REGULAR MEETING OCTOBER 4, 1915.

At a Regular Meeting of the Board of County Commissioners, held on the 4th day of October, A. D. 1915, there were present, Hon. Eugene Kempenich, Chairman, Fermin Marquez and Perfecto Gabaldon, Ruperto Jaramillo, Sheriff, and J. M. Luna, Clerk.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The Board then proceeded in order of business and the following were had.

Mr. Jose Jaramillo, representing Antonio and Lorenzo Jaramillo, appeared before the Board regarding claims for land condemned for road purposes and Mr. Jose Jaramillo accepted the sum of \$150.00 per acre in settlement of the same; and the Clerk of this Board is hereby instructed to issue a warrant at the rate of \$150.00 per acre, to the said Antonio and Lorenzo Jaramillo. The amount of land condemned for road purpose is 41.100 of an acre, at \$150.00 per acre 61.50.

The Clerk was instructed to issue a warrant to Ignacio Aragon for the sum of \$25.00 as recommended by A. E. Morris, Road Foreman. Also to issue a warrant to Ignacio Garcia y Gabaldon for the sum of \$3.00, for digging a ditch.

Hon. Saturnino Baca, Superintendent of Schools, appeared before the Board requesting that a survey of School District No. 2 be ordered. The Chairman of this Board is hereby authorized to employ the County Engineer to do the survey as soon as possible.

A petition was presented by various residents of Los Lunas, offering to give right of way, for a sixty feet road under certain conditions. The Commissioners declared their willingness to meet the desires of the petitioners by all means within their power; and referred the same matter containing the petition to the County Road Board.

A petition was presented to the Board from various residents of Belen for the opening of certain streets, in said town of Belen, which said petition is accompanied by a map which makes a part of said petition. The opening of said street are described as follows, in the petition: Baca Avenue from First street through to Main connecting at Main Street with Didier Avenue. Also necessitating the opening of a portion between First and Second and between Sixth and Main; Also on Third Street a portion lying between Bernardo Avenue and Baca Avenue, thereby connecting Bernardo Avenue with the Townsite proper at a convenient opening.

Said petition has been filed with the Board in conformity with Paragraph 4 Chapter 124 of the laws of 1905.

The said petitioners were required to file a bond for \$300.00 in conformity with Chapter 5 of said laws and the Board agreed to appoint viewers in conformity with paragraph number 7 of said Chapter at the next session after the filing of said Bond.

Also a petition of the Peoples Lumber Company was presented to the Board asking permission for the erection of a set of wagon scales, at Belen. Permission was granted to set said scales under the supervision of the County Board. Said permission is to expire at such a time said street is required to be widened, paved or said scales interfere with the traffic of the community of Belen.

WHEREAS, The Board of County Commissioners have been informed that the residents of Tome, El Cerro, Adelino and Casa Colorado are willing to cooperate with the County in securing of a Right of Way for a good road through said precincts; and

WHEREAS, It is the intention of this Board to assist the above said residents in the construction of a good substantial highway if right of way can be secured reasonably.

BE IT RESOLVED, That a committee consisting of Hon. Jesus C. Sanchez, Miguel E. Baca and Daniel Lucero, are hereby appointed to interview the property owners and report to the Board at their earliest convenience as to the approximate cost of Right of Way from the Los Lunas Bridge to the Belen Bridge and from the Valencia Church to the Belen Bridge.

Mr. Harold P. Dyer appeared before the Board asking a franchise to furnish electric energy, for any purpose to the inhabitants in and about the town of Belen. The Board after due deliberation passed unanimously the following resolution:

Wrong Policy.

Reaction Will Bring Agita-
tors to Senses.

Its discouraging to read some
of the articles, written by people
who know better, concerning the
policy of president Wilson in
dealing with international af-
fairs and to what extent the
"hyphen," only of a different
sort but more pernicious than
the one that America has been
dealing with lately, will go in
order to harm American institu-
tions.

One of the many weeklies that
exchange with the News is very
much agitated because the State
department has seen fit to re-
cognize Carranza when the
Catholics thru-out this county
were against it. It goes on and
condemns Secretary of State
Lansing, because, in answer to
charges made by catholic papers
on account of recognition of Car-
ranza, he said that Eliseo Ar-
redondo had assured him "that
catholics in the Mexican repub-
lic would be accorded all the
liberties that were in accord with
the laws of Reform" and that
this was all that could be asked
of the Carranza government. It
proceeds with quite an attack on
Latin-American Masons and
ends with the following language
"No, there is no other remedy,
American catholics should unite
to a man and register four and
a half million votes against
Woodrow Wilson in 1916."

The News holds no brief for
Carranza nor the Latin-American
Masons and as far as the polit-
ics of this paper are concerned it
will be opposed to Wilson in
1916 but, we would suggest to
the leaders of any party that if
they want to see Woodrow Wil-
son elected they better start an
agitation like the above. We
still maintain that before we are
republicans, democrat or belong
to any religious organization we
are americans.

That the plan, above referred
to, will meet with the disapproval
of catholics we are positive of.
The majority of the catholics of
the country are better Americans
than what some papers would

have us believe and will resent
ulterior motives that inspires
suggestion of getting together
against Wilson, because he saw
fit to arrive at a decision, on a
question, that was up to him.

We doubt if a "hyphen" like
the above is in existence in this
country but if there is it is time
that we apply the eraser.

Albuquerque, N. M., Nov. 3.
With a program that could not
be excelled by any teachers
organization in the United
States, and with every educator
filled with the spirit of enthusiasm
and the determination to make
this year's convention the big-
gest ever held in all its history,
the New Mexico Educational
Association is now preparing to
entertain the teachers of the
state at Albuquerque during the
first three days of Thanksgiving
week.

The best brains of the coun-
try have been secured for this
occasion. Men and women who
have no superiors in their special
lines will address the teachers
and the big crowd of visitors
that will be present at that time.
Among the notables who will
be heard are Prof. M. V. O'Shea,
of the department of education
of the University of Wisconsin,
one of the leading educators of
the United States; Dr. Philip
Van Ness Myers, author of
Myers' text books. Cora Wil-
son Stewart, famous as the orig-
inator of the "moonlight schools"
of the Kentucky mountains, and
Prof. O. A. Benson, of the Uni-
ted States department of agricul-
ture.

Hon. John J. Lentz, for many
years a member of congress
from Ohio and one of the most
distinguished public men in the
country, will also address the
teachers, and not the least of
the attractions at the convention
will be Hon. Felix Martinez,
who during the better part of a
lifetime has interested himself in
the subject of education among
the Spanish-American children
of New Mexico.

The railroads have offered a
rate which will prove a great
inducement to all who have the
educational interests of the state
at heart to come to the conven-
tion. Anticipating a great crowd,
the executive committee of the
association has secured the na-
tional guard armory which will
seat 2,500 people, for the bigger
attractions during the conven-
tion. The sectional meetings will
be held in the spacious high
school auditorium, where the
convention sessions were held
last year.

In four years' time the mem-
bership of the association has
grown from 450 to approxi-
mately 1,700. It is the aim of
those in charge of affairs this
year to swell the membership to
more than 2,000 at this conven-
tion, and present indications are
that this mark will be passed
with a considerable margin to
spare.

OUR PUBLIC FORUM

VIII.—C. E. Schaff On Railway Investments



President Wilson, recently referring to our railroad
problems, said in part: "They are indispensable to
our whole economic life and railway securities are at
the very heart of most investments, large and small, public
and private, by individuals and by institutions. . . .
There is no other interest so central to the business wel-
fare of the country, as this. No doubt, in the light of the
new day, with its new understandings, the problem of the
railroads will also be met and dealt with in a spirit of
candor and justice."

When the first citizen of the land stresses the impor-
tance of understanding and dealing justly with the rail-
roads, certainly the American plowman can venture upon
a careful study of the problem. C. E. Schaff, president of the M. K. & T.
railway company, when asked to outline the relation of the public to rail-
road investments, said in part:

"It may be said that the railroad world is encumbered with a lot of
phantoms which exist only in the popular fancy. For instance, because
there have been a few so-called 'railroad magnates' whose names have figured
prominently in finance, many people have come to believe that the railroads
of the country are largely owned by a few rich men. As a matter of fact
nothing could be farther from the truth. Out of the colossal sum of twenty
billion dollars of American railroad securities, less than five per cent is now,
or ever has been, in the hands of these men who have figured prominently in
the newspaper headlines—while the other 95 per cent is in the hands of over
two million investors, large and small, who in many instances have put the
modest savings of a lifetime into these securities in order that they might
lay away a competency for old age. When, therefore, the value of these
securities is depressed or perchance destroyed, the hardship is a hundred-
fold greater upon thousands of every-day citizens, than upon the handful of
millionaires, good or bad, who have figured prominently in railroad circles.

Hundreds of millions of dollars of the assets of our great life and fire
insurance companies, savings banks, trust companies, educational and fiduciary
institutions are invested in railroad bonds—and the moment, therefore, that
the soundness of these bonds is called into question the financial solidity of
these myriad institutions—directly affecting the welfare of millions of policy-
holders and bank depositors—is gravely menaced. During the last several
years, many millions of dollars representing depreciated values, have been
charged off the books of concerns like those enumerated above. American
railroads have become a vital part of the very woof and fabric of the nation.
Their continued efficiency is absolutely essential to the smallest community
in the land.

In blindly striking at the railroads our blows fall not merely upon thou-
sands who have committed no wrong, but, in the last analysis, upon ourselves.
We should remember how interdependent we have come to be in this mighty
republic of ours—that each is in truth become more and more his brother's
keeper, and that we need to act and think circumspectly, lest in our mistaken
zeal we destroy those who, like ourselves, need whatever of this world's
goods the toll and sweat of years has bequeathed to them."

The Farmers' Record.

The farmers of the country
have now met the nation's mis-
sion for civilization and human-
ity in a way that will lay a farm-
er foundation for lasting prosper-
ity than the ephemeral trade in
munitions of war. They have
risen to the call of a year ago
with a record-breaking produc-
tion of food for the world

The wheat crop of 1915 ex-
ceeds the highest previous re-
cord by 110,000,000 bushels.
The corn crop exceeds any other
year except the remarkable yield
of 1912.

A large part of the increase
comes from southern states,
where heretofore cotton has had
almost the sole attention of the
farmer. The cotton crop, re-
duced in acreage in expectation
of reduced demand, will be short,
but the food increase will more
than make up for this deficiency.

This burst of agricultural pro-
duction will not only fulfill a
higher mission to civilization
than the making of munitions
for the fighting lines, but it will
react more surely upon every
kind of domestic business, from
the railroads that carry it to in-
numerable trades and industries
that are built on large grain
commerce and farmer prosper-
ity.

When the farmer prospers,
the county prospers.—Albuquer-
que Journal.




lencia, State of New Mexico, as
follows:

That all franchises, permits or
licenses to any person or persons,
corporations, public or private,
heretofore granted, permitting
said persons or any of them the
privilege of furnishing electric
energy for any purpose to the
inhabitants in and about the
town of Belen, be, and hereby
are, revoked;

That a franchise be granted for
the term of 25 years to Aarold P.
Dyar, his executors, adminis-
trators, successors or assigns, here-
inafter known as the grantee,
permitting said grantee to fur-
nish the inhabitants in and about
the Town of Belen in said County
of Valencia with electric light
and power, or to furnish said in-
habitants with any other conven-
ience to which electricity may
now or hereafter be put, or to
furnish the County of Valencia
with the electricity for any use
to which it may desire to put it,
within the limitations of this
franchise;

That said grantee be permitted
to charge for his services and
make regulations for operating
his business in accordance with
the laws of the State of New
Mexico regulating public service
companies, except that for any
electricity furnished the county
of Valencia, the charge shall be
not more than 85 per cent of
the charge made to any other
person or corporation for like
service;

That said grantee be permitted
the reasonable use of any or all
highways, byways, roads, streets
and alleys in said County, within
a radius of ten miles from the
present location of the U. S. Post
Office in the Town of Belen, for
erecting poles and stringing wires
thereon, and otherwise erecting
and maintaining electric trans-
mission lines for transmitting
electric energy to prospective
customers of the grantee, and to
make all necessary excavations in
streets, roads and alleys for pipes,
conduits, poles, posts, or other

appliances necessary for the en-
joyment of said franchise; Pro-
vident, however, that the right
and privileges hereby granted
shall not be exercised or enjoyed
so as to occasion public or private
damage or injury;

That poles, posts, wires and
other fixtures shall be no erected,
placed, constructed and managed
as not to interfere with poles,
wires or other structures of any
telephone or telegraph lines now
erected and used along the streets
or alleys, nor with any water-
pipes, sewers or street crossings;

That said grantee shall install
and maintain such fuses, insula-
tion and other appliances on and
along all wires placed or suspend-
ed by him as shall safeguard
against or minimize the danger
to persons and property from
electric current, and shall take
all precautions that are custom-
arily maintained and taken by well
managed electric light and power
companies in such behalf;

That all poles, posts, towers or
structures erected upon such
streets, roads or alleys, shall be
placed and erected as near the
outer edge of the sidewalk of
such streets and alleys as practic-
able, so as to cause the least in-
terference with the passage of
persons and vehicles over and
across the streets, roads and
alleys;

That said grantee shall at all
times during the life of this fran-
chise save the County of Valencia
harmless against any and all dam-
ages which may be caused in the
erection, maintenance or opera-
tion of said electrical plant and
his lines for the transmission of
electric current, and shall at his
and his grantee's and assignee's
own expense defend all actions
that may be brought against the
County of Valencia alleged to
have been caused by such con-
struction, maintenance or opera-
tion; and shall file with the
County Clerk an indemnity bond
for \$2000.00 for the performance
of the same.

That upon the termination of
the rights, privileges and fran-
chises herein granted, said
grantee, shall have the right to
sell, dispose of or remove all
posts, poles, wires and other fix-
tures and appliances placed by
him in any of the streets, roads
or alleys aforesaid, within a
period of three months there-
after, and in event of his failure
to so remove the same, said struc-
tures and equipment upon said
streets, roads and alleys, shall
be forfeited to and become the
property of the County of Valen-
cia, for such disposition as it may
seem fit;

That said grantee shall within
six months from the date of the
granting of this franchise, in
good faith, commence thereec-
tion of his proposed plant and
the construction of the electrical
equipment necessary thereto, and
have the same in practical opera-
tion within one year from the
date of this franchise, and said
grantee agrees by his acceptance
hereof that all rights and priv-
ileges hereby granted shall be
deemed, upon due notice in writ-
ing, in the event of his
failure so to do, from the Board
of County Commissioners of Val-
encia County, to be vacated and
void, as if they had never been
granted, without any further ac-
tion thereon;

That this grant shall not be
deemed operative until accept-
ance thereof in writing accom-
panied by the above mentioned
bond filed with the clerk of the
Board of County Commissioners
of Valencia County by the said
grantee, and this grant shall be
vacated and void, as if it had
never granted unless said accept-
ance and bond are filed within
thirty days from the granting
thereof.

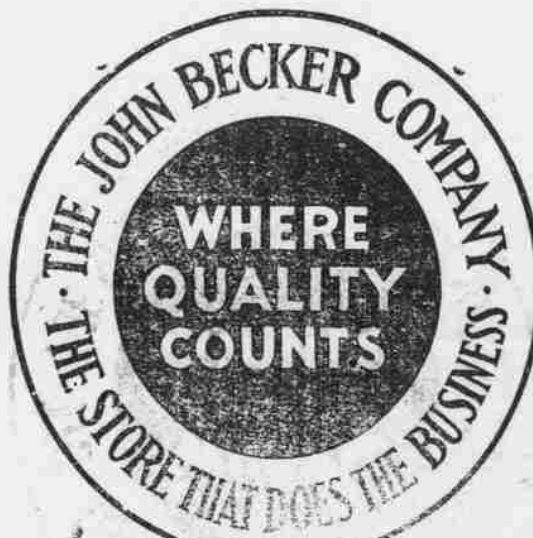
