STATEHOOD REALITY AT LAST

After Long, Loud Cry Statehood
is Secured for New Mexico
and Arizona

SIGNED MONDAY BY TAFT

Special Telegram to Current
Announced Pleasing News
to the Citizens of
Carlsbad

BILL SIGNED WITH FOUR DIFFERENT PENS

Previous to the passage of the statehood resolution the Current received three special telegrams direct from Washington, the first announcing the passing of the statehood resolution in the senate, the second its concurrence by the house, and the third at 3:04 P. M. Monday announcing that the president had signed the bill at 3:08. This was made possible by the difference of time it being in Carlsbad time when the resolution was signed. The telegrams were posted on the post office window and were the first news received in Carlsbad. The following is the detailed account of the signing of the resolution:

Washington, D. C. Aug. 21.—“Well, gentlemen, it's done,” said President William H. Taft, in the executive office in the White house at eight minutes after three o'clock this afternoon, August twenty-first, nineteen eleven, as he finished affixing his seal of approval upon the resolution admitting New Mexico and Arizona as states into the union.

The executive was crowded with persons interested in the signing of the bill, and deep silence prevailed as with four different pens the president completed his signature and the date and the deed was done. There were present Delegate Andrews of New Mexico, Delegate Cameron of Arizona, Congressman H. D. Flood, father of the resolution; Senator Penrose, representing Senator William Alden Smith of Michigan, chairman of the senate territories committee, who was called out of the city; Congressman Connell, Weyman Draper and others of the house territorial committee, Hoyal Smith of Globe and others from the territories, with the newspaper men.

The word had been circulated around that the resolution was to be signed at three o'clock, and at about that hour the visitors commenced to pour into the waiting-room of the executive office. A few moments after three all were shown into the president's room, where he, sat at a desk. He greeted a number of these present, rising from his chair as he shook hands.

The clerk laid the statehood bill before Mr. Taft.

“Has anybody gone over this?” asked the president, rather anxiously, looking around him as though he wanted to be sure he was not signing the original Flood resolution from which the recall of Judges for Arizona had not been eliminated.

Senator Penrose assured Mr. Taft that it was “all right,” but the president was not entirely satisfied and he proceeded to read it over hurriedly himself. Having satisfied himself that it was all he had insisted upon, he picked up a pen and wrote the word “approved.” He was given another pen and wrote “William Howard Taft.” With

a third pen he wrote, “August 21,” and with a fourth the year, “1911.”

The first pen, a gold one to be added to the collection of Senator Smith, was then given to Senator Penrose in lieu of the absent senator, while the other three went to Mr. Flood, Mr. Andrews and Mr. Cameron, respectively.

After the signature had been affixed some of those present grouped themselves on one side of the room, with the president in the foreground and a photograph was taken. No formal program had been arranged and those present were ushered out, while the president went back to work on his cotton bill veto, which he was engaged in writing.

The next thing was to inform the territories that just as soon as the passing of events would allow it, they would be full-fledged states. Hundreds of messages were filed for transmission to the southwest, and it is probably safe to say that by sundown no community in either territory was left uninformed. Just how soon the president will issue his proclamation certifying the passage of the resolution to the territorial governors could not be learned today. Mr. Taft leaves tomorrow for Beverly, but it is understood there is nothing to prevent the issuance of the proclamation at the the summer capital and it will probably be forthcoming in a few days.

Did it ever occur to you that Carlsbad and Pecos occupy the same position as Dallas and Fort Worth do in the Texas League in point of rivalry? When these teams meet there is always some hectic doings upon the ball field with plenty of action if not so much real base ball. Wild and woolly battle, a jumble of boots, bulls and errors, with a good quantity of hard hitting usually mark the clashes between these two teams. It has been this way for years, and the game Monday evening served as another proof of the assertion.

The spirit of annihilation seems to be foremost when these teams meet. The rivals appear to be so keen to completely wipe each other off the map that they fight it tooth and nail for supremacy. Perhaps the mental con-

THE NORMAL INSTITUTE

Closed Last Night After Most
Successful Session in His-
tory of Institute

CARLSBAD IDEAL PLACE FOR NORMAL

The Teachers' Normal Institute for Eddy county closed last night after a very interesting and successful session and a total attendance at the close, of sixty-five, thirty-five of whom will take the examination today and tomorrow.

Monday morning E. McQueen Gray, of the University of New Mexico, addressed the teachers on the subject of “Teaching English in the Schools of the State.” He was followed by President Roberts of the State Normal at Las Vegas on teaching history and President Gray followed on the same subject.

Thursday morning the committee appointed the Monday previous to draft suitable resolutions reported as follows:

RESOLUTIONS:

We, the teachers of Eddy county, now assembled desire to offer the following resolutions:

1. Be it resolved: That our thanks be extended to the Carlsbad School building for our Normal work. That we are especially grateful to the citizens of Carlsbad for the hospitable manner in which they have received and entertained us, and that we express our appreciation to the Carlsbad Commercial Club who tendered us a delightful evening's entertainment.

2. Believing that the public school system of New Mexico is equal to the average of the states, and that this is due to a very efficient supervision; we point with pride to James E. Clark as the one who has so fearlessly and efficiently earned our hearty approval.

3. Since our county school affairs have been handled in so admirable a manner, as the raising of our County standards the impartiality shown, the sympathy and help given us in our labors; we wish to endorse such efforts in the person of our present County Superintendent, A. A. Kaiser.

4. That the Normal work has been a success from every standpoint.

5. That we heartily commend Professor Vaughn and Moore as being the very best of instructors and ask that they be employed for the Normal work of 1912.

6. That we extend our appreciation to our assistants, A. A. Kaiser, Miss Williams, J. B. Hatfield and B. E. Kaiser for their earnest efforts in our school.

7. That the institute is under obligations to the Messrs. Williams, Mrs. James, Mr. VanHoy and Mr. White for the excellent music furnished.

8. Since we have been designated as a new state by the authorities at Washington since the Normal has been in progress that we give three cheers for the new state and may peace, happiness and educational prosperity attend its people.

9. That the institute is under obligations to the Messrs. Williams, Mrs. James, Mr. VanHoy and Mr. White for the excellent music furnished.

Whereas, Carlsbad is the county seat of Eddy County and is designated as the logical and proper place for all its county offices, and

Whereas, the people of Carlsbad have always evinced a marked interest in the teachers and their profession and in all things educational, also; that Carlsbad school officials refuse to allow her teachers to take advantage of any excuse for non-attendance at the County Normal thereby keeping them in touch with all live questions, relative to their profession and giving them a general interest and sympathy in Normal work, and

Whereas, teachers from other parts of the county have secured excuses from attendance at County Normals and can therefore have no direct interest in them:

Therefore, by reason of the above stated facts:

Be it Resolved, that it is the sense of this “Teachers Association” that all future County Normals be held in Carlsbad.

FROM HATCH TO MATURITY.

Many failures in poultry are not in hatching, but in growing, in maturing the fowls. There must first be an object in selection of eggs. Are they to hatch show birds, broilers, roasters, layers, breeders?

Select accordingly and when hatched push to maturity at date best for object in view. To reach standard weight and mature plumage, to be fit for first shows, fowls must be hatched six to

ten months before and pushed by special feeding, protein the prime constituent.

Broiler season is at its height from March to June, two to three pounds a day maximum in three months. Try these for broilers:

BROILER FEEDING MASH

Commeal	100
Brain	10
Flour midds	10
Beef scrap	10

BROILER BREAD

Commeal	100
Brain	10
Flour midds	10
Beef scrap	10

Mix, stir in six raw eggs, moisten with milk, bake in slow oven.

Broilers sold by weight after April 1. Birds for roasters and capons must be out early, largest birds sold best at Thanksgiving, Christmas, Jan. 1 to July 1. Cracked yellow corn and beef scrap are the common forcers, mash of commeal, brain, midds, scrap, in which corn and scrap are gradually increased, is excellent. Contractors for delivery of fresh eggs the year round must get

pullets out early to lay in hot season and molt when old hens have knocked off.

SENATOR LAFAYETTE YO. ON ROAD DRAG

Iowan Says It Is Surprising What Results Are Obtained.

During a recent interview Senator Lafayette Young of Des Moines expressed his satisfaction over results from the dragging of roads the American Cultivator. "It is surprising," he said, "what a good can be made of dirt by dragging, surface with what is known as King drag. This dragging is done over rain. The soft earth is smooth, over and the rough places filled up. When roads have been dragged for a year the surface becomes hard and smooth and will dispose of a very heavy rain."

The King road drag has been exploited by the department of agriculture and by several agricultural ex-

periment stations and thousands of bulletins on the subject have been sent to farmers.

The question has often been raised why it is possible to construct a good road which will stand heavy traffic by means of the King road drag without the use of macadam. In the first place, it is explained by Mr. King, a traveled road that has been undisturbed for a year or more possesses a tough hard crust which is valuable. Many road men cover this impervious crust with thick blankets of soft, loose earth, while others will tear it all to pieces. This crust or shell should neither be broken nor covered. It should first be leveled with the drag and all the wrinkles and ruts smoothed out of it. Then it should be thickened gradually.

So much has been written lately regarding the dragging of roads that many people beginning the use of the drag become discouraged before they are well started. They should understand that it often takes a whole season for the road to become properly published and to stand to withstand the rains and traffic.

A GOOD ROAD IS LIKE A BANK ACCOUNT.

A bad road is likened unto a checkbook and a good road to a bank account that draws interest and constantly increases in size. The state of the roads affects the farmer more than any other class, and the farmer should stand for good roads, while the towns should help him bear the burden of construction.

TEN-YEAR-OLD ROADS BEST.

Builders Are Getting Careless, Kansas City Judge Says.

"Why are the roads built ten years ago better today than the roads built three or four years ago?"

That question was asked by Judge H. C. Gilbert of Judge E. L. Martin and Judge E. E. Axline of Kansas City. The questioned judges shook their heads.

"Simply because the plans and specifications made and carried out ten years ago were for real rock roads work and for the further reason that the contractors who did the work ten years ago were required to build the roads exactly according to plans and specifications," answered Judge Gilbert.

"There is going to be a change in this road building business," Mr. Gilbert said, and the other members of the additional list of information that there is going to be a decided change.

"Contractors in recent years haven't been building the roads in strict compliance with the plans and specifications," Mr. Gilbert added further. "Some of the contractors called for roads twenty feet wide and others sixteen feet wide. They are a little narrower than those widths in many places—too many places. The same contractors called for the macadam to be fifteen inches in the center—little enough—and nine inches deep at the edges. The macadam is not that deep in many places."

A Seven Mile Stone Highway. There are probably few cities in southern California engaged in a more extensive campaign of road improvements than Riverside. Work now under way and for which proceedings have been begun amounts to approximately ninety city blocks, or seven miles of highway, to be constructed of rock roadbed with oiled macadam surface.

THE STATEHOOD RESOLUTION

Enabling New Mexico and Arizona to Form a Constitution, State Government and Come Into the Union on an Equal Footing With the Original States

EXACTLY AS SIGNED BY PRESIDENT TAFT

The following is the Statehood Resolution as signed by President Taft:

JOINT RESOLUTION
To enable the people of New Mexico and Arizona to form a constitution and State government and be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original States, and to enable the people of Arizona to form a constitution and State government and be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original States.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

That the Territories of New Mexico and Arizona are hereby admitted into the Union upon an equal footing with the original States, in accordance with the terms of the Enabling Act, approved June twentieth, nineteen hundred and ten, and upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth. The admission herein provided for shall take effect upon the proclamation of the President of the United States, when the conditions explicitly set forth in this joint resolution shall have been complied with, which proclamation shall have been certified by the President, and also after evidence shall have been submitted to him of the compliance with the terms and conditions of this resolution.

The President is authorized and directed to certify the adoption of this resolution to the governor of each territory as soon as practicable after the adoption thereof, and each of said governors shall issue his proclamation for the holding of the first general election as provided for in the constitution of New Mexico heretofore adopted and the election ordinance numbered Two adopted by the constitutional convention of Arizona, respectively herein set forth in accordance with the terms and conditions of this joint resolution. The results of said elections shall be certified to the President by the governor of each of the said Territories. And if the terms and conditions of this joint resolution shall have been complied with, the proclamation shall immediately issue by the President announcing the result of said elections so ascertained, and upon the issuance of said proclamation the proposed State or States so complying shall be deemed admitted by Congress into the Union upon an equal footing with the other States.

Sec. 2. That the admission of New Mexico shall be subject to the terms and conditions of a joint resolution approved February sixteenth, nineteen hundred and eleven, and entitled, "Joint resolution reaffirming the boundary line between Texas and the Territory of New Mexico."

Sec. 3. That before the proclamation of the President shall issue announcing the result of said election in New Mexico, and at the same time that the state election aforesaid is held, the electors of New Mexico shall vote upon the following proposed amendment of their state constitution as a condition precedent to the admission of said state, to-wit:

Article XIX of the constitution as adopted by the electors of New Mexico at an election held on the twenty-first day of January, anno domini nineteen hundred and eleven, be, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Article XIX.

Sec. 1. Any amendment

enacted by the legislature under the provisions of this constitution.

Sec. 4. When the United States shall consent thereto the legislature by a majority vote by the members in each house, may submit to the people the question of amending any provision of Article XXI of this constitution on compact with the United States to the extent allowed by the Act of Congress permitting the same, and if a majority of the qualified electors who vote upon any such amendment shall vote in favor thereof the said article shall be thereby amended accordingly.

Sec. 5. The provisions of section one of this article shall not be changed, altered or abrogated, in any manner, except through a general convention called to revise this constitution as herein provided.

Sec. 4. That the probate clerks of the several counties of New Mexico shall provide separate ballots for the use of electors at said first election for the purpose of voting upon said amendment. Said separate ballots shall be printed on paper of a blue tint, so that they may readily be distinguished from the white ballots provided for the election of county and State officers. Said separate ballots shall be delivered only to the election officers authorized by law to receive and have the custody of the ballot boxes for use at said election and shall be delivered by them only to the individual voters and only one ballot to each elector at the time he offers to vote at the said general election, and shall have the initials of two election officers of opposite political parties written by them upon the back thereof. Said separate ballots shall not be marked either for or against the said amendment at the time it is handed to the elector by the election officer, and if the elector desires to vote upon said amendment, the ballot must be marked by the voter, unless he shall request one of the election officers to mark the same for him, in which case such election officer so called upon shall mark said ballot as such voter shall request. Any elector receiving such ballot shall return the same before leaving the polls to one of the election judges, who shall immediately deposit the same in the ballot box whether such ballot be marked or not. No ballots on said amendment except those so handed to said electors and so initialed shall be deposited in the ballot box or counted or canvassed. Said separate ballots shall have printed thereon the proposed amendment in both the English and Spanish language. There shall be placed on said ballots two blank squares with dimensions of one half an inch and opposite one of such squares shall be printed both in the English and Spanish language the words "For constitutional amendment," and opposite the other blank square shall be printed in both the English and Spanish language the words, "Against constitutional amendment."

Any elector desiring to vote for said amendment shall mark his ballot with a cross in the blank square opposite the words, "For constitutional amendment," or cause the same to be so marked by an election officer as aforesaid, and any elector desiring to vote against said amendment shall mark his ballot with a cross in the blank square opposite the words "Against constitutional amendment," or cause the same to be so marked by an election officer as aforesaid.

Sec. 5. That said ballots shall be counted and canvassed by said election officers, and the returns of said election upon said amendment shall be made by said election officers direct to the secretary of the Territory of New Mexico, at Santa Fe, who, with

the governor and chief justice of said Territory, shall constitute a canvassing board; and they, or any two of them, shall meet in said city of Santa Fe on the third Monday after said election and shall canvass the same. If a majority of the legal votes cast at said election upon said amendment shall be in favor thereof, the said canvassing board shall forthwith certify said result to the governor of the Territory, together with the statement of votes cast upon the question of the ratification, or rejection of said amendment; whereupon the governor of said Territory shall by proclamation declare the said amendment a part of the constitution of the proposed State of New Mexico, and thereupon the same shall become and be a part of said constitution; but if the same shall fail of such majority then Article XIX of the constitution of New Mexico as adopted on January twenty-first, nineteen hundred and eleven, shall remain a part of said constitution.

Except as herein otherwise provided, said election upon this amendment shall be in all respects subject to the election laws of New Mexico now in force.

Sec. 6. That the fifth clause of section two of "An Act to enable the people of New Mexico to form a constitution and State government and be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original States," approved June twentieth, anno domini nineteen hundred and ten, be, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

"Fifth. That said state shall never enact any law restricting or abridging the right of suffrage on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude."

Sec. 7. That before the proclamation of the President shall issue, announcing the result of said election in Arizona, and at the same time that the State election is held, as aforesaid, the electors of Arizona shall vote upon and ratify and adopt the following proposed amendment to their State constitution as a condition precedent to the admission of said State, to-wit:

"Section one of Article VIII of the constitution of the State of Arizona, adopted by the electors of said State at an election held on the ninth day of February, anno domini nineteen hundred and eleven, be, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

Article VIII. Removal From Office

"RECALL OF PUBLIC OFFICERS."

"Sec. 1. Every public officer in the State of Arizona except members of the judiciary holding an elective office, either by election or appointment is subject to recall from such office by the qualified electors of the electoral district from which candidates are elected to such office. Such electoral district may include the whole State. Such number of said electors as shall equal twenty-five per centum of the number of votes cast at the last preceding general election for all of the candidates for the office held by such officer may by petition, which shall be known as a recall petition, demand his recall."

The ballots to be provided for said first state election shall have printed thereon this proposed amendment and there shall be placed on said ballots two blank squares with dimensions of one half an inch and opposite one of said square shall be printed the words "For constitutional amendment" and opposite the other blank square shall be printed the words "Against constitutional amendment."

Any elector desiring to vote for said amendment shall place

a cross in the blank square opposite the words "For constitutional amendment" and those desiring to vote against such amendment shall place a cross in the blank opposite the words "Against constitutional amendment," and said ballots shall be counted and canvassed by the election officers of said State authorized by law to count and canvass the ballots cast at the election for State officers; and the returns of said election upon said amendment shall be made by said election officers direct to the secretary of the Territory of Arizona at Phoenix, who, with the governor and chief justice of the Territory, shall constitute a canvassing board, and they, or any two of them, shall meet in said city of Phoenix on the third Monday after said election and shall canvass the same.

MODERN ROADMAKING.
Efforts in England to Meet Motor and Trolley Car Traffic.
The following illustrates the efforts in England to meet in roadmaking the conditions imposed by motor and trolley car traffic:
A new and direct roadway is proposed between West Hartlepool and Middlesbrough near Newcastle, in the county of Northumberland, a direct line of seven and three-fourth miles. In designing the roadway the engineer in charge has given attention to the possible development in both heavy, slow and fast vehicular and motor traffic, each of which demands separate consideration and possibly different methods of road surface treatment.
The plan accordingly provides for a center footpath nine feet in width, on the east side of the footpath a road for motor and light, fast traffic twenty four feet in width and on the west side of the footpath a road for heavy, slow traffic twenty two feet in width. This gives a width for highway purposes of fifty five feet. The plan further shows on the westernmost side of the footpath a width of fourteen feet reserved for trolley or trolley purposes, making a total width of land to be acquired of sixty nine feet.
A scheme similar to this will doubtless control future roadmaking in England, and existing roads may be reconstructed on a corresponding plan. One of the chief advantages in separating the several kinds of traffic would be in permitting different methods of surfacing the roads to be used and those best adapted to the traffic so concentrated. Another advantage would be the lessening of the chances of accidents. A third advantage would be the greater speed permissible to fast traveling motor and trolley cars.
ALL READ THIS
Any one having stone he desires to have tested for road building purposes should write to the office of public roads, Washington, for necessary instructions as to how to proceed to secure such tests. The sender will be required to pay all transportation charges, but aside from these tests are made without further cost to the party desiring them.

depend entirely on the public school for their life preparation. To meet the needs of this class the course of study has been made more practical. In the high school elective courses are presented to the pupil in order that he may pursue that line of work that will best prepare him for a particular occupation or profession. In the grade school a full course of sewing has been adopted. Construction work for boys will be begun in the lower grades and continued through the eighth.

The so called commercial department in the high school has been discontinued for reasons that must appear evident to all persons familiar with the previous work of that department. With the present commercial equipment and without a special teacher this type of work in the High school is less than a farce. The board, composed of business men, were unanimous in their opinion that no real preparation for business in the modern sense with the probable exception of the theory of bookkeeping, should be attempted until our schools were financially able to introduce a commercial course that would stand for something more than mere show.

The school policy is also distinctly disciplinary in its character. The school authorities take the position that discipline ranks high among those innumerable factors that constitute a successful school. Good order must and shall be maintained at all hazards. This applies to the First grade but it applies much more emphatically to the High school grades.

It is believed also by the school authorities that there is no place for the spectacular in public school work. The school is in no sense an advertising agency for the teachers or brilliant pupils. There is no time nor place in a public school curriculum for anything but real, genuine, intensive work with just enough play between work periods to make that work interesting. A few public entertainments will be given but very few. The school belongs to the public and the public should be more interested in what the school really contributes to the life of the pupils than in the entertainment it may give on special occasions.

Finally, let us impress upon you the necessity of keeping uniform with the school conditions. This can only be done by frequently visiting the school. Your criticism based on an actual knowledge of school conditions are always welcome. Early in the year a school paper will be established and the purpose of which is to present the public with an interpretation of a home and school situation. A home and school situation is being presented in order to bring the teachers and parents together to discuss school problems.

Thank you, these suggestions and explanations may prove helpful to school patrons. I remain,

2. For the construction of an additional 100 ft. steel span on the west end of the Artesia Pecos River bridge, and the construction of a dirt approach thereto.

3. For the repairs of the east and west approaches to the Carlsbad Pecos River Bridge by extending the concrete abutments already in place and replacing the earth approaches that were washed out by the river.

4. For the repairing of the Malaga Pecos River bridge, by replacing the concrete abutments and flooring that were washed out and repairing the approaches to said Malaga Pecos River bridge, at the bridge and on either side of the river.

5. For the construction of a reinforced cement bridge over the east side canal of the Carlsbad Project, where the La Huerta road crosses the same, and for the earth approaches thereto, to repair and make adequate the bridge now at that point.

All bidders upon the above mentioned work are to furnish their own plans and specifications and all materials necessary therefor.
