Sand Road Work

Territorial Engineer Miller who, in company with H. C. Kerr and Mayor McLenathen, visited the sand road and inspected the work expressed himself as well pleased with the stability of the road and instructed Mr. Lewis to go ahead and draw on the Good Roads Commission for expense until further orders. When Mr. Miller came in he received a wire from Gov. Mills to allow the work to proceed until a meeting of the commission could be held to decide whether the Commission could spare the funds to finish the road.

Mr. McLenathen received a letter from engineer Miller last night containing a draft for \$1,200 for use in the work of the sand road. The Engineer stated that he was glad to be able to send this which makes \$3,200 given by the territory. He also stated that on account of the lack of funds the commission could not advance any more this year. The territory has done its best as has also the town of Carlsbad, the donations from citizens being nearly \$1,500.00 while Eddy county has also done well having appropriated \$2,000. It will require about \$1,500 to finish the road and there is no way to get it except from poll taxes and as the Plains have over 300 who are poll tax payers it is proposed to place this work on the sand for there is about half the road in each road district. If this is done at once the road will be completed so there will be no trouble in reaching a railway from the Plains country.

Big Fire at Knowles

Saturday night the store and contents of Robison & Wright at Knowles was entirely destroyed by fire, the whole stock of about \$4,000 worth of goods being entirely consumed. The loss was covered by \$3,000 insurance. Knowles has been extremely unfortunate of late, this being its second big fire since Dec. 1, 1910.

Three suits brought by the town of Carlsbad, before Justice Cunningham, against John Hewitt, Fred Rohmer and J. A. Pond with a view to compel connections with the town sewers. The Pond case was dismissed on account of some irregularity in service and the cases against the other two were dropped against the town by the Justice. FEET OF GROWING COLTS NEED CARE.

The feet of the growing colt should be properly cared for. If left to nature the feet will not always grow out full, strong and perfect in form. Writes M. W. The frog and heels shift back from under and from below. When a split occurs from above it is difficult to cure without firing or blistering, hence it is important to protect the walls. The sole need not be cut to open the heels. Keep the walls rounded at the point surface, the frog and the frog attachment.

Horses become unsound of limb when the wear and tear is not equally distributed, as certain parts bear an undue amount of weight. Ordinance No. 104

AN ORDINANCE, PROHIBITING THE CARRYING AND DISCHARGING OF ARMS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF CARLSBAD.

Be it enacted by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carlsbad:

SEC. 1. That hereafter, it shall be unlawful for any person to carry or discharge any arms within the corporate limits of the Town of Carlsbad.

SEC. 2. That hereafter, it shall be unlawful for the parents of any child, under the age of twenty-one years, to knowingly permit such child to carry or discharge any arms within the corporate limits of the town of Carlsbad.

SEC. 3. Any person guilty of violating Sections 1 and 2 of this ordinance shall be punished by fine not less than \$5.00 or more than \$25.00.

SEC. 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage and publication according to law.

Regularly introduced, passed, favorably by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carlsbad, New Mexico, and first publication ordered this twenty-first day of February, A. D. 1911.

Ordinance No. 103

AN ORDINANCE, REGULATING PERSONS FOLLOWING CERTAIN OCCUPATIONS, TO PAY A TAX THEREON, AND FOR ENFORCING THE SAME BY PROPER PENALTIES.

Be it enacted by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carlsbad:

SEC. 1. There shall be levied and collected for the year of 1911 and each year thereafter from each person, firm, company, corporation or association of persons pursuing any of the following occupations in the town of Carlsbad, New Mexico, a tax of the following rates:

SEC. 2. For the year of 1911 and each year thereafter, the tax shall be levied and collected on or before July 1, 1911. Thereafter the same shall become due and payable semi-annually on or before the first day of January and July of each year.

SEC. 3. The occupations and the amount of the annual tax on which such occupation tax shall be levied and collected are as follows:

Backs with capital stock of \$20,000 to \$50,000 \$40.00

Bank with capital stock of \$40,000 to \$100,000 40.00

Wholesale and retail dry goods and grocery store, doing a jobbing business 50.00

Retail dry goods and grocery store 20.00

Retail grocery store 20.00

Retail merchants other than herein classified 20.00

Wholesale and retail hardware store 20.00

Retail hardware store 20.00

Jewelry store 20.00

Drug store 20.00

Lumber yard 20.00

Warehouse, handling wool, fuel, feed, hides, etc. 20.00

Warehouse doing only commission business 10.00

Livery stable, and feed yard, each 15.00

Meat market 10.00
