## BAD KILLING AT KENNA

Two Brothers Named Zumwalt Kill two Brothers Named Hall—Dispute Over old Sores Causes

## THE ZUMWALTS SURRENDER

Monday's Roswell Record

Kenna, March 27.—Wm. and Alex Zumwalt, who yesterday morning shot and killed Thomas and Edward Hall five miles northwest of Kenna, came in this morning after the arrival of the morning train from Roswell and voluntarily surrendered themselves into the custody of Sheriff C. L. Ballard. Soon after the arrival of the train, Justice Marcellus W. Witt empaneled a jury and at noon in the old store building, a coroner's inquest was started over the bodies of the deceased.

The only eye witness had left the country, going to Fort Sumner to notify the wives of the dead men of the tragedy. The Zumwalt brothers were placed on the stand and neither denies participation in the killing of the Hall brothers.

Will Zumwalt the first on the stand, was asked by District Attorney Fullen, "Did you kill both?"

"I helped to kill both" was the answer.

When Alex Zumwalt was placed on the stand he was asked by the district attorney, "What part did you have in the killing of the Hall brothers?"

"I helped to kill both" was the answer.

The shooting occurred just 300 yards this side of the Roosevelt county line.

The verdict of the coroner's jury was as follows:

"The deceased came to their deaths by gunshot wounds from six shooters, inflicted by Will and Alex Zumwalt."

The Zumwalts testified without a tremor although they were within one foot of the dead bodies.

Sheriff Ballard will take the two prisoners to Roswell tonight and place them in the county jail. Their preliminary hearing will be held at Roswell Thursday morning before Justice Witt.

### THE LOCAL REPORT

William Zumwalt and his brother A. Zumwalt shot and killed Thomas and Edward Hall, brothers, Sunday morning, five miles northwest of Kenna in this (Chaves) county. Trouble had been brewing for several days and all four were armed with six-shooters. All were stockmen. The Zumwalts came into Kenna and surrendered and Sheriff C. L. Ballard was notified and left this morning with Justice of the peace M. W. Witt Prosecuting Attorney L. O. Fullen to hold the inquest and preliminary hearing today. R. T. McClung went up also as Associated Press correspondent.

The dead Hall brothers fell in a herd of 500 cattle that was under the supervision of William Zumwalt and was the property of Dee R. Harkey, of Carlsbad. Thomas Hall was riddled with bullets being shot five times in the legs and through the body. His brother Edward received one fatal shot, in the side waist, through and through.

It is said the only witness was a nester boy. W. A. Bryant, the liveryman brought the bodies into Kenna and placed them in Frick's store.

Reports say that Will Zumwalt had an automatic forty-one and his brother a .45. Thomas Hall a .38 and one empty chamber in Edward Hall's revolver, but no exploded shell, showing

that the dead man had not fired any shots. The plea of the Zumwalt brothers will be self-defence.

### ANOTHER REPORT OF THE SHOOTING

Parties coming from Kenna last evening give diversified reports of the shooting. Will McCombs and Dock Sears, both well known citizens at Kenna, report the news as told in Kenna practically as related above.

The first report that came to Roswell of the shooting yesterday was that the killing was done by Wm. Zumwalt and his brother was not mentioned. No land Keller a young man from Kenna who came down last night, insists that the first report is correct and that only Wm. Zumwalt had any part in the killing. He says that the two Hall brothers and Wm. Zumwalt were mounted and that they dunned over cattle and that the shooting occurred before breakfast yesterday morning the three men met out on the plains. But in conflict with Keller's report is another report that there were eight instead of five bullets in Tom Hall's body, which would show that more than one sixshooter was used against the Hall brothers.

Wm. Zumwalt is between 35 and 40 years, old. He has a wife and four or five children. The Hall brothers have a surviving brother at Kenna. All the parties in the case are known to many Roswell people, as they make frequent trips here.

D. R. Harkey and C. R. Brice came in Wednesday and on being interviewed Mr. Harkey stated that he was about a quarter of a mile from the parties when the shooting occurred but did not see it. He met the Hall boys in the road and supposed they were going to Kenna but they turned and went to the herd where the Zumwalts were with the cattle. The young man, Sheldon Haney, who was the only eye witness, stated that the Halls came up and fired two shots before the Zumwalts pulled their guns. The Zumwalts were armed with Automatics and the Halls with single action Colts, a 38 and 45. It seems that Ed Hall had pulled a gun on Alex Zumwalt Thursday of last week; they parted in bad blood, and the next time they met was at the herd in Zumwalts pasture, Sunday morning. The shooting occurred about 300 yards south of the Roosevelt county line in Chaves county.

### Bujac & Brice are to be Zumwalts' Attorneys.

C. R. Brice of Carlsbad, passed through last night enroute home from a trip to St. Louis. While on the train a short distance north of Roswell he was notified by Miss Irma Brockleman, stenographer, that his firm Bujac & Brice, of Carlsbad had been employed to defend the Zumwalt brothers for killing the Hall brothers at Kenna Sunday. It was all news to Mr. Brice and to his surprise he was then introduced to his clients by R. T. McClung the press correspondent—Roswell Record.

### Notice to Tax Payers.

## TOWN BOARD MEETINGS

The Board Will Endavor to Enforce the Sewer Regulations—Charges for Water for Trees to be Collected.

Minutes of regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carlsbad, N. M. held in the Commercial Club Rooms March 6, 1911.

Present: C. H. McLenathen, mayor; R. M. Thorne, W. S. Jolley, G. M. Cooke and C. R. Brice, trustees; J. B. Harvey, recorder; Carl Gordon, marshal; J. E. Laverty, treasurer; and W. E. Smith, sewer inspector.

Minutes of meeting held February 6, 19th and 21st were read and approved.

Treasurer's report was read and approved.

The sewer inspector's report was read and approved.

The following resolution was offered by Trustee C. R. Brice who moved its adoption, viz.: "Resolved that the mayor be instructed to notify all persons who have not paid the annual sanitary sewer rental charges that the sewer inspector will disconnect them from the sewer on the expiration of five days from service of such notice unless said rental charges are paid". The motion was duly seconded by trustee G. M. Cooke and by vote of the board the same was passed by unanimous vote.

The following Resolution was offered by Trustee G. M. Cooke who moved its adoption, viz.: "Resolved, that all persons who have not made proper connections with the sanitary sewer be served with final notice and that

The Mayor stated the call of this meeting to be for the purpose further considering proposed ordinances nos. 103 and 104 which had been regularly introduced at a former meeting.

Ordinance No. 103, entitled "AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING CERTAIN PERSONS FOLLOWING CERTAIN OCCUPATIONS TO PAY A TAX THEREON AND FOR ENFORCING THE SAME BY PROPER PENALTIES", which was regularly introduced at a meeting of this Board on February 21, 1911 and published for the first time in the Carlsbad Weekly Current, a Weekly newspaper published in the Town of Carlsbad and of general circulation, was brought up, placed upon its second reading and offered for amendment. Amendments as shown by ordinance as amended were offered by Trustee R. M. Thorne and passed by unanimous vote of the Board.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the rules were suspended and Ordinance No. 103 was placed upon its third reading as amended and offered for final passage.

A motion was offered by Trustee G. M. Cooke and seconded by Trustee R. M. Thorne

ordinances Nos. 103 and 104 were ordered published in the Carlsbad Current for two more consecutive issues and to take effect from and after five days of their last publication according to law.

It only required twenty minutes to burn and kill 142 girls in a shirt waist establishment last Saturday afternoon in one of the death traps of the City of New York. It would require three hours to vacate the building with the single fire escape while twenty minutes was sufficient to burn every body in the building to a crisp. This should be notice to the town of Carlsbad to get busy with the court house and Odd Fellows hall.

Edward A. Mann was ousted last Saturday from the district attorneyship of the Sixth Judicial district. Mann was appointed Nov. 18, last year to the office by Governor Mills who removed George S. Klock with no cause assigned for his removal but Klock was intent on prosecuting some friend of the governor, and this made his excellency hot under the collar. Mann was declared by the supreme court a usurper and not entitled to the office because the courts have decided that cause must be shown to remove an appointed official.

The killing at Kenna last Sunday was one of those unfortunate affairs caused by the ancient custom of settling disputes with guns, a practice that should be stopped if it were necessary to imprison any who carry arms while at work on the range, even when used in so called self defense.

The insurgents in Mexico are fighting, though the entire cabinet of President Diaz has resigned and Madero, the insurrecto president, says there will be no let up until Diaz steps out and an election held that will give every one a right to vote.

The maintenance and operation charges of the water users under the Carlsbad Project are paid in full, the last amounts being received by Secretary Etter last night and were sent to the local land office this morning. This places the project in better condition than ever before at this season. The building charges will not be necessary to meet until December 1, when it is hoped the crops will be harvested from another good year, and the proceeds will pay the three dollars and ten cents per acre, due at that time.

A fine looking Mexican girl was captured by the federals at the battle of Casas Grandes, the other day, while plugging away at the Duquies with a revolver, like any of her masculine counterparts. If the women have really taken up arms against him, Don may as well "Hear ye the Fiddle and the Bow," for it is all that we of the U. S. can do to hold our own with them in piping times of peace, untroubled.

Governor Mills has designated Friday, March 31, as "Arbor Day" and enunciates a shining truth when he says that "When a tree is cut down at least two should be planted to replace it." The Pecos Valley needs a million trees. The Carlsbad schools are planting trees today and will further celebrate the day by a half holiday.

Uncle Sam has ordered recruiting officers to take in all material which presents itself. If loose straws are any criterion then surely there will be something doing in military circles, notwithstanding continued advice from Washington to the contrary.

Carlsbad is taking on the airs of a city. They have put in a

post line at the depot and now keep the hotel shouters back of it. An innovation for which the traveling public is duly thankful, too, we're thinking.

M. J. Beck, who has been with the Joyce-Fruit people at Portales several months passed through the city Friday evening, en route to Carlsbad to connect with the Joyce-Fruit people at Carlsbad. Register-Tribune.

#### Ordinance No. 103

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE PERSONS FOLLOWING CERTAIN OCCUPATIONS TO PAY A TAX THEREON, AND FOR THE ENFORCING THE SAME BY CIVIL PENALTY.

Be it enacted by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carlsbad:

Section 1. There shall be levied and collected for the year of 1911 and for each year thereafter from every person, firm, company, corporation or partnership, or person or persons engaged in the following occupations, named in this ordinance, an annual occupational tax, in every such occupation or separate establishment, as provided by this ordinance:

Section 2. For the year of 1911, one-half of said tax shall be due and payable on or before April 1, 1911, and the remaining one-half on July 1, 1911. Thereafter the entire tax shall become due and payable on or before January 1, and shall be paid in cash.

Section 3. The occupations and the amount of the annual tax, for which said occupational tax shall be levied and collected are as follows:

Section 4. It shall be the duty of all persons, firms or corporations, subject to the occupational tax, provided by this ordinance, to make application to the Town Recorder for an occupational license and to pay him said tax, and to receive from him such occupational license, prior to the pursuing of any such occupation within said Town of Carlsbad, provided, however, that persons combining allied lines of business in one concern shall be taxed for the highest one of said lines only.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons or corporation to conduct, pursue or carry on within the corporate limits of the Town of Carlsbad any occupation or business named in this ordinance, without first having paid the tax provided therefor by this ordinance and obtaining an occupational license as provided by Sec. 4 hereof.

Section 6. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine of not less than \$25.00 or more than \$50.00, and each day such occupation is pursued and violation thereof shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 7. Ordinance No. 89 of the Town of Carlsbad is hereby repealed.

Section 8. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage and publication according to law.

Ordinance No. 104

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE CARRYING AND DISCHARGING OF ARMS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF CARLSBAD.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carlsbad:

Section 1. That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person to carry or discharge an arm on the streets within the corporate limits of the Town of

Carlsbad.

Section 2. That hereafter it shall be unlawful for the parents of any child, under the age of twenty-one years, to knowingly permit such child to carry or discharge any arm within the corporate limits of the town of Carlsbad.

Section 3. Any person guilty of violating Sections 1 and 2 of this ordinance shall be punished by fine not less than \$5.00 or more than \$25.00.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage and publication according to law.
