SPECIAL ARTICLE FROM THE CONVENTION.

Santa Fe, N. M., Nov. 15.—The last week, announced as the last, of the constitutional convention opened with the republicans slightly demoralized, and with the exception of one or two, the democrats more united.

When the convention met Monday morning the republicans found themselves unable to proceed, and after twenty minutes, spent in receiving reports and petitions, the convention was adjourned over until Tuesday morning. This was to give the republicans time to get together and caucus on matters which should be for the full deliberation of elected delegates representing a free people. The party bosses, however, are dictating.

The republicans had some trouble over the apportionment for legislative purposes. It was so arranged that counties in which progress has been shown could be overwhelmed by the reliably republican counties under the bosses, and there was no complaint that the democrats had not been deprived of everything they possible could be deprived of, but in dividing the districts different republican leaders fell out. Jealousy was the main cause of this trouble, as one ambitious politician would object to having another ambitious politician tied up in the same district with him. To add to these troubles the democrats filed notice that they would fight the constitution under the proposed apportionment.

Now the republicans are more afraid of an organized fight on this constitution than of anything else, and it is believed that the apportionment was purposely made so as to excite their ire and then modify, as number of democrats suspected of having certain corporate leanings, immediately got busy having a few unimportant changes made, which did not help the democrats nor hurt the republican schemes but offered an excuse for a compromise talk, which may be effective.

After much wrangling the republicans arrived at a conclusion and the apportionment will be forced through. This apportionment offered as a "compromise" does not increase the democratic

representation a single vote.

The first business Tuesday morning was the adoption of the preamble and boundary sections, over which there could be no possible difference, and right there the convention got into a wrangle as the next business was the elective franchise. An amendment providing for a primary law, and was promptly voted down.

The convention finally got itself together sufficiently to adopt an amendment which practically nullified the woman suffrage proposition for school elections.

The democrats will oppose the same sections of the reports from the taxation corporation and other committees that they opposed during the consideration by the committee of the whole, but it is not expected that they will be successful.

The feature of the past three weeks of the convention was the flooding of the convention with petitions for prohibition. Many of the counties sent in petition after petition.

Against the Constitution.

We are in receipt of a letter this week from a prominent business man of Albuquerque, with whom we have no acquaintance, neither do we know his politics. But he says something concerning an editorial which appeared in the news two weeks ago which is, naturally, very pleasing to use. The editorial in question was headed "Misrepresentatives," and what the writer says concerning the sentiment, in his city is of the utmost importance. The clipping was attached to the letter, and the letter reads. "A very able presentation of the situation at Santa Fe," referring to the article appearing in the news. "From what I can hear around town," continues the writer, "this city will vote down the constitution three to one." It is pleasing to learn not only that the policy of the news is endorsed, but that other sections of the territory well oppose the adoption of the constitution. That's the right spirit; if we can't get a good constitution let's have now.

WHY NEW ORLEANS

CITY IS LOGICAL POINT FOR WORLD'S PANAMA EXPOSITION.

its Geographical Position and Many Other Considerations Mark It as Most Suitable Spot for Dedication of Great Work.

Public sentiment has decided that the completion of the Panama Canal in 1915 shall be celebrated with a great International Exposition in which all the nations of the world may participate; and the question of where this Exposition is to be held will be settled by Congress at its approaching session.

New Orleans and San Francisco are contesting for the honor of holding this Exposition, and both cities have guaranteed immense sums of money as an evidence of their ability to finance so great an enterprise.

An Exposition worthy of the term "World's Fair," such as New Orleans proposes to build, will be a great educational movement. Its success as such, however, will depend entirely upon the percentage of our population who can secure its educational advantages, this in turn, depends upon its location, as the time in traveling to and from the Exposition, and the cost in railroad and Pullman fares, are the most important factors.

Considering these matters, New Orleans' claims to being the "Logical Point" for this Panama Exposition, seem to be fully substantiated by the following facts:—

New Orleans is 500 miles from the center of population in the United States. San Francisco is 2,500 miles distant therefrom.

Within a radius of 500 miles from New Orleans there are 17,500,000 people. Within the same radius from San Francisco there are only 2,000,000.

Within a radius of 1,000 miles from New Orleans, there are 65,000,000. Within the same radius from San Francisco there are only 6,000,000.

At an average of 900 miles from New Orleans, there are 70 of our principal cities with a combined population of 20,000,000. Averaging 900 miles from San Francisco there are only 8 large cities, with a combined population of just 1,000,000. The average distance of all these cities to New Orleans is 792 miles,—to San Francisco 2,407 miles.

Over 75 per cent. of the people of the United States could go to an Exposition there at an average expense for railroad fare of \$12.50, as against an average of \$37.50 to the Pacific Coast; and for several millions of our people, the Pullman fare and Dining Car expenses alone, for a trip to San Francisco, would amount to more than all their transportation expenses for a trip to New Orleans.

This is an important public question to be settled by Congress at the session which convenes in December.

Many of our readers will wish to visit this World's Panama Exposition, and it held in New Orleans a great many more could spare the time and money for the trip than could go to San Francisco. Therefore, we urge our readers to write to the two senators from this State and the congressman from this district, requesting them to support New Orleans in the contest.

DAINTIES FOR TABLE

RECIPES OF VALUE, BOTH NEW AND OLD.

Excellent Peach Cake That is Guaranteed to Please—Preparation of Sheep Kidneys—Fried Bananas with Meat.

For an excellent peach cake use this recipe, which never fails to give satisfactory results if carefully followed:

Half a dozen eggs, the weight of eggs in sugar, half their weight in flour, grated rind of one lemon, and two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice.

Beat the egg yolks till they become pale yellow in color and thicken. Gradually add the sugar and lemon juice. Have the whites already beaten stiff and dry. Cut and fold one-half the quantity into the mixture, and then cut and fold in one-half the flour the remaining whites, and finally the rest of the flour. Bake in two shallow pans. While the cake is baking peel some peaches and cut into sections from end to end. Sprinkle with lemon juice, which will prevent discoloration. Cover one layer of the cake with the sliced fruit. Sprinkle lightly with sugar. Cover this with the other layer, which must be right side up. Spread the top with the icing, recipe for which follows, and decorate with sliced peaches.

Icing—Grate the thin rind of a lemon into a cup. Into this sift through a wire sieve enough peach juice and pulp to fill the cup one-half. Flavor with a few drops of almond extract and the juice of half a lemon. Gradually beat in confectioner's sugar to make a smooth spreading paste. The amount of sugar required is about three-quarters of a pound. The sugar must be beaten in slowly, a little at a time.

Oranges can be substituted for the peaches when desired, and these also make a delectable combination with the cake.

Two sheep kidneys, yolk of an egg, lemon juice, seasoning. Skin and core the kidneys and cut in small pieces.

Melt one ounce of butter in a stew pan, boil, then add pepper and salt. Stir briskly over the fire for about five minutes or until the meat looks cooked. Then take the pan off the fire, drop in the yolk of an egg and mix. Add a few drops of lemon juice. Have ready as many rounds of toast as there will be breakfasters. Butter these and spread the preparation on them, having all very hot.

Fried bananas make a tasty accompaniment to cold beef, mutton, or veal, and may be new to some where fried apples are quite familiar.

Slice them long and thin, mix lemon juice and sugar, and marinate the slices in this for from fifteen minutes to half an hour. Drain, dip in flour, and brown in hot butter. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Sheep and lamb kidneys furnish a number of delicate morning viands.

Finnish Roll.

Mix enough shortening into entire wheat bread dough, after the second raising, to make it tender; one-fourth cupful to each pound will usually be sufficient; roll out one-fourth inch thick and spread with creamed butter; then spread with dried cherries. Sprinkle with cinnamon and grated nutmeg; then roll as for jelly cake, wetting the outer edge with water and pressing together, forming in a ring and fastening the ends together with water; with shears cut into slices one-half inch thick, allowing each slice to lap a little on the previous slice, so the ring will remain intact when all are cut; let rise to double their size and brush with water and bake; serve hot with stewed cherries heaped in the center and covered with a sauce, or serve with coffee, omitting the fruit and sauce in the center.

SOME GOOD SALADS

POSSIBLY HERE ARE A FEW YOU MAY NOT KNOW.

Calves' Brains, Properly Prepared, Make a Delicious Sunday Night Dish—Celery Roots Another Very Appetizing Salad.

Calves' brains, plainly boiled in salt and water, chilled on the ice, cut in small dice and served on a bed of tender lettuce with mayonnaise make a delicious dish for Sunday night.

When there is no olive oil in the house a hot salad may be made of lettuce and bacon. Fry the bacon—which must be cut in cubes—a delicate brown, then throw it and the grease all over the lettuce, adding salt and pepper as needed. Use hot vinegar.

Canned Pimientos—Spanish peppers—make a salad as good to eat as it is beautiful to look at. Open the can, let it stand fifteen minutes for odors to escape, and then turn contents into a collander, running the cold water over the rosy vegetables. Give them a good wash, then drain carefully, and chill them thoroughly on the ice. Serve on lettuce dressed with mayonnaise or French dressing. If the family is small a whole can of the pimientos will not be needed, but what is left over from the salad will keep in the ice box. The washing is necessary to get off the slime of the canning juices.

Celery roots make a very satisfactory salad for those who want to feel that they are really eating something. They must be peeled and boiled till tender, thoroughly chilled and dressed with French dressing—olive oil, vinegar, salt and pepper. Of course the lettuce bed makes a pretty finish and adds a note of taste to the salad.

When the larder runs very dry, if there are only some stale white bread in the house and a bit of garlic or onion, still another salad is possible. Toast the bread until it is hard all through, cut it up in small squares and rub one with a cut of onion or clove of garlic. Dress with French dressing an hour before eating so the oil can soak in and if there are two pieces of pimiento left from the can already mentioned add them to the dish. This may seem a little messy to look at, but it will taste all right.

A sweet orange salad which turns out a very ornamental dish is made by cutting the fruit in round, thin slices and using rum and sugar for the dressing. A banana salad, which should be cut in lengthwise slices and put on lettuce, would be dressed with sugar and lemon juice. Capers add a very excellent note to potato salad, and give it a pretty look, while any species of lettuce may have the usual taste immensely varied with a raw egg dressing. Beat the egg, white and yolk together, till it runs freely; add three teaspoonfuls of sugar, salt and pepper to taste, and a tablespoonful or more of elder vinegar. Then let the dish stand until the edges of the lettuce begin to wilt. A French gourmand always "fades" his salad in this way before eating it.

Sweet Rice Croquettes.

Cook one cup rice in two cups milk in double boiler until liquid is absorbed and rice is tender. Add one-fourth cup sugar and one-half teaspoon salt. Cool, add two egg yolks, shape in form of nest, dip in crumbs, again in egg and crumbs, and fry in deep fat, hollow downward. Drain on brown paper and fill nests with cubes of jelly.

Raisin Fudge.

Three cups brown sugar, three-fourths cup milk, one-fourth cocoa; stir constantly till it will form a soft ball when dropped in cold water. Add a tiny bit of butter, one-half teaspoon vanilla and one-third cup of raisins, seeded and torn in two.

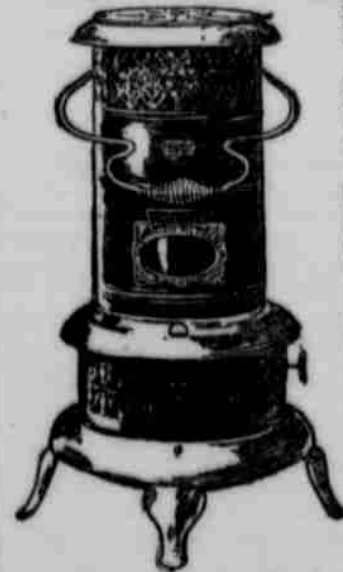

VOTE IT DOWN.

It is quite evident, without waiting for the adjournment of the constitutional convention, that the instrument is not what the people want, nor what they had a right to expect, even taking into consideration the elements that have dominated the convention. This change has taken place the past two or three weeks; for at the beginning of that period it looked as though a fair constitution would be presented—not pleasing to all, but acceptable, possibly, to the majority—but, as has been stated, conditions have changed, and there has been so much trimming, so many interlineations; so many omissions, and the general features so bad that it is meeting with opposition wherever its provisions are known.

It omits the initiative, which, if placed in the constitution, would ultimately correct abuses from which we will suffer under the constitution as now drafted.

The direct primary is left out: a provision that would have given the people absolute authority in the selection of their officials, and eliminated, to a great extent, the ward-heeler and the political boss.

No provision is made for the segregation of the whites and blacks in the schools, which will bring about troublesome and unpleasant conditions in the future, as it has in almost every state of the union.

While it has provided for a corporation commission, it has practically tied its hands, and it is extremely questionable if the people will derive any benefits from its creation.

A referendum, it is true, has been provided, and, while an improvement over the original draft, it is yet full of holes and weak in essentials.

It has drafted the instrument in such a manner that it can scarcely be amended short of a revolution; and this feature alone is sufficient to condemn it.

It is most faulty on the question of taxation, and in no wise relieves the people of the burdens; in fact, some of the sections have a familiar ring. They are quite to some very obnoxious laws enacted by the territorial legislature.

While disclaiming any attempt at legislation in our basic instrument, yet it contains many features that will estop legislation in the future state, and in such a manner that there is little hope for redress in matters where the people would like to exercise some authority.

Its general and specific provisions lack in lucidity, and will afford abundant opportunity for the legal fraternity to ply their

profession, the people to be the pawns.

The man who wants statehood at any cost; the man who is willing to sacrifice every right in order to attain that end; the man who favors a constitution that is as unchangeable as the laws of the Medes and the Persians, and who prefers aristocracy to democracy will support this makeshift that will soon be presented for his suffrage; and no argument will be sufficient to induce him to do otherwise. But the man who wants a reasonably fair constitution; who demands some rights; who desires self-government; who opposes the character of legislation this constitution will breed, and who believes in equal taxation and exact justice in the administration of governmental affairs cannot support this constitution. The empty shell of statehood will catch the unwary; but it must be admitted the bait is poor.

CONVENTION NOTES.

A dozen petitions asking for the submission of a provision for state-wide prohibition were introduced and referred to the committee on liquor traffic, at Santa Fe last week. The total number of petitions which have been introduced in the convention in reference to this matter now amounts to more than sixty and they came from all parts of the territory. The petitions bear the names of thousands of voters of the territory and a large number of names of women and children.

Delegate A. H. Hudspeth of Lincoln County, introduced the following, relative to the taxation of mines: All mines and mining claims, both placer and rock in place, containing or bearing gold, silver, copper, lead, coal, or other valuable mineral deposits, after purchase thereof, shall be taxed at the price fixed for such lands by the United States, unless the surface ground or some part thereof of such mine or claim is used for other than mining purposes, and has a separate and independent value for such other purposes; in which case said surface ground, or any part thereof, so used for other than mining purposes shall be taxed at its value for such other purposes, as provided by law; and all the machinery used in mining, and property and surface improvements upon or appurtenant to mines and mining claims, which have a value separate and independent of such mines or mining claims, and the net annual proceeds of all mines and mineral lands leased from the United States, shall be taxed as provided by law.

There is a rumor floating around Santa Fe to the effect that someone held out some of the funds from the "Jack pot" made up to kill the initiative and referendum by the saloon men of the territory. According to this rumor there is a difference between what was collected and what is accounted for, and the e are a number of a saloon men who fear that the republicans have invented a new kind of hold up which means no more profits unless it can be stopped right where it is. In many of the counties of the territory the saloon men have often been the victims of political hold-ups. This was a representation to them that if they did not come through with funds for the defeat of the initiative and referendum the temperance people would initiate the prohibition business and put them out of business. The outside liquor interests were also taken in for a good round sum.

The delegates sent to ask the convention for the measures desired by railroad orders have given up in disgust. This should turn many votes from the party of greed and broken promises, but the railroad attorneys writing the constitution have, so it is said, assured the politicians that when the time comes they will line up these men with few exceptions. They wanted the initiative, the referendum and an

employee liability law, and a few of the other pet measures forced through by the interests.

Politicians admit that the feared nationalism in New Mexico is dead, Fall having gone in with the old guard and getting all he asked for in return for not taking lead of the independents and capturing the convention. The republican bosses spend many sleepless nights trying to devise ways and means to keep the state from Otero running the convention independent of party lines.

The republicans spend nearly all the time in caucus, fixing it so that the few bosses who have axes to grind can run the convention. It also seems that there is some hard feelings against Catron because of a habit he has of agreeing in caucus and then trying to run something in on the floor. He has tried the game, and been caught, but there is always danger and it is wearing on the nerves of the bosses.

The highest salary to be paid a state officer in the new state of New Mexico is to be placed at \$5,000 for the governor. The attorney general is to get \$4,000, and the secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, school superintendent and land commissioner are to receive \$3,000 apiece. There are 19 states in the United States, the pay of whose governors is less than it is proposed to pay the governor of the state of New Mexico. Nebraska, Wyoming and Vermont pay their governor \$2,500.

TRY WASHING THE FURNITURE

Pieces That Have Been Cast Off May Easily Be Restored to Original Brightness.

"Very few people know that furniture ought to be washed," said a salesman in the furniture section of a large department store. "Yes," he continued. In the Absence of a Broiler, This Method Will Be Found to Give Satisfaction.

Take on iron spider, half fill it with warm water and put over a hot fire. The spider must be very hot before putting the steak in it. When the water boils rapidly pour it off. This heats the pan evenly and does not burn or crack it. Put over a clear fire next till it is all dry from the water, place the entire slice of steak in it, but do not put salt in it, for it draws out the juice which should be retained in the meat. Cook rapidly for a minute or two, then turn over and cook the other side the same. After this quick turning turn back to the first side if you do not like it rare and cook till it is done as much as you like, but keep turning every minute, and on no account let it scorch or burn. When it is cooked remove whole to the platter. When the steak is removed you may pour hot water into the pan for gravy. When it is brown turn into a small pitcher, as there isn't much of it, but do not turn the water gravy over the steak or you will spoil it by making it tough. Sprinkle pepper and salt over the steak, and be generous with the butter, as you can afford to be, since you use none to cook it with.

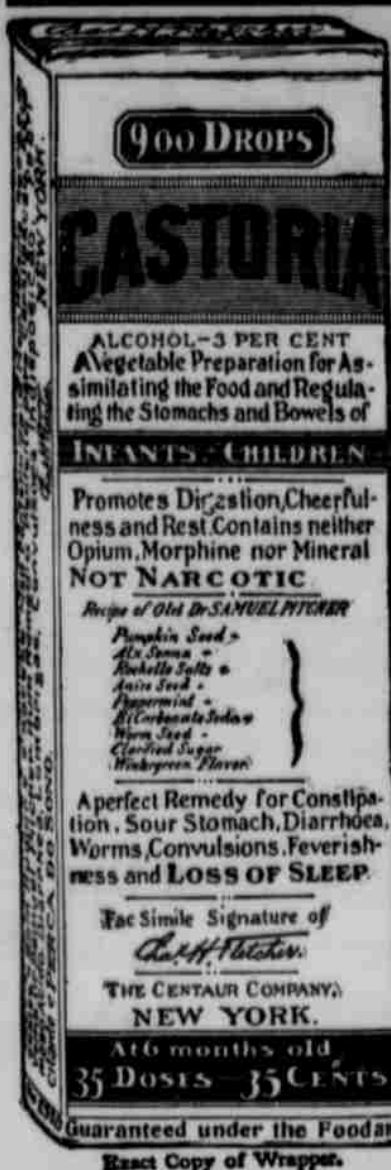
For a change, render out a piece of suet after frying the meat. In this fry some sliced onions till they are brown rings. Arrange these rings around the steak.

To Clean White Plumes.

First immerse in gasoline until thoroughly wet and cleaned; then shake out and roll over and over in flour. After the flour bath use cornstarch, and your plumes will come out perfectly white and clean. This is the process used in millinery establishments with excellent results. Any light colored plume will clean well in this bath.

Cocoa Frosting With Peanuts.

Take half powdered sugar or more than half and the rest cocoa. Beat together with a little milk, then shell some peanuts, according to the amount of frosting you want to make. Beat all together, making a frosting. You may use walnuts or hickory nuts instead of peanuts for a change.

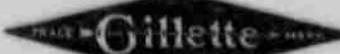

KNOWN THE WORLD OVER

FOR DINNER OR LUNCHEON

Proper Arrangement of the Table and
Order of Seating and Serv-
ing Guests.

Set a plate for each person. At the right of the plate place an oyster fork, soup spoon and knife in the order of use, the first one used furthest from the plate. At the left of the plate lay the forks in order of use, the first one used furthest from the plate. Let the tines of the forks and bowls of the spoons be turned upward and the cutting edges of the knives be turned toward the plate. Place the napkin upon the plate or at the left of the forks or folded once above the plate. Set glass for water above the knife. If wine glasses are to be used set the glass for water above the plate and near the center of the cover (space occupied by plate and accessories) and set the wine glasses to the right in a half circle, the first one to be used placed furthest toward the right and nearest the hand.

The salad knife and fork are supplied for a salad to be served as a separate course. These are placed according to the place of the salad in the menu or just before the salad is passed. Spoons or knives and forks are usually supplied for the sweet course—after table has been cleared for this course—spoons and knives at the right of the plate and forks at the left. If forks only are called for, place these at the right.

When serving the dessert—if eight plates—or plates with finger bowls, are to be set before the guests and the dessert is to be brought in afterward, set the plates before the silver. If the dessert is to be brought in on individual plates, set silver in place, then bring on the food.

Three important things to remember:

- No. 1—Food should always be set down before the guests from the right.
 - No. 2—When a dish is presented from which a guest is to help himself, it should be passed to his left.
 - No. 3—When a course is finished remove the plates from the left.
- Meats are served by the host and hostess from the table or by attendants from side table and pantry.

Table napkins and tablecloths should never be starched.

Bristle brushes if merely dusty can be cleaned in cornmeal.

A small broom made of stiff wire is convenient in cleaning skillets.

A week alum bath is good for tender feet which suffer in summer time.

When a room is to be closed for several months work powdered borax into the edges of the carpets and under the spots where heavy furniture rests.

Fasten firmly at the center of back tape or ribbon, which is run through heading in underwear. This keeps it from being pulled half out or lost entirely in laundering.

Hold the knife in a slanting manner and follow the grain of the wood while cleaning dough off a bread board. Also do the washing of it away from the iron sink, for the least grease and black will get into the soft wood.

When ironing starched clothes, if the iron is dipped quickly into cold water each time when taken from the stove the starch will never stick and the clothes iron smooth and so quickly you hardly realize you're started before you're done.

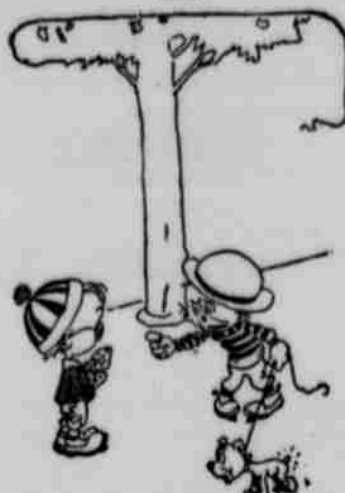

Thanksgiving Day Proclamation.

In the year 1621, after the gathering of their harvests the Pilgrim Fathers on the bleak shores of Massachusetts Bay appointed a day of thanksgiving and prayer for the many mercies which Almighty God had vouchsafed them. Annually since that time, in Massachusetts, a day in the fall has been set apart as a day of thanksgiving and prayer, and the custom has spread until thanksgiving Day is now observed in all of the states and territories of the union, and the president each year issues a proclamation declaring the last Thursday of November to be a holiday and requesting the people on such day to give thanks to their Creator for the manifold blessings which they have received during the year; and whereas, the President has recommended by proclamation that Thursday the 24th day of November, A. D. 1910, be observed as Thanksgiving Day.

Now therefore, I William J. Mills governor of the territory of New Mexico do hereby proclaim, Thursday, November 24th, A. D. 1910 to be thanksgiving Day and a legal holiday in the territory of New Mexico.

The observance of this day is strictly an American custom and it should be observed by all. Schools will be closed and the people generally when they can do so should attend places of worship and give thanks to the Almighty for having safely brought our beloved country through another year; for having us bountiful crops; preserved us from plagues and epidemics of a general character, and for having given us as a people so many comforts and luxuries. On said day let us also pray to God that like blessings may be vouchsafed our country and ourselves during the year to come.

Done at the Executive Office this 14th day of November, A. D. 1910.

Irrigation Taxation.

The colored gentleman is visible in the fuel pile in many of the committee reports to the constitutional convention, but in few is it more evident than in two sections of the irrigation committee's report. The sections in question are numbered 6 and 10, and those who have kept track of a little local history will understand why they are of interest to Lincoln county. sections read as follows:

Sec. 6. Reservoirs, ditches, canals, flumes power plants, power transmission lines and pumping plants owned and used by individuals, irrigation districts or corporations for irrigating lands owned by such individual members or stockholders of said corporation; provided, that the same shall not be a source of revenue or profit other than that directly derived by each land owner from his lands so irrigated, shall not be separately taxed so long as they shall be owned and used exclusively for such purposes. All lands of like character, whether held in large or small quantities, shall be assessed at the same value per acre all lands and improvement shall be listed separately for taxation. The plowing of lands shall not be considered an improvement for the purposes of taxation.

Sec. 10. Timber lands and lands containing coal, mineral oils, precious or other valued and assessed according to the surface value thereof; the annual output of timber lands and all lands containing coal, mineral oils, precious or valuable stones, shall be valued and assessed for taxation according to the value thereof at the place of production in the same proportion and on the same basis as other property in the state is valued and taxed. Provided, that no taxation shall be levied on the surface improvements, machinery or other appliances used in the production of such coal, mineral or precious stones. Provided, also, that any coal lands owned or held by any
