Death of Judge Mann.

Judge Edward A. Mann of Albuquerque was killed in an automobile accident near Gallup last Friday evening. It seems that the driver of the machine lost control of the car as he approached a turn of the road, and the machine and occupants went over. Judge Mann was pinned under the weight of the machine and had his neck broken. It is thought that he died instantly. Thos. N. Wilkerson, City Attorney of Albuquerque and the other two occupants of the car, were painfully but not seriously injured.

Judge Mann was buried in Albuquerque last Monday afternoon.

JUDGE MANN'S CAREER

Judge Mann was a native of Beatrice, Nebraska, and was 48 years of age. He was the son of the Rev. Henry P. and Maria (Minard) Mann. He received his early education in the public schools of Nebraska and later attended Belleplain College, Tex., from 1886 to 1887. Hethen studied law with L. H. Thompson, of Norton, Kansas, and was admitted to practice in the Kansas courts in 1891. He practiced law in Kansas, Colorado and Nebraska from 1891 to 1903. He was prosecuting attorney for Scotts Bluff county, Nebraska, from 1900 to 1902.

It was in 1903 that Judge Mann decided to come to New Mexico, and he moved to Las Cruces. There he entered the firm composed of Bonham, Holt and Mann. The following year, on the creation of the sixth judicial district, he was appointed associate justice of the New Mexico supreme court. He was appointed in 1904 and confirmed. He was again appointed in 1908. Judge Mann, since he retired from the bench, practiced law in Albuquerque and had taken a lively interest in politics.

He was a 32d degree Scottish Rite Mason, a Knight Templar, a Mystic Shriner, a Knight of Pythias and also an Elk.

Bazaar Given by Ladies Aid of Luthern Church a Success.

The Bazaar given by the Ladies Aid of the Luthern Church, last week, was a success from all standpoints. The ladies fed about one hundred and fifty people, at the supper, who heartily enjoyed the meal.

Altogether \$240.00 were realized by the Ladies Aid efforts. The officers of the Ladies Aid are: Mrs. L. C. Becker, President; Mrs. C. N. Wilson, Vice-President, and Mrs. P. P. Dalies, Treasurer.

Man Has Foot Mashed.

Joe Windsor, a young man about 29 years old, was brought to Belen on No. 22 from Dalies with a mashed foot. Windsor and four others, as he puts it, "one a gambler," left Belen last Wednesday on a freight train for Gallup. At Dalies they were put off by the train crew and they waited there until another freight, from Albuquerque, showed up. He got on between two cars and while he was waiting for train to start, the engine suddenly backed up and Windsor in some way had his foot caught between the bumpers. His pals notified the train crew right away and the engine pulled ahead allowing the injured man to get his foot out.

It was found that his foot had been painfully mashed and the roadmaster at that point gave him "first aid to injured" and sent him to Belen, on No. 22, where Dr. Radcliffe tended to him. His foot was dressed but the doctor does not believe that he will be able to work for a couple of months. Railroad boys at this point collected \$70 for the young man who was entirely out of funds and on his way to Gallup to work in the mines. John Windsor, his stepfather, and only relative lives at Mackinaw City, Pa.

Chaves County Has Splendid Schools.

Clovis, N. M., Nov. 20.—Rev. C. C. Hill, superintendent of schools of Chaves county, made splendid showing for his schools in the report he submitted in person to the department of education, having gone to Santa Fe to attend the meeting of the state board of education of which he is a member and from here going to the educational convention at Albuquerque.

Chavez county now has an estimated population of 19,563, the school census being 5803. The county has 128 teachers, of whom only three are third graders, 31 are second grade, 47 first grade, 3 professional and one life. Of the 43 teachers at Roswell, every one has received training in a professional normal school. Many schools now have nine months term and not one less than seven months. Fifty-three schools have one teacher; seven have two teachers, four have four teachers. Salaries range from \$50 to \$155 per month.

Supt. Hill is enthusiastic about the county unit law. At first opposed to it, he now finds it to be especially beneficent in his county.

STATE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION FOR HIGHS ORGANIZED.

Purpose of Organization is to Govern Interscholastic Contest in All Departments of Sports.

A conference to regulate athletic relations between high schools, known as the New Mexico High School Athletic association, was organized here yesterday. The officers are:

President—J. W. Giltner, principal of the Albuquerque high school.

Vice President—E. D. Ringler, East Las Vegas.

Secretary-Treasurer—O. Stanley, Dresher, principal of the Carlsbad high school.

Board of Control—Andrew McCurdy, Carrizozo, J. H. Dowden, Raton, and W. D. Shadwick, Tucumcari.

The association plans a scholarship standard for high school students competing in athletic contests. The suggested provision of the constitution, which met with some opposition, relative to high schools meeting other than high schools was amended. High schools may compete with other schools than those of their class, but such contests are to have no bearing upon state high school championships. Another suggested provision which also met with opposition, was modified. This provision referred to students older than 21 years taking part in football games. Players, who have reached that age, may play providing both contesting schools consent.

The association will look after inter-high school contests in football, baseball, soccer, tennis, basketball and on track and field.

A practical means for determining with fairness to all schools the state basket ball championship was considered. The plan is to divide the state into several sections. Schools in these sections will play among themselves and the winner in every section will be eligible to entry in the state basket ball tournament to be held here during the state high school track and field meet. The boundaries of the sections will be determined largely by the nearness of the schools to one another and railway transportation facilities. Four sections were suggested, the northern, central, southwestern and southeastern. Albuquerque high school, obviously, will belong to the central territory.

The University of New Mexico, which heretofore has managed the annual interscholastic track and field meet, will co-operate with the association to the extent

Russian Black Hundred Demands Isolation for Jews After War Closes.

Saratow, Russia, Nov. 20.—At the conference held here by the organization known as "The Black Hundred" a number of resolutions were passed. Among the most important were these two:

"To appoint a dictator with unlimited power, whose business it would be to maintain the Russian monarchical system intact after the war and to keep Russia free from mob law.

"To isolate the Jewish from the native population in a number of specially selected towns. This has been proposed as the Jews are regarded as a 'dangerous element.'"

MAN HAS NARROW NSCAPE FROM BAD WOUND.

Jose Espinosa Shot by Negro Resort-keeper When He Interferes to Prevent Carving Process.

About 11:30 Thursday night Frank Rogers, a colored citizen, who is said to have run a house of questionable reputation east of the Santa Fe tracks, took five shots at Jose Espinosa, a recent arrival from Oxnard, California. The last shot took effect on the back of the left shoulder, coming out in front. If the shot had been a couple of inches lower, Espinosa would not have told the story. As it is, he is now nursing his painful, but not dangerous wound in his room at the Krahmer hotel, where Dr. Radcliffe is giving him all the attention possible.

It appears that Rogers and a young man named Santiago Baca had a disagreement some few days past and that Rogers was in a fair way of carving up Baca with a razor when Espinosa interfered in behalf of Baca and from all accounts he handled Rogers rather roughly. Last Thursday night while Espinosa was making his way home Rogers suddenly appeared on the scene and immediately proceeded to empty his revolver on Espinosa with the above results. Espinosa was taken to his room but Rogers faded away in the dark, though Deputy Sheriff Fidel Delgado and a Santa Fe special officer did everything possible to land him.

Feeding Industry.

An industry that promises to be a winner is receiving some attention from Dr. William D. Radcliffe, of this city. The doctor has started feeding about sixty head of hogs at his ranch. He has kept them in his alfalfa patches for some time but now he is feeding them kaffir corn so as to prepare them for the market. Kaffir corn, outside of being cheaper, makes better pork than if hogs were fed on other grains.

The doctor has also finished planting his crop of winter wheat and is very enthusiastic about farming in this part of the state. Some time past, when he was able to give it his entire attention, he threshed fifty-four bushels of wheat and seventy bushels of feterita from an acre of land in one season. If that is not profitable farming, Valencia county would like to know what is.

Tax Commission Permits Socorro to Raise Levy.

Santa Fe, N. M., Nov. 20.—Upon the plea of H. O. Bursum, the state tax commission granted Socorro county the right to levy 9.17 mills instead of 7.765 mills so that \$19,000 may be available for the Mogollon road. Mr. Bursum made his plea from Socorro over the long distance telephone.

McKinley county was refused authority to exceed the five per cent increase by \$1391.07. In Lincoln county a proposed 2 1-2 mill levy in school district No. 14 was cut to 2 1-4 mills and a 10 mill levy on district No. 33 to 8 mills.

Five Billions in Foreign

Trade in Last 12 Months.

Washington, Nov. 22.—New high records in the foreign trade of the United States continue to pile up the greatest favorable trade balance the country has ever known, according to figures made public today by the department of commerce.

During the twelve months ending with October, the foreign trade exceeded \$5,000,000,000 imports were \$1,699,748,013 and exports \$3,318,634,636 as compared with imports of \$1,880,414,501 and exports of \$2,140,847,829 during the same twelve months previous.

Exports of October established a new high record, rising to \$334,668,578, which was \$33,961,756 more than the former record made in September. October imports were \$148,529,620.

Washington, D. C. Nov. 24.
The Democratic administration
is approaching a very awkward
situation.

There are on the docket of
the United States Supreme
Court the so-called five per cent
rebate cases. They involve a
tremendous sum in customs re-
venues, loosely estimated at
between fifteen and twenty mil-
lion dollars, collected under the
provisions of the Underwood
tariff law. On the court's de-
cision hangs the fate of these
millions.

It the Supreme Court upholds
the five per cent rebate provision
in the Underwood law, than the
sum in dispute belongs to the
foreign importers and must be
paid back by the government.
The treasury deficit long ago
became alarming. If this enor-
mous additional sum has to be
paid but, it will still further em-
phasize the failure of the De-
mocratic fiscal policy.

On the other hand, if the
Supreme Court decides that the
five per cent provision of the
Underwood law is invalid, the
highest court in the land will
have convicted the Democratic
Congress of a humiliating blun-
der and still further emphasize
its record of legislative ineffi-
ciency.

The fact that the attorney
general, in order to save the re-
venue involved, is attacking the
validity of the law Congress
worked six months to pass,
makes the situation still more
complicated.

From a political standpoint,
the best thing that could happen
to the Democratic party in this
case would be to have a deci-
sion go over until after election.

Whether or not this happens
largely upon the time the case
is heard. It is up to the govern-
ment to take the first step to
advance the date of hearing.
Litigants on the other side of
the case have complained bit-
terly over what they terms un-
reasonable delay, and for weeks
have been urging the govern-
ment to move more quickly.

Meanwhile, regardless of when
the hearing may be held, De-
mocratic leaders are wondering
what can be done to offset the

attack that will be made on
their fiscal policy on the one
hand, and their legislative effi-
ciency on the other.

Of Interest to New Mexicans.

THE new book written by
Colonel R. E Twitchell by the
name of "The Confederate In-
vasion of New Mexico" should
interest any student of the state's
history. It deals with the con-
ditions in New Mexico during
the civil war and of the great
Confederate campaign which,
had it been successfully carried
out, would have effected vitally
the final outcome of the great
strife. Histories of our civil war
mention very little about the
conditions in the southwest and
it will be news to quite a few
residents of the state to know
that one of the most important
campaigns of the entire four
years' struggle took place right
here in the Sunshine state. Col.
Twitchell's comments on the
state militia will no doubt arouse
some adverse note in the state.
The story will appear in serial
form beginning in the January
number of Old Santa Fe and
afterward in book form.

SOME of the periodicals of
the state are taking Supreme
Court justice Hanna's Wash-
ington interview very seriously.
They should realize that the
only thing about the Judge that
should have attention is the
position he holds, besides may
be he feels that there won't be
any more political accidents and
he should be allowed to have
all the fun possible at the ex-
pense of the people who were
partly responsible for his elec-
tion.

SOME people were sore be-
cause friend Alvin White want-
ed to be President of the N. M.
E. A. saying that "he wants to
be gove.nor." Suppose he does?
This is United States of Amer-
ica and Alvin White and any
other man can aspire to any
thing they want, and if it is
going to be a democrat, A. N.
White suits us.

NEW MEXICO should be
thankful that W. H. Andrews
has a good chance of landing
nomination for United States
Senator, which practically means
election.

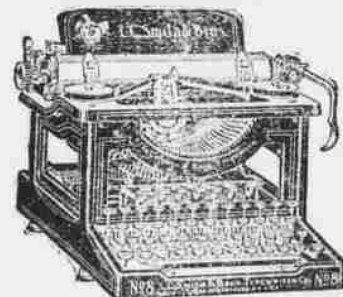
