Noted Character Crossed Divide.

All old-time stockmen, their employes and many citizens of the counties of Lincoln and Chaves knew Jim Hardeman, the old crippled wolf catcher, who operated in the two counties for years past. He was an eccentric character and his passing evoked a statement from a correspondent at Roswell, where he died, that will be read with interest by a multitude. The correspondence is as follows:

Roswell, N. M., April 16.—Jim Hardeman, an old-time wolf hunter, died at St. Mary's hospital this morning, following a stroke of paralysis ten days ago. The body is being held awaiting word from relatives in Texas.

Hardeman was a unique character. Born in Austin, he lived in Texas until 32 years of age and then came to Roswell from Milam county. That was twenty years ago and since then he has made the home of Fred Higgins, in this city, headquarters, although he was seldom in town. He spent most of the time in the cow camps of eastern New Mexico, hunting wolves for the hides and bounty.

As a successful wolf hunter, Hardeman stood alone. He has killed more wolves and thus done more for the cattle and sheep interests in this way than any other ten men. It is said that whenever a wolf howled around his camp, it was not long before its hide was drying. A reporter talked with Hardeman only a few days before he was stricken. He said: "I have a secret in wolf hunting that I believe no other man knows. I have never seen it worked by any other man and I have never told anyone, even my best friend. With this secret process, I can capture the smartest, shrewdest wolf alive. No wolf can escape me."

Continuing to talk of his experiences, the grizzled old plainsman said:

"I have in past years caught so many wolves at one time that it was useless to catch more, having reached the limit on the bounty. I have seen the time when I have made \$250 in one day in wolf hunting."

Hardeman came from one of the distinguished and honored families of Texas. It is said that Hardeman county, Texas, was named for his people. His mother, 86 years old, and a sister, live at Alva, Texas. Another sister lives at Oklahoma City. He lived a lonely life and was never married.

Fruit Crop is Safe.

So far as can be learned from all parts of the county, the fruit crop was not damaged by the late frosts, with the exception, perhaps, of a few peach trees that bloomed prematurely. Similar reports come from Chaves and Otero counties. Uncle Geo. Dillard, whose orchard on the Mesa is much exposed, says the buds on his peach trees are perfect, and if nothing happens during the next two weeks to injure them, there will be the most bountiful fruit crop seen for many years. A. C. Austin, of the Bonito Fruit Farm, reports his fruit safe, although this is the first year he failed to irrigate, having disposed of his water right to the railroad company.

Lincoln County Institute.

FINE POINTS ABOUT SOUPS

Delicate and Proper Blending of Savors is About the Chief Thing to Remember.

Often it is the small attentions or lack of them which makes or mars a soup. The methods have always been very clear to the initiated and the painstaking. But for those who do not know a few careful suggestions from Miss Beecher's Domestic Receipt Book, which are put in such a detailed form that they cannot but be helpful. She says:

The delicate and proper blending of savors is the chief art in good soup-making. Be sure and skim the grease off the soup when it first boils, or it will not become clear. Throw in a little salt to bring up the scum. Remove all grease.

Be sure and simmer softly and never let a soup boil hard.

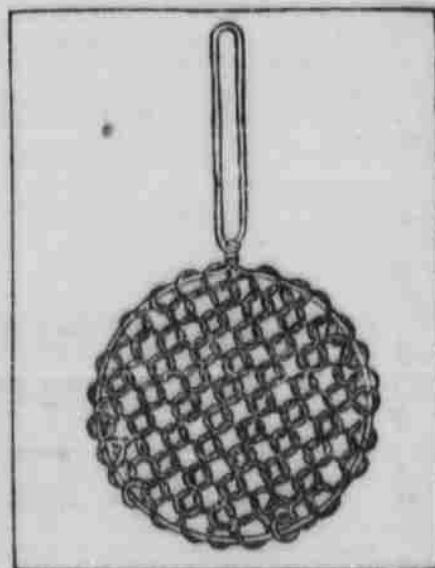
Put the meat into cold water and let it grow warm slowly. This dissolves the gelatine, allows the albumen to disengage and the scum to rise and diffuses the savory part of the meat. Be sure not to leave any fat floating on the surface. A quart of water to a pound of meat, or a little less, is a good rule. Soup made of uncooked meat is as good the second day if heated to the boiling point. If more water is needed use boiling hot water, as cold or lukewarm spoils the soup. It is thought that potato water is unhealthy, and therefore do not boil potatoes in soup, but boil elsewhere and add them when nearly cooked. The water in which poultry or fresh meat is boiled should be saved for gravies or soup next day. If you do not need it give it to the poor. Keep the vessel in which you boil soup covered tight, that the flavor be not lost.

Never leave soup in metal pots, as sometimes a family is thus poisoned. Thickened soups require more seasoning; nearly double the quantity used for thin soups.

KEEPS BROILING MEAT DRY

Platform of Rings Prevents the Steak From Being Immersed in Grease.

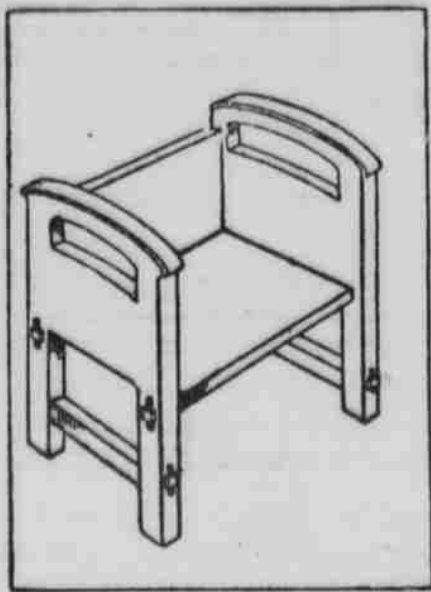

REALLY TWO CHAIRS IN ONE

Piece of Furniture Is Rocker in One Position and Stationary When Inverted.

From the number and variety of collapsible convertible and combination chairs of all sorts that are on the market, the designers would seem to have reached the end of their rope. Here comes a Californian, however, with an invertible chair which seems to be the simplest one of the lot. This is a combination rocker and standard chair, and all that is needed to transform it from one to the other is to turn it upside down, or right side up, whichever way you like to regard it. The chair is shaped like a piece of



mission furniture, and the rockers, which are short, serve as curved arms when it is stationary. They are protected when down by a metallic sheath, which also figures as an ornament when they are up. The back is so made that it slides up and down in a groove and can be adjusted in whichever position is required. Withal, the chair is a sturdy and attractive piece of furniture, and is likely to be popular on its merits.

FOR THOSE FOND OF STEW

"Pepper Pot" Makes a Combination That is a Welcome Addition to Any Menu.

One pound of cooked tripe, one small knuckle of veal, one onion, two potatoes, three-quarters of a cupful of chopped suet, one bay leaf, one blade mace, three quarts of cold water, a bunch of potherbs, salt and red pepper to taste, two tablespoonfuls of butter, one tablespoonful of cornstarch, one tablespoonful of flour. Wash the veal and potherbs and slice the onion, put them in a saucepan with the water and bring slowly to a boiling point. Remove the scum. Allow to simmer for four and a half hours. Strain and set away to cool. When cold, skim off the fat, add the potatoes, cut in small cubes; the tripe, cut in half-inch squares; one tablespoonful of chopped parsley and the meat cut from the knuckle, rejecting every bit of the fat and gristle. Put them on to boil just long enough before dinner to cook the potatoes; when boiling, season to taste with salt and red pepper. Blend the butter and flour and cornstarch together, then stir them into the boiling soup. Mix the chopped suet with one and a quarter cupfuls of flour and half a teaspoonful of salt, and add enough water to make a stiff dough. Form into tiny squares or dumplings and simmer in the soup for 20 minutes.

No Teary Eyes.

When peeling onions peel from the bottom upward and under the running cold water spigot. This will save the eyes from shedding tears and carry away all the odor that might arise or become attached to the fingers.

It is better than wearing a pair of cheap goggles and wearing rubber gloves on the hands to protect them from the strong odor.

THE STATEHOOD MUDDLE.

Our readers will recall that, when the New Mexico constitutional convention was in session, the News advocated the submission of amendments to the constitution to be voted upon separately from the main instrument. We particularly urged that the popular features—the initiative and referendum—be handled in this way, if they could not be submitted in the main body of the instrument. This proposition had strong support for a time in the convention, and some of the members contended for it to the end. However, the great constitutional (?) lawyers in that celebrated body contended that separate amendments might endanger the constitution itself, and the result was that these popular features never went to the people for an expression.

That we were right in our contention, we quote a no less authority than President Taft, and we are happy that we have the president supporting one principle that we advocated, even though unsuccessfully.

It is true the quotation that follows refers particularly to Arizona, but the principle involved is the same. The following statement from President Taft was given to the press by the president's secretary:

Charles D. Hiles, the new secretary to the President, gave to the Washington bureau of the New York Tribune the official statement of what the President said on Monday of this week to Congressman Flood and Houston concerning the Arizona constitution. This statement, telegraphed to the Tucson Citizen, follows:

"President Taft made a suggestion to Representatives Flood and Houston of Virginia and Tennessee respectively regarding the constitution of Arizona which should command the support of all true friends in that prospective state. These members called on the President and asked if he would object to the legislation so amending the statehood act as to relieve him of all necessity of approving Arizona's constitution. Mr. Taft told them that inasmuch as Congress had enacted the legislation it would be well within its rights to amend it, but he suggested as a counter proposition a plan, which, in his estimation, should commend generous support in both houses of congress.

"This suggestion was that Congress should adopt a resolu-

tion approving the constitution in all respects save that of the recall as applied to the judiciary and should provide that this feature be again submitted to the people of Arizona. He expressed the view that in voting for a constitution embodying the recall as applied to the judiciary, the people of Arizona were confronted with the alternative of so doing or of rejecting the constitution in its entirety. If they were afforded the opportunity to vote upon that question alone they would, in Mr. Taft's estimation, reject it, and it is his belief that they should be granted such an opportunity.

"Messrs. Flood and Houston failed to indicate their views of the President's suggestion altho they apparently came from the White House predisposed toward their own proposition to take the matter out of the hands of the chief executive."

Federals Occupy Agua Prieta.

The insurrectos deserted Agua Prieta Monday night, leaving many dead. Under the leadership of "Red" Lopez, they captured the town and held it until Monday night, leaving it after a furious battle with 1,200 federals under command of Col. Renaldo Diaz. It is said the insurrectos ran out of ammunition after having the battle won. The town of Agua Prieta is just across the line from Douglas, Arizona, and during the incessant firing Sunday and Monday a number of stray bullets wounded citizens of Douglas.

Diaz Blames Americans.

New York, April 20.—The New York Times today had a story from Mexico City giving Diaz's answer to the United States' demands. Diaz disclaims responsibility for the deaths and injury of Americans, and says they are due to their own acts or those of insurrectos. He says the insurrectos and Americans who joined them fired on Douglas (when the insurrectos took the town) and not Mexican federal troops.

He quotes John Dean, a citizen of Douglas, as making affidavit that "Red" Lopez's troop, which is responsible for the slaughter,

is mostly made up of Americans.

He says the United States officers refused to allow Mexican federals to occupy the custom house and other intrenched places but did allow insurrectos to fire from such intrenched places and even took arms from the federals and armed insurrectos with them.

He says Maj. Gardner at Agua Prieta did this.

Conditions at Juarez.

According to the Herald Madero's army surrounds Juarez on the northwest, west and southwest. It is anticipated fighting is being delayed pending peace negotiations.

Dr. Gomez sent an urgent message to Madero by way of El Paso at 2:30 yesterday afternoon cautioning him against attacking Juarez at present.

Gomez indicated that with the grave situation that has arisen in at Washington concerning the sensational Mexican reply to the American note, concerning firing into border towns, it is most necessary to prevent any further international complications.

Madero and his officers were near El Paso yesterday in conference with the peace commissioners.

HUSBANDS AS PROPERTY.

Considerable satisfaction will be felt by mankind generally at the argument advanced by a married woman in a suit involving another woman that "a husband is property to a wife and a family, and to win him away is nothing short of stealing." So it is the husband and not the wife that is the "human chattel." The admission controverts the theory upheld through generations of feminist protest against the serfdom imposed by man on his domestic partner through unequal marriage laws, says the New York Herald. The honest confession that the contrary is the case has been secured at last, but at a cost to feminine consistency which may be expected to bring its proper rebuke from every woman's club in the land. The fair plaintiff to secure her own ends has proved false to one of the cherished principles of her sex. But the truth is out. It is man who is the chattel, possession of whom is gained by the marriage ceremony and the right, title and interest to whom has been established in suits for non-support or for abandonment during marriage as well as in alimony proceedings afterward. His status as matrimonial property has, to be sure, long been a matter of court record.

Here is high valetry and variety with a vengeance! A roomclerk in an uptown palace hotel tells of a palace revolution that double discounts a jerked-beef mutiny in Rio Janeiro, says the New York Press. He says: "The valets and maids we get here are far more difficult to deal with than their masters and mistresses. Most of them insist upon having rooms with private baths and turn up their noses at anything else. It has happened at times that the servants' rooms were all occupied and we had to put a valet or a maid into a room with a bath, a regular guest room, charging the regular servant rate. The result is that every 'gentleman's gentleman' that comes here now demands a 'bath' as his inalienable right."

The coming generation, in our cities at least, is likely to have a more lively appreciation of the value of fresh air than the one that has preceded. Within the past three years nearly fifty cities have established open-air schools for the benefit of tuberculous children, says the Boston Transcript. Providence began it and other municipalities have followed on, though not all have developed the idea to the same extent. Boston, for instance, might profitably carry it farther than she has. Pawtucket, R. I., not only has a fine open-air school, but proposes to have at least one open-air room in every school building in the city, where delicate children can receive the tonic influence which nature so bountifully provides.

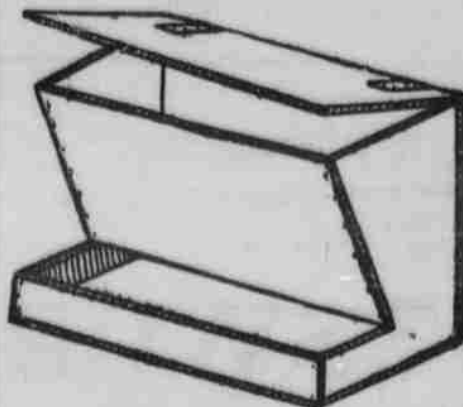
POULTRY

FEED HOPPER FOR POULTRY

Device Shown in Illustration Will Hold Several Days' Supply—Will Be Found Handy.

Where it is desired to keep the feed before the poultry, or any grits or shell, the hopper shown in illustration will be of value, as this may be built to hold several days' supply, says Homestead. By constructing partitions inside same, several kinds of feed may be fed from the same hopper.

The sides are constructed in the manner shown; cutting same from a board, that is the same width as the



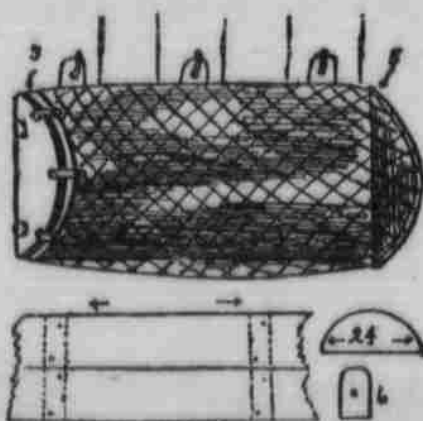
Feed Hopper for Poultry.

width desired for the hopper, to these are nailed boards to make an open tray at the bottom, with the balance of hopper inclosed. The feed placed in the top will automatically replace that in the tray, as fast as the tray is emptied. The tray should not be too wide, about a two and one-half inch space is ample; then the hens cannot spoil the grain by standing in the tray.

GREEN FOODS FOR CHICKENS

When Scarce or Difficult to Obtain It Is Wise to Allow None of Feed to Go to Waste.

When green food is scarce or difficult to obtain it pays to plan some way to prevent its being wasted. Cut two pieces for the ends of a box, each twenty-four inches long, getting proper curve by using a compass. Make the back of the holder of thin boards four feet long and twenty-four inches wide, and nail one end in place, hing-

ing the other end and using small straps of leather to hold it shut. Cover the holder with coarse mesh wire netting and hang it in a convenient place high enough so that the fowls cannot roost on it, yet so that they can feed from it readily. Use hangers of wood, tin or leather.

This box will enable the fowls to pick at the green stuff, whether it is clover, grass or chopped cabbage, without danger of the mass becoming soiled or destroyed by the chickens scratching in it.

PROTECT THE YOUNG CHICKS

Loss Through Depredations by Crows, Hawks, Cats and Other Enemies May Be Avoided.

A covered coop or yard is advisable on most farms for raising young chicks. The loss through depredations by crows, hawks, cats and other enemies is very large, and most of this can be avoided by raising the chicks in well protected coops or yards, says Farm and Home.

A yard that will give sufficient protection should be inclosed on sides and top. The first three feet of netting should be of one-inch mesh, the balance of two-inch. Either this netting or a board should be buried several inches in the ground, so that skunks cannot dig under. In a yard 20x40 200 chicks may be raised until large enough to take care of themselves.

Where brooders and individual houses are used a small covered yard should be attached to each house and

the same device should be adopted for individual coops. Make the framework of furring strips 1x2 inches and 6 to 8 feet long.

Cover the sides with inch mesh netting 18 inches high. Put a ridge pole in the center, so that you can set board shutters against them. These may be made of half-inch boards and will give needed shade, as well as protection from storms.

This yard should be permanently attached to the coops. After the chicks are old enough to care for themselves, let them out during the day by raising up one end, and after they go in at night they are easily shut up. It is only ten seconds' work to move the coop daily two feet onto fresh grass.

Experiment in Minnesota.

At the Minnesota experiment station farm at Crookston, 50 Leghorn pullets fed on a dry mash from December 12 to February 12, laid an average of 18.2 eggs per day at an average cost of 7.8 cents per dozen. During the same period a similar lot on a wet mash ration laid an average of 19.6 eggs per day, at a cost of 6.7 cents per dozen. With lots of 100 hens each, Leghorns gave a total profit for four months of \$89.10 and Plymouth Rocks of \$54.94. On a ration of corn, oats, shorts and skim milk, 12 Plymouth Rock cockerels in three weeks' time made an average gain per bird of two pounds, at a cost of 4.35 cents per pound. On a similar ration a lot of 12 Leghorn cockerels made an average gain of 1.18 pounds per bird, at a cost of 4.9 cents per pound.

Geese More Profitable.

Geese will undoubtedly prove more profitable than chickens or turkeys, considering the amount of the cost of feed and labor, for they do not require near so much care and attention as fowls and the feed is a small consideration, for their principal food is grass, weeds, clover, alfalfa and such.

MUST BE PERFECTION

SALAD NEVER A DISH THAT CAN BE SLIGHTED.

Clear Judgment and Much Care for This Absolutely Indispensable Adjunct of the Modern Dinner Table.

Among the luxuries of our bills of fare there is not one that is more appreciated by everyone than a well-made salad; there is no department of cooking that demands clearer judgment in making and serving than this same salad; while all kinds, from the richest to the simplest, depend on the materials selected and their wise combination.

All salads should be served very cold and long standing injures them. Therefore make the dressing and place it near the ice in the cooler before preparing the salad proper. When ready to serve, chill the bowl and the individual salad plate if you would have your salad at its best.

Bread and butter sandwiches or Boston brown bread thinly sliced and delicately spread with fresh butter and filled with a shredded lettuce leaf sprinkled with ground nuts may be served with any salad. But with lobster, shrimp or fish salad, "brunettes" are the proper caper; they are made from the white bread and butter sandwiches filled with Neufchatel and minced cress. Mutton sandwiches are liked with vegetable salads. They are seasoned with herbs, as mint, pepper grass, celery, salt, curry and minced pickles.

For potato salad prepare cheese straws, or spread graham bread with a mixture of snappy cheese and the hard boiled yolk of eggs and seasoning. The home-made cheese straws are far better than the made ones, that are sold in cartons, and will keep as well; they may be reheated just before using.

Miss Grauel's recipe for cheese straws: These are particularly nice, and, if cut evenly, look dainty. Grate three tablespoonfuls of dry, highly seasoned cheese, to it put one-half pint of sifted flour seasoned with salt and paprika; rub together with a tablespoon of butter and cold water as for pastry. Turn onto the floured baking board and roll out thin. Cut half the paste into straws and the rest into rings. Bake until yellow and crisp in a moderate oven and serve with the straws laid in the rings.

Rich and elaborate salads are served as a course by themselves, but when a salad is to accompany a meat course, it should be simple in character and served on individual salad plates. Very often the salad is placed on such plates and the dressing passed with it on a separate boat or bowl; this manner has much to commend it.

With duck, rich fish and water fowl, acid salads are served. These are made with a good allowance of lime, lemon juice or Tarragon vinegar. Cheese is passed with all green salads and black coffee and saltines go with all accompaniments.

Sweet drinks, as punch and fruit drinks, are never served with fruit or sweet salad.

Philadelphia Ice Cream.

Allow a quarter of a good vanilla bean and seven ounces of sugar to each quart of cream. Split the bean in halves, scrape out the seeds and mix them with the sugar. Cut the pod into small pieces, add to it one-half the cream, add the sugar and stir in a double boiler over the fire until the sugar is thoroughly dissolved and the cream hot. Strain and stand aside to cool. When cold add the remaining cream, turn the mixture into the freezing can, pack and turn rapidly until the mixture begins to freeze, keeping the motion perfectly even. Turn more slowly for a few moments, remove the dasher, repack and stand aside for two hours to mellow.
