THE WAR CLOUDS of the world lower darkly and the future appears dim and uncertain in the eastern hemisphere. No one can foretell what the harvest of death may finally bring forth.

In the sunshine of our own State of New Mexico the future is illumined by our present prosperous conditions. In all lines of industry the past year has shown great advancement. In education and the things that make life better and of more worth we have made remarkable progress. Our blessings have been manifold and our disadvantages largely the imaginings of mines ill at ease, distorted by malice or warped by the prejudice of preconceived notions not in accord with the actual facts and conditions:

THEREFORE, I, WILLIAM C. McDONALD, Governor of the State of New Mexico, do hereby designate

THURSDAY, the 25th DAY OF NOVEMBER, 1915, as

THANKSGIVING DAY

May our hearts bow in unison with our heads on the altar of a peaceful, happy state and nation, in praise and thankfulness to an all-wise Providence. May the spirit of good cheer pervade the homes of all and impress those blessed with plenty that it is better to give than to receive, so that the homes of the poor and unfortunate may be made glad by the kind thoughtfulness of their more prosperous brothers and sisters.

Done at the Executive Office this, the 12th Day of November, 1915. Witness my hand and the Great Seal of the State of New Mexico.

## Valencia County Teachers Going In Full Force.

Superintendent S a t u r n i n o Baca Makes Stron Talk to Educators and Big Attendance at Convention Is Assured.

In a talk before Valencia County Teachers' association meeting, which was held in Belen Saturday, Superintendent Saturnino Baca of the county schools urged that school directors in all districts make arrangements to send teachers to the educational convention in Albuquerque next week. While it is not compulsory for directors to do this, Superintendent Baca believes that directors will realize importance of the convention and act accordingly.

The teachers' meeting was one of the most enthusiastic that has been held in Valencia county, there being present about fifty teachers and visitors when President H. G. Baca of the association called it to order. W. M. Fox of the Belen schools made the address of welcome and was responded to by Frank Sanchez. Roll call was answered by forty teachers, each giving a short talk on "What I Am Doing for My School." Adelino Sanchez, of the Adelino school, surprised even his most intimate friends by a very able paper on "Needs of the Rural Schools." Miss Durand, a new teacher who recently arrived from California, spoke on domestic science.

### Music by Belen Teachers.

In the afternoon session music was rendered by the Belen teachers. Professor Fox spoke on the Valencia county high school and urged that all county children be prepared for the county high school. The play ground demonstrations were in the shape of a football game between two selected teams. A volley ball game by the seventh and eighth grade pupils of Belen and a basket ball game by the county teachers and the Valencia county high school.

The program was closed by a reception to the visiting teachers by the domestic science department at the Belen schools.

The day as a whole was enjoyed very much by every one present but what really encouraged the most was the speech by Superintendent Baca on the progress of the Valencia county schools during the last four years. Four years ago Valencia county had thirty teachers, now it has sixty, and there won't be a single district in all the county that will have less than nine months of school.

Even the fellow who habitually sends out of town for his own goods wants his full quota of the riches that are accumulated through the thrift and husbandry of his fellow citizens. Producing and selling the surplus abroad and then keeping our money at home by buying from home dealers will and many thousands of dollars to the money in circulation in this community. It is the sure way of meeting prosperity with open arms and gathering in our share and a little more for good luck. Let other communities support themselves. Our interests and our duty are at home. Let's keep prosperity in this town.

You young fellows who have your eyes focused upon the bright lights and the gaieties of the big cities should get out your stub pencils and do a little sum in addition. If you go the way of others and drift to the city you will naturally annex a "best girl." She will want you to take her to the theatre once a week, and that will cost \$4.00 for the tickets, \$5.00 or so for the taxi and \$3.00 or \$4.00 for the supper after the performance. Then frequently she will want an automobile ride on Sunday

Of course, it's great sport while it lasts, but the first thing you know you'll be yelling your head off for the old man to send you car fare home and the price of a full stomach before you start. Yep, city life is great in more ways than one.

We presume there is not a business or professional man in this town who is not an ardent advocate of home trading. So are we. And in this connection we want to suggest that it might be in keeping with such doctrines for certain of our worthy business men to remember that this paper has an up to date job printing plant and is prepared to do all kinds of printing. To say the least, it is rather disconcerting for us to urge the people to buy their goods at home and then run across a piece of printing for some local business house that has been ordered from out of town. The citizen who makes a practice of buying this goods from outside sources is injuring the business interests of this town. ## VALENCIA COUNTY'S PRINCIPAL INDUSTRY.

Agriculture is Valencia County's principal industry. The prosperity and well fare of the community depends entirely on the amount of crops that are raised and the marketing of the same. Hence it is the duty of certain parties to see that Valencia county gets a farm agent, so that farmers may profit by his knowledge and demonstrations; So that the farmer can get all that he possibly can from the tilling of the soil.

Here is a condition. The majority of the Farmers in this valley are that so called Spanish-Americans and they have never derived one bit of benefit from the efforts of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, all due to the fact that every pamphlet, every one of the farmer's bulletins that are issued are written in English, hence the only ones that get any benefits from them are the Anglo-American farmers. Being this a condition that the county commissioners cant deny, and believing that the people of Valencia county are entitled to a little something from the county commissioners, county commissioners, in justice to those people, should make all the efforts possible and get a county farm agent. One who knows his business, so that he can teach our farmers the most approved methods of farming, that would applicable to our conditions and climate. One who would give demonstrations of the way to go at it so that instead of raising 30 bushels of grain from one acre it would be possible to get 40 or 50 bushels.

The remedy is in the hands of the County commissioners. All they have to do is to be a little enterprising, to take a small size interest in the real affairs of the county. They can do it if they want to, and we believe

in conformity with the regulations applicable to spending county money, for if they can appropriate money for the San Diego Fair and our State fair (all money well spent) they can very well afford to spend some to develop our own resources.

## MUSIC FOR TEACHERS CONVENTION.

Best Talent in Southwest to  
Provide Musical Program  
For State Educators.

Albuquerque, N. M.—The two thousand New Mexico school teachers who will gather here Thanksgiving week for the annual convention of the New Mexico Educational association will hear a musical program, extending through the six general sessions of the convention which will be the most notable assemblage of musical talent in the history of the state, if not of the whole southwest. The program has been arranged by E. Stanley Seder, the brilliant young head of the department of music of the University of New Mexico who rapid advancement as an artist has attracted general attention and whose compositions for voice, organ and piano are beginning to receive notice in musical circles all over the country. Mr. Seder has for his material his glee club, band and orchestra from the University, the Albuquerque high school orchestra and clubs and orchestras from the Las Vegas and Silver City normal schools, the Santa Fe high school and one or two other of the large schools of the state. To this he has added the best talent in the state, including Mrs. Mabel Stevens Himoe and Mrs. Ralph M. Henderson, A. L. Tello and Bruno Dickmann of this city, Miss Elizabeth Garrett of Las Cruces, and other artists who he is holding as a surprise. It is a program which will measure up to the high standard established by the managers of the convention program, and it will give the first illustration of Mr. Seder's ability as a conductor of large musical effort.

Mr. Seder, who is little more than a boy in years, has had a remarkable rise as a musician. Three years ago he was known as a talented organist in local churches. After a year's study with a local teacher he went to New York City where in less than a year he secured entrance into the most prominent musical circles winning his way through his ability as an organist and by his musical writing.

train our young men at home and keep them in the state. This was the assertion of W. C. The New Mexico University he declared, was as good as any in the country, and the state needed men trained in our atmosphere, under our conditions and with our resources. "Fifty per cent of the boys and girls you permit to go out of this state to other schools," he said, "never come back and are at dead and terrific loss to your development and prosperity."

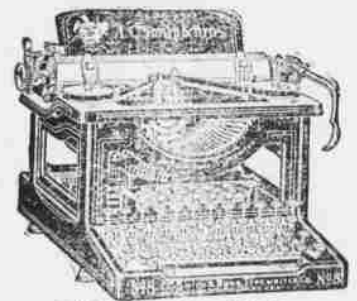

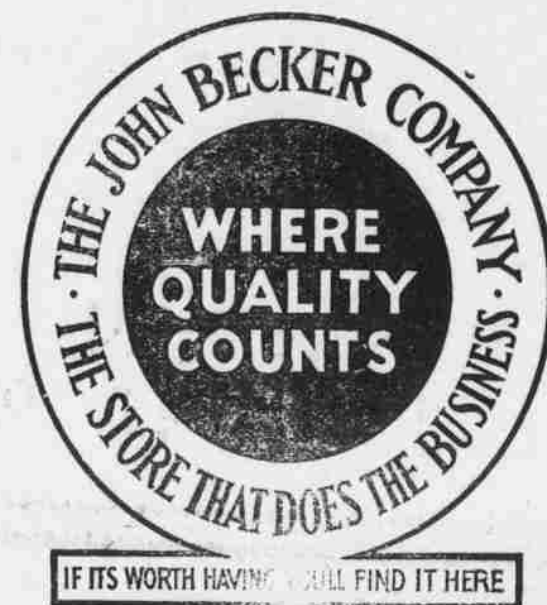
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
