## WILLIAM EMPEROR WOUNDED IN NECK.

### German Officer Turns Pis- tol on Self and Ends Own Life Quickly.

Story First Published in a  
French Paper but Not  
Vouched for By It.

London, Eng., Feb. 26.—A highly sensational story has reached London from France a circumstantial account of an attempt by a German general to assassinate the kaiser. This account is printed in the "Alsacien-Lorrain de Paris," which does not vouch for the truth of the story.

The following is a translation of part of that article:

"A compatriot who had been expelled from Alsace took refuge in the south of France. He has just received a letter from a relative in Alsace, who declares that no precise fact has ever transpired as to the exact nature of the malady from which William II is said to be suffering.

REMAINS OUT OF SIGHT.

"However, this may be, it is quite sure that, reports to the contrary notwithstanding, the kaiser has not been seen at any front but has remained indoors for some weeks past. Neither cancer nor any other malady is accountable for this compulsory retirement on the part of the Prussian monarch.

ATTEMPT MADE BEFORE  
CHRISTMAS.

"As a simple matter of fact, the kaiser was the victim of an attempt made upon his august person just before Christmas by a German general, who, as the result of a violent dispute with his sovereign, fired his revolver at the emperor and then turned the weapon against himself with deadly effect. This story is at any rate generally accepted in Germany as a true story.

"The ball is said to have entered his majesty's neck, which explains the hypothesis of an operation for cancer."

## ARE THE BIRDS IN YOUR JARDEN?

The conservation of bird life is one of the necessities of the day. We easily recognize their aesthetic influence, but compar-

atively few of us appreciate their great economic value. Crops, fruit and trees are constantly preyed upon by insects. In the United States insects cause loss to agriculture of more than half a billion of dollars each year. Birds more than any other agency hold these pests in check.

The foundation for the settling of the bird question lies in education. Legislation is hard to get; even the best laws are in constant danger of being repealed, and even the enforcement of laws is uncertain. With education comes the appreciation of the value of birds, and the problems is solved.

Considering the attitude of the General Federation of Women's Club concerning birds, it is inconsistent for any of the million women of the Federation to wear feathers, with the exception of ostrich feathers; but it is even more inconsistent for members of Conservation Committee who are working for the protection of birds to wear them. Think of the inspiration it would be to the women of America if the two million women of the General Federation refused to wear hats trimmed with feathers.

Every States should have its birds preserves and all parks should be made bird and will-flowers preserves. We must urge property owners to post their lands and prohibit shooting.

Encourage the construction of bird houses in all manual training classes in schools and you have done a great benefit to agriculture.

## New Submarine Companig.

Washington, Feb. 29.—Results of the new Austro-German submarine campaign against armed merchant ships of the extent allies beginning at midnight are awaited by the United States with grave concern.

Although under their new instructions Teutonic naval commanders are authorized to sink without warning all armed enemy merchantmen, they encounter, it is understood they have been told to make sure if possible that no American citizens are aboard any ship attacked. Furthermore, in the latest communication regarding submarine warfare, Germany has assured the United States that the new orders are so formulated as to prevent the destruction of enemy liners "on account of their armament unless such armament is proved."

## Former Pastor is Called to Pulpit of West- minster Church.

Westminster Presbyterian congregation, which has been without a pastor in El Paso, since the resignation of Rev. John E. Abbott, shortly before Christmas, has extended a call to Rev. Watson M. Fairley of Fayetteville, N. C.

Mr. Fairley was pastor of Westminster church 11 years ago, serving for a year and resigning to go to a then larger field. He is remembered by many of the congregation as a remarkably forceful speaker and earnest worker.

The offer of the pastorate of Westminster was sent to Mr. Fairley by telegraph and was followed by a formal call by mail. The officers of the church expect to receive his reply within a few days.

Since the departure of Rev. John E. Abbott, former pastor of Westminster, for Missouri, where he is state missionary, the pulpit of the church has been filled by chaplain John T. Exton, of the Twentieth U. S. infantry.

## PREPAREDNESS PROGRAM

Washington, Feb. 29.—The campaign for national preparedness will enter on a new phase in congress next week, when in all probability bills providing for increasing the army to an extent never before contemplated in time of peace will be introduced in both the house and senate.

The house military committee will begin tomorrow its final review of the measure tentatively agreed upon last week and which it is stated will be altered only in minor details before it is favorably reported. The final vote probably will be taken Thursday but it will require several days for Chairman Hay to prepare a report to accompany the bill.

## W. C. Simpson Is Appointed Sheriff of Luna County.

At a meeting of the board of county commissioners that was held on Wednesday the question of the appointment of a sheriff to fill out the unexpired portion of the term of the late sheriff D. B. Stephens was taken up, and the choice of the commissioners was unanimously for the appointment of W. C. Simpson.

## Five Americans Threat- ened Would Death.

Passengers arriving on the first train to reach Juarez directly from Mexico City in several months, reported today that Carranza soldiers undiers under General Luis Gutierrez, the new military commander of Chihuahua state, had killed a Chinese hotel keeper at Jimenez, south of Chihuahua City, several days ago, and threatened to execute five Americans. The latter, it was declared, had been placed against an adobe wall and were facing a firing squad when an order for their release came. Carranza officials here, however, denounced the report as a fabrication, five americans threatened would death.

## REGULAR TERM.

JANUARY 3rd, 1916.

The Board of County Commissioners met in Regular Session on January 3, 1916. There were present, Hon. Eugene Kempenich, Chairman, Fermin Marquez and Perfecto Gabaldon, Ruperto Jaramillo, Sheriff, and J. M. Luna, Clerk.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The Board then proceeded in order of business and the following were had.

A petition was presented by Mr. H. H. Schutz, Receiver, of the Southwestern Agricultural Corporation, requesting that the Board of County Commissioners recommend to the District Attorney the correction of the 1912 taxes, which are alleged to be too high owing to the improper classification of the returns for that year.

This petition was referred to Hon. H. P. Owen, District Attorney with recommendation that he take proper steps and adjust

the matter as requested.

The report of Dr. W. F. Wittwer, County Health Officer, was presented before the Board and approved.

WHEREAS, In the opinion of the County Commissioners, of Valencia County, a certain part of the road from Ojuelos Spring to Becker Station, should be discontinued, as it appears that there is a new better road connecting the same parts.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the following are appointed viewers in conformity with Sec. 3, Chapter 124, of the laws of 1905, to report as to the vacating of the said portion of said road: Diego Aragon, Simon Aragon and Bolesio Romero.

RESOLVED, That the District Attorney is hereby requested to approve or disapprove the various vouchers referred to him, by the Board of County Commissioners promptly so that final action on the same may be taken.

RESOLVED, That the County Clerk is hereby instructed to issue a warrant for land taken for road purpose to Benito Sanchez, at the rate of \$20.00 per acre.

Eugenio Baca appeared before the Board and protested against the appointment of certain viewers, to view a certain road in precinct No. 2.

Doroteo Gabaldon appeared before the Board, regarding a certain road work to be done in front of his house. This matter was referred to the road Board.

The resignation of Charles Neustadt, as Justice of the Peace of Precinct No. 23, was accepted and Mariano Padilla was appointed to fill the vacancy. Also the resignation of Manuel Sandoval, Justice of the peace, of Precinct No. 7, was accepted and Jesus Marquez, was appointed to fill the vacancy.

The County Clerk was instructed to issue warrants for land taken for road purpose in conformity with the report presented by Mr. A. E. St. Morris.

A communication from the New Mexico State Record, was received, requesting an appropriation of \$200.00 to be used in advertising the resources of Valencia County in a special edition to be published by them shortly. The matter was taken into consideration and it was denied to give the amount requested.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the District Attorney is hereby instructed to bring suit in the District Court, for the collection of all delinquent taxes due the County of Valencia from 1909 to date.

Mr. Dennis Chavez appeared before the Board in behalf of the New Mexico Board of Exposition Managers, for the Panama California Exposition, asking for an appropriation from the County of Valencia for the purpose of continuing the display of the New Mexico industries for the year 1916. The Chairman of this Board was authorized to draw a warrant for \$500.00 in favor of the New Mexico Board of Exposition Managers of the Panama California Exposition, upon re-

ceipt of assurance from said Board, that together with this amount they would have sufficient revenue to conduct the New Mexico Building at San Diego for the year 1916.

WHEREAS, There remains in the County Treasurer, certain small amounts to the credit of various funds; which said funds either through changes in the law vesting the same in other funds or being in excess of the requirements for which the fund was created; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, That the County Treasurer is hereby instructed to take the following transfers to such funds, viz:

Precinct No. 2, Road Tax account \$62.75; Precinct No. 3, Road Tax account, \$2.00; Precinct No. 5, Road Tax account, \$6.00; Precinct No. 11, Road Tax account, \$4.00; Precinct No. 13, Road Tax account, \$3.00; Bridge Repairs Fund \$35.70; Rio Grande Improvement Fund .22c; to the General Road Fund, Index Fund \$4.22, to the General County Fund, District No. 32, \$7.28 and District No. 39, \$11.42, to the General School Fund.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the County Clerk is hereby instructed, to issue a certified copy of the County Treasurer.

WHEREAS, There is a balance of \$1839.00 in the Special Bridge Fund, of the County of Valencia; and

WHEREAS, The same was levied for the construction of the Belen Bridge and repairs of the Los Lunas Bridge;

BE IT RESOLVED, That this fund be employed under the direction of the State Engineer in the widening and improvement of the Los Lunas Bridge; and

IT IS FURTHERMORE RESOLVED, That the County Clerk is hereby instructed to send a certified copy of this resolution to the State Engineer.

The quarterly reports of the following Justices of the Peace were approved:

Gabriel Marquez, Doroteo Gabaldon, Rafael Montano, Alfredo Baca and George H. Pradt.

The quarterly report of Raperto Jaramillo, Sheriff, was presented before the Board and approved.

The accounts shown on page 66 and 67, Record of General County Warrants were allowed by the Board.

The Board then adjourned subject to the call of the Chairman.

## OUR PUBLIC FORUM

### VIII.—C. E. Schaff

#### On Railway Investments

President Wilson, recently referring to our railroad  
problems, said in part: "They are indispensable to  
our whole economic life and railway securities are at  
the very heart of most investments, large and small, public  
and private, by individuals and by institutions. \* \* \*  
There is no other interest so central to the business wel-  
fare of the country, as this. No doubt, in the light of the  
new day, with its new understandings, the problem of the  
railroads will also be met and dealt with in a spirit of  
candor and justice."

When the first citizen of the land stresses the impor-  
tance of understanding and dealing justly with the rail-  
roads, certainly the American plowman can venture upon  
railway company, when asked to outline the relation of the public to rail-  
roads investments, said in part:

"It may be said that the railroad world is encumbered with a lot of  
phantoms which exist only in the popular fancy. For instance, because  
there have been a few so-called 'railroad magnates' whose names have figured  
prominently in finance, many people have come to believe that the railroads  
of the country are largely owned by a few rich men. As a matter of fact  
nothing could be farther from the truth. Out of the colossal sum of twenty  
billion dollars of American railroad securities, less than five per cent is now,  
or ever has been, in the hands of these men who have figured prominently in  
the newspaper headlines—while the other 95 per cent is in the hands of over  
two million investors, large and small, who in many instances have put the  
modest savings of a lifetime into these securities in order that they might  
lay away a competency for old age. When, therefore, the value of these  
securities is depressed or perchance destroyed, the hardship is a hundred-  
fold greater upon thousands of every-day citizens, than upon the handful of  
millionaires, good or bad, who have figured prominently in railroad circles.

Hundreds of millions of dollars of the assets of our great life and fire  
insurance companies, savings banks, trust companies, educational and fiduciary  
institutions are invested in railroad bonds—and the moment, therefore, that  
the soundness of these bonds is called into question the financial solidity of  
these myriad institutions—directly affecting the welfare of millions of policy-  
holders and bank depositors—is gravely menaced. During the last several  
years, many millions of dollars representing depreciated values, have been  
charged off the books of concerns like those enumerated above. American  
railroads have become a vital part of the very woof and fabric of the nation.  
Their continued efficiency is absolutely essential to the smallest community  
in the land.

In blindly striking at the railroads our blows fall not merely upon thou-  
sands who have committed no wrong, but, in the last analysis, upon ourselves.  
We should remember how interdependent we have come to be in this mighty  
republic of ours—that each is in truth become more and more his brother's  
keeper, and that we need to act and think circumspectly, lest in our mistaken  
zeal we destroy those who, like ourselves, need whatever of this world's  
goods the toil and sweat of years has bequeathed to them."
