### FILIBUSTERED

New Mexico Compelled to Wait Until the Special Session for Recognition.

OWEN, OF OKLAHOMA, TO BLAME

Amid the wildest scenes ever enacted in recent years on the floor of the senate, New Mexico's immediate hope for statehood was strangled by the filibustering tactics of Senator Owen, of Oklahoma. All through Friday night the New Mexico matter formed the real basis for the obstructive tactics of Mr. Owen. He held the tariff board proposition in the balance so long, that it finally lost out when it reached the house. The great government appropriation bills also hung in the balance until Mr. Owen had secured a rider to the house joint resolution admitting New Mexico by which Arizona was included. In view of the fact that Arizona had not complied with the provisions of the enabling act in an official way, the senate was compelled to submit to the dictation of the senator from Oklahoma, and he held the floor until just before the expiration of the session, compelling President Taft to give him a promise that there would be an extra session of congress. When assurance had been received there was barely time remaining to complete the appropriation bills and they were hurried through. Mr. Owen succeeded, however, in obtaining a vote upon the proposition to prove the actions of both territories and suffered defeat by 45 to 39.

Delegate Andrews led the fight all the way through, and would have won out had it not been for the attitude of the belligerent Owen, who afterwards explained that he had not previously confided his intentions to any one and his filibuster was of his own conception, and made independent of any of his colleagues. Mr. Andrews pointed out after the battle was over that beyond the fact that there has ensued a delay, that the position of New Mexico is in no way affected, the enabling act being very clear in this regard. The extra session will be here in less than a month and with the obstacle of a time-limit removed congress will take up the matter and give Arizona and New Mexico their rights, independent of what may be the fate of the Arizona mix-up. The vote in the senate would, however, show that Arizona is in a bad way, but this will have no bearings on New Mexico's chances for early success. It is said that the approval of the senate is in no way required, and many senators were of the opinion on the day of adjournment that the action of the president will make further congressional action unnecessary.

Undoubtedly the principal reason for coupling the two territories in the filibustering tactics of Senator Owen was not one of principle so much as politics. New Mexico is admittedly republican, while the general impression in Washington is that Arizona is Democratic, and the close margin existing between the two parties in the Senate very likely instigated the attempt to force Arizona in, so that the two republican senators from New Mexico would be offset by two democratic members from Arizona. But however this may be there is no question but what New Mexico is almost a state as this leaves the national capital, and whether the finishing touches will be put on the matter by the president or by congress is a matter only of time.

## School Notes.

1. A plan has been formed recently to hold a Public School Field Meet at some date near the latter part of the term somewhat on the same plan as the one held last fall. There will be running contests and jumping and games of base ball and basket ball. In the evening there will be debates and reading contests. Early next week the students will begin practice.

2. The plan of having recess at the grade building is meeting with universal approval. Since this custom was adopted there has been a noticeable improvement in the deportment and grades of the pupils affected by it.

3. The Senior class have already begun their commencement plans. They have decided to give a class play—something of a classical nature. This class land the High school pupils generally seem to be determined to make the last three months of the term count for something. Records in class deportment and recitation are good.

4. The commercial department has been reorganized on a different basis. Each pupil is allowed one period each week for typewriting practice. Book-keeping work is done in the rooms under the supervision of the teacher and not in the commercial room as formerly.

5. A writing period has been introduced in the High school for all grades. Every student in that department will be compelled to practice fifteen minutes per day.

6. The Fourth Year chemistry class has been discontinued, the superintendent believing that work in that subject is without value in the absence of laboratory material.

7. Weekly teachers' meetings are held at the office of the superintendent every Friday afternoon. At these meetings matters of general interest to the school are discussed. The teachers express themselves as being well pleased with the arrangement since it affords them an opportunity to discuss matters of common interest and methods of co-operation.

8. In the near future basket making and mat weaving will be introduced in the grades. More manual training work is necessary for the course.

9. For the remainder of the term special emphasis will be placed on the study of English in all grades. Experience shows that pupils are usually weak in this study.

10. Visitors are welcome to all departments of the school. We are always ready to receive suggestions from our patrons and the superintendent's office is open to our patrons and citizens.

### MASSING TROOPS

20,000 on Mexican Border, but for What Purpose no one Seems to Know

Washington, March 7.—A n army of approximately 20,000 men, representing all branches of the service is mobilizing along the Mexican border of the United States.

It is officially stated and the administration made special efforts to substantiate the statement, that the sole purpose was maneuvers on a grand scale for training officers and men. Nevertheless there are persistent rumors that the government is preparing for more serious eventualities.

Confidential reports from Mexico lately encouraged the belief that the conditions of the Mexican government are far from being as satisfactory as the official assertions would indicate.

The military force will establish headquarters at San Antonio under command of Major General Wm. H. Carter, assistant chief of staff, assisted by several brigadier generals, who will command the brigades into which the grand division will be divided.

These brigades will be placed at strategic points throughout the Department of Texas, including not only the Mexican border, to which particular attention will be given, but also Galveston and the other sea ports. The orders contemplate the

El Paso, Texas, March 7.—American intervention is on every lip today as the result of the United States government ordering additional troops toward the Mexican border.

El Paso, Texas, March 7.—Mail advices from Parral say that on Sunday the insurgents surrounded the American mining camp of El Rayo, Chihuahua, and were about to attack when the manager, James Colbath, sent a messenger explaining that Americans owned the entire property. The insurgents then retired. They were well armed and mounted.

Naco, Arizona, March 7.—According to William Rynarson, son of former Territorial Senator Rynarson, of New Mexico, who arrived here yesterday from the vicinity of the El Tigre mine, many Americans and prominent Mexican families are fleeing from the country because of insurgents activity.

## Territorial Notes.

**Roy Bank Closes.**—Word has been received at Santa Fe from Roy, Mora county, that the Roy Trust and Savings bank failed to open its doors on last Friday. It is reported that the bank will be taken over either by the Federal bank of Tucuman or the First National bank of that city. Traveling Auditor Charles V. Safford is at Roy to straighten out the affair. E. J. N. Roy, assistant cashier, in charge of the bank, declares the bank is solvent.

**Killed in Mining Shaft.**—Filomeno Sepulveda, employed at the Eighty-Five mine near Lordsburg, Grant County, was found dead at the bottom of the stope in which he had been working. He fell from a platform ten feet high. His skull was crushed and his neck broken. Sepulveda was 23 years of age and leaves a wife and a child. The coroner's jury brought in a verdict of accidental death.

**White Slave Traffic in Territory.**—Two immigration officers of El Paso, who have been in the city several days quietly conducting an investigation, left in charge of Bessie Bandiet, otherwise known as Birdie Abbot, a French woman, who it is alleged, was imported for immoral purposes. There was another woman whom officers wanted deported, but she had disappeared. The Abbot woman will be deported to her native country. Silver City Enterprise.

**Famous in France.** That the cliff dwellings attract attention even in France is indicated by the fact that W. D. Shea, district passenger agent of the D. & R. G., to day received a request from Sarcelles, France, for a copy of the D. & R. G. publication on the Pajarito park ruins, 20 miles west of Santa Fe.

**Found Dead in a Cave.** Bernard Back, a shepherd, was found dead in a cave in the Mal Pais, seven miles northwest of Carrizozo, Lincoln county. No food was found in the man's hut and it is believed he died of starvation. In his wallet was found \$2.27 in cash and a partido contract for the herding of 100 sheep.

**Answer Fire Alarm Quickly.** The school children at Santa Fe, New Mexico, at 7 minutes before ten o'clock this morning, the fire alarm was sounded on the gong. All the pupils marched out of the building to music played on the piano, and back again to their work in less than four minutes, not a word having been heard spoken by the pupils.

**Death of a Physician Dr.** Charles Howe Bradley, for the past fifteen years a resident of Las Vegas, died there of pneumonia.

**New Long Distance Phone.** A force of the Colorado Telephone Company this morning began stretching a new No. 8 copper circuit from Santa Fe to Las Vegas.

## Sixteen Thousand Votes in Arizona.

Phoenix, Arizona, Feb. 27.—By an affirmative vote of 79.12 per cent of the total, the proposed constitution of Arizona was ratified at the recent election. The official canvass was completed today. This shows that out of the total of 16,009 votes cast 12,187 were in favor of the constitution with 3,822 against. The total vote was small, however, as 17,676 votes were cast at the previous general election.

### What About Statehood?

In the failure of statehood at the hands of the Sixty-first Congress the people of New Mexico have just cause for grievance. They have been promised statehood for many years, and this time it did seem that the promise was about to be fulfilled. Hence the disappointment of Saturday was all the more bitter.

It is to be noted that the republican newspapers of the territory are jumping into the breach and accusing the democratic party of being responsible for the defeat of statehood. How about it?

The Sixty-first congress, which adjourned on Saturday, was republican in both branches, with a republican president in the White House. The House, which did approve of the constitution, doing all it could to realize statehood, was composed of 219 republicans and 172 democrats. The vote in that body was unanimous for the adoption of the constitution and for statehood. The senate, that body which defeated statehood and the body which has so often stood between the people and things desired, was composed of 58 republicans and 34 democrats. Thus the republicans had the president, a majority of 47 in the house and a majority of 25 in the senate. This condition has not existed for the two years of the past session alone, but has been the state of affairs for years.

And with all this the republicans have the nerve to accuse the democrats of killing statehood.

The truth of the matter is that the republicans have simply failed to keep the statehood pledge in the platform of 1908, just as they have failed to keep many other promises.

In the same platform which promised immediate statehood for New Mexico was the same promise for Arizona, yet the republican majority in the senate, aided by three untrue democrats, voted down statehood for Arizona, thereby killing statehood for New Mexico as well.

But what will be the outcome? Will we be compelled to wait until after the next presidential election?

The record believes not. We believe that New Mexico and Arizona will be given statehood this summer. We base our belief on the fact that an extra session of congress will convene on April 4th, and above all that this new congress will have a democratic majority in the house and a progressive majority in the senate.

It is feared by some that the extra session cannot act on statehood because of the enabling act, which speaks of the "next regular session" in referring to the approval of the constitution by congress. As to the power of congress at the extra session to admit New Mexico and Arizona we believe there can be no doubt. The congress just ended could take no action which would be binding on the new congress to refuse to admit new states. We believe that is an elementary principle of law.

So that although statehood has been delayed by the refusal of the republican majority to carry out the platform pledge of their party, yet statehood has been deferred but a short time.

It has been claimed by some that it is possible for the president to at once admit New Mexico by proclamation, it being asserted that the enabling act can be interpreted to that effect. This claim is borne out to a certain extent by the following language used in a dispatch from Washington received by the Record:

"It was asserted this afternoon that the action of the senate this morning does not mean that New Mexico cannot be admitted by ac-

tion of the president."

From this sentence it is evident that the belief held by some in Roswell that the president has power to act is also held in Washington.

Of course in a case like present one the hope of the people of New Mexico must be based upon what the president will think, and how he will construe the enabling act in this respect.

Mr. Taft has given more evidence during the last month or two of possessing a backbone than during all the rest of his term. It may be that he has awakened and will assert himself to the extent of giving statehood to New Mexico.—Roswell Record.

The board of commissioners met Monday to consider property valuations in Eddy county and were assisted by Assessor Price and many interested citizens, the object being to learn as much about property conditions as possible, so that an equal and just assessment of all classes of property could be made, and that none be overlooked or given in too low or too high. After listening to reports from all over the county it was the opinion of the board that on account of the drouth and the fact that so much stock of all kinds was shipped and driven out of the county that the assessed valuations on cattle, sheep goats and horses would be seriously curtailed and that farm lands around Artesia, and town property in Artesia, would not bear as high a valuation as last year on account of the drouth affecting some of the wells west of the railway and south of town. On this account the farm lands around Artesia will have a minimum valuation of \$10 per acre and the maximum one fourth actual value, where irrigated. Those farms that are not irrigated will be valued at \$4.00 per acre. Farms under the Carlsbad project will be assessed at \$10 per acre, minimum, and up to as high as twenty-five per cent actual value. Dry farms will be assessed at about \$1.50 per acre on all land that is cultivated. Cattle will be assessed at \$9.00 per head on one third the number. Sheep, goats and horses will be assessed the same as last year or on about the same basis as cattle. Lands with private water rights will be assessed at \$17.50 per acre.

## Death of Dave Blocker.

DIED—David Eli Blocker at 730, Saturday, March 4 1911, at his home in Carlsbad of lung trouble, aged forty-eight years. The above has been expected for some time by the many friends of Dave, he having been a sufferer from lung trouble since coming here in 1898. He was born March 21 1863, in Summit county, Ohio, near Akron, on a farm that was the family home for many years having been the home of his father and grandfather. He was married in 1885 to Sophia Kunkler and besides his wife he leaves three children, his mother and brother Sam. The funeral occurred at 4 P. M. Sunday and was attended by a very large number.

Rev. T. L. Lallance held the services at the house. Though not a church member Dave had many good principles and died at peace with all men and leaves many friends among the people of Carlsbad who sincerely regret his demise.

## J. N. Heard Dead

Jasper Newton Heard, of Pecos, was accidentally killed about two miles east of Pecos last Friday forenoon some time. The first news of the accident was brought to Pecos by a Mexican Saturday forenoon, who said he had found a dead horse with a man under him east of the Pecos river. A physician and nurse were immediately sent by auto and it was found that the man and horse were both dead from having their necks broken by the horse stumbling on a root that projected from the ground and that the man was J. N. Heard. Mr. Heard had been in the habit of mounting his horse and riding out to his pasture east of town and at times he would not return for a day or two going for the purpose of looking after his cattle and if any were out he would ride for miles and stop wherever night overtook him. It seemed from all appearances that Mr. Heard was trying to head some cattle, for the pasture gate was open and in his hand, cold in death, was gripped a rope coiled up as if used in swinging to drive the cattle. The carcass of the horse and body of Mr. Heard had apparently lain about twenty-four hours when discovered. The funeral occurred at Pecos Monday, his brother Allen, of this place, going down in his auto, Saturday, as soon as he received the wire notifying him of the sudden death of Jasper for there is no Sunday train to Pecos. He sent the auto back by the driver and returned on the Tuesday train. The deceased was sixty-six years old and was born in Alabama coming to southern Texas with his parents when about ten years old. He lived at Pecos fourteen years near which place he owned a ranch. Besides his wife his surviving family members are, Mrs. Watt Reynolds, Jack, Jay, Jesse and T. C. Had he survived until next September he would have been sixty-six years old but his age sat lightly for he was one of the most fearless riders in the country and had not only been raised on horseback but was on a horse nearly every day.

"After getting out of the Kansas-Pacific, Colonel Reiff was associated with Gen. William J. Palmer, the colonel of his regiment in the civil war, in building the Denver & Rio Grande. The construction of this road was fought not only in Wall Street but in the field, and there were pitched battles fought between the construction forces of Reiff and Palmer and those of the Union Pacific party.

Feeding Oil to Cows. The Experiment Station Record. United States department of agriculture, says on the subject of feeding oil to cows: J. Mackintosh and W. Good win found that the addition of peanut and coconut oils to the rations of milking cows produced no appreciable difference in yield of milk or percentage of fat. From two to four ounces of peanut oil per day per head improved the flavor of winter butter, but larger quantities made the cream difficult to churn and the butter was soft in texture. Coconut oil also made cream difficult to churn, but had a hardening effect on the butter, which was of good flavor, texture and appearance.

## Col. Josiah C. Reiff Dead.

"Col. Josiah C. Reiff, one time partner of Charles Woerishoffer, and one of the last surviving witnesses of finance of the days of transcontinental railway construction, died on Tuesday at the home of Mrs. J. Hood Wright, at Fort Washington Avenue and 194th street. Colonel Reiff was 73 last October and a bachelor. Of late years he had made it a practice to visit at the Wright home over Sunday. He was a close friend of the late J. Hood Wright, an executor of his estate and president of the J. Hood Wright hospital for twelve or thirteen years. He was stricken with pneumonia after dinner Saturday night.

"Although Colonel Reiff was best known as a railroad financier and market general, he will be longest remembered as the man who 'grub staked' Thomas A. Edison. He supplied funds for the inventor's early researches into electricity which brought forth the automatic telegraph and duplex and quadruple telegraphy. He did not follow Mr. Edison into his work on the electric light nor his late experiment in wider fields, but up to the time of his death, maintained his interest in some of the Edison telegraphy patents.

"As a silent partner of Weirishoffer in the banking firm which was then one of the greatest in the street, he had an active part in some of the famous bear's market battles. He fought Jay Gould with him and was at one time treasurer of the Kansas-Pacific railroad, which he pushed through into Denver. It was of this road that Jay Gould told on the witness stand that when he was induced to purchase it he found on an inspection trip the sidings crowded with loaded cars and the stations piled high with freight. After paying over the money Gould explained ruefully on the stand, he learned that the congestion had been carefully stage set for his benefit and had been accumulated for weeks in advance of his inspection.

"Colonel Reiff received his military title for gallantry in the field. Of late years Colonel Reiff was less active in the street and devoted himself to several copper properties in which he was interested and in which he represented a party of foreign investors. He was president of the American Copper Mining Co. and of the Alpha Copper company and a director in the British Columbia Copper company."

The above is taken from the New York Times, of March 2, and refers to the late Colonel J. C. Reiff, who was one of the two surviving brothers of William C. Reiff, our fellow-townsmen, who has been long and favorably known here.

Mr. Reiff's brother was largely instrumental in having H. H. Harges bring his wife here from Paris, France, Mr. Harges hoping that this mild climate would tend to arrest, if not entirely cure Mrs. Harges of a well advanced pulmonary trouble. Mr. Harges was also encouraged to try this climate on the advice of Colonel Otis whom he met in Paris.

Owing to the present illness of Mr. Reiff he was not able to attend the funeral services but the family here was represented there through the oldest brother, D. T. Reiff, of Kokomo, Indiana. It is comforting to the family here to know through a letter received from a relative who was

present that the deceased had the best of care during his brief illness, in Mrs. J. Hood Wright's home and that the display of flowers was simply beyond description. Outside of his own relatives the mourners were first class people and financial kings in New York City.

Mr. Reiff this week received papers to sign for the appointment of administrators of his deceased brother's estate as it is believed that he died without a will. It is known that he had holdings in mining and industrial stocks. Thomas A. Edison Colonel Reiff and a few others associated with them have been in litigation with the Western Union Telegraph company for over 25 years on account of that company using Edison's patents in rapid telegraphy, known as the automatic duplex and quadruplex instruments, without right or compensation.

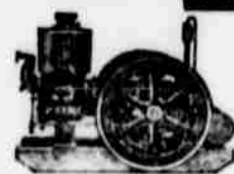

## County Commissioners.

(CONTINUED)

It having been shown to the board that errors were made in the following assessments for the year 1910, it was moved and carried that the district attorney be requested to prepare an order to present to the district court ordering the corrections made as set out in the following:

M. W. Witham, assessed against the South Half of Sec. 12 and the Southeast Quarter of Sec. 11, all in Township 17 South Range 26 East; should be assessed without improvements.

W. T. Watkins was erroneously assessed with personal property to the amount of \$1,770, which should have been \$245.

Edward N. Requa was assessed with Lots 2 and 7 in Sec. 2, T. 16 South, Range 25 East, N. M. P. M., for the year 1910. Said property was also assessed to Edward Griffith, the rightful owner of said property. The assessment of said property against Edward N. Requa should be cancelled.

The assessment of C. N. Myers was erroneously assessed with cash \$1,000, which should be \$250.

John Bruce assessed with the Southwest Quarter of the South-

west Quarter of Section 23, T. 17 South, Range 26 East, N. M. P. M. for the years 1907, 1908 and 1909, when said property during those years belonged to the United States government, and all taxes for the years above mentioned should be cancelled.

W. E. Tucker, being the head of a family should be allowed the \$200 exemption on his 1910 taxes. F. L. Hill erroneously assessed value of improvements of \$750 should be reduced to \$20.

Sarah E. Brown, owner of the Southeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Sec. 6, T. 23 S. R. 28 East, said land was erroneously assessed as watered land at \$10 per acre, when it should be assessed as dry land at \$1.25 per acre.

On motion, made and duly carried, R. G. Brown was appointed janitor for the ensuing year for same rate as the previous year, \$45 per month.

George E. Foster was appointed road supervisor of District No. 3 and the commissioner from that district was instructed to enter into a contract with said George E. Foster that he be employed at the rate of \$3 per day for all time rendered by him and when he uses his team for road work he is to receive \$4 per day, he is to be under the supervision of the commissioner from

road district No. 3. Said George E. Foster to furnish a good and sufficient bond for the faithful performance of his duty and an account for all moneys received by him in said office.
