Silver City:

The county seat is Silver City, situated at the foot of Pinos Altos, in the beautiful Chihushua valley. All the northern half of the county and parts of Socorro county and Arizona are di-rectly tributary to it, and it outlits dozens of surrounding camps. It lies at the end of a branch line of the Santa Fe road, and exjoys the advantages accruing to every large supply depot. Its banks, court house, hospitals, stores, public schools, hotels and other buildings of a public and semi-public character would do credit to an eastern county seat. Since the opening of the Santa Rita copper mines in 1800 it has been a town site, but the energy of the last dec ade has done more for its advancement than all the previous years. This method of developing a water supply is worthy of a complete and technical description. Space however does not permit this. The water is stopped on the bel rock by sub-drains. The lo-cation is in a wide swale or shallow val-ley leading down from the Pinos Altos towards Silver City. No water what-ever runs on the surface. This under-drainage is an important factor in the economic development of the arid west. Suver City is a notside example. Not only has she an ample supply for domestic and sanitary purposes of a large city, sot dependent on chance showers, but through her pumping system she is relieved as much as possible from danger of fires.

By the authority of the national thought they bring—Days that days that sweeten ational Irrigation Congress is executive committee, the fourth National Irrigation Congress is hereby called to meet in the city of Albuquerque, N. M. for the four days beginning September 16, 1895.

The present year is proving to be the most remarkable in the history of American irrigation. It has seen a wonderful awakening of popular interest in the cause throughout the east, resulting in the organization of most potential forces for the purpose of cooperating with the western people; the enactment of well considered irrigation laws in eight states, and the creation of administrative systems in five of them; the recognition of the pressing nature of the problem by the departments of interior and agriculture under whose direction a national board of irrigation has been formed from officials in various departments of the government.

These splendid evidences of the triumphant progress of the irrigation cause demand a large representative and effective session of the irrigation congress in 1896. A further reason for such a gathering is the fact that the presidential campaign of 1896 will be maugurated previous to the assembling of another session of this body, and that it is thus necessary to formulate at Albuquerque the demands which the friends of irrigation will desire to make upon the great polit-

ical parties of the nation. In view of the nature of the oppurtunity, a program of extraordinary variety, interest and importance will be arranged, and it s anticipated that this session of the congress will be more widely useful and influential than the previous convention at Salt Lake County's wealth producing resources, her incomparable sanitary advantages, beautiful scenery, broad ranges, bright, rapid rivers and enterprising people. Between the interior and exterior walls of the safe a large amount of hydraulic cement, combined with other ingredients, usually according to a secret recipe, is packed solidly. In case of fire the theory is that the water in the cement-sbont 48 per cent-will, owing drical and from an inch up to two inches in diameter.

Combination locks are now used exclusively. The mechanism of most of them is extremely simple. In one look there are a number of round brass disks or "tumblers," each pivoted at the cen-ter on a small shaft which runs through the safe door and connects with the lock knob. Each tumbler has a slit in it just the size of the steel arm which controls the bolts and reaching nearly back to the center. When all these slits are together and pointing in exactly the same direction the arm slips into them and the bolts can be thrown. But if the slit in a single one of the tumblers is even a thousandth of an inch out of line the arm will not slip back. The disks are set a short distance apart and small screws with big heads are fastened at random over them. As these strike together in turning the tumblers whirl, and a man might turn the lock knob a thousand years without once getting the alits in all the tumblers together. But the man who knows just how far to turn one way and then how far back again according to the combination numbers has no trouble at all.

The combination and numbers are easily changed by changing the screws in the disk. Many of the best safes and vaults are now being provided with time locks. Two and sometimes three clocks are inclosed in glass cases just inside of the safe door. When the door is locked, no one can open it again patil the clock hands have traveled the set distance around the dial and touched a little trigger which releases the bolts. More than one clock is used, so that if one rans down the others will go on and perform their doty. In the big banks the vaults are closed about 5 o'clock in the evening and set to open a little before 9 o'clock in the morning. Food Tin Cans.

In a recent government report by Dr. H. W. Wiley it is stated that in Germany the law requires that the tine employed for holding canned goods shall not contain more than I per cent of lead, while in this country there is no restriction whatever in regard to the character of the tin used, the result of this latter fact being the employment of cans in some cases containing as high as 12 per cent of lead. This practice prevails, notwithstanding the unanimity among physiologists as to the effect of lead salts other trying diseases well known to physicians being the direct effects of continual exposure of the system to any such minute portions of lead salts. It is said to be possible to exclude the latter by requiring that the tin shall not contain more than, say, 1 1/2 per cent of lead; also that the solder be as free

from lead as possible. In Germany the solder made use of in sealing the cans is not allowed to con-tain over 10 per cent of lead, while in this country the analysis of numerous samples of the solder applied shows that it contains fully 50 per cent of lead, in addition to this being the lack of care to prevent such solder from coming into contact with the contents of the can, and large surfaces of solder on the seams are often found exposed to the action of the acid contents of the can.

Tourists' Gold In Italy. At the British embassy to the king of Italy a calculation was made some time ago of the amount of gold brought by travelers into Italy every year. By far the largest number of these travelers come from England and the United States. The calculations made it evident that no less than £20,000,000, or \$100, 000,000, are brought into this country and left here by these travelers.
