Democratic Laws Have been Tried and Found Wanting.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 6.—As the time for Congress to reassemble approaches, this fact is being gradually disclosed by the administration itself. In nearly every Department in Washington, government officials are preparing amendments patch up defects in statutes. These defects exist because the methods followed in the enactment of the statutes were slovenly and careless to the last degree.

Another problem facing the administration, even more serious than that of defective laws, is that of the government's finances. There has been a growing discrepancy between receipts and expenditures, creating a deficit in the treasury that must be provided for.

Government funds have been wasted, and a large proportion of this waste is due to carelessness by the Democratic Congress in handling appropriations. Articles have heretofore appeared giving a few typical examples of how this waste has occurred. These articles might be continued indefinitely. Enough has been said, however, to illustrate the wasteful, inefficient principle that has vitiated the entire Democratic regime.

A recapitulation of the later articles, from 16 to 24, is given herewith. They will be followed later by additional descriptions of Democratic mistakes:

16. Millions of dollars worth of the nation's timber supply jeopardized.

17. The integrity of the law taxing "cotton future" sales is in doubt, and must be tested in court.

18. As business managers the Democrats have been utter failures, their methods of enacting appropriation bills causing enormous waste. To illustrate:

19. The rural free delivery service has been shamefully crippled.

20. The construction of good roads by governmental aid was delayed a year, and much of the appropriation absolutely lost.

Dies Monday at Albuquerque

Walter Collins, a Santa Fe brakeman fell from an engine in the local yards late Saturday night.

He was rushed to Albuquerque in a special train and given medical attention but he succumbed to his injuries Monday.

Collins fell from the running board of a freight engine. It seems that he was going ahead to throw a switch but there is no information available to show just how accident happened. He struck on his head producing concussion of the brain.

Glimpses of the Great War.

Berlin, Oct. 6.—The man who probably is the oldest to serve actively in the German army is 89 years-old Chief Hospital Inspector Engel of Thale, who went through the campaign of 1870-71 as hospital inspector, then became barracks inspector, retired five years ago on a pension and then enlisted for the present war. He was first called upon to organize a hospital in Oschersleben and then was put in charge of the institution in Thale, with its 468 beds.

Max Metzger of Landau of the Palatinate, aged 70, another veteran of 1870, is one of the comparatively few whose son and grandson are actively serving along with him in the war. He volunteered from Karlsruhe last fall, and is now a non-commissioned officer in the Grenadier Body Guards. His son, Siegmund Metzger, aged 44, is a corporal in a force stationed at Karlsruhe. The latter's son, seventeen years old, is a non-commissioned officer in a Baden infantry regiment now at the front.

Paris.—The honor of being the oldest "poilu" can be claimed, it appears, by Alcide Verd, 72 years of age. Having seen service at Sedan. Verd was again anxious to serve his country and demanded immediately that he be sent to the front. His request was granted and he now is serving with the 47th territorial regiment in the first line trenches, surprising his comrades by his high spirits and good humor

London.—Along with the rise in the price of nearly everything else, the telegraph rate in the United Kingdom will probably soon be raised. It is reported that the postal authorities—the telegraph lines are government-controlled in Great Britain—are considering increasing from twelve to eighteen cents the rate for sending a twelve-word message, address and signature to be counted as words as heretofore. The twelve-cent rate has been in force thirty years.

State Fair Notes.

If you do, the only way to arrange it is to go to Albuquerque to the State Fair next week. By special arrangement with the two Albuquerque newspaper, the Morning Journal and the Evening Herald, the State Fair management has installed an electric scoreboard in the grandstand at Traction park, and visitors to the fair will have every play photographed before them just as it takes place.

This is the latest of the innumerable amusement features arranged for by the authorities in charge of the fair. And it is only a small part of the program for the entertainment of the thousands who will go to Albuquerque next week. On the opening day of the fair there will be a football game between the University of New Mexico and the New Mexico Military Institute which will be one of the greatest contests in college athletics during the year. Every day afterwards there will be horse racing of a caliber that has not been known in the west before. At night there will be fireworks, the midway shows of the Brundage carnival company, the greatest wire-walking performance ever seen in the United States, the concerts of the Kilties' band and innumerable other attractions to hold the undivided attention of the big crowds that will be present.

America For Americans.

It is about conceded on all
sides that Americans are going
to continue to conduct the af-
fairs of America for American
The man with German affilia-
tions first and the man with
English sympathies first have
tried, each in his way, to line up
the United States as the ally of
one side or the other in this war.
All such efforts have failed.
Uncle sam is simply "sawing
wood" in the interest of his own
household, and is conducting
things strictly according to in-
ternational law and firmly warn-
ing each side not to interfere
with his work. At last those
warnings have been heeded, as
witness the last note from Ger-
many on the sinking of the Ara-
bic. So far we have gained
every contention, because we
have contended for nothing that
was not just.

All of us, native-born, for-
eign-born, native-born or for-
eign-born, should rally as
Americans in defense of Ameri-
ca and in championship of
Americanism. We need not
rally to the physical defense of
our country—not yet and prob-
ably, such is our fortune, not
soon; but we do need to rally in
spirit, in sentiment, in heart, to
rally to a spiritual assertion of
our insistence that under our
flag and our allegiance none but
Americans can be tolerated.

The harsh but not inhospitable
truth is that those, if there be
such, who cherish a dual loy-
alty, who would remain some
sort of qualified American,
should return where they be-
long. For the time is here
when every man must show his
true colors, when if he choose
not to be wholeheartedly Ameri-
can he should be wholly and
avowedly something else. No
man can serve two masters.
And he in our midst who is not
for America is against her.

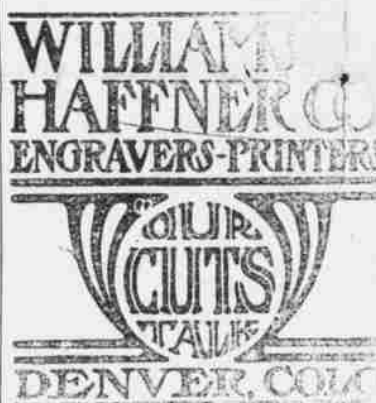
Our flag and our cause have
been upheld in the past by for-
eign-born with the same intensi-
ty of devotion as by native-born.
The genius of Americanism has
been exemplified by Catholic,
Protestant, infidel and Jew. It
has possessed the immigrant as
well as the old settler. A simi-
lar unanimity must animate us
now. The nation cannot toler-
ate, it cannot afford to tolerate,
citizenship that purposes to
found and cherish an alien cult
amongst us. Bits of Europe

are not to be perpetrated and
perpetuated here. Unless a
man come with design to be
American, in his loyalty, his
ideals, his living, he should
forthwith go back whence he
came.

To insist upon undivided
Americanism is not a mere des-
irability; it is imperative neces-
sity of our nationality and our
democracy. Unless we do so,
the United States cannot remain
a nation and the republic can-
not endure.

But insistence should be the
last resort, the final recourse.
The advantages of American
citizenship are so plain, the no-
bility of American ideals so
manifest, that interest and emula-
tion unite to draw irresistibly
all our people into one allegian-
ce to flag and institutions and
ideals.

The appeal should be suf-
ficient—it will be. This nation
can demand loyalty as a right;
but, instead, it appeals for loy-
alty as a free devotion arising
from the heart. What America
wants is a citizenship wholly
loyal to all that the American
flag stands for—America first,
ast all the time.—Morning
Journal.

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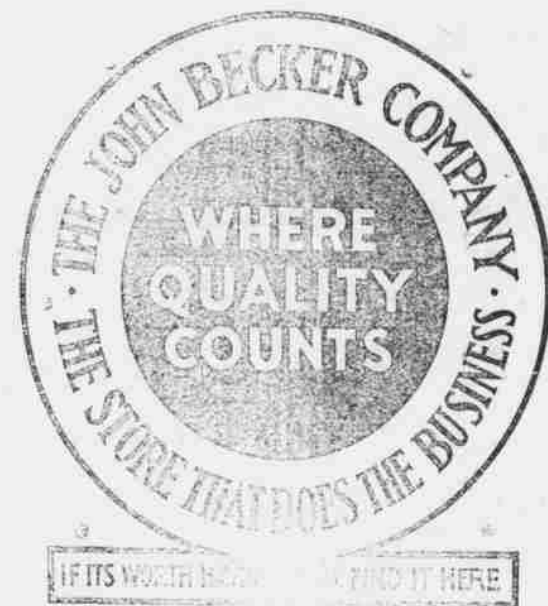
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
