## THE KNOWLES ROAD

Eddy County Border Town to be Headquarters of Line from Tucumcari Toward Mexican Gulf

The following is clipped from the Register-Tribune of the 4th inst and is the latest on a railway to Knowles:

Texico, New Mexico.—Railroad construction on the new road which is to run from Tucumcari to Kerrville, Texas, connecting with Aransas Pass line in the latter town and thence on to the Gulf of Mexico, has been ordered to begin at once. The financing of the project has been completed by an understanding reached with a syndicate of French bankers who through their Boston agents are to take over the whole bond issue.

This road was first projected under the name of the Rock Island, Farwell and Gulf railway, but since the later developments in the organization of the new road the name has been changed to the Texas, New Mexico and Pacific railway.

Beginning at Tucumcari, the road will run to Texico, and thence along the eastern boundary of New Mexico, to Knowles Eddy county. Still continuing south the crossing of the Texas and Pacific line will be made in

points along the line.

The Current is a little pessimistic concerning any project promoted by M. J. Healy, but hopes he will at least "make good" once and obtain the assistance of some of the moneyed interests of the country. Of course, this line must be built by the Rock Island or it will never be built, for "wind jamming" cannot build a railway.

## WHERE THEY SPENT THE FOURTH

A Large Number of our Citizens Went to Loving, Others to Queen Others to Artesia and Various Points in the County.

GOOD TIMES THE ORDER OF THE DAY

About 100 of the people of Carlsbad visited Loving on the Fourth to partake of Loving hospitality and were well rewarded for their trip. The train carrying the crowd with the Firemen's Cornet band left Carlsbad at 7 A. M., and reached Loving before the incoming of the farmers to the picnic grounds, so there were few in the town except Carlsbad people; about two-thirds of whom were members of the fair sex—ladies and children predominating among the visitors. The crowd soon found its way to the grounds, near the large Methodist church, where the savory smell of barbecued meats led one to the conclusion that the Carlsbad people had mouths and used them for other purposes than talking. The Methodist people brought out seats under a large canvass and the band soon made the valley resound with patriotic airs, such as come from a twenty-five piece band led by such a master as Joe Bunch. It was not long until the crowd gathered and the speaking commenced. Rev. Wheeler introduced Hon. D. G. Grantham, who delivered a speech that would have done credit to any celebration in the United States. He exhibited a fac simile copy of the Declaration of Independence which contained the names of the signers just as written, all of which is made possible today by the aid of photography. He was followed by Major E. P. Bujac, who also delivered a stirring and patriotic address. Both gentlemen could not have had more appreciative audiences anywhere, for Loving contains many well read people. Miss Hepler then recited that stirring poem "The Liberty Bell." After the assembly was dismissed the ring riding tournament commenced and the prize was won by Carl Smith. There were five contestants Dean Smith being second in the race.

There were many from Carlsbad in autos and a large number from Malaga. The main body of Carlsbad people left on the

four o'clock train for home and attended the ball game and band concert in the evening.

Mention should be made of the excellent dinner which consisted of barbecue meats, pies, cakes, pickles, coffee, and in fact, every good thing that could tickle the palate and satisfy the appetite. Many pronounced the dinner the best ever served at a like occasion in Eddy county.

Quite a large number of people gathered at Geyser Spring, Farrell & Russell ranch, on the Fourth and Tom Sanford, of Malaga, was the speaker. There were 200 at the doings and it was one of the best celebrations in the county.

About 200 people met at Queen the 5th and celebrated in regular mountain style. The mail carrier took out ice the Fourth and the women folks made barrels of ice cream and lemonade. The main sport was goat roping, the first money being won by Buford Polk and second money by John McCollum. There was singing and dancing which lasted until the morning of the 6th.

A party consisting of M. Livingston, V. H. Lusk and their cow outfits and George M. Pendleton and family, visited the Hagerman dam seventeen miles southeast on the river, the Fourth. Mr. Livingston, Hong Lusk, Buck Marvin, Dolph Lusk and Sam Lusk went in the new five passenger Buick recently purchased by Mr. Livingston. They shut the water from the canal and got fish galore.

A Settler's picnic was held at the Lone Tree schoolhouse, six miles east of Carlsbad on the Fourth. The settlers gathered at an early hour and brought a piano to furnish the music. There were about thirty-five present who put in the day feasting on good things, and watching games by the young people. The families of Holloway, Jennings, Stokes, W. A. Weaver and Isen, were present. The settlers had a half barrel of lemonade left, besides many other good things.
