THE AUSTRIANS ARE SUCCESSFULLY DRIVING ITALIANS.

The austrians are still gaining. They continue their offensive against the italians in the southern Tyrol. They have advanced on both sides of the Saguna valley, driving the italians before them.

According to the war department office announcement, the 15, austrian troops advanced in several places in the sector below Roberete and the 16 the attack was renewed along the whole line. The austrians captured a position on the eastern end of Folgoria plateau. At some points the victorious troops crossed the italian frontier and at other points they close to the border.

Swedish Noble Kills Banker and Woman Clerk.

Leonard Rudolph Glyllenspalm, member of one of the oldest families in Sweden, has confessed to the double murder which recently occurred in one of the branch banks of Stockholm and which stirred all Sweden because the brutality and mystery of the crime. The manager of the bank was found with a hatchet in his skull and a woman clerk was shot dead.

When Glyllenspalm was arrested denied his crime but after he had been held for two days, an analysis of some spots in his cloths and shoes established that they were stains of human blood and when confronted with this evidence, Glyllenspalm confessed.

A young swedish woman with good memory for faces and who had seen the nobleman emerge from the Bank recognized him after a fortnight and denounced him to the police.

SIXTEEN BANDITS KILLED NEAR MADERA.

Many Prisoners Taken.

By a report received the 21st. is known that bandits under command of Alejandro Dominguez and Pedro Castillo were practically annihilated by 26 cowboys of the Hearst ranch at a point 40 miles southwest of Madera.

The bandits had stealing cattle from Hearst ranch and the cowboys were sent to drive them away or kill them. The bandits were surprised and 16 were killed and a number of prisoners taken among them Pedro Castillo, one of the leaders.

Sibley's Troops Return to Texas.

The second american punitive expedition commanded by Col. F. W. Sibley, 14th. cavalry, which entered Coahuila pursuing Glen Spring and Boquillas raiders, has now completely withdrawn to United States.

Col. Sibley brought with him to this side four mexicans prisoners which were captured by Lieut. Cramer in a running fight near San Anita, Coahuila, ten days ago.

As some arrivals from Boquillas say there is no truth in the report that the expedition had been menaced by Yaqui Indians, being emanated that report from a message sent by the war department to Col. Sibley some days ago advising him that a band of Yaqui Indians had left Cuatro Ciénegas for Boquillas on the Mexican side.

Bandits Active Action Again in Chihuahua.

By via wireless to Columbus is known that bandits are again active in the western region of Chihuahua, though being hunted personally by a detachment of cavalry. Despite of the presence in the places of a large bodies of Carranza troops, Friday night a detachment of U. S. cavalry numbering 15 men, was jumped while patrolling the Mexico North Western Railroad a few miles south of Temosa-

TORRES TO FIGHT AT TRACTION PARK DECORATION DAY.

Albuquerque, N. M., May 23:—Everything is in readiness for the biggest fight card set for this state since Jim Flynn met Jack Johnson for the Championship of the World at Las Vegas, July 4, 1912. The fights are to be staged here under the direction of Louis Newman and Billy McCarney, the afternoon of Memorial Day, May 30 and will be made up of three ten rounds scraps between equally matched men. Three classes of battler will show their wares, bantamweights, lightweight and welterweights.

In the main event, Jack Torres, that wonderfully clever New Mexican welterweight, who is now in direct line for the welterweight championship of the world, will meet one of his foremost rivals for the title, Jimmy Connors, of New York. They will fight ten rounds at 145 pounds. Connors has to his credit two wins over Art Magirl, the latter being the only man who ever scored a win over Torres in the past year. Connors also beat Frank Barrieau, of Canada. Barrieau gave Torres a hard fifteen round battle, also twice taking the Albuquerque lad along ten stirring rounds.

BRITISH ACTION CONDEMNED.

U. S. Government Stand by His Policy.

American government is sending a new note to Great Britain making protest against interference with U. S. mails. A big volume of business has been lost for the british of taking vessels into english ports and there examining and detaining mail going to and from the United States. The note to England will make again plain that the United States cannot consent to continuances of the practice which already has objected.

One of the results of the british interference with mails has been to virtually paralyze business between the United States and Britain and Sweden.

SOME YOUNG LAMBS NEED SPECIAL CARE.

When Young Animal Becomes Chilled Wrap It in Blanket—Hard to Raise by Hand.

A farmer who keeps sheep nearly always has a few lambs needing special care in order to save them.

If one is found chilled, it should be wrapped in an old coat or blanket, and placed near a fire to warm.

A few drops of some hot liniment, with a little of the ewe's milk, warmed with hot water, fed to the lamb a teaspoonful at a time ten or fifteen minutes apart, will soon warm it up unless too far gone when discovered.

Sometimes the lamb will need a good rubbing around the throat and limbs before it can swallow. They should not be rubbed too much, however, as the mother knows her young by the smell, and it makes work to raise them by hand.

This can be done successfully if one is careful in feeding. A lamb will do the best on a bottle, but it is a little more work than teaching it to drink.

It is best to use the ewe's milk, if possible, for a week or two, as one has to be careful in feeding with cow's milk. If cow's milk is used, it should be made half water, sweetened a little with sugar. Feed sparingly, about as one would a baby, about once an hour at first, and farther apart as they grow older. If the lamb is small a tablespoonful will be enough at first.

New Mexico Taxpayers Association

Santa Fe, May 26.—The May number of the New Mexico Tax Review, issued today shows the New Mexico Taxpayers' Association down to serious work in the persual of its financial survey of New Mexico, as shown by the table of contents, and by the introductory statement by President, H. "Audit of the City of Las Vegas," a brief of the audit of the City named, made by the Taxpayers' Association at the request of the city government.

"Direct and indirect Taxation", fourth of Mr. James' series of instructive articles on the theory of public finance, and a number of other articles of general interest to taxpayers and the public generally.

In introducing the May number, President Hagerman makes the following statement:

"One of the main objects of the Taxpayers' Association of New Mexico as set forth in its articles of association, is to educate its members upon questions of administration and the expenditure of public funds. As stated in the foreword of our first number, the association exists for the purpose of affording those who pay for the government a medium of instruction and an organ of expression. It is further provided by our articles that the director shall supervise all publicity issued and used by the association.

"The association can furnish no useful instruction without first securing the facts. These facts the director is collecting and compiling. If the association is to accomplish the purpose for which it was organized if the director is to do his duty and earn his salary, the facts so collected must be published.

"This organization does not exist to prosecute or persecute public officers. It is not constituted to cause trouble or to in-

tiating personal or political disputes. But it would be worse than cowardly, worse than delinquent in its professed purpose if, knowing facts, it did not give those facts fully and dispassionately to the public.

"This association will not criticize persons. It will criticize, if necessary, public policies and public acts which it finds to be against the public interest. Such criticism will never be captiously indulged in or made without outlining constructive policies and in all cases, will be accompanied by a careful and full publication of the facts without other comment than is necessary to make the facts speak for themselves. If, from these facts criticism is directed against any public official, the association can only deplore the existence of public acts not to the public interest. The association can have no friends to protect, no enemies to punish. No public officer sincerely serving the state can have any fear of personal harm from its activities or the facts it may disclose. If disclosures are made which cause criticism of individual officers, it should always be borne in mind by such officials that the fundamental object of the association is not to tear down but to build up and that its help and assistance are at the service of those who sincerely desire to remedy such defects as are found to exist in the administration of our public affairs.
