fried thickened supplemented with sand wiches, Saratoga chips, cakes, pies, etc., and coffee and lemonade. The dinner was most elaborate and sumptuous and was keenly appreciated by the visitors and guests assembled all of whom were loud in their praises of the repast and tendered their most profound thanks to Mr. and Mrs. McShane and the ladies of the Loving district to whom, in a large measure, the success of the day was due. weighed twenty pounds, several heads of cauliflower, head lettuce which was planted only twenty-five days ago, three kinds of radishes, including the winter, Chinese and the small round red radish, two varieties of tomatoes, green beans, greens, onions and sweet corn. Parenthetically stated the onions exhibit especially attracted Brigadier General Marshall who took the entire twenty pounds away with him.

E. D. McKenzie had some fine specimens of watermelons, tomatoes and sweet peppers to offer as evidence from his section of the valley. He has grown more watermelons this season than any other one man in this part of the valley and the writer, as well as all of his neighbors and friends, will make affidavit that no better sweeter melons are grown anywhere.

The exhibit of honey which was tendered by R. Ohnemus was second to no other honey and was carried away by the distinguished guests of the army board.

W. O. Roby claimed the distinction of having some of the old fashioned pumpkins, the kind mother used to make the pies of. L. G. Ryan had some fine samples of Indian corn, kaffir corn and milo maize which show what can be done in that line of farm

Martin of Loving district offered in evidence a fine bunch of matured alfalfa seed, unthrashed which is the second seed crop from a field which has already, this season, thrashed a seed crop which yielded over three hundred pounds to the acre.

Among the other articles exhibited which made a most creditable showing were: apples, pears and quinces, which were donated by farmers of the lower end of the project.

The exhibit and reception as a whole was a successful and enjoyable affair and was one of the most forcible arguments which could have been produced demonstrating to the board what is being done by the farmers under the project enlarged according to the original promise of the reclamation service and completed.

The smoker which was held in the parlors of the Commercial club in the evening was attended by a number of the citizens and by a large number of the farmers under the project. The meeting was called to order by Mayor C. H. McLenathan, president of the Commercial club and in a masterly and elegant manner, characteristic of the speaker, he cordially welcomed the visitors to Carlsbad and briefly stated the experiences and hopes of the older citizens who settled in the Pecos valley about twenty years ago when he himself first located in Carlsbad. Through some unaccountable manner the supports were knocked out from under the memory about daylight, Wednesday morning and as a consequence, it experienced a drop of about thirty or forty degrees which sent summer underwear and low shoes to the corner of the clothes press and demand for overcoats took a bullish tendency. A light fall of rain also stimulated the demand for slickers and umbrellas.

The fine display of farm products at Loving last Saturday would convince any one of the possibilities of a grand carnival next fall for the lower project. Let us all work to that end.

By the death of Senator Dolliver, of Iowa, this week, the new Nationalism party loses one of its most ardent workers and loyal supporters. He made a hard fight for an honest revision of the tariff and stood for honesty and principle in politics. He was a close friend of Senator La Follette and was only defeated for nomination to the vice presidency on the ticket with McKinley by the effort to shove Theodore Roosevelt. He was a man greatly admired by both of the great political parties.

Over \$500,000 are recorded as assets of the Pecos Valley this season from the sale of cotton, cattle, sheep, and alfalfa seed, to say nothing of the cantaloupes, alfalfa hay, and horses.

The approach of cold weather has set the Huplers Club composed of Jake Owen, Will Matheson, Fred Butler, John Cantrell, George Becker, C. L. Swain, and others to holding their councils and arrange for their trip. Some of the members of the club have gone on the hunt regularly for the past eight or ten years. C. H. McLanathan's Address

The following is the address of Mayor McLanathan at the smoker Saturday night before the board of army engineers.

Gentlemen of the United States Army Board and of the Reclamation Service:

It is a very pleasant privilege, on behalf of Carlsbad and this Commercial Club to bid you welcome to this portion of the Pecos Valley.

It is not for me to discuss the beneficent law creating your Board and under the provisions of which you are, unconsciously, linking your names with destiny, the matchless destiny of the arid west. The three great lights by which the teeming millions of Western America will in the future read the story of its wondrous development, will be the Homestead Act, the Reclamation Act and the Act creating the Board of Engineers, in whose presence we now stand and to whom we extend a most cordial welcome.

To him to whom much is given, much is expected. Results should be measured by opportunities. Your opportunities are large—the results are as yet hidden in the womb of the future. On your report will hang the fate of every community whose needs and resources come under your official consideration.

Happy are we, if we can give to you an adequate understanding of those needs and a full appreciation of our abundant ability to make good for every dollar expended in completing the reclamation of our fertile lands.

And happy are you, if by grasping the possibilities of this favored region, you extend to us the further assistance we so sorely need and for which we are and will be abundantly able to pay in the current coin of the realm.

I am not going to discuss the physical, economical, or engineering features of the project. Those questions are within your province. I am however constrained to say that if you could gather in one place all the fertile valleys of the earth, all the rich alluvial plains on which the fruiting rays of the sun ever fell, irrigate that favored section with the silt laden waters of the Indus or the Nile and pour it with an ignorant, indolent and thriftless race, the result would be a certain and an inglorious failure. They could not even pay the postage used by the Secretary of the Pecos Water Users Association, much less the fixed charges under any irrigation project. Results are not accomplished by chance, however fortunate, but by men men strong of arm, stout of heart and steadfast of faith. We have the soil. We have the climate. We have the water. More than all these we have the people. God bless them, industrious, intelligent, courageous and enthusiastic—a combination of characteristics that recognizes no failure and suffers no defeat.

If you will consider the facts, figures and conclusions presented to you by the Association and grant us the relief prayed for, we will pay back into the Treasury of the Government the uttermost farthing. You will give to us the means by which we can achieve and enjoy that well merited success for which we have been so long striving. For a score of years, some of us have been waiting for this day, waiting for this hour, waiting for you. This is no idle dream. It is a stern, desperate reality that confronts us and bids you pause to consider our necessities, our resources and your opportunity. Again on behalf of Carlsbad and the Commercial Club, I bid you thrice welcome.
