

## PERFORATES SHELL OF EGGS

Compressed Air Keeps Contents of Shell From Leaking Out—Saves Finger Tips.

A novel device for perforating egg shells has been designed by a West Virginia man. It is a more or less elaborate apparatus for such a purpose, as it is equipped with a compressed air pump as well as a perforator, but it does the work in clean shape. At one end of a strand is a compressed air chamber with the rod of the pump, which operates on a spring, rising from it. An airtight channel connects with a little receptacle that resembles a miniature flowerpot and in the bottom of which is the perforating apparatus. The egg is

placed endwise in this receptacle and the plunger of the compressed air pump is pressed down. The perforators are forced into the egg shell, drilling out neat holes, but the upward pressure of the air in this chamber keeps the contents of the shell from leaking out and the egg can be removed without losing any of it and held over the cup into which it is meant to flow. This little implement saves the smearing of the fingers that so often accompanies the opening of soft-boiled eggs.

## DUSTLESS AUTO BODY IS NEW

Latest European Inventions Do Away With Vacuum Behind Fast Moving Machine.

The efforts of European automobile manufacturers for the past year have been directed towards the designing of an automobile body that will not raise the dust. Many different variations of bodies have been tried out in the experiments, but all are of the new torpedo type, which seems to be the most effective. This car has the torpedo shape, and in addition an alto-




Obviates Vacuum Behind Automobiles

gether new feature. It is a clear opening from the under part of the body, through which the air sweeps freely, says Popular Mechanics. The rear panel is also curved around in a peculiar fashion, and the two features do away with the dust-raising vacuum which usually exists behind the rear seats.

tific American. It is arranged to allow gradual administering of the anesthetic to the patient, and to store the mixture of exhalations and anesthetic gas, thereby economizing the anesthetic. It comprises a funnel with absorbent material in the apex for the anesthetic, a support for a receptacle containing the anesthetic, a pipe opening to the funnel apex and adapted to communicate with said receptacle to allow the liquid to flow into the absorbent material.

## NEW METALS FOR AIRSHIPS

Two Metal Alloys Have Been Discovered That Are Lighter Even Than Aluminum.

The craze for flying machines has stimulated invention in many directions; the latest announcement is that two metal alloys have been found that are lighter even than aluminum.

One of these, called "metal-licge" by the inventor, has been analyzed and found to contain 99 parts of magnesium, with a little zinc and sodium and traces of aluminum and iron. While lighter than aluminum, it has the property of decomposing water and producing hydrogen, and so has some at least of the disadvantages of magnesium.

The other alloy, "electron," is less well known; it is a German product and is said to be lighter than aluminum, to be easily worked and to have remarkable strength. It may be employed in the construction of the next Zeppelin airship.

## Forcing Plant Blooms.

A newly discovered plan for forcing plants for securing blooms out of season consists of immersing shoots by inversion in water at a temperature of 30 to 50 degrees C. for nine or twelve hours, and afterward keeping the plants in a dark, moist chamber at a temperature of about 25 degrees until the leaves commence to appear, after which the plants are grown under ordinary greenhouse conditions.

### Will Statehood Win?

The above, or similar questions, have been propounded many times the past ten days, and the answers have been as varied as the colors of the rainbow. We are willing to say frankly that we fear it will; and state as one of the reasons for that fear that the power that put the constitution through will be a powerful factor in having it adopted.

There are three classes which will support the constitution—two are "Extremes," and the other is "Conservatives." The "Extremes" are those who will support the constitution because the bosses pull the string; and those who want statehood at any price. The middle element is composed of men who believe that a fairly good constitution has been presented—at least as good as could be obtained—and will, therefore, work for the instrument. That these three classes constitute a majority in New Mexico we are not prepared to say, but we fear they do.

We hold that the constitution ought to have been much better than it is, and if the one presented is the best that could be secured, it is only another reason for its rejection. That the instrument contains some good features we are willing to admit, but that it contains one, single, clear-cut provision whereby the people may enforce their wishes, we deny. We submit that without these provisions the instrument is weak, and if adopted will necessarily produce a weak state government, from the standpoint of a popular government, and that the people are entitled to and should have a better constitution; and, further, that if this one is rejected we will have a better constitution.

Congress met Monday in regular session. The session expires by limitation March 4th, 1911, and is called the short session. It will be a year before the congress elected a month ago will convene, unless the president calls a special session.

Insurgent leaders in congress will urge at this session a reduction on some tariff schedules. What position the standpatters will take in the matter is not known; but it is believed they have been chastised to agree to

lower tariff duties. Many of the leading republicans in this congress will not sit in the next, because they have been defeated by insurgents or democrats. The lesson, it is believed, will have a salutary effect on legislation.

### Ballinger Whitewashed.

The majority report of the Ballinger investigating committee has been made public, and it exonerates the secretary. The report in part is as follows: "The evidence has wholly failed to make out a case. Neither any fact proved nor all facts put together exhibit Mr. Ballinger as being anything but a competent and honorable man, honestly and faithfully performing the duties of his high office, with an eye singly to the public interest." That the charges and insinuations against secretary Ballinger in regard to the Cunningham coal land entries or other coal land claims in Alaska are not justified and his conduct in respect thereto is not justly censurable; that he was fully justified in revoking indian cooperative agreement; "That restoration of water power sites by secretary Ballinger were made in good faith and not in enmity to the government, and that no injury appears to have been done to the government and the cause of conservation by either his restorations or withdrawals;

"That in view of the opinion of the attorney general, he was justified in abandoning the use of so-called water users' cooperative certificates in connection with the reclamation of arid lands; "That while the administration of the reclamation law presented features justly subject to criticism, no unfair criticism of improper conduct on secretary Ballinger's part has been shown nor was there any action by him not within the bounds of discretion of the head of the interior department in the faithful performance of his duty;

"That he is not an enemy of or hostile to a reasonable and judicial policy of conservation and that no ground whatever has been shown justifying the opinion that he is not a faithful and efficient public officer."

### Harry Humphrey Returns.

Harry Humphrey returned this week from his old home in Michigan. While absent Harry became a benedict, and Mrs. Humphrey and two sisters will arrive in a few days. Mr. Humphrey brought a car load of household goods which he and his brothers left at the old homestead when they came to New Mexico. They will start housekeeping here, and will be counted amongst our best people.




### POTATO SORTER VERY HANDY

Tedious Labor Involved Can Be Relieved by Device Shown in Illustration Below.

The tedious labor involved in sorting many bushels of potatoes can be relieved with the device shown in illustration, and the amount of work done in half or a third of the time possible under the hand method, says Orange Judd Farmer. A frame is built to go over a large box or bin. This is covered with 1-inch mesh chicken wire and set so that it slants upon the box or bin. The potatoes are placed upon this screen and the small ones pass through the meshes into the box or bin below.

The larger potatoes roll down toward the lowest end of screen. Two men standing on each side of the device can pick out all the damaged potatoes as they roll down over same, thus securing perfectly sorted potatoes with but a fraction of the time, labor and expense required to sort them by handling each one. If the device is placed on a bin that is sev-




A Handy Potato Sorter.

eral feet from the ground an inclined surface should be placed at the foot of the screen, so the tubers will not be bruised by dropping directly to the floor or ground.

### ONE WAY OF CUTTING CORN


#### Storing Potatoes.

If there is danger of frost entering the cellar put the barrels containing the potatoes in the room over the kitchen where the heated air from the range can be used to keep the air at a moderate temperature they will keep dry and retain their flavor.

### TRANSFER BEES TO CELLAR

Hives Should Be Taken Indoors Some Time in November—One Method Illustrated.

The bee should be taken into the cellar some time in November. The covers of the hives will be all sealed down tight and it will not be necessary to disturb them, but the hives should all be loosened from the bottom boards, so that there will be no jar when they are picked up. Great care should be taken not to

arouse the bees or they are likely to fill themselves with honey and it will be probably five or six months before they have a cleansing flight.

The picture shows how hives can best be transferred to the cellar. Lay on the cellar floor two joists and place the hives on them six or eight inches apart. The next tier is placed on top of the first, each hive resting on two under. This will give ample ventilation.

#### Alfalfa Culture.

Professor Coburn says the theory that a nurse crop will prevent the weeds choking the alfalfa is apparently, as a rule, not well founded. In his book he says that alfalfa should not be sown on foul land, and also proper disking and harrowing at near intervals for four to six weeks before sowing will disturb or kill far more weeds than can any nurse crop. Besides, the oats or barley sown as a nurse will, when cut, leave weeds in good growth, or dormant and ready to spring up as fast or faster than the alfalfa. No nurse crop is ever used with fall sowing. When ground has been thoroughly prepared for the preceding crop, and then properly cared for and made ready for alfalfa by the preliminary weed destruction, it will be found advisable to sow alfalfa alone, even in the spring.

#### Trap for Bee Hive.

Some beekeepers use a trap at the entrance of the hive. This trap allows the workers to pass, but catches and holds the queen when the bees swarm. A new hive is placed upon the old stand when a swarm comes out, and the old one moved to a new place. The bees, not finding the queen with them, return to their old location and enter the new hive, supposing it their own home, and, as they are going in, the queen is released and goes in with them; thus they are really led to hive themselves.



Seed potatoes, like table stock, should be stored, as cold as possible without frost.

Light injures the flavor of table potatoes, which should be kept in the absolute dark.

Gather pumpkins and squash before a hard frost, and store away in a dry place (not in a damp cellar).

It is not necessary to clean garden seed so thoroughly as the seed purchased if it is to be sown by hand.

The potatoes should be dry and free of earth. The potato ground should be drilled to wheat and seeded to grass. If the potatoes have been well fertilized and good culture given, no fertilizer will be needed for the grain.

## FRAME FOR WINDOW

HOW HARMONY IN CURTAINS MAY BE SECURED.

Woodwork, Wall Coverings and Furniture Must All Be Uniform if the Best Results Are to Be Arrived At.

Woodwork, wall coverings and type of furniture should all be taken into account when the curtains are planned; and there should also be uniformity in the appearance of the windows from the outside. The best way is to put pane curtains in all the windows facing the street, hanging inside the draperies assigned to decorate the room.

The pane curtains are made of some light material and run on rods which fit into the window casing close against the pane, the linen window shades drawing up and down between these pane curtains and the draperies within. Much filled pane curtains and those looped back or crossed over each other are not as fashionable as straight curtains of conventional pattern, and these curtains may be simply hemmed or bordered with a narrow ball fringe.

Ceainy window hangings are often far more harmonious in brown, yellow, green or rose tints. Women who can stencil cleverly are putting artistic stencilled hangings in library, den and dining-room windows with excellent effect.

When the ceilings are over-high for the size of the room, a more graceful effect may be achieved by the use of valances. Indeed, the valance is the smart thing now in window drapery, and unless the windows are very low, add greatly to the attractiveness of the hangings. The valance is a strip of the curtain material set between the two long curtains and falling ten inches or so across the top of the windows, making the opening between the curtains rectangular rather than V-shaped, as is the case with draped back hangings.

Great care must be taken in making the valance to have the hem perfectly even and the casing at the top the same width as the casing in the longer curtains. A thread should be drawn in both curtains and valance to make sure the measurements are exact. It is these little details of exactness which give the professional touches, and no matter how anxious one is to get the curtains up to see the effect, the work should not be slurred over or the result will surely be amateurish and bad.

### Tomato Stuffed With Corn.

Six tomatoes, one cup of grated corn, one-eighth teaspoonful of salt, speck of pepper, two teaspoonfuls of melted butter.

Select six large, smooth tomatoes. Wash and wipe them. Cut a slice from the stem end and carefully scoop out all of the seeds.

Season the corn with the salt, pepper and butter and place in the tomato cups. Replace the slice cut off. Put them in a buttered baking dish. Cover the bottom of the dish with water or stock and bake in a moderate oven for an hour. Baste frequently.

### Molasses Pudding.

Beat together four ounces of butter and three ounces of sugar till quite creamy. Add one well-beaten egg, three-quarters of a teaspoonful of molasses, and gently fold in half a pound of sifted flour. Add as much slightly warmed milk as will be necessary to form the mixture into a soft consistency, then add one teaspoonful of ground ginger and one heaping teaspoonful of baking powder. Beat all very well together, pour into a greased paper, and steam for three hours. Turn out on a hot platter and serve immediately.

## OUR SANTA FE LETTER.

Special Correspondence.

It is reported in Santa Fe that friends of District Attorney Klock will carry the matter of his removal to Washington, and from the statements made by the friends of the removed official the case may develop some sensations. According to the story the removal was the result of the refusal of the district attorney to suspend or postpone some prosecutions against men in Sandoval county for selling liquor without a license, and as these men happened to be under the protection of the Boss of Sandoval county, which was in Klock's district, the prosecuting attorney lost his job. If the matter is taken up from Washington there may be something doing.

A number of tax payers in Santa Fe county are causing the officials some unpleasant hours because of the discovery of the manipulation of the assessments, evidently to favor those in political favor. It seems that three tax payers living side by side, and possessing land improvements of the same value have compared notes, one with the other, and all three with a prominent politician a short distance from them. One pays \$33; the second one pays \$60; and the third man pays \$5. The properties are practically of the same value, and this difference is irritating to at least two of them. But to make matters worse another neighbor, who is a politician in favor with the gang, has property worth as much as the three properties mentioned, and this politician only pays \$1 in taxes. If the republican proposition for raising the increased revenue for the new state is carried out, that is to raise property to its full value, which they allege is five times the value now returned, the first taxpayer can be called upon to pay \$165; the second \$300; the third \$25, while the politician will only be paying \$5. Under these conditions the taxpayers not in politics, on the right side, are not favoring statehood as strongly as the man who wishes present conditions perpetuated.

The "Indian wars" with the Pueblos in Santa Fe county continue, the latest being that the Indian police have "gathered in" another batch of bad booze from their friends, the white men, and that more "uprisings" are reported. Every time a man loses a bottle he promptly reports an uprising.

According to the October report of the finances of the New Mexico counties there was more tax than a million dollars on hand, and, regardless of the laws made and provided, something more than thirty thousand dollars was held by private individuals and mercantile companies neither officials nor bankers. This is a condition which should be looked into.

There is an unaccountable delay in the printing of the constitution, and it is not known just when it will be given to the public. It is reported that the version given out in the newspapers, and already generally published

over the territory, is "not quite complete." Just what this means is causing some speculation.

In view of the fact that the debates in the constitutional convention developed some startling things concerning legislation in the territory and that the constitution makers considered it necessary to try and prevent forged bills, the changing of bills, and such practices, some people are wondering if the constitution as printed and given to the people will be word for word and letter for letter like the copy which will finally be used as a constitution for the new state, if it is adopted. A small change will sometimes make a big difference.

Republicans at the capital are anxiously looking for the first issue of their democratic publication down in Albuquerque. It will support the constitution.

The report of the action of the Arizona legislature in cutting down the salaries to be paid the state officials has directed attention to the extravagant salaries provided for in the proposed constitution for New Mexico. Nineteen older more populous and richer states than New Mexico can hope to be for many long years, pay less than is proposed in the document for governor.
