Official Paper of Eddy County.

Some merchants have, for years, sent out of town for printing that can be and is done better in Carlsbad. Many a dollar goes to St. Louis and Dallas that should be left at home. Of course this is the business of the business men who send away for printing but, does it pay? The printing houses of Carlsbad could afford to do out of town work much cheaper because it brings business that helps to fill in the crevices. For instance: Envelops usually cost \$2.00 for 500 printed, but envelopes can be furnished out of town customers for \$1.50 for 500 because the work helps to keep a force busy and helps to pull down other places and build up Carlsbad.

The same may be said of all lines of printing for if work can be secured by Kansas City, Dallas, or St. Louis outfits at ten to twenty-five per cent less than is charged in Kansas City, Dallas or St. Louis to local houses, it helps to pull down Carlsbad and other small places and build up those towns. The same may be said of the whole mail order business for that is the principle it exists on. One Kansas City house offers a bill of groceries for \$11.45 that our local dealers quote at from \$17.00 to \$21.00, still our local dealers ask that the mail order house be condemned and at the same time on account of saving five or ten per cent send away for printing. It is time the newspapers and dealers would get together. All are existing but all could live better if a better understanding was had. It has been a long time since the grocery dealers have advertised to any amount in Carlsbad and it would not be strange if the papers would accept advertising from Kansas City in this line. The freight is only \$1.21 per 100 and the Kansas City people want to pull down Carlsbad and all other towns, hence can even afford to advertise here. There are only a few items that home merchants can sell to compete with out of town houses and if the people become as well educated to sending out of town as many merchants are in sending out for printing, then even those articles will be shipped in. This is in reference to heavy articles such as flour, feed, potatoes etc. People can and do club together at times and when merchants commence to send away for printing they can expect nothing else but death to their own business.

As a proof of the fact that it pays to advertise, we have these examples, occurrences of the past ten days, to offer: Mrs. E. T. Carter phoned to notify the public, by a few lines, that her pet rabbit was lost and a suitable reward was offered for its return. Within a few minutes after receiving the first phone, this office was called up by the lady to state that she had only hung up the receiver when in walked a Mexican with her rabbit. Another case was that of W. W. Slocumb, who came in and wrote an ad to say that he had a couple of good young mares to sell cheap. He had only been gone a few minutes when he returned to say he had sold the mares. So if you want to sell anything or to find lost articles just phone the Current, No. 49, and often it will not require a cent expense, but the very fact that you are seen or heard of around a newspaper office will do the job.

The sewer connection problem is a live one these days with many citizens of Carlsbad. That it costs to make connections is undisputed, but the past year or over, since many have made connections, proves the value of sewers. Three years ago the town of Carlsbad

had ten cases of typhoid to one during the past year, even with less than one half the houses connected with the sewer. If people believe it more economical to live without sewer connections and pay big doctor bills, to say nothing of the loss of children and other members of their families by typhoid, they should fight the town board in the courts and spend money on lawyers and doctors, for the professional men re all, without exception, nice fellows and deserve all the business the property holders of Carlsbad can give them. However the policy of penny wise and pound foolish, or wasting at a mighty small spigot never did appeal to the Current as good business. Regarding this matter the New Mexican has the following:

"Whenever a case of typhoid fever is reported, whenever a person dies of that disease, it is an indictment against a whole community. Typhoid fever is as preventable as small pox and it should be made a capital crime to empty sewerage into a running stream. Every incorporated community that neglects to put in a sewer system and to enforce sanitation, should have one-fifth of all its income held out by the state until a sufficient fund has accumulated to enable the state to build a sewer system for the town and to enforce sanitation. It is only in uncivilized countries now-a-days, where the emptying of sewerage into running streams is permitted. Even in Panama, in Porto Rico and the Philippines, wherever Uncle Sam took hold, or in Korea where the Japanese are masters, the first steps taken by those in authority was to stop the pollution of streams and to construct sewer systems.

Joe Clements arm Torn off in Gasoline Engine.

Joe H. Clements, the well known sheep man of Hope lost his right arm and had a narrow escape from death by shock and bleeding Monday when he got his coat sleeve caught in the cog wheels of his gasoline engine at his ranch north of Hope. He was taken to Roswell and had the crushed arm amputated three inches below the elbow late Monday afternoon. Although his condition is serious, his physicians believe he will survive.

The accident happened at seven o'clock Monday morning. Mr. Clements was oiling his engine and pump, to draw water for his sheep, when his sleeve went between the wheels and his arm drawn in. With all his strength he jerked loose, but only after the bones and flesh from the wrist to three inches below the elbow were ground to a pulp. He fell unconscious to the ground and was found there between two great pools of blood when his wife came out to see what was the matter. Only a week before he got his sleeve torn off in the same way and his wife went out to see if he was having more trouble from this cause.

As soon as possible Mrs. Clements got her husband into the buggy and started to town. The news was telephoned in from Sunset ranch, but Mrs. Clements drove on toward Roswell, accompanied by a neighbor who rode on horseback.

When eighteen miles out from Roswell they met a rescue party, composed of James Sutherland and Mrs. I. W. Kinsinger, C. M. Mayes and C. F. Montgomery. The rescuers were in an auto and the auto brought Mr. and Mrs. Clements to town. The amputation occurred soon after the arrival of the party at the Clements home on North Virginia avenue.

Mr. Clements is between sixty and sixty-five years of age. He has resided here about 25 years and is widely known over the Pecos Valley. He has been in the sheep business many years and has about 7,000 sheep. Tuesday's Roswell Record. Mr. Clements is quite well known in this country, being one of the old timers at Hope and his many friends will be sorry to hear of his misfortune.

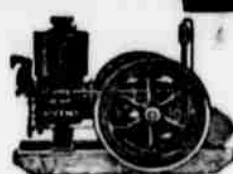

J. P. McMillan Dead.

John Patrick McMillan, one of the first carpenters to come here when the town was new, died at the hospital at one o'clock Wednesday morning, April 19.

Deceased came here in February 1890, having spent nearly eight years previous in El Paso where he worked for the S. P. Ry for four years. He came to El Paso from Roxbury, Massachusetts, where he was born of Irish parents, February 22, 1863. Of his life previous to coming to El Paso he never could be induced to talk so there is very little known of his early history. Ed Wilson who first met him in El Paso in 1882 and came here a month before he came, says deceased was always very reticent concerning his antecedents and if questioned closely would get angry.

"Mac," by which name he was known, was taken ill about years ago, and has not enjoyed any health since. He was for several years employed on the H slash ranch thirty miles southwest on Black river, where he seemed to recover to some extent. He owned a house and lot in town opposite the Missouri hotel where he roomed while in town. After he died the Odd Fellows put Dick Wicker in charge of his effects. An old New York Life policy that had lapsed was found and it was from this the age and birthplace of deceased was copied by this paper. The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon under the auspices of the Odd Fellows' not as a lodge, for Mac had lapsed in his dues some time ago and even refused to allow his friends to keep him in good standing.

Reverend Reece, of the Baptist church, conducted the services at the grave and a quartette sang "Nearer, My God, to Thee." The funeral was attended by a large number of the early settlers of Carlsbad.

The services at Grace Episcopal church Easter Sunday were something extra the music being by the regular choir. Miss Walz sang "The Lord is Risen," by Arthur Sullivan and the choir rendered a festival Te Deum, by Dudley Buck. The sermon was on the Resurrection. The communion was celebrated during the service.

Ordinance No. 106

An Ordinance Providing for Sprinkling of Streets and Assessing the Cost thereof Against Abutting Property Owners.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF CARLSBAD, NEW MEXICO:

Sec. 1. It is hereby determined by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carlsbad that the hereinafter mentioned and described streets and avenues, and parts of streets and avenues of the Town of Carlsbad shall be watered in whole at the expense of the owners of property abutting such streets and avenues or parts thereof.

Sec. 2. The streets or parts of streets hereby determined to be watered are as follows, to-wit:

Eastern Avenue between Fourth Street and Eighth Street; Central Avenue between Third Street and Thirteenth Street; Western Avenue between Fourth Street and Thirteenth Street; Church Street between Fourth Street and Eleventh Street; Park Avenue between Fifth Street and Eighth Street; Fourth Street between Church Street and Right-of-Way of Eastern Railway Company of New Mexico; Fifth Street between Park Avenue and Right-of-Way of Eastern Railway Company of New Mexico; Sixth Street between Park Avenue and Right-of-Way of Eastern Railway Company of New Mexico; Seventh Street between Park Avenue and Eastern Avenue; Eighth Street between Park Avenue and Eastern Avenue; Ninth Street between Church Street and Central Avenue; Tenth Street between Church Street and Central Avenue; Eleventh Street between Church Street and Central Avenue; Twelfth Street between Western Avenue and Central Avenue; Thirteenth Street between Western Avenue and Central Avenue.

Sec. 3. That the expense of watering such streets and avenues or parts of such streets and avenues to be borne by the owners is hereby estimated and determined by the Board of Trustees to be twelve (12) cents per annum per each lineal foot of frontage of such abutting property on all streets running north and south as follows, to-wit: Eastern Avenue, Central Avenue, Western Avenue, Church Street and Park Avenue; and three (3) cents per annum per each lineal foot of frontage of such abutting property on the following streets running east and west, to-wit: Fourth Street, Fifth Street, Sixth Street, Seventh Street, Eighth Street, Ninth Street, Tenth Street, Eleventh Street, Twelfth Street and Thirteenth Street.

Sec. 4. That there is hereby assessed the sum of twelve (12) cents per annum against each and every lineal foot of frontage of each lot or parts of lots or parcel of land abutting on the following named streets and avenues or parts of streets and avenues, to-wit: Eastern Avenue between Fourth Street and Eighth Street; Central Avenue between Third Street and Thirteenth Street; Western Avenue between Fourth Street and Thirteenth Street; Church Street between Fourth Street and Eleventh Street; Park Avenue between Fifth Street and Eighth Street; Fourth Street between Church Street and Right-of-Way of Eastern Railway Company of New Mexico; Fifth Street between Park Avenue and Right-of-Way of Eastern Railway Company of New Mexico; Sixth Street between Park Avenue and Right-of-Way of Eastern Railway Company of New Mexico; Seventh Street between Park Avenue and Eastern Avenue; Eighth Street between Park Avenue and Eastern Avenue; Ninth Street between Church Street and Central Avenue; Tenth Street between Church Street and Central Avenue; Eleventh Street between Church Street and Central Avenue; Twelfth Street between Western Avenue and Central Avenue; Thirteenth Street between Western Avenue and Central Avenue.

Sec. 5. That it is hereby made the duty of each and every property owner against whom such assessments are made and levied to pay to the Treasurer of the Town of Carlsbad on or before the first day of May, August, November and February of each year one fourth of the annual assessment levied against the abutting property herein described according to the provisions of this ordinance, and the entire amount so due and payable before the second day of May in each and every year hereafter, and it shall be the duty of the Town Treasurer of the Town of Carlsbad to collect and receive such payments and give proper receipts therefor and to keep a record thereof, and shall make a monthly report of said collections to the Board of Town Trustees.

Sec. 6. The amounts hereby assessed against the hereinafter mentioned and described lots and parcels of property and real estate and the same shall hereby constitute a lien upon the said lots and parcels of land, and if such assessment be not paid on or before thirty days after April 30 of the year in which such sprinkling of such streets is done it shall be the duty of the Town Recorder of the town to make out, sign and attest with the seal of said Town of Carlsbad and file for record in the office of the probate clerk and ex-officio recorder of the County of

Eddy a claim of lien therefor and all subsequent purchasers, mortgagees or encumbrancers of such lot or parcel of land shall take the same subject to such lien.

Sec. 7. Such liens shall bear interest at the rate of eight per cent. per annum from the date of filing thereof until paid, and after such recording may be sold and assigned to any person for the face value thereof, with interest, and may be foreclosed at any time after such recording in the same manner as now provided for the foreclosing of mortgages on real estate.

Sec. 8. Expenses of recording such lien and reasonable attorney's fees shall be allowed in decree of foreclosure of such liens.

Sec. 9. The word "streets" shall mean and include streets and avenues.

The watering of streets as herein provided shall commence on the first day of May, 1911, and the final payments of such assessments herein made for each year thereafter shall be on or before the second day of May in each year.

Sec. 10. All funds derived under the provisions of this ordinance shall be created into a special fund to be known as the "Sprinkling Fund" and the proceeds of such "Sprinkling Fund" shall be used for no other purpose than to pay expenses incident to sprinkling and repairing of the streets of the Town of Carlsbad within the sprinkling district hereby created.

Sec. 11. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication as required by law.

Ordinance No. 105

An Ordinance Prohibiting the Sale or Disposal of Intoxicating Liquors within the Corporate Limits of the Town of Carlsbad.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF CARLSBAD:

Manufacture, Sale etc. of Liquor Prohibited.

Sec. 1. On and after the 15th day of June, 1911, the manufacture, sale, barter, giving away or otherwise furnishing except as herein provided of any malt, vinous, spirituous, mixed or fermented liquors within the corporate limits of the Town of Carlsbad is hereby prohibited. And on and after said date the soliciting or taking orders for, or advertising the sale of intoxicating liquors within the Town of Carlsbad is hereby prohibited.

Sec. 2. On and after the 15th day of June, 1911, the purchase, acceptance as a gift or in trade of any intoxicating liquor except as herein provided, within the corporate limits of the Town of Carlsbad is hereby prohibited.

Transported Liquors must be Labeled and Registered.

Sec. 3. From and after the 15th day of June, 1911, it shall be unlawful for any person, or his bailee or agent engaged in the business of a common carrier, to knowingly ship, transport or convey, for hire or otherwise, any package or of package containing any spirituous, vinous, malted, fermented or other intoxicating liquor of any kind, from any point within the corporate limits of said Town of Carlsbad to another point within the said Town of Carlsbad, or to knowingly make delivery, in any manner whatsoever, of any such intoxicating liquor to any person, unless such package be so labeled on the outside cover thereof so as to plainly show the name of the consignee, the nature of the contents, and the quantity contained therein, and such person transporting, conveying or delivering intoxicating liquor as aforesaid shall keep a record of such transportation, showing the name of the consignee, the nature and quantity of liquor, and the date of delivery thereof, which record shall be permanently preserved in a book kept for that purpose only, and shall be open to the inspection of any citizen of Carlsbad at all business hours.

Sec. 4. From and after the 15th day of June, 1911, it shall be unlawful for any person to keep at any place of business, office, club room or hall, excepting as hereinafter provided, within the corporate limits of the Town of Carlsbad any intoxicating liquor of any kind with intent to sell, give or barter the same in violation of this ordinance, and possession of any such intoxicating liquor at such place within the corporate limits of the Town of Carlsbad by any person and the presence of such liquor upon such premises of any person shall be prima facie evidence of intent to unlawfully use of such liquor by such person in violation of this ordinance.

Sec. 5. Upon the filing of a complaint or information by any person or persons, that intoxicating liquors are kept upon the premises described in such complaint, by a person named in the complaint, with intent to violate the provisions of this ordinance, a warrant shall be issued by the Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction commanding the Town Marshal of the Town of Carlsbad to arrest the person or persons charged or described as keeper or keepers of such premises and to search the premises in such complaint and to take into custody all intoxicating liquors found upon such premises and safely keep the same subject to the order of the said court. The complaint or information shall describe the place to be searched with sufficient particularity to identify the same and shall describe the intoxicating liquors alleged to be on such premises as particularly as practicable; but any description, however general, that will enable the officer executing the warrant to identify the property to be seized shall be sufficient. No such complaint or information as herein provided shall be made, except the person making same shall have information or evidence which leads him to believe that intoxicating liquors are kept upon the premises in violation of this ordinance. Upon return of the warrant and the trial of the cause upon such complaint the Justice of the Peace shall deal with such person so arrested as provided by this ordinance and shall, if such liquor be seized, if he finds upon the trial of

the cause that liquors are kept upon such premises as charged in the complaint, order that such liquor be destroyed.

LIQUOR PROHIBITED ON HOTEL, RESTAURANT AND BOARDING HOUSE PREMISES.

Sec. 6. It shall be unlawful for any proprietor or manager of any hotel, restaurant or boarding house to permit intoxicating liquors upon the premises occupied by such hotel, restaurant or boarding house, and the presence of such liquor upon such premises shall be prima facie evidence that the same was upon such premises by the permission of such manager or proprietor.

INTOXICATING LIQUOR FORBIDDEN AT CLUBS, ETC.

Sec. 7. It shall be unlawful for any social, fraternal, charitable or commercial club, society, lodge or association, or any person acting for them, within the Town of Carlsbad to buy, sell, barter, give or furnish to any person, any intoxicating liquor.

USES ETC OF LIQUOR FOR SACRAMENTAL PURPOSES AUTHORIZED.

Sec. 8. Authority is hereby granted to religious organizations to receive, keep, transport and use wine for sacramental purposes.

CERTAIN SALES AND USES OF LIQUOR AUTHORIZED; LIMITATIONS.

Sec. 9. Authority is hereby given for the purchase or sale of intoxicating liquors for medicinal purposes by licensed apothecaries, and for the purchase and sale for industrial and scientific purposes of alcohol which has been denatured by some process approved by the United States Commissioner of Internal Revenue; provided, that no apothecary, or his assistants or his employees shall sell or dispense liquor for any purpose within the Town of Carlsbad except for medicinal use and upon prescription written and signed by a regularly licensed and practicing physician of the Town of Carlsbad and issued only upon his own diagnosis, which prescription shall be written and not printed and shall show the name of the person to whom it was issued and shall not be filled more than once; each such sale shall be duly registered by the apothecary in a book kept for that purpose only, and such registration shall consist of record of the quantity of liquor sold, to whom so sold, the date of such sale and a full and complete copy of the prescription upon which such sale was made, and such register shall at and during all business hours be open to inspection by any citizen of Carlsbad, and shall not be for more than one pint, nor shall more than one prescription be filled for the same person within one week.

APOTHECARY'S BOND REQUIRED.

Sec. 10. Before any apothecary shall sell or dispense any intoxicating liquor under the authority of Sec. 9 of this ordinance he shall first obtain from the town recorder of said Town of Carlsbad a permit authorizing him to do so; provided, no such permit shall be issued until after such apothecary shall have executed and delivered a good and sufficient bond to the Town of Carlsbad in the sum of \$2,000.00, to be approved by the Mayor and Town Attorney of the Town of Carlsbad, conditioned for the observance in good faith of the provisions of this ordinance applicable to apothecaries as such, and upon conviction of the offense of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, such bond shall be forfeited to the Town, and such apothecary shall, in addition to the penalties imposed by said bond and the other penalties and punishments prescribed by this ordinance, be forever prohibited from selling or dispensing liquor under and by authority of this ordinance, and his permit to sell and dispense shall upon such conviction become ipso facto void.

LAWFUL PRESCRIPTION DEFINED, AND PENALTY FOR UNLAWFUL PRESCRIPTION.

Sec. 11. No physician shall prescribe intoxicating liquor for any person, except for the treatment, cure, relief or palliation of some disease of the body, to be ascertained by the personal diagnosis of such physician, and no physician shall issue a prescription calling for such intoxicating liquor without writing and signing the same and stating therein that such prescription is upon his personal diagnosis and conforming in all respects to the requirements of Sec. 9 hereof, relative to form and contents of such prescription, and no physician shall resort to any subterfuge whatever with intent to violate the spirit of this ordinance, or by which this ordinance shall be violated.

LIQUOR AND INTOXICATING LIQUOR DEFINED.

Sec. 12. The terms "liquor" and "intoxicating liquor" as used in this ordinance are hereby declared to mean, and include all intoxicating malt, vinous, spirituous, mixed and fermented liquors and all beverages which contain more than one per centum of alcohol.

"PERSON" DEFINED.

Sec. 13. The term "person" as used in this ordinance is hereby declared to mean all natural persons, corporations, firms, partnerships, associations and joint-stock companies, whatsoever.

PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE.

Sec. 14. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or who shall fail to comply with any of the provisions thereof, shall be deemed guilty of an offense against the Town of Carlsbad, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than \$50.00 and not exceeding \$200.00; or by imprisonment not less than thirty days or exceeding ninety days, in the discretion of the court trying the cause.

Sec. 15. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 16. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.
