## CHILD KIDNAPPED AT LAS VEGAS

### And Held by the Perpetrators of the Crime for \$12,000 Ransom.

Santa Fe, N. M., April 3. — "The three-year-old grandson of Judge H. L. Waldo was kidnapped at Las Vegas and ransomed for \$12,000." Such were the sensational tidings that reached Santa Fe this morning. As soon as this news was posted on the bulletin boards, at an early hour, it spread over the city like wild fire and created widespread indignation that would have been ominous for the kidnapper had he been arrested here, for a crime of that kind is regarded as one against the whole community, and against which fathers and mothers are helpless to defend themselves.

The story reads like an episode out of a dime novel. Night before last two masked strangers entered the house of Attorney A. T. Rogers, Jr., at Las Vegas, the son-in-law of Judge H. L. Waldo. Mr. Rogers was away at Ratan attending the session of the district court. The intruders invaded the room of a brother, William Rogers, and compelled him to give up a revolver. They then forced their way into the apartment of Mrs. Rogers and demanded Waldo, her son. Mrs. Rogers was helpless. She pleaded and implored. She offered all her jewels, all her money, all her property, but one of the villains replied:

"To hell with your jewels, I want the kid!"

Despairing, Mrs. Rogers begged for permission to clothe the child warmly and comfortably. This was granted while the robber coolly waited. The mother hugged and kissed her darling in frantic farewell until the criminal tore the boy out of her arms, mounted a horse and was off in the dark, leaving a letter of instructions, in which a demand was made of \$12,000 in cash. Who can describe the agony of that mother? Her despair? Mr. Rogers was reached as soon as possible and he came home yesterday on the flyer. No time was lost in securing the money and setting in motion every agency possible to recover the child. The letter of instructions had directed:

"If you are ready to deliver the money, set a red light in a certain window at ten o'clock in the evening." It then directed that the money should be taken to a certain spot in a road, eleven miles from Las Vegas that same night. These instructions were followed. Mr. Rogers in his automobile made the trip to the lonely spot and there met his man. He delivered the money, but the child was not there. "The child is in Kearney's Gap,"

he was informed. Two horses were standing in the road and two men galloped away. Will Rogers speeded to Kearney's Gap. There the child was found in the road. It was wrapped in a blanket.

"Is that you, Uncle Will?" the youngster chirped. "I am awful hungry. I had nothing to eat all day." What a family reunion there was last night when the boy was returned to his mother's arms.

### Store Robbed at Hondo.

The News is in receipt of a communication from Hondo stating that the store of J. M. Torrez, in which the postoffice is located, was broken into last Thursday by robbers and \$30 in money and several checks stolen.

Nothing was taken from the postoffice, however, the robbers evidently being cautious about tampering with Uncle Sam's property. There is no clue, but it is suspected the job was done by local talent, as professionals would not have spared the postoffice. This makes the fifth robbery committed in Lincoln county in the past three months.

### Tin Can Irrigation.

"I aint much of a farmer," said a newly arrived homesteader. "In fact," he continued, "I aint no farmer at all; but I have a plan which I think will work out all right provided I can get enough tin cans to fill 'em." Here he hesitated as if he were reluctant to proceed.

"Got a scheme to beat dry farming all hollow, eh?" queried one of his auditors.

"You have guessed it. I just came to New Mexico to give the thing a trial. I only want good soil, that is, ground that will hold a seed and have a chance to sprout."

"Plenty of that kind of earth in New Mexico," he was assured. "I don't say too much, but it might prove better than most places, only we lack moisture. But the outlook is good for this season. But I won't interrupt again. Proceed."

"Well, this thing can be worked without irrigation ditches. A good well and a garden hose—but a bucket would do, though slower. Having plowed the land—say I have put in a crop of vegetables. The seed or shoot in the ground between each planting or nearly so, I would put a tin can with a small hole in the bottom. I would fill the cans with water, or the rains might do that for me. If it did it would save much time."

"Can't you see," he said eagerly, "the water retained in the cans will only get out by slow—drop by drop."

The idea seemed to appeal to his listeners and some said they would try it.

## SOME KITCHEN HINTS

WORTH BEING POSTED WHERE THEY CAN BE SEEN.

Some Directions That Are Household Words, and Some That Set Forth Ideas That Are New and Valuable.

Here are a few rules that it would be well to cut out and paste up in your kitchen. They are hints about affairs of that very important region of the home:

1. Wash a saucepan in plenty of hot water; but never wash cake tins or frying pans. Wipe them well with a piece of paper, which is afterward burned, and polish them with a dry cloth.

2. Stand saucepan, fish kettles, etc., in front of the fire for a few minutes after washing them so that they may be thoroughly dried inside. This makes them last longer and helps to keep them in good condition.

3. Pudding cloths, jelly bags and so on should be well washed, scalded and hung up to dry. It is not necessary to iron them, but they should be smoothed and folded before they are replaced in the drawer.

4. Add a little soda to the water in which you wash plates and dishes. The soda loosens the grease on them and gives the china a good shiny surface.

5. Never add soda to the water in which you wash silver. Use a wooden tub, with plenty of hot water and soap, and dry the articles with a soft cloth. If silver is carefully washed and dried, once a week will be found often enough to clean it with powder and a leather. Silver should be kept in a baize lined drawer or basket, for if it is laid on hardwood it is apt to be scratched.

6. Never put the handles of knives into hot water or they will split. If a knife has been used for cutting onions or any other strong-scented vegetable dig the blade of it once or twice into garden mold to remove the smell before it is washed.

7. If a pan is burned or blackened rub the inside of it with a hard crust of bread dipped in salt and afterward wash it with hot soda and water.

8. Be very careful to keep the lids of saucepans clean, for the flavor of one dish may cling to a lid which has not been washed and spoil a second dish which is prepared in the same pan.

9. After washing up wipe out the dish tub and allow it to stand by the fire till it is dry. The dishtub should be scrubbed with boiling water and soap at least once a week.

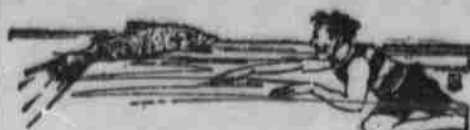
To keep butter sweet in warm weather pack the butter in a crock; make brine strong enough to bear up an egg, and pour over it.

To remove indelible ink: Take a small lump of cyanuret of potash, rub it on the ink stain, first dipping it in water, then rinse the cloth in cold water.

When baking cake, should the oven become too hot, set a basin of cold water in it.

For chapped hands: Wash your hands in sugar water; dry them with corn meal, night and morning.

## MANY WAYS OF COOKING HAM

More Tender if Baked Than if Fried—  
Excellent Idea for a Lunch-  
eon Dish.

Sliced ham is more tender if it is baked than if fried. Cut a slice three-quarters of an inch thick, put it into a small enamel pan, turn three-quarters of a cupful of milk over it, cover and bake for an hour and a quarter, basting every 15 minutes with milk.

For luncheon grind the ends of a boiled ham and mix it with a button onion that has been chopped fine and a little minced parsley. Put the mixture into a pan with a little butter and moisten with hot water or cream. Simmer four or five minutes and then heap on slices of toast.

For curly bacon cut it very thin and half-cook it in boiling water, then curl it, fasten in shape with a toothpick and broil it over the fire.

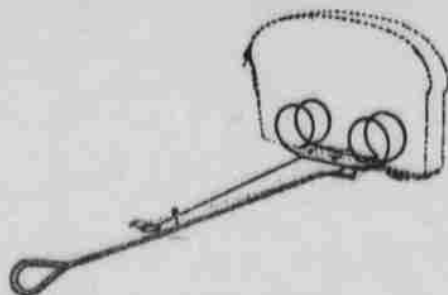
A little grated American cheese mixed with minced ham used in sandwiches is delicious if the sandwich is fried brown and served very hot.

Cold ham is tasty if it is shredded and cooked in currant jelly sauce. Put a cupful of the shredded ham into a saucepan with a level tablespoonful of butter and half a cupful of currant jelly. As soon as the jelly and butter begin to bubble add four tablespoonfuls of sherry and a seasoning of paprika. Simmer the mixture about five or six minutes and serve with toast.

## IMPROVED FORM OF TOASTER

Holds Bread in a Vertical Position  
While Being Prepared for  
the Table.

The toaster which is illustrated in the accompanying sketch is arranged for use in toasting slices of bread in a vertical position. The holder is swiveled on the handle of the toaster,



and a rod is attached to one end of it, with which the holder may be turned on its pivot to bring the opposite side of the slice to the fire. The rod passes through an eye formed on the handle, and is provided with a notch, which engages the eye when the holder is at right angles to the handle.—Scientific American.

### When Buying Vegetables.

In buying vegetables avoid carrots, beets and similar roots that have their green tops removed.

As withered or discolored tops would betray vegetable age, the dealer carefully cuts or trims them off. Roots with the earth clinging to them are usually fresh. Roots that are too free from earth and very clean looking are usually stale and old. They look clean because they have been freshened by soaking in cold water. Dealers have not time enough to clean fresh vegetables simply for the joy of doing it. When they do so you can be sure that it is to their advantage.

### Spice Cake.

One-half cup chopped figs, one cup seeded raisins. Pour over these one cup boiling water in which one level teaspoon soda has been dissolved. Stir and let cool. Once cup granulated sugar, one-half cup butter, one and one-half cups flour, one level teaspoon baking powder, yolks four eggs, whites two eggs, one teaspoon cinnamon, one-quarter teaspoon allspice, one-quarter teaspoonful cloves, one and one-half teaspoonful nutmeg, one-half cup chopped nut meats. Mix together, except flour and fruit, which should be added last. Bake as solid or layer cake.

## THE SIXTY-SECOND CONGRESS.

The sixty-second congress met in extra session Tuesday. It is a matter of conjecture what will be done at this session or when it will adjourn. The democrats took possession of the house and Champ Clark of Missouri was put in the speaker's chair. In his speech accepting the honor, he warned the democratic members that the eyes of the country were upon them; that the party was on trial and that it had an opportunity for the first time in sixteen years to prove its worthiness for a still higher expression of confidence.

The democrats have formulated an ambitious program, which includes the revision of the Payne-Aldrich tariff laws.

Republican leaders of the senate have announced there shall be no tariff legislation, hence a legislative deadlock is predicted.

One of the most important things the democratic house will likely do is to order an investigation of the departments and branches of the government service. The democrats claim that there has been no such investigation for twenty years and that it will be a great saving to the people.

Representative Clark in his speech accepting the speakership outlined the measures through which the democratic party hopes to enjoy the faith of the people.

Intelligent revision of the tariff, election of United States Senators by popular vote, changes in the house rules to permit proper consideration of public measures, economy in handling the purse strings of the country, the publication of campaign contributions and the early admission of New Mexico and Arizona to statehood were some of the things which Speaker Clark emphasized in the democratic program as measures which would be undertaken by the majority party in the house.

The political complexion of the sixty-second congress is as follows: Senate, republicans 50; democrats 41; vacancy 1. The House: Democrats 228; republicans 150; Socialists 1; vacancies 2.

Governor Harmon, of Ohio, and William Jennings Bryan met on the floor of the house just before the session opened amid a deafening demonstration. Both were in Washington on business.

The outlook for remedial legislation and democratic triumph was never brighter.

Up to this writing no trace has been discovered of the abductors of Attorney Rogers' child at Las Vegas, an account of which is published on the first page of the News. Several posses have been in the field searching every nook and corner, but have found no clue to the culprits. Pinkerton detectives in and around Las

Vegas, assisted by local officers, are making every effort possible to unravel what now seems to be a mystery in which local parties are implicated. It is thought that the kidnappers are not in hiding, but are somewhere in the country south of Las Vegas. It has been intimated by parties familiar with the circumstances that there is likelihood of the ransom money being returned and the matter hushed up. Later developments, however, will unravel the mystery, and it is hoped the criminals will be apprehended and given the limit of the law.

Statehood at hand, eastern capital coming to seek investment, abundant rains, a successful season assured to stockmen, phenomenally high prices for cattle, the mining industry flourishing—these are some of the things that promise to make the next twelve months a veritable year of jubilee for New Mexico. Come to Carrizozo.

### Approval of Bond Delayed.

Last Saturday was the date fixed by the court for passing upon the \$15,000 indemnity bond in the county seat case. A committee of Carrizozo citizens visited Alamogordo in order to enter a protest against the approval of the bond, should the bond, in their opinion, fail to meet the requirements. The protest was made, the protestants setting up a number of reasons why the bond should not be approved. Judge Wright withheld his approval until tomorrow, April 8th, at which time the plaintiffs, Lincoln, have been cited to show cause why the bond should be approved.

In the meantime both sides have been busy securing information, one to refute the allegations in the protest and the other to substantiate the protest. The matter will, therefore, be presented to the court tomorrow, and the final decision of Judge Wright is expected. No one can forecast the result, and it would be the height of impropriety to do so, but this much can be said as a matter of fact: Should the bond be approved the injunction will remain in force; should it be rejected the injunction will be dissolved.

Judge Hewitt returned Saturday evening from Alamogordo, where he had gone to represent the interests of Carrizozo in the county seat matters. He went out to White Oaks the following morning.

### MACHINERY WANTED.

It is perhaps an example of the irony of fate that Russia, our most formidable competitor in some branches of agriculture, should be obliged to depend, to a considerable degree, on American machinery for her success in the competition, says the Manchester Union. It is a fact no less interesting, though not unnatural, that American manufacturers of agricultural machinery are getting themselves in readiness to send to Russia all the machinery she is willing to pay for, provided she will make the trade an object to them by way of duty concessions. The Russian National Organization of Traders in Agricultural Machinery and Implements has laid before its government resolutions advocating the continuance of agricultural machinery on the free list, and the removal of the present duty on locomobiles imported with threshing machines and steam plows. In these resolutions American manufacturers of agricultural machinery are naturally interested. They know that the Russian government earnestly desires the development of the southern part of its country into a corn-growing area, the fertility of the soil making this especially desirable; and they are quite reasonable in hoping and expecting that this consideration will be a factor in the Russian acceptance of the proposition to admit free of duty all utensils and machinery required in the cultivation of the product.

There are two sides to every question. Dean Bailey of the College of Agriculture at Cornell, presented the other side of a much-discussed matter when he talked to the fruit growers of the state at Sodas on the subject of abandoned farms. It is often declared that there is great loss of potential wealth in the abandoned farms. But Prof. Bailey says that much sentiment has been wasted on so-called abandoned farms; that farming has been suspended on some lands for good economic reasons, and that farming will not begin again upon them until conditions demand it. All this is true, of course. Buying an abandoned farm does not always open the road to prosperity for the buyer. The new owner may find conditions such that he cannot get along any better than the old owner who left the place. There is gold in sea water, but no profitable way has been found to extract it. There is land lying unused in abandoned farms—though the state agricultural department showed not long ago that there are fewer farms of this kind than the average person supposed.

## USE FOR OLD SHADES.

NEED NOT BE THROWN AWAY WHEN WORN OUT.

Many Practical Ways in Which They May Be Utilized—Excellent for Cutting Out Dress Patterns.

Housewives are telling us that the roller shades of today are fragile and short lived compared to the substantial Holland shades we all bought a decade ago. The spring breaks too easily—a single snap or jar when set too tensely will rupture it—render the whole shade useless unless you care to bother with measurements and supply a new roller to suit. When the body of the curtain itself is a little worn and punctured it doesn't seem to pay. The shade is a discard and the waste-fulness apparent.

But there are several practical uses for window shades that are past ordinary use—the cheap paper ones as well as those of standard material.

The latter is excellent for cutting out dress patterns that you wish to preserve against the ravages of time and constant handling.

Besides being strong and easily rolled, it yields readily to the pressure of hot flatirons, thus having the advantage over the flimsy delicate tissue paper in which most patterns are offered for sale. When smoothed or ironed out on dress goods for cutting, it "stays put" and requires less pinning and readjusting. Some dress patterns, entirely out of the province of fads, are good for years when cut out of something more durable than newspapers or the like. Foundation sleeve patterns, glove fitting waist, and princess patterns would easily fall into this class.

There are few abrupt changes in the styles of aprons, underwear, infants' clothes, and the like, and here again one pattern cut out of something stout and durable may save you much shopping.

Holland window shade material also makes excellent stencils for practical use as well as for preserving the pattern. And a little of this is generally on hand when the regular gelatin paper is not available.

One housewife has used old window shades in a more ingenious way. Being too narrow for any of the windows in her new home, she had one of them fastened under the pantry shelf, where it could be drawn down waste of time than turning the leaves cooking recipe came to hand that particularly appealed to her she would draw down this shade and paste it under the proper heading. It is far handier than a cookbook, for she can run her eye over the whole rapidly and spot the recipe required with less commodiously. Whenever a good new of a big cookbook entails.

Intact parts of this window shade material afford a good foundation for scrapbooks or more particularly books in which to keep your embroidery and crochet patterns. Cut the leaves of average book size, and punch several holes down the edge large enough for fish cord or baby ribbon to pass through. Lace back and forth across the back edge through opposite holes to get a fairly secure binding. It is better to sew your samples or patterns to the leaves than to keep them lying loose. Then you will always know just where to find them instead of going through the whole collection.

### Crust to Remove Grease.

It may be news to some women to hear that a piece of bread burnt to a crust will remove grease on cloth if rubbed upon the spot, following the nap of the cloth.

It is also said that if the head of a match, after being lighted and then blown out, is applied to a stain from paint the spot will disappear.

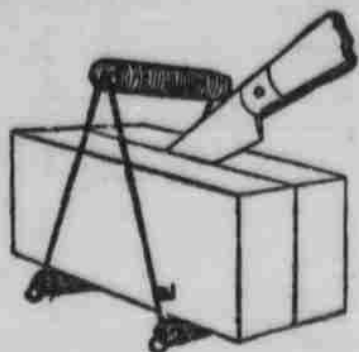

## CLEANS KNIVES WITH EASE

Device of California Man One of the Best Ever Placed on the Market.

There are all varieties of knife-cleaners from the single stone on which the housewife rubs her cutlery to the elaborate device of multiple wheels used in the big hotels and restaurants. But one of the simplest and most effective of all would seem to



be that devised by a California man and shown here. This contrivance consists of a couple of cleaning stones held in juxtaposition in a resilient frame. The frame consists of two inverted V-shaped wires with springs connecting the three corners of each. This has the effect of keeping the stones closer together all the time, but allowing enough leeway for the admission of a knife blade or the tines of a fork, which can be cleaned by being rubbed up and down a few times. The springs will insure a sufficiently strong pressure to give good frictional action at all times.

## VALUABLE IN THE HOUSEHOLD

Innumerable Uses to Which Sawdust May Be Put to Good Advantage.

Sawdust may be put to serve a number of purposes for the housewife. It is good for removing sediment in glass and earthenware. A handful thrown on a dying fire will help to revive it. Well dried and heated and sprinkled over grease spots in carpets, it is useful in removing these objectionable marks. It should be well rubbed in, left for a few hours, then treated again if necessary. Heat some sawdust on a piece of paper in the oven, and it is an excellent remedy for mildew and damp spots on metal or other polished goods. Rub some dry sawdust on articles that have been polished, and the polish will last longer. Slightly moisten sawdust sprinkled on outhouse floors, verandas or larder, etc., and brushed off with a hard broom will cleanse the floor without much trouble.

### Useful Hints.

Milk will clean piano keys satisfactorily. It will take out ink spots of long standing. Used in starch it will give a fine gloss. It will remove discoloration from gilt mirrors and picture frames. Used with bluing for lace curtains it will make them look like new.

To cloud quickly the windows in a bath room, etc., apply with a brush a strong solution of epsom salts mixed in vinegar. This gives a beautiful frosted appearance and becomes permanent if varnished over with white varnish.

Mahogany or any other colored wood may be darkened by polishing with cold drawn linseed oil.

### Splendid Cookies.

One sifter of flour, one teaspoonful soda, and pinch of salt; sift and then take lard and mix in, as for pie dough. Two cupfuls of brown sugar; flavor with maple and vanilla; roll out and sprinkle granulated sugar thickly on top; cut out with a large cookie cutter and press a raisin or nut in the center of each; just before putting in the oven take the tip of the finger and wet the top, and the cookies will be crinkly and crisp. If sweet milk or water is used two teaspoonfuls of baking powder in place of soda.
