Legislative Apportionment.

The committee on apportionment in the constitutional convention has about completed the draft of its report, and as reported, with the possible exception of some minor changes, will no doubt be adopted by the convention.

The report calls for a senate with 24 members, and a house with 49 members. The basis of representation in the upper house will be one senator for every 13,641 people, while a population of 6,681 people will suffice for a representative in the lower house.

Under this apportionment two counties in the new state will have two senators — Bernalillo and San Miguel. Eight counties will be grouped together in pairs to secure a senator for each pair. These counties are: Guadalupe and Torrance, 1; Lincoln and Otero, 1; Luna and Sierra, 1; and Sandoval and San Juan, 1. All the other counties will have one senator each. In the distribution of representatives the counties get from one to four, save Luna and Sierra, which are combined, and are given one.

The people now better understand the author and know better to judge what he proposes. They are not likely to longer regard him as an improvement on Geo. Washington and Abraham Lincoln."

NO CLOUDS IN SIGHT

COLONEL GEORGE HARVEY SAYS COUNTRY ALL RIGHT.

THE WRITER SEES NO CLOUD

Striking Article in North American Review That is Attracting Wide Attention.

The attention of business and professional men in all portions of the country has been attracted to a strikingly strong article by Col. George Harvey in the September issue of the North American Review in which the writer takes a view of the greatest hopefulness for the future of America and Americans. The article is entitled "A Plea for the Conservation of Common Sense," and it is meeting with the cordial approval of business men of all shades of political opinion throughout the entire country. In part, Colonel Harvey says:

"Unquestionably a spirit of unrest dominates the land. But, if it be true that fundamentally the condition of the country is sound, must we necessarily succumb to despondency, abandon effort looking to retrieval and cringe like cravens before clouds that only threaten? Rather ought we not to analyze conditions, search for causes, find the root of the distress, which even now exists only in men's minds, and then, after the American fashion, apply such remedies as seems most likely to produce beneficial results?

Capital and Labor Not Antagonistic.

"The Link that connects labor with capital is not broken but we may not deny that it is less cohesive than it should be or than conditions warrant. Financially, the country is stronger than ever before in its history. Recovery from a panic so severe as that of three years ago was never before so prompt and comparatively complete. The masses are practically free from debt. Money is held by the banks in abundance and rates are low.

"Why, then, does capital pause upon the threshold of investment? The answer, we believe, to be plain. It awaits adjustment of the relations of government to business. . . . The sole problem consists of determining how government can maintain an even balance between aggregations of interests, on the one hand, and the whole people, on the other, protecting the latter against extortion and saving the former from mad assaults.

"The solution is not easy to find for the simple reason that the situation is without precedent. But is not progress being made along sane and cautious lines? . . .

Conserve Common Sense.

"Is not the present, as we have seen, exceptionally secure? What, then, of preparations for the future? Patriotism is the basis of our institutions. And patriotism in the minds of our youth is no longer linked solely with fireworks and deeds of daring. It is taught in our schools. A new course has been added—a course in loyalty. Methodically, our children learn how to vote, how to conduct primaries, conventions and elections, how to discriminate between qualifications of candidates and, finally, how to govern as well as serve. They are taught to despise bribery and all forms of corruption and fraud as treason. Their creed, which they are made to know by heart, is not complex. It is simple, but comprehensive, no less beautiful in diction than lofty in aspiration. These are the pledges which are graven upon their memories:

"As it is cowardly for a soldier to run away from battle, so it is cowardly for any citizen not to contribute his share to the well-being of his country. America is my own dear land; she nourishes me, and I will love her and do my duty to her,

whose child, servant and civil soldier I am.

"As the health and happiness of my body depend upon each muscle and nerve and drop of blood doing its work in its place, so the health and happiness of my country depend upon each citizen doing his work in his place.

"These young citizens are our hostages to fortune. Can we not safely assume that the principles animating their lives augur well for the permanency of the Republic? When before have the foundation stones of continuance been laid with such care and promise of durability?

"The future, then, is bright. And the present? But one thing is needful. No present movement is more laudable than that which looks to conservation of natural resources. But let us never forget that the greatest inherent resource of the American people is Common Sense. Let that be conserved and applied without cessation, and soon it will be found that all the ills of which we complain but know not of are only such as attend upon the growing pains of a great and blessed country.

SECRETS OF HONEY BUSINESS

Bees Will Store Just as Much in Old Box or Washing Machine as in Finest Hive.

Bees will store just as much honey in any kind of an old box, keg or deserted washing machine as in the finest hive that was ever made, and that is one of the big secrets of the bee business; the principal thing is keep the box cool by shading it during the heat of the day, though shade at other times I consider objectionable.

Close to the hive have an abundance of water, some salt and slaked lime, writes A. F. Benney in Farm Press. The best watering device I

know of is a board set at an angle of about twenty degrees with a can or bucket at the high end which leaks just fast enough to keep the board wet a little. The container must be kept covered, else the bees will get in and drown.

Secret No. 2. Do not molest the bees after they get to work, and give them an abundance of room in which to store honey—2,000 to 3,000 cubic inches is not too much.

No. 3. Bees will sting, for they are built that way. The remedy is to wear veil and gloves until you get to like having the little dears prod you.

Take an old box of about 2,000 cubic inches capacity and across one end fasten a dozen sticks the size of your finger, nailing into the ends of them through the sides of the box. Cleat the cover boards together, cut a hole one half by six inches in the lower end and fasten it on with screws. Now tie a wire loop in the top of the box to hang it up by and you have what I call a "tree box." With several of them, which cost me just 15 cents, I got honey enough to sell for \$100, but I sorted it carefully, putting the clean white comb into jars (Mason), and selling it for 15 cents a pound. The rest of the honey I strained and put in jelly tumblers, Mason jars and tin (gallon) cans and it averaged me 11½ cents a pound. Labels can be bought at a low price which aid in selling. At the end of the season I had besides the honey several swarms of bees and could have had more.

Exercise for Horses.

Exercise is essential to the welfare of both mare and foal. Green pasturage is, of course, the ideal environment for the brood mare, and especially by its cleanliness has a salutary effect in the prevention of ill. The early foal without the advantage of this environment is peculiarly liable to the contraction of disease from germs lurking in the stable.

STUMP SPLITTER IS UNIQUE

Old Method of Using Wedge or Dynamite Improved Upon by Large Conical Screw.

The usual method of removing stumps of trees from the ground is to split them by the use of a wedge or a blast of dynamite, says Scientific American. The accompanying illus-



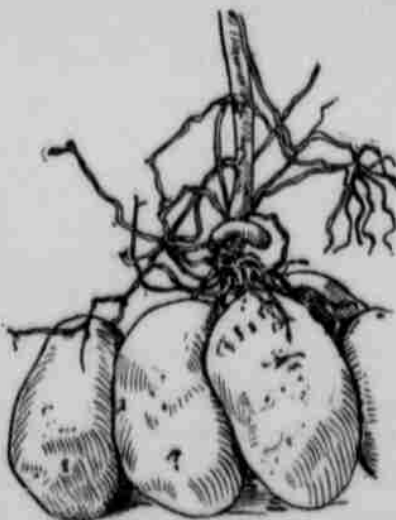
Unique Stump Splitter.

tration shows a new method. It consists in screwing a wedge into the top of the stump. The wedge is in reality a large conical screw, provided at its lower end with a fine thread used for starting the cone into the wood. The shaft of the screw is provided with a hand wheel, by which it may be steadied and turned. Extending laterally from the shaft is a long arm, at the end of which a whiffletree is coupled. A horse may be hitched to the whiffletree, to turn the shaft and screw the cone into the stump. When the stump is too large for the threaded cone on the shaft to split effectively, another cone section may be added. After the stump has been split by means of the cone into a number of small parts these parts can easily be excavated and removed.

POTATOES WERE LEFT OVER

Seed Remained in Ground All Winter and Produced Strong, Vigorous Plants.

Sometimes potatoes left in the ground over winter will produce good crops the following year. Of course such instances are rare and are not easily accounted for. The photograph

from which the accompanying cut was made was sent by a man living at Stamford, Conn. He says this hill was from seed which remained in the ground all winter and grew strong, vigorous plants the next spring. The ground had been heavily fertilized for rhubarb.

A DECIDED IMPROVEMENT.

Since the first of the week conditions in the constitutional convention at Santa Fe have undergone a decided change for the better. We are not ready, by any means, to say that even now, ideal conditions exist in our constitution making, but they are so much better than it appeared they possibly could be that we see chances of a fair constitution.

It is true, the plan now proposed eliminates the initiative entirely, and direct legislation without the initiative resembles the play of Hamlet with Hamlet left out; yet the progressive republicans, conscious of the solid democratic minority behind them, have forced a better referendum proposition, and the "old guard" consented to let it pass without performing a dental operation, as was gleefully reported from the committee's former action.

In addition to the improved situation on the referendum, the corporation committee has also agreed to loosen up and permit the people to elect the commission. Still further, the judicial committee, according to advices received this morning, has agreed to report the election of supreme court justices as well as the minor judicial officers. This is a great victory for the people, the only thing to retard a full rejoicing being the loss of the initiative. The progressive republicans and democrats accomplished a great deal when they brought about these conditions, and are entitled to a vote of thanks, even though they lost one of the popular features.

RIDING FOR A FALL.

The constitutional convention evidently think the people of New Mexico are so anxious for statehood that it can hand out and call it a constitution and have the people adopt it. Maybe so yes; maybe so no. The majority of the people may take anything, but if they do and wake up too late to find that the thing is unbalanced, because one end has been filled and the other left empty, they will have no one to blame but themselves.

We have been told for years, and by some of the very men who are working on the constitution, that one of the principal reasons why the people of New Mexico wanted statehood was because they wanted a voice in the selection of officers—that they were tired of being treated as serfs and having to live under appointive officers. This was a strong plea and touched the heart of every loyal New Mexican.

The general demand is, and is, that all state officers be elected by the people. But is that what we are to get? For answer, it is only necessary to read the report of the commit-

tee on judiciary and that of the corporation committee. One recommends that we have a supreme court, composed of three members, which shall be appointed by the governor, and shall serve twelve years. The other recommends a corporation commission of three members to be appointed by the governor. Is this the self-government for which the people of the territory have been crying all these years? If so, statehood will be a disappointment to those who hold other views on self-government.

And again, the legislative committee has reported a kind of referendum, so mild that those bitterly opposed to it have no objection; for they say "it's fangs have been pulled." The convention must have its share of trimmers to offer such a thing in the face of the demand for a honest referendum. Better none at all than a subterfuge. This same committee refused to incorporate an initiative provision in any form; and it is just as well so, for a lame initiative would be worse than none.

Then we see, if these reports go through, what we are to get and what will be denied us. The sins of commission are great, but the sins of omission are greater; for but for the omission the sins of commission could be atoned later. No direct legislation permitted and self-government denied. If these be satisfactory, then New Mexicans are easily pleased.

They claim to have Teddy downed in New York, but that is impossible. He may meet defeat, but he won't down. The hottest batteries turned upon the Colonel come from this own side of the house.

The reports from Santa Fe indicate that the constitutional convention will complete its labors and adjourn inside of the sixty days—the time allotted by congress for the session. With the report of twenty-seven committees, taking a day or more to dispose of each, makes this prognostication rather questionable. The sooner we know our fate the better off we will be. Close up! Close up!

Dr. Hawley Crippen was last week found guilty by a London jury of the murder of his wife, Belle Elmore, and was sentenced to death. His paramour, Miss Ethel Le Neve, was tried 3 days later and acquitted of being an accessory. This closes a case that is in a way international, as Belle Elmore was an American woman, Crippen being an American also. We have to admit that the British system of running down, prosecuting and bringing criminals to justice is far in advance of ours. It is believed, however, that Crippen's sentence will be commuted to life imprisonment on account of the circumstantial character of the evidence on which he was convicted.

Territorial Game Law.

The following is, in substance, the law relating to the killing of game, and only holders of licenses may legally hunt:

1. Deer, with horns, may be killed from October 15 to November 15.

2. Grouse, native or crested, Messina, California or helmet quail may be killed from October 1 to December 31.

3. Wild turkey from November 1 to December 31.

4. Prairie chicken from September 1 to November 30, commencing with the year 1915.

5. Doves from August 1 to October 31.

6. It is unlawful to kill, capture, ensnare or in any manner injure or destroy, or have in possession any antelope, pheasant, bob-white quail or wild pigeon until the year 1914.

7. Snipe, curlew or plover may be killed with a gun only from September 15 to March 1.

8. The hunter's kill for any day is limited to two turkeys, six grouse, twenty ducks and thirty other birds, and no person shall kill, take or have in his possession in any one open season more than one deer, with horns, nor have in possession at any one time more than four turkeys, six grouse, thirty ducks or other birds.

WASHING OF IRISH CROCHET

Life of Collars and Neckwear Is Prolonged by Laundering It the Proper Way.

Irish crochet collars and neckwear may be the most durable a girl can use or the most unsatisfactory. It depends upon the laundering. Wash in thick, hot suds made from pure white soap. Rinse through several waters and put through a thin starch water. Squeeze out excessive moisture between cloths. Pin the crochet piece to a cushion or heavily padded board. Pull out all the points and edges, fastening each one with a pin to the cushion. Allow it to remain until dry, when it will look like new. If the lace is much yellowed the cushion can be placed in the sun during the drying process. A drop of bluing can be added to the last rinsing water, or if a creamy tint is liked the lace can be put through a weak tea.

A great saving of laundry work and linen may be effected by the use of "runners" for the breakfast and luncheon table. Linen crash with blue border is satisfactory. Cut one strip for length of table to extend a few inches over edge, and two strips to cross table. Place on polished table one long and one cross strip for four persons, or one long and two cross strips for six plates. For a summer cottage a plain pine table stained may be made attractive by the use of these "runners."

Almond Cream.

Two heaping tablespoonfuls of powdered gelatine, four ounces of almonds, one pint of milk, one cupful of whipping cream, four tablespoonfuls of sugar, half a teaspoonful of almond extract. Mix the gelatine, sugar and milk together in a saucepan, then dissolve slowly over the fire. Strain into a basin and cool, then add the almonds blanched and chopped finely, almond extract and the whipped cream. Pour into a wet mold and turn out when firm, sprinkle over with ground almonds and serve with orange jelly.

To Remove Odor From Hands.

It is not generally known that dry mustard rubbed on the hands will remove any odor, even those clinging ones of iodoform or onion. Articles that have been cleaned with gasoline or any other pungent fluid can also be sweetened by this same method, only it should be dusted lightly on the article, and not rubbed, and then a gentle shaking should be given until the whole surface has been deodorized.

Meat Toast.

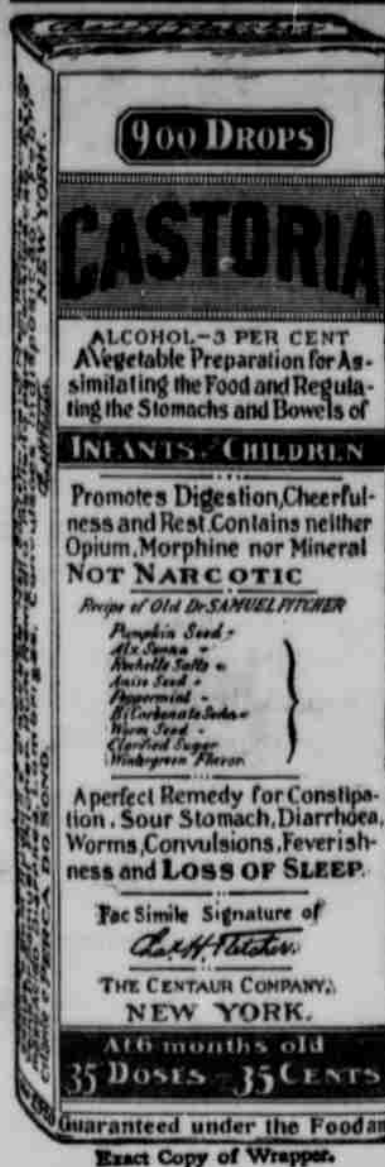
Chop finely six to eight ounces of cooked cold meat. Melt one heaping tablespoonful of butter in the chafing dish, and fry in it one chopped onion, add one tablespoonful of flour and stir until brown, then put in the meat, season with salt, pepper and red pepper, and stir till hot through. Add three tablespoonfuls of stock or water, and cook for ten minutes. Spread the mixture over hot buttered toast. Serve hot.

Halibut Steaks.

Have the steaks one inch thick, sprinkle on each steak salt, pepper, paprika, dip in bread crumbs, then in beaten egg, and then in crumbs again. Put three heaping tablespoonfuls of butter in the blazer of the chafing dish and when smoking hot put in the halibut and fry till it is nicely browned on both sides. Garnish with thin slices of lemon and sprinkle over with finely chopped parsley.

Puff Balls.

One egg, one-half cup sugar, beaten together, one-half pint of sweet milk added and about one pint of flour in which is sifted one teaspoonful baking powder and a little cinnamon, nutmeg and salt. It will be a thick batter. Drop small spoonful into hot fat and fry like doughnuts. Drain on brown paper and roll in sugar.

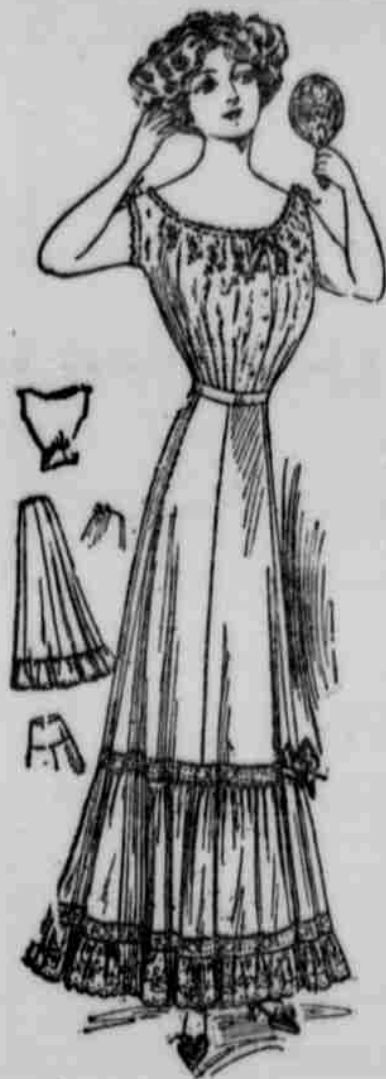
PURELY FEMININE

LINGERIE IS DAINTY

UNDERGARMENTS LOOK LIKE THE
WORK OF FAIRIES.

Attractive and Almost Endless Selection of Materials Now to Be Had Give a Most Gratifying Variety.

Once upon a time a girl thought herself very well provided for when her mother gave her a bolt of long-cloth and some spools of cotton and admonished her to be industrious, but times have changed, and girls have



changed with them. Today longcloth undergarments are practically unknown and instead of the tatting and crocheted trimmings once fabricated so laboriously the modern woman goes to the shop for the daintiest laces. Her intimate little garments—nighties, chemises, drawers, skirts and underbodies—are all made of cottons or linens that look as if they have been spun by the fairies.

The one thing the dainty modern girl does in imitation of her grandmother is to make her under-railment by hand. If she is not skilled in the use of the needle, she buys lingerie by hand.

But, alas, even in the finest materials ready-made lingerie is of two sorts, the good and the bad. It may come from gay Paris or be made in the slums of the great American cities, but it is open to the same objection. The

lovely restraint which is shown in the good things is, balanced by a superfluity of ornament, a gushing abandon as you might say, that brings a blush to the modest cheek. Is it possible, you think, any woman would wear such horrid things! When garments in coarse lawn and cambric are trimmed in this way they seem so inappropriate, that only to look on them dulls the appetite for elaborate lingerie. "Let me be plain forever more," you growl, "and go forth with a nun-like petticoat, treated only to hems and tucks."

The best results in lingerie are correspondingly attractive, and the endless variety of materials now used for the purpose gives a gratifying variety. Fancy lawn skirts, flounced with dotted muslin or cross-barred muslin, and nightgowns, chemises and underbodies are all made of these dainty weaves. The expensive batistes and dimities, the crinkled crepes and handkerchief lawns once regarded as exclusively for outside wear, are now used for all kinds of undergarments.

With lawns, linen and cotton some new insertions that look like canvas are much used and several kinds of lace appear on a single petticoat. Tasteful monograms in hand embroidery are now de rigueur, and ribbons are run through a lawn insertion with slits of the exact width.

With the exception of the joining of the seams, which is done by machine, every garment constructed in perfect taste should be made by hand. A delicate touch of color sometimes appears in the figured dimities, but the general preference is for all white, with only the ribbons tinted.

The illustration comprises a very smart petticoat and corset cover of nainsook. The skirt is gored, and the two cuts show it may be made either with a deep or a narrow flounce. For a dressy costume the flounce could be of lawn, with lace instead of the cambric trimmings, shown herewith. The underbody is hand embroidered, and can be made in a single piece, except the tail, for the tucks at the sides fit it into the figure.

Good undervests for summer are of Hale or Italian silk—the vests which are not ribbed. Three of a very excellent gauze-lisle can be had for a dollar, and one dollar and twenty-five cents will buy a dainty silk vest with a lace edge and ribbon drawstrings.

Evening Cloaks.

Reduced Rates to the Eighteenth National Irrigation Congress, Pueblo.

September 28-30, 1910, will be a gala event in the history of Pueblo. The Eighteenth National Irrigation Congress convenes on the 26th and will be attended by many of the most distinguished men of the country. Among the speakers are Hon. Frank C. Goudy of Denver, Mr. J. M. Wilson of Wyoming, Major Richard W. Young of Salt Lake City, Dr. George Pardee of California, Mr. George E. Barstow of Barstow, Tex., ex-Governor Adams of Colorado and others interested in irrigation and the reclamation of arid lands.

The Denver & Rio Grande railroad offers exceedingly low rates to Pueblo from stations in Colorado and New Mexico to enable citizens along its lines to attend this meeting. From New Mexico points tickets will be on sale September 23, 24, 25 and 26 and will carry a final return limit of October 3, 1910. From stations in Colorado, tickets will be sold on September 24, 25 and 26, except from stations south and west of Alamosa and south of Vance Junction, the selling dates will be one day earlier, or September 23, 24 and 25. Tickets will be limited for return to October 3, 1910.

In addition to the above the Rio Grande has placed in effect reduced rates from Denver, Colorado Springs and Pueblo in order that delegates and others attending the congress may have an opportunity to visit the principal irrigated sections in Colorado, Utah and New Mexico. These tickets are on sale September 30 and October 1 and carry a final return limit of 30 days in addition to date of sale, except to stations between and including Denver, Manitou, Canon City, Walsenburg and Trinidad, which will have a ten-day limit.

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THE EL PASO FAIR.

El Paso, Texas, Oct. 26.—Dan Patch, the King of Horses, Minor Heir, his stable mate, Lady Maud C. and Hedgewood Boy, the two greatest double harness performers in the world, and George Gano, another record holder. These are to be the feature attractions at the El Paso Fair and Southwestern Exposition which opens Saturday. In addition to these special features a program of races has been arranged to include the greatest horses on the Grand Circuit.

High class as it is, the racing at the Southwestern Exposition is but one of the many departments of the Second Annual Fair and Exposition. A mining exhibit of the mineral resources of the Southwest, a National Convention of the Mohair Growers; a Poultry Show which is to be the largest ever held in the Southwest; an Alfalfa Convention of the grass growers in the district, Dog Shows; Agricultural and Horticultural displays; Livestock exhibitions, and Merchants', Manufacturers' and Machinery display, covering acre after acre of ground. These and many more will be seen at the El Paso Fair Grounds, the White City, next week.

The Overland Trail will be the amusement center of the big Exposition, although the grounds will be filled with special entertaining attractions. A Baseball Tournament for the championship of the Southwest; an illuminated Horse Show; Buffalo Bill's Big Show; an electrically lighted night pageant, the annual Os-Aple parade.
