## The Farmers' Free List.

The democrats in congress do well when they begin tariff revision by putting upon the free list something like one hundred articles largely consumed by farmers. The farmer has been the chief sufferer from the principle of protection and it is only fair that relief should begin with him. The reciprocity treaty is a God-send to him, not so much because it confers great benefits upon him but because it leads to greater reductions. The opponents of the reciprocity agreement have tried to hide behind the farmer, but the "farmers' free list" will drive them from under cover and compel them to vote with the democrats or quit talking about the farmer. Look at the list!

"Plows, harrows, headers, harvesters, reapers, threshing machines, cotton gins and other agricultural implements—15 per cent ad valorem.

"Cotton bagging, gunny cloth and similar fabrics used as coverings, etc.—6-10 of a cent per square yard."

"Grain, buff and split leather—7½ per cent.

"Band, bond, belting, rough and sole leather—5 per cent.

"Boots and shoes made of bovine cattle hides or skins—10 per cent.

"Harness, saddles and saddlery—20 per cent.

"Leather cut into shoe uppers or vamps, etc.—10 per cent. additional duty.

"Barbed fence wire—3-4 of a cent a pound.

"Wire rods, strands or wire rope, woven wire for fencing and other kinds of wire suitable for fencing—3-10 to 6-10 of a cent per pound.

"Fresh beef, veal, mutton, lamb, pork and meats of all kinds—1½ cents per pound.

"Salted, pickled, dried, dressed and preserved meats—25 per cent ad valorem.

"Bacon, hams and shoulders—4 cents a pound.

"Lard—1½ cents a pound.

"Sausage and sausage meats—25 per cent ad valorem.

"Buckwheat flour, wheat flour and semolina—25 per cent.

"Corn meal—40 cents per 100 pounds.

"Rye flour—½ of a cent a pound.

"Oatmeal and rolled oats—1 cent a pound.

"Biscuits, bread, wafers and similar articles, not sweetened—20 per cent.

"Sewing machines—45 per cent.

"Salt (in bulk)—7 cents per 100 pounds.

"Salt (in bags, sacks or barrels)—11 cents per 100 pounds.

"Shingles—50 cents per 1,000.

"Laths—20 cents per 1,000.

"Timber (hewn, sided or

squared, and round timber used for spars or in building wharves)—½ of a cent per cubic foot.

"Sawed boards, planks, deals and other lumber (rough)—50 cents to \$1.25 per 1,000 feet board measure.

"Sawed boards, planks, deals and other lumber (dressed)—50 cents to \$1.50 per 1,000 feet board measure.

The above list shows the additions that are to be made to the free list with the tariff now collected. Meat alone will be a great boon. The fangs of the beef trust will be drawn when the consumer can buy his meat in the open market. The beef trust has taxed the farmer both ways, in buying and in selling. The meat buyers of the city as well as the farmers will be benefited by free meat. Let the good work go on; the democrats are making an excellent beginning. —Commoner.

## California Will Try New Law.

The initiative, referendum and recall for all cities and towns in California becomes a law in thirty days. Governor Johnson has signed the measure passed by the legislature. All elective municipal officers may be recalled four months after they assume office upon petition of twenty-five per cent of the registered voters of the town. The official sought to be recalled will be subject to an election and must leave office immediately if another man receives the majority of votes. The initiative and referendum can be invoked upon petition of 25 per cent of the legislators. Unless the governing body passes or vetoes the measures desired within thirty days, an election will be held to enable the people to pass upon the measures. If the petition carries only 10 per cent of the voters and the governing body refuses to act, the measures come up for a vote of the people at the next regular municipal election.

## Col. Wiggins Bounds Texas.

In an argument the other day about the boundaries of the state of Texas, Col. Wiggins was asked to bound the state and settled the dispute as follows: "On the north by the Redman and tomahawk, sah; on the west by hot tamales, cactus and chile con carne, sah; on the east by the huckleberry swamps and alligators of Louisiana and Arkansas, sah; on the south by the Gulf of Mexico—and if it wasn't for that measly pond of water, would extend to the South Pole, sah. Texas is a wolf. It's her duty to howl. She's one of the old blue hen chickens, sah."

### THE STAY AT HOME.

To travel with a well-filled purse, a well-stocked mind, a sharp and intelligent curiosity—that is a delight. To take a sea trip as a tonic—that is rational, too. Goldsmith found it so and cried: "The first, best country ever is at home."

After deep thought Prof. Prentiss C. Hoyt, of Clark College, propounds the opinion that there is no such thing as American humor. It is not American, but just individual and personal, thinks the professor. It may argue some temerity to contradict a college professor. But really Professor Clark gets on debatable ground in denying the existence of that commonly recognized entity, American humor. Artemus Ward and Mark Twain had their separate individualities; but they had their common national characteristic, and their fun is racy of the soil it sprang from.

Sympathy for that young woman whose nose freezes when she tries to sleep out of doors should lead some philanthropic inventor to devise a workable nose muff.

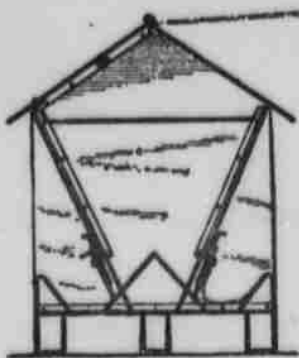

### FEED APPARATUS FOR SWINE

Device Adapted for Feeding Cattle, But More Particularly Hogs—Delivery Is Regulated.

Device shown in the illustration, the idea of Charles G. Howard of Exeter, Neb., provides an apparatus for feeding cattle and more particularly swine, which may be arranged to regulate the rate of delivery of the food; provide an apparatus where the door for delivering the food may be readily and quickly adjusted; and provides a construction which is simple, economical, and durable, says the Scientific American. So far as possible all the members shown in the engraving are constructed from

metal, the sides and top, as well as the framing channels below the floor of the troughs, being of sheet metal, while the rods, bolts, and disk forming the lock for the doors are preferably formed of bar and plate metal.

### USEFUL RUBBER CURRY COMB

Home-Made Implement Is One of Best Things for Removing Loose Hairs From Horse.

One of the best things for removing the loose hairs from a horse when he is shedding is a rubber having an uneven surface, writes Earl Streit of Newark, Ohio, in the Popular Mechanics. A comb of this kind can be made of a block of wood, 3/4 inch thick, 3

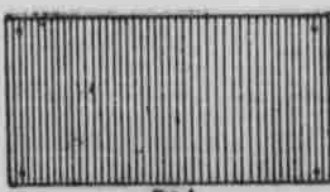

or 4 inches wide and 6 inches long. Tack a piece of corrugated rubber, a piece of rubber stair pad will do, on one surface of the block. Make a handle and fasten it to the other side of the block. The rubber tacked to the block is shown in Fig. 1 and the side view showing the handle in Fig. 2.

### Bordeaux Mixture Formula.

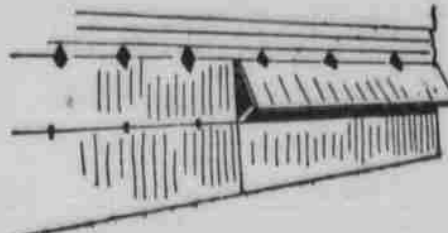
There are a number of formulas for Bordeaux mixture, but the standard formula now recommended by the majority of experiment stations for use against most fungous diseases is four pounds of copper sulphate, four pounds of lime and fifty gallons of water. This does not mean that it is absolutely necessary to make up the mixture in 50-gallon amounts. If we need only 50 gallons of the mixture then we would use four pounds each of the sulphate and lime and 50 gallons of water. If we need only 25 gallons of the mixture we would use two pounds each of the sulphate and lime and 25 gallons of water.

### VENTILATE THE SHEEP SHED

Structure Should Be So Arranged So As to Give Necessary Fresh Air and Exclude Heavy Rains.

A building devoted to sheep should be arranged so as to give the desired fresh air and prevent the beating rains from getting inside. Ordinary door arrangements will not afford this protection.

Windows or the upper part of the building may be fixed with strong

hinges so as to be pushed out and propped open, allowing the fresh air to enter at the bottom of the opening. The top of this kind of a shed may be left open the greater part of the time without harming the flock at all.

### GOOD FITTINGS FOR STABLES

Buildings Should Be Well Lighted and High Enough for Ample Ventilation—Size of Doors.

The stables for the stock should be well lighted, high enough for ample ventilation and the stalls wide and long enough for the stock to rest in comfort. The stable doors should be fully four feet in width, hung on rollers; this will prevent an animal from being injured in passing in or out of a half-open door. The winter doors should be solid and slotted in summer. The following dimensions will prove satisfactory: Width of double stall with stanchions for cows, 6 feet; width of feed trough, 18 inches; width of feed passage between two rows of cattle, 4 feet; length of stall from stanchion to gutter for small cows, 5 feet; length of stall from stanchion to gutter for large cows, 6 feet; length of partitions between stalls, 4 feet; width of manure gutter in cow stable, 12 inches; depth of gutter, 8 inches, and walk behind cows, 2 feet. Width of stall for horses, 5 feet; length of stall for horses, 12 feet; size of loose box for mare with colt, 10x12 feet, and size of loose box for cow and calf, 8x10 feet.

A concrete floor put down on a properly graded 8-inch base of cracked stone is not too hard if the cattle are well bedded. The best floor for horses is one of red clay, just made moist enough to pack down firm. A clay floor is best for horses' feet. A stone floor is too hard, and a board floor is too dry. The stable should face south; the doors should open out upon a well-sheltered, dry yard, securely fenced. Running water in the yard, with drain to carry off the overflow, is to be preferred to water in the stable.

### DO NOT KILL OUT BOB WHITE

Quail Is Strong Ally of Farmer in Fight Against Weeds and If Undisturbed Becomes Tame.

They most certainly should not be killed out. On the other hand they will repay bountifully all effort expended in protecting them and favoring their increase. The farmer should never allow more to be shot for game than the surplus stock, being sure to leave plenty of birds for the next year's nesting. The live birds on the farm are worth much more than the dead birds on the table however well they may be cooked.

The Bobwhite or quail is naturally trustful and where undisturbed becomes remarkably tame. He will rear his young and spend his days close to human dwellings, adding cheer by his merry whistle. More important than this, however, from the money standpoint, the Bobwhite is a strong ally of the farmer in the fight against weeds.

### THE RECALL.

Much has been said about the recall feature in the Arizona constitution, and particularly as it applies to the judiciary. The federal authorities are said to be much opposed to this proposition. Even Mr. Roosevelt, who likes to be styled the progressive of progressives, mildly censured the people of Arizona for incorporating that popular feature in their constitution. Yet, when this self-same speaker reached California he most heartily approved of the feature in that state.

For our part, while only tentatively endorsing the recall, we are bound to confess that we fail to see any reason for alarm over the question. It may be abused at times, yes; but if its operations should be productive of worse conditions than those from which we are now suffering, then God help the American people! And in this connection, it appears only fair to say that if the recall should be applied to any class of officials the judiciary is certainly not the class that should be exempt. For the judiciary the people have a high regard, which is as it should be, but no reverence, as to a divine institution. When it is wrong, as it sometimes is, it should have no more right to sit back upon its dignity and say "what are you going to do about it?" than any other class of officials. Every official is the servant of the people, and it is a well recognized principle that a servant is responsible to his master.

To those who mildly endorse the recall, but insist that the touch of man should not profane the judicial ermine, we wish to cite one case, and then if they agree—and how they demands it—that the recall should be invoked in this particular case, why not make it applicable to all flagrant abuses of a similar character?

All the country knows of the Lorimer scandal and most people believe he obtained his seat in the United States senate by the most questionable methods. A number of the members of the Illinois assembly, indeed, confessed to accepting bribes in return for their support of Lorimer. This matter was presented to the United States senate, but that body white-washed the Illinois senator, because, forsooth, it was not shown that Lorimer had a personal knowledge of the bribegiving. Since that verdict, however, new evidence has been secured, and the names of the men who put up the slush fund discovered. The Illinois assembly issued subpoenas for these men, and just here the court got in a body blow.

These men, their own conscience accusing them, naturally, did not want to undergo the in-

quisition, and to avoid doing so went before a Chicago judge, secured a habeas corpus and thus tied the hands of the people of Illinois, and closed their mouths, as well; for, be it understood, it is not the wisest policy to criticize courts. The immunity bath thus granted by the court is the keystone of their rascality; and, dear reader, do you suppose the honest people of Illinois would not like an opportunity to recall that judge? Do the people of Illinois believe that judge is any better, any freer from the temptations that assail all humanity, any more likely to be infallible, simply because he is on the bench, than he was before he donned the ermine? In other words, does the elevation of any man to the bench allay his prejudices and render him incapable of doing wrong? If these questions can be answered in the affirmative, then the recall should not apply to the judiciary.

H. B. Holt, a leading attorney of Las Cruces, is representing clients in the court. Mr. Holt was district attorney of this district some years ago, and it will be remembered that he made things interesting for the evil-doer.

Attorney A. H. Hudspeth and Martin B. Goodin went to Lincoln Sunday, to attend the regular session of probate court the following day. They returned Wednesday and Mr. Goodin left for his home in Missouri, while Mr. Hudspeth attends court here.

### \$15,000 Bond Approved.

"I shall approve the bond." Such were the words of the judge at the conclusion of the testimony in the bond hearing Monday afternoon. The result was to the people of Lincoln as great a surprise as it was a disappointment to the people of Carrizozo. So much of a surprise was it to the people of Lincoln that they had come prepared to file a new bond should the judge fail to approve the one under consideration. There is no use to deny the fact that gloom pervaded the hearts of the people who fondly hoped for a different result. Their cup is full to the brim; yea, verily, it runneth over.

The approval by the court of the \$15,000 indemnity bond stops work on the county buildings until such time as the courts of final resort pass upon the questions at issue. When that will be no one can tell, and if the end is as far from us as the beginning few need care. In the meantime Lincoln retains the records, Carrizozo gets the court and an armistice has been declared.

### Peace Negotiations.

Judge Francisco Carbajal, the peace envoy from Mexico City arrived in El Paso on the 3rd inst., and was joined soon after by Gov. Miguel Ahumada, of Chihuahua. Gov. Ahumada will act only in an advisory capacity to Judge Carbajal.

Dr. Vasquez Gomez, the envoy of the revolutionists, as well as his advisors, were all in El Paso awaiting to begin the conference.

It is understood both Carbajal and Gomez have full powers to proceed and conclude peace if they can agree under the instructions given them by their principals.

The conference opened yesterday across the river in a cottonwood grove on the river bank below the dam, and opposite the switch tower at the crossing of the Southern Pacific and E. P. & S. W. railways. This location is between Juarez, occupied by the federal troops, and the main camp of the insurrecto troops up the river where Madero maintains his headquarters.

## HOW TO CARE FOR THE FEET

Nothing So Good as Alcohol Rub After Pedal Extremities Have Been Chilled.

No other part of the body except the waist suffers so much abuse and distortion as the feet. They are susceptible to all sorts of deformities and the subject of all sorts of neglect.

Many people do not bathe them sufficiently often, do not change their stockings with sufficient frequency and do not care for them in other ways as they should.

The soldier who cares for his feet is the one who holds out on the march, and many foreign armies have doctors who see that the men care for their feet. The dead skin which hardens and produces callous spots needs to be removed twice a day if the feet perspire freely.

To rub the feet with alcohol refreshes them wonderfully, and nothing is as good for them as a vigorous alcohol rub after they have been wet or chilled.

A rub with cocoa butter is a fine thing for the feet at all times. Get a cake of this and give them a five-minute rub at least once a week after the daily bath and you will save yourself many a groan.

We should wear rubbers whenever we need them and take them off as soon as we can. The feet must be kept warm and dry.

A famous physician is reported as saying that his income would dwindle to a half if women kept their feet warm. And it may be added that a woman's chance of being a comfortable soul and a jolly person to have around would be improved by three halves if she would wear the right kind of shoes, care for them and her feet properly and try to have everybody else do the same.—New York Mail.

### Almond Tarts.

For tarts make shells of rich puff paste or get patties. Filling for one dozen tarts: Put three tablespoonfuls of almond paste in a double boiler with a little milk to dissolve; add half a pint of rich milk and lumps of butter. When it boils add the beaten yolks of two eggs mixed with three tablespoonfuls of sugar and two of flour; let boil till thick; when cool, add fifteen cents' worth of ground almonds and a few drops of almond extract; fill shells. Whip the whites of the two eggs stiff, add two tablespoonfuls of sugar, spread top and sides of tarts, sprinkle with powdered sugar and set in oven till a light brown.

### Light Fruit Pudding.

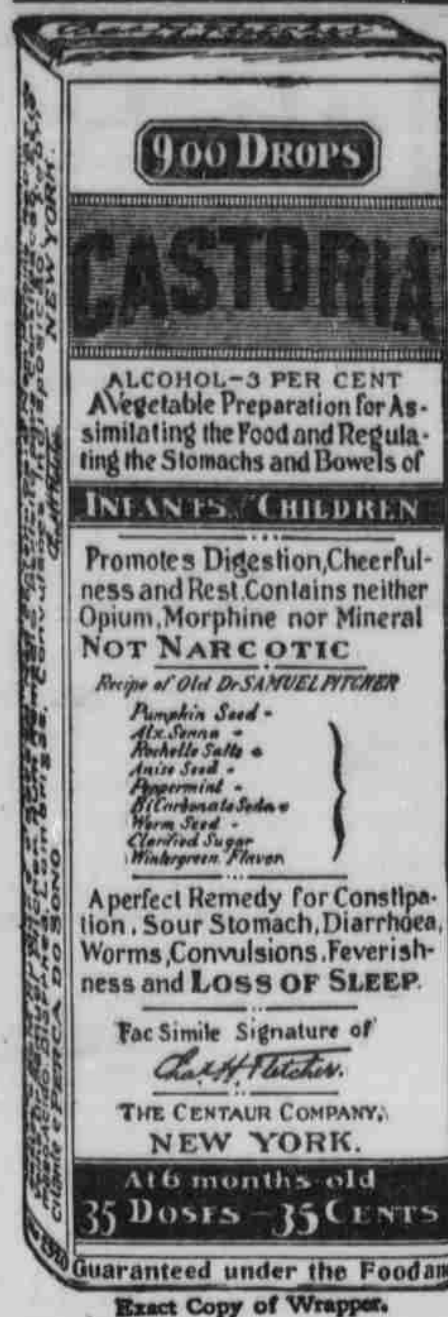
Work one-half cup of butter until creamy, add two tablespoonfuls of sugar, two eggs well beaten, one cupful of milk and two cupfuls of flour mixed and sifted with three teaspoonfuls of baking powder; then add three-fourths of a cupful of raisins seeded and cut in pieces; one-fourth of a cupful of citron thinly sliced; fruit to be dredged with one-fourth of a cupful of flour. Turn into a buttered melon mold, tie down cover and steam one and one-half hours. Mold should not be more than two-thirds full.

### Fudge Frosting.

One and one-half tablespoons butter, one-half cup unsweetened cocoa, one-fourth cup confectionery sugar, a few grains of salt, one-fourth cup of milk, one-half teaspoon vanilla. Add cocoa, sugar, salt and milk, heat to boiling point; let boil for eight minutes; remove from fire and beat until creamy; add vanilla and pour over cake.

### Apple Snowballs.

Boil a large cupful of rice in milk until three-quarters done, then strain it off. Pare and core as many apples as needed, put a clove and a little sugar into each apple and pour some rice around it. Tie each ball in a separate cloth and boil in fair water until the apples are tender. Turn onto plates and serve with good brandy sauce.

waists. The dressmakers say that  
bretelles are going to be very much in

son. They come in an entirely new

### Lady Fingers.

Beat the yolks of four eggs until  
lemon colored and thick. Add one-  
half cup of fine sugar, a pinch of salt  
and a half teaspoonful of vanilla and  
beat until very light. Whip the whites  
of the eggs until stiff, and dry and mix  
with the yolks. Sift in three-quarters  
of a cup of pastry flour, already sifted  
before measuring, and fold in lightly.  
Put the mixture into a pastry bag and  
press the batter through into strips  
about an inch wide and three inches  
long, on a tin sheet or an inverted  
dripping pan, covered with white pa-  
per. Sprinkle with powdered sugar  
and bake in a moderate oven.

#### Court Opened Monday.

District court for Lincoln county opened Monday in the school building, Judge Edward R. Wright presiding. The grand jury was called and found to be one short. A special venire was issued and William Kahler, Jr., was accepted. The panel completed, T. H. Kirkland was appointed foreman, after which the grand jury was sworn, charged and put to work.

The hearing on the \$15,000.00 bond in the county seat injunction case was taken up, a number of witnesses examined, and at the conclusion of the testimony, the court approved the bond, thus tying up the work on the county building for an indefinite period.

The court, consulting with the members of the bar, then proceeded to set the criminal and civil dockets. No cases were set earlier than next week, at which time the petit jury will be called.

Eleven criminal cases were set for Monday, the 8th; eight were set for Thursday, the 11th; four were set for Monday, the 15th; four were passed for the term; five were dropped with leave to reinstate; four were continued; nolle entered in three and three passed temporarily.

The grand jury had returned seven true bills up to 2:30 Tuesday afternoon, at which time the court took a recess until Saturday morning. Judge Wright returning to Alamogordo. A host of witnesses swarm around the court house, and, as it has been a year since a court was held in this county, the grand jury has a great deal to do, and will likely return a number of bills.

The civil docket was called, and disposed of quite easily, only one possible case to require a jury. The civil docket will take up a very small portion of the court's time, as it will consist principally of motions, reports and defaults.
