ATTACK IS MADE ON POLICIES OF ADMIS- TRATION BY ELIHU ROOT.

Former Senator and Cabinet
Officer Sounds Keynote of
Campaign in Opening
Speech to Republi-
can Convention

Lack of Foresight Charge to Wilson.

From the Morning Journal:

New York, Feb. 15.—The policies of President Wilson and the democratic administration toward the international situations arising out of the European war and the Mexican disturbance, and, as relating to domestic conditions, toward the tariff, were attack by former United States Senator Elihu Root today in his address, as temporary chairman of the New York state republican convention, in assembly here.

No other presidential election since 1864 has been so fraught with consequences so vital to national life as the one now approaching. Mr. Root said, and all ordinary considerations which play so great a part in presidential campaigns "are and ought to be dwarfed into insignificance." He promised that if the republican party is returned to power the people may expect a foreign policy which will leave "no doubt anywhere in the world of America's purpose and courage to protect and defend her independence, her territory and the lives and just rights of her citizens under the laws of nations," and that the people may expect, also, that "the government will stand for full and adequate preparation by the american people for their own defense."

RESPECT FORFEITED.

Mr. Root charged the present administration with "the lack of foresight to make timely provision for backing up of American diplomacy by actual or assured military force" with "the forfeiture of the world's respect for our assertion of rights by pursuing the policy of making threats and of failing to make them good," and with "a loss of the moral forces of the civilized world through failure to truly interpret to the world the spirit of the American democracy in its attitude the terrible events which accompanied the early stages of the war." These said Mr. Root, were the administration's "three fundamental errors. The temporary chairman said in part:

"For the first time in twenty years we enter the field as the party of opposition, and indeed it is a much longer time, for in 1896, in all respects save the tariff, the real opposition to the sturdy and patriotic course of President Cleveland was to be found in the party that followed Mr. Bryan. It is our duty as the opposition to bring the democratic party to the bar of public judgment to put its defense so

far as we see just and substantial grounds to criticize its conduct, and to ask the voters of the country to decide whether that party, organized as it is, represented as it has been since it came into power, has shown itself competent to govern the country, as it should be governed, and whether its spirit, its policies and its performance are the best that the American people can do in the way of popular self-government."

Taking up foreign relations, Mr. Root said that for the first time within the memory of men now living these relations "are recognized as vital." He took up first the Mexican problem, reviewing the situation when President Wilson was inaugurated. "His duty then was plain," Mr. Root declared. "It was, first to use his powers as president, to secure protection for the lives and property of Americans in Mexico and to require that the rules of law and stipulations of treaties should be observed by Mexico towards the United States and its citizens. His duty was, second, as the head of a foreign power to respect the independence of Mexico, to refrain from all interference with her internal affairs, from all attempt at domination except as he was justified by the law of nations for the protection of American rights."

"The president of the United States failed to observe either of those duties. He deliberately abandoned them both and followed an entirely different and inconsistent purpose. He intervened in Mexico to aid one faction in civil strife against another. He undertook to pull down Huerta and set Carranza upon his place to be constitutional president of Mexico. He certainly was the de facto president of Mexico Rightly or wrongly, good or bad, he was there."

Mr. Root reviewed our subsequent relations with Mexico, declaring that the United States intervened in Mexico to control the internal affairs by threat, by economic pressure, and by force of arms, "and that the American government ignored, condoned the murder of American men and the rape of American women and the destruction of American property and insult to American officers and defilement of the American flag and joined itself to the men who were guilty of all these things to pull down the power of Huerta."

"The results of this interference were most unfortunate," Mr. Root continued. "If our government had sent an armed force into Mexico to protect American life and honor we might have been opposed but we would have been understood and respected by the people of Mexico, because they would have realized that we were acting within our international rights and performing a nation's duty for the protection of its own people; but when the president sent an armed force into Mexico to determine the Mexican presidential succession he created resentment and distrust of motives among all classes and sections of the Mexican people."

"With the occupation of Vera Cruz the moral power of the United States in Mexico ended. We were then and we are now hated for what we did for our feeble and irresolute failure to protect the lives and rights of our citizens. No flag is so dishonored and no citizenship no little worth the claiming in Mexico as ours: And that is why we have failed in Mexico."

"And for the death and outrage, the suffering and ruin of our brethren, the hatred and contempt for our country, and the dishonor of our name in that land, the American administration at Washington shares responsibility with the inhuman brutes with whom it made common cause."

OUR CONGRESSMEN MAKING GOOD.

During the consideration of the Indian appropriation bill in the House last week Representative Hernandez was successful in securing a number of important appropriations for the Indian School at Albuquerque, the most important of which perhaps was an item for \$12,000 for the purchase of some forty acres of additional land adjoining the school property in order that the vocational education of the young Indians who are quartered at the school may be more readily carried out. This additional land, which has been authorized the efforts of Mr. Hernandez, is close up to the city of Albuquerque and is irrigated land which will aid very materially in advancing not only the red men of the southwest but their white neighbors as well, because it will assist in making them far better citizens than they could be made ordinary methods of education. During the discussion which followed the recommendation of the Indian committee that this land be purchased much information as to the advancement of the Navajos was brought out, and it was shown that Mr. Taylor of Colorado and Mr. Mann of Illinois had both made personal visits to the country of the Indians and that both were quite enthusiastic in their comments upon the progress made by the red men and especially by the Navajos, the latter of whom are said to be the most expert weavers in the United States.

At first it seemed as though there might be some objection to the purchase of forty acres of land at the price of about \$300, an acre but when the facts and conditions were explained to the House Mr. Hernandez was successful in getting the item through. The representative from New Mexico was equally fortunate in securing the endorsement of the House to an amendment which provides an appropriation of \$5,000, for the construction work on the Indian highway extending from Mesa Verde National Park to Gallup, New Mexico on the Navajo reservation. This sum is to be used largely for the purchase of tools, powder, etc., to aid the Indians

in the construction of this road and Mr. Hernandez showed that this aid, which by the way is not a direct Government appropriation but is to be paid back out of the Indian funds in the future, will aid and encourage them in road building. In response to questions as to the extent of the reservation Mr. Hernandez showed that there are over nine million acres in all set aside for the Navajos and that the county of McKinley of which Gallup is the county seat has already raised a fund with which to assist in making the roadway across the reservation. Besides owning upwards of one hundred thousand sheep which aid materially in the progress of the Indians Mr. Hernandez pointed out their vast deposits of coal and other minerals which will aid materially in the wealth of not only the Indians themselves but of the State and Nation as well when the proper facilities are furnished for reaching the markets and that this roadway will prove a long step in that direction.

As he pointed out the progress made by the Indians of his state Mr. Hernandez' remarks were greeted with the applause of the House and when he concluded all objections were withdrawn and, thus in the course of half an hour he had succeeded in obtaining the Government's support for the better education of such a large portion of his constituents as well as in securing aid towards the construction of roadways which will prove highly beneficial alike to the Indians and the white residents thereon.

Interscholastic Track and Field Meet.

Albuquerque, N. M., Feb. 17.—The annual interscholastic track and field meet, to be held this year on April 28 and 29 at the state University, is the subject of the current official bulletin of the University, just issued. It is the first time the annual athletic meeting has been considered worthy of the dignity of a University bulletin, and indicates the growing importance of the annual gathering of high school athletes of which this will be the fourth. A championship banner and a loving cup are contested for. The banner is a permanent possession, while the cup goes to the team winning it the third time in succession. The Albuquerque high school won the first meeting. Roswell high school won two years ago and last year and if it can win again this year will become permanent possessor of the handsome trophy.

The track meet this year is held much earlier than usual, and has been advanced to meet the wishes of the high schools themselves, nearly all of which will have entries in this year's meeting. The May dates heretofore set were regarded as too close to commencement time. The new state Interscholastic high school athletic association takes official charge of the meeting this year, although the state University will continue as host to the visiting athletes supplying them with entertainment and accommodations during their stay in Albuquerque and making the only cost of attendance and participation in the track meet that of railroad fare. Each high school may enter up to fourteen contestants in the thirteen events of the meeting, or an any of them; the usual scoring system of first, second and third being employed under rigid rules laid down in the bulletin. Copies of the new bulletin may be had on application to the state University.

DEMOCRATS IN CONGRESS ARE DEMORALIZED.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 16.—Disheartened, the Democratic members are guilty of deliberate neglect.

By actual daily count since the holidays the Democrats have been fewer in number on the floor of the House than Republicans, except for seven roll calls. An uninformed observer would have supposed that the Republicans and not the Democrats were the responsible party.

There are in the House 228 Democrats and 197 Republicans. The record of attendance shows that on every day during January, with the exceptions noted, the Republicans outnumbered the Democrats on the floor, sometimes two to one, and sometimes three to one.

The inability of the Democratic party to legislate has been shown in the past. Haste, inaccuracy and crude incompetency run like a scarlet thread through the statutes they have enacted.

To this record is now being added the proof of shameful neglect. With a majority in Congress responsible for the enactment or failure of an important program, the Democrats have constantly flinched that responsibility.

Listless, hopelessly divided among themselves, they are furnishing a conspicuous example, not only of their incapacity to handle the affairs entrusted to them, but also a total lack of appreciation of the necessity for close application to the business in hand, if errors and disastrous consequences are to be avoided.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 16.
—An appalling oversight of the
Democratic administration in
providing for national defense
has been laid bare.

Representative Patrick H.
Kelley of Michigan, a member
of the Naval Affairs Committee,
has disclosed to the House that
of the nine dreadnaughts, seven-
teen destroyers, thirty-nine sub-
marines and two transport and
supply ships authorized by Con-
gress or under construction since
the Democrats have been in
control of the House, NOT
ONE IS COMPLETED.

More important still, no ap-
parent effort has been made by
the President or the Navy De-
partment since the beginning of
the war in Europe to hasten the
construction and completion of
these additions to the Navy.

Why this neglect on the part
of the administration to carry
out the mandate of Congress to
equip the navy for adequate na-
tional defense at this time?

In a resolution setting forth
this condition Mr. Kelley re-
ferred to the President's recent
statement that "the world is on
fire and we are daily treading
amidst dangers not of our own
making and not under our con-
trol; no man can tell what a day
may bring forth."

His resolution proposed that
the Secretary of the Navy be
directed to negotiate at once
with contractors and govern-
ment ship yards to learn the
earliest time within which these
war craft can be completed, and
report to the House.

"The President has said in
recent speeches that the country
faces a crisis," said Mr. Kelley,
"and none could tell what a day
might bring forth. If this lan-
guage means anything, it means
that our need of defense is a
present need. Dreadnaughts
and battle cruisers authorized
by this Congress will not be
available for the defense of the
country for four years to come.

"Hence it seems to me that
the first duty of Congress is to
see that the sixty-seven ships
now under construction or auth-
orized for the American navy
are completed and made avail-

able at the earliest possible
moment. Preparations which
do not materialize for five years
would not avail us anything if
our danger is a present one.

"I cannot understand how the
President, knowing the danger
as he only can know it, has
made no suggestion to Congress
that the ships now under con-
struction ought to be rushed to
completion.

"Either we are not in danger
or the President has been neg-
ligent in this regard."

LOUIS D. BRANDEIS AND THE SENATE.

It is reported that the United
States Senate is shocked be-
cause President Wilson has sent
in the name of Louis D. Bran-
deis for confirmation, as a Judge
of the Supreme Court of the
United States. Mr. Brandeis
has shown himself not only a
great lawyer, but one of the
greatest thinkers in the country
today, and he thinks on the side
of the people, a little bit more
than he does about the corpora-
tions. For this reason the Uni-
ted States Senate is shocked to
think that President Wilson has
appointed a Judge to serve the
"people and Justice" instead of
the corporations. When the
Russian Duma passes a law it
the Czar does not like it, he
simply vetoes it, and that ends
it. When the United States
Congress passes a law, and the
President signs it, it then be-
comes a law; but the Supreme
Court of the United States can
declare the law unconstitutional
if they choose to do so, so there-
fore, the Supreme Court of the
United States has the same veto
power in this country that the
Czar has in Russia; and for
these reasons it is of utmost im-
portance that only men of ster-
ling patriotism be placed upon
the Bench of the Supreme Court
of the United States. The
Supreme Court is our Czar.
Wall Street is moving Heaven
and Earth in its efforts to pre-
vent the confirmation by the Sen-
ate. However, it is believed
that the name will be confirmed,
by the Senate when it is voted
upon because every U. S. Sen-
ate who votes against confirma-
tion steps himself as a servile
tool of corporation and an enemy
of Social Justice.

Hon. Frank Hubbell's recent
announcement of his candidacy
for the Republican nomination
for United States senator, "not
only fulfills the old adage of
"Coming events cast their shad-
ows before," but is very gratify-
ing to his hundreds of friends
all over the state, and knowing
Mr. Hubbell as we do, to be a
prince among men, with all the
qualifications, from an educa-
tional standpoint, to his know-
ing the needs of the state he
would represent, should the con-
vention see fit to nominate him,
will support him to the last
ditch.—Socorro Chieftain.

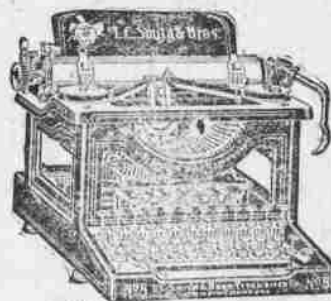
