## IMMEDIATE WITHDRAWAL OF AMERICANS TROOPS

### Demanded by Carranza's Note.

Although it has been told that the announced Carranza's note has not been brought to Washington we thought the news was only a way to delay the matter. It has been demonstrated we were right. Today the wires have transmitted through all the world such note.

Carranza bluntly questioning the good faith of United States government, and, with a threat of armed resistance, demand withdrawal of American troops from Mexico.

The note was laid before the president Wilson, who at once began considering how it should be answered.

In official circles was complete unanimity, is the belief that that there would not be immediate withdrawal of the Pershing expedition. High officials said that the fact government so far had failed utterly to demonstrate its ability to protect the border against bandits, and expressed the opinion that the troops would stay in Mexico until this was done.

## BANDS AND RED FIRE FOR BIG MASS MEETING TO HELP RECRUITING.

The message that electrified France when Napoleon Bonaparte was at the pinnacle of his power: "Your Country Needs You," is modernized today for New Mexico in the words: "Your State Needs You." Napoleon's message brought thousands flocking to the standard of France. Will history repeat itself in New Mexico today? Will the young men of our state respond to the call for help that comes from the Mexican border and enlist in the New Mexico national guard and leave for the front?

New Mexico needs men. Three hundred men must go from this state to the front to maintain the honor and dignity of the state.

Albuquerque has taken the lead—the initiative—in the matter of recruiting. There will be a big mass meeting at 8 o'clock tonight at the corner of Second street and Central avenue. Bands will be playing and flags flying. The glare of red fire will dispel the darkness of the night. There will be a parade of citizens and those who have already volunteered their services as guards men. Speeches will be delivered from a reviewing stand by Hon. Neill B. Field, Captain W. C. Reid, Captain Fred Forneff, and several other prominent speakers.

border, at least attend the meeting tonight and show your spirit.

New Mexico can not afford to fall down on the call for men for border service. At the outbreak of the Spanish-American war in 1898 Albuquerque sent its full quota of men to join the New Mexico Rough Riders, who rendered distinguished service in Cuba.

The entire state is watching Albuquerque in the attempt to secure a large number of recruits. Col. D. K. B. Sellers, general chairman of the committee on arrangements for the mass meeting tonight, sent five dozen telegrams broadcast throughout the state yesterday, telling of the organization methods adopted here, and asking for a report on the number of enlistments made in other parts of New Mexico.

The telegram read as follows: "New Mexico's patriotism is at stake. Must have three hundred recruits for border, quick. Let us make Decoration day an occasion for practical patriotism by recruiting this number throughout the state. Albuquerque will hold a monster mass meeting and parade Tuesday evening with bands and red fire and urges every other town in the state to do same and wire Adjutant General Herring, collect the number of new soldiers your secures. This in order that we may notify the president that New Mexico has made good.

## UNIVERSITY EXERCISES.

(Continued.)

Albuquerque, N. M., May 31  
—Any one who doubts that  
prosperity exists in New Mexico  
and the southwest has but to  
consider the troubles of J. L.  
LaDriers, an Albuquerque archi-  
tect, who is in charge of the  
bids for the new Chemistry and  
physics laboratories of the Un-  
iversity of New Mexico, con-  
struct of which will be begun  
in summer. The University  
will spend \$80,000 on the two  
buildings and the contract is a  
big one. The bids will be open-  
ed June 25th. To date the archi-  
tect has received just nine  
bids.

"The trouble with this bid-  
ding" said Mr. LaDriers in an  
interview here today. "Is not  
in the plans or specifications, or  
because there is a prejudice  
against public work of the kind.  
It is simply that all the contrac-  
tors are too busy to consid-  
er taking it on, or haven't time  
to work out the specific and a  
bid. There has never been a  
wise in the history of this state  
when building was so general  
or so active."

Only one Albuquerque con-  
tractor has filed a bid on the  
University work thus far.

The plans for the two new  
buildings were drawn under the  
personal direction of Walter  
Burley Griffin, he was known  
Chicago architect, who has been  
retained by the state University  
a consulting architect for both  
buildings and grounds. It is  
hoped to have the physics labo-  
ratory ready for use during the  
coming college year which opens  
August 22nd. It is not likely  
that the new chemistry building  
will be completed for use dur-  
ing the coming year.

In addition to the new sci-  
ence buildings a considerable num-  
ber of cottages for students are  
to be built. The dormitories  
are filling rapidly and it now  
looks so if the University would  
have a freshman class of 150 or  
more. The Albuquerque high  
school alone will contribute 23  
freshmen from its class of 45.  
One of the smaller Pecos Valley  
town will send 11 high school  
graduates to the University in  
August.

### Our Dumb Animals.

Animals in moving pictures

California seems to be an ideal  
spot for the making of moving  
pictures. In Our Animals, the  
organ of the San Francisco S.  
P. C. A., there appeared recent-  
ly an article that depicts the suf-  
ferings to which animals are  
frequently subjected in the pre-  
paration of the photographs. We  
do not purpose to reproduce  
the stories of cruelty reported  
by the Los Angeles correspond-  
ent who wrote the article. They  
are too revolting for that. It will  
be enough to quote a single  
sentence: "These are only a  
few examples of the fiendish  
cruelty that animals are daily  
subjected to furnish amuse-  
ment for so-called educational  
and scientific study and to fill  
the coffers of the great film  
companies." From this para-  
graph it is understood that many  
cruelties are practised "in the  
name of science," not by scient-  
ists, however, but because in  
that name unscrupulous men  
feel sure of escaping the law  
interference.

Some of the examples men-  
tioned as showing films we  
visited to brutalize and degrade  
particularly the minds of chil-  
dren, are the Paramount, the  
Mutual, and the Pathé com-  
panies. One of the most en-  
rageous of all the atrocities por-  
trayed was investigated by the  
officers of the Los Angeles S.  
P. C. A., and according to the  
article referred to, the guilty  
company was the Pathé. "The  
heartless wretches who, in this  
case, pushed a horse, its legs  
tied together, over an embank-  
ment 150 feet deep, were fined  
the trifling sum of \$20 each."

Our sympathies are with the  
human species which and  
great disadvantages try to pre-  
vent these cruel practices. The  
public is excluded from the  
places where the pictures are  
made, and though the actors  
themselves sometimes, when the  
cruelties are too horrible, report  
them, they will not swear to the  
acts.

We sent the article to

National Board of Censorship,  
and publish in another column  
their reply. What can you and  
I do? Refuse to attend any  
moving picture show where  
films involving cruelty in any  
shape are exhibited, and per-  
suade our friends to do the same.

### German Misery a- round Verdun is Re- vealed by Many Letters.

The following letters found  
upon officers and soldiers of the  
German army taken prisoner  
around Verdun, are given out  
at French headquarters as indi-  
cating the state of mind of the  
officers since the failure of the  
first assault, and of the feeling  
of the soldiers' families at home:

A letter written by Lieuten-  
ant Hordas of the 81st Germany  
infantry to his parents says:

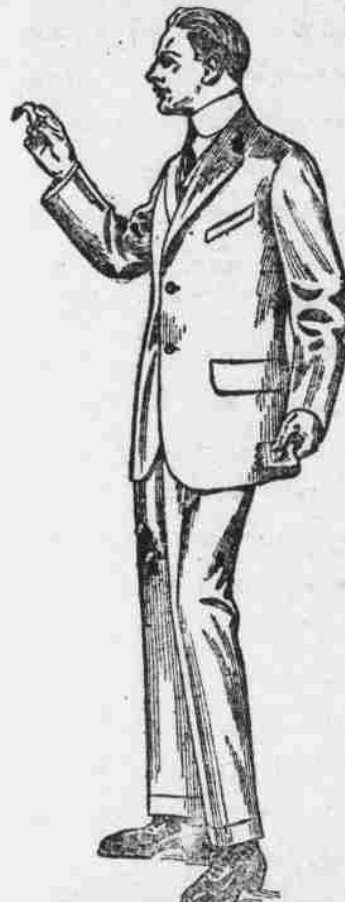
"Our losses in officers are so  
considerable that I was obliged  
to take command of the 8th  
company. We are now in the  
first line, and I am crouched in  
a little mud-hole that must pro-

tect me from the fragments of  
the enemy's shells that come  
uninterruptedly. I have seen a  
great deal in the course of the  
war, but I had not yet been in  
a situation to indescribably  
frightful. We are day and night

## OUR PUBLIC FORUM

### VII.—Hon. Elihu Root On Woman's Sphere



The question of Woman Suffrage is an issue before  
the American people. Twelve states have adopted it,  
four more states vote upon it this fall and it is strongly  
urged that it become a platform demand of the national  
political parties. It is therefore the privilege and the  
duty of every voter to study carefully this subject. Hon.  
Elihu Root, in discussing this question before the Consti-  
tutional Convention of New York, recently said in part:

"I am opposed to the granting of suffrage to women,  
because I believe that it would be a loss to women, to all  
women and to every woman; and because I believe it  
would be an injury to the State, and to every man and  
woman in the State. It would be useless to argue this if the right  
of suffrage were a natural right. If it were a natural right, then women should  
have it though the heavens fall. But if there be any one thing settled in the  
long discussion of this subject, it is that suffrage is not a natural right, but is  
simply a means of government, and the sole question to be discussed is  
whether government by the suffrage of men and women will be better gov-  
ernment than by the suffrage of men alone."

Into my judgment, sir, there enters no element of the inferiority of  
woman. It is not that woman is inferior to man, but it is that woman is  
different from man; that in the distribution of powers, of capacities, of  
qualities, our Maker has created man adapted to the performance of certain  
functions in the economy of nature and society, and women adapted to the  
performance of other functions.

Woman rules today by the sweet and noble influences of her character,  
put woman into the arena of conflict and she abandons these great weapons  
which control the world, and she takes into her hands feeble and nervous  
for strife, weapons with which she is unfamiliar and which she is unable to  
wield. Woman in strife becomes hard, harsh, unlovable, repulsive; as far  
removed from that gentle creature to whom we all owe allegiance and to  
whom we confess submission, as the heaven is removed from the earth.

The whole science of government is the science of protecting life and  
liberty and the pursuit of happiness. In the divine distribution of powers  
the duty and the right of protection rests with the male. It is so through-  
out nature. It is so with men, and I, for one, will never consent to part  
with the divine right of protecting my wife, my daughter, the woman  
whom I love, and the women whom I respect, exercising the birthright of  
man, and place that high duty in the weak and nerveless hands of those  
designed by God to be protected rather than to engage in the stern warfare  
of government. In my judgment, this whole movement arises from a false  
conception of the duty and of the right of both men and women.

The time will never come when the line of demarcation between the  
functions of the two sexes will be broken down. I believe it to be false phi-  
losophy; I believe that it is an attempt to turn backward upon the line of  
social development, and that if the step ever be taken, we go centuries back-  
ward on the march towards a higher, a nobler and a purer civilization, which  
must be found, not in the confusion, but in the higher differentiation of the

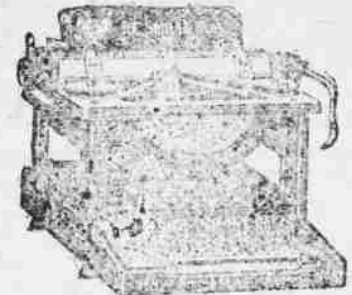
