## KITCHENER DEAD; CRUISER BLOWN UP.

**British War Minister and  
Staff Perish in Ship  
Explosion Off  
Orkneys.**

Admiral Jellicoe, commander of the British grand fleet, has reported to the admiralty that the British cruiser Hampshire with earl Kitchener, British minister of war and staff, aboard, has been lost off the west Orkney islands.

According earl Kitchener as his staff were Hugh James O'Beirne, former councilor of the British embassy at Petrograd, and former minister at Sofia; O. A. Fitzgerald, earl Kitchener's private military secretary; Brig. Gen. Ellershaw and Sir Frederick Donaldson. The party was en route to Russia to confer with Russian leaders regarding the war.

### JELICOE'S REPORT.

Admiral Jellicoe's report to the admiralty follows:

"I have to report that his majesty's ship Hampshire, Capt. Herbert J. Savill, R. N. with lord Kitchener and his staff on board, was sunk Monday night at about 8 p. m., to the west of the Orkneys either by a mine or torpedo.

"Four boats were seen by observers on shore to leave the ship. The wind was north and heavy seas were running. Patrol vessels and destroyers proceeded to the spot and a party was sent along the coast to search, but only some bodies and a capsized boat have been found up to the present. I greatly fear that there is little hope of there being any survivors.

"H. M. S. Hampshire was on her way to Russia.

## NEW MEXICO TAX PAYERS' ASSOCIATION FIRST MU- NICIPAL AUDIT.

Santa Fe, N. M., June 6.—

The first municipal audit completed by the New Mexico Taxpayers' association has proven mutually satisfactory to the association's officers and to Las Vegas, the city whose accounts were audited. In the May number of the New Mexico Tax Review, Director A. E. James gives a thorough summary of the audit of the East Las Vegas accounts for the two years period, which finds that the accounts of the city "though in many respects lacking in completeness, have been kept with a conscientious thoroughness, well worthy of attention." A number of pertinent suggestions are made as to improved methods of municipal accounting for New Mexico cities which probably will be found as interesting to other cities as they have been found applicable to Las Vegas.

That the Las Vegas city government is well satisfied with the audit is indicated by a letter from city clerk Charles Tamme to Director James in which he says:

"The city council is highly pleased with the report. Knowing as I do the painstaking efforts to complete the report, I feel that I must compliment you upon your commendable work."

Since completing the Las Vegas audit, P. H. Miller, the Association's auditor has completed the audit of the city of Roswell and this week began work upon the municipal accounts of Gallup. All three audits were undertaken at the invitation of the respective city governments.

The time ought soon to come when there will no longer be room for divided or foreign allegiance and traitorous tongues.

Take off your hats Flag Day and shout for "Old Glory," the flag that set us free and must keep us free.

## WHAT TO DO FOR NEXT NEW MEXICO FAIR.

Albuquerque, N. M., June 8.—"Get busy on your exhibit for the State Fair, and get busy right now."

This is the urgent message which the State Fair Commission has been sending to every county in New Mexico since Monday, when county commissioners in almost every county in the state had up for consideration, the matter of financial support for exhibit preparation. Three counties already have made substantial appropriations for their respective exhibits, two of them having increased the amounts voted last year. Assurances have come to Fair headquarters that every county in New Mexico will participate officially in the coming Fair, and with this assurance of statewide co-operation, President Southard of the Fair board is setting to work on a campaign of preparedness, the keystone of which is "early work on the exhibits."

"We looked for co-operation everywhere this year" said Mr. Southard today, "and are getting it, getting it in a way that makes work on the Fair this year, a pleasure, for we feel that the whole state is behind us. I'd like to say however, that one thing is most important in the preparation of exhibits. That is an early start. Now, this first week in June when crops are young, is the time to plan the exhibit for late September. If the men in charge in the various counties will take the preliminary steps now; if they will interview the farmers and fruit growers; if they will make a general outline of what is wanted and let the people know about it; if they will lay the foundation this month, we will have a display in Albuquerque in the fall which will be a world beater. If I were asked the most important thing in connection with a state fair exhibit, I am sure that I'd say 'an early start'."

## SCHOOL OF BUSI- NESS IN UNIVER- SITY OF NEW MEXICO.

Albuquerque, N. M., June 7.—What probably will be termed the "Course in New Mexico" is to be established in the State University with the installation of the new school of business, to be introduced with the opening of the next college year on August 22nd. It is the determination of the University government that in future no graduate of the New Mexico State University shall go out from the college without a thorough, practical knowledge of the home state, of its resources, industries and opportunities. This knowledge is to be up to the minute and of the most completely utilitarian character. President David R. Boyd has urged constantly, since he came to the University, that next to training of the individual student, the first function of the institution is to train young men and young women for best and most practical service to the state and to their home communities. On the other hand he holds that the most valuable phase of life and work at the University, for those who expect to live and work in New Mexico, is knowledge of the state gained there, and knowledge of and acquaintance with New Mexico people.

On a recent visit to Lovington, in eastern Eddy county President Boyd met the father of a University student who told him that since returning from the University his son had received letters from fellow students in 14 different counties of New Mexico. "I consider that acquaintance worth more than the academic work" this father

told the University president. Dr. Boyd has recounted the incident illustrating his point that the University student in four years will become acquainted with large numbers of young men and young women from among whom, because they are trained, will come the future leaders of New Mexico in all lines of activity. This acquaintance he insists has an immediate cash value and a larger social value, which will be good for a lifetime. It is the strongest argument, he says, in favor of educating New Mexico young people in New Mexico institutions.

While the University courses in the past have naturally imported much knowledge concerning the state, its resources and conditions; this has been more or less incidental to academic work. It is now proposed that by reading, lectures and special courses of study that the graduate of the state University shall know not only that New Mexico has resources in coal and iron and precious metals, but where those metals have been found and how they are being mined; that this is not only an important stockgrowing state, but how important it is and where are its principal grazing and feeding districts,—a detailed knowledge, briefly, of conditions throughout the state, which naturally will carry with it practical knowledge of local governmental, political and social conditions, all down to the minute.

The new school of business will not teach shorthand and typewriting or bookkeeping. It will teach business management; broad principles of trade; business economies; publicity, and the various phases of practical business which the average businessman has found it necessary to work out for himself in the costly school of experience. It is expected that the enrollment in the new course will be large. It is now certain that the coming freshmen class at the University will number more than 150.

## NEW MEXICO MILITARY INSTITUTE.

Roswell, N. M., June 6.—The commencement of the New Mexico Military Institute which has just closed was unusually gay and delightful, and marking as it did close of the most successful year that the institute has ever passed, it was in the nature of an epoch-making

event.

The commencement address, delivered by Rev. Austin D. Crile, was an exceptionally able effort and was listened to with the closest attention by a large audience composed of many out-of-town visitors as well as several hundred residents of the city of Roswell. Dr. Crile showed with convincing clearness that military preparedness is not incompatible with Christianity, but on the other hand is one of the imperative duties of a nation.

A feature of the commencement which was particularly impressive, but which was not on the program; was the reading of a number of telegrams of congratulation from alumni and students of the institute who are now with the national guard at the border, utilizing the training they received at Roswell in the service of their country.

The drills by the battalion of cadets which formed a part of the exercises were up to the standard of military excellence which has caused the New Mexico Military Institute to be officially recognized as one of the ten best military schools in the United States. Company B, under command of Captain Sam Lusk, was the winner of the company prize at inspection and competitive drill.

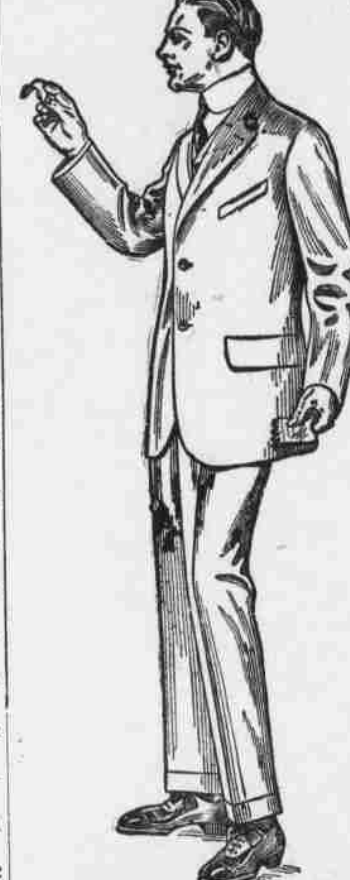

## OUR PUBLIC FORUM

### VII.—Hon. Elihu Root

#### On Woman's Sphere



—ELIHU ROOT

The question of Woman Suffrage is an issue before the American people. Twelve states have adopted it, four more states vote upon it this fall and it is strongly urged that it become a platform demand of the national political parties. It is therefore the privilege and the duty of every voter to study carefully this subject. Hon. Elihu Root, in discussing this question before the Constitutional Convention of New York, recently said in part: "I am opposed to the granting of suffrage to women, because I believe that it would be a loss to women, to all women and to every woman; and because I believe it would be an injury to the State, and to every man and every woman in the State. It would be useless to argue this if the right of suffrage were a natural right. If it were a natural right, then women should have it though the heavens fall. But if there be any one thing settled in the long discussion of this subject, it is that suffrage is not a natural right, but is simply a means of government, and the sole question to be discussed is whether government by the suffrage of men and women will be better government than by the suffrage of men alone.

Into my judgment, sir, there enters no element of the inferiority of woman. It is not that woman is inferior to man, but it is that woman is different from man; that in the distribution of powers, of capacities, of qualities, our Maker has created man adapted to the performance of certain functions in the economy of nature and society, and woman adapted to the performance of other functions.

Woman rules today by the sweet and noble influences of her character. Put woman into the arena of conflict and she abandons these great weapons which control the world, and she takes into her hands, feeble and nerveless for strife, weapons with which she is unfamiliar and which she is unable to wield. Woman in strife becomes hard, harsh, unlovable, repulsive; as far removed from that gentle creature to whom we all owe allegiance and to whom we confess submission, as the heaven is removed from the earth.

The whole science of government is the science of protecting life and liberty and the pursuit of happiness. In the divine distribution of powers, the duty and the right of protection rests with the male. It is so throughout nature. It is so with men, and I, for one, will never consent to part with the divine right of protecting my wife, my daughter, the women whom I love, and the women whom I respect, exercising the birthright of man, and place that high duty in the weak and nerveless hands of those designed by God to be protected rather than to engage in the stern warfare of government. In my judgment, this whole movement arises from a false conception of the duty and of the right of both men and women.

The time will never come when the line of demarcation between the functions of the two sexes will be broken down. I believe it to be false philosophy; I believe that it is an attempt to turn backward upon the line of social development, and that if the step ever be taken, we go centuries backward on the march towards a higher, a nobler and a purer civilization, which must be found not in the confusion, but in the higher differentiation of the

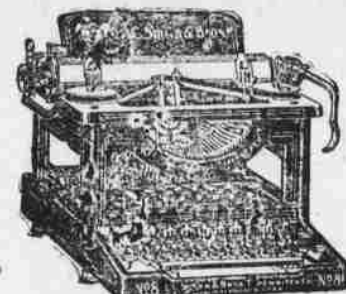
