STATEWIDE CONTEST FOR QUEEN OF STATE FAIR AND \$100 IN GOLD

High Honors for Winning Young Ladies; Railroad and Hotel Expenses Paid for Queen and Maids of Honor, and \$100 in Gold for Young Lady Who Is Chosen Queen. Contest Begins July 2nd.—Ends September 15th. Rules and Conditions of the Contest in Which Every County Will Participate.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., June 29.—W. P. Southard, president of the state fair commission, today announced in behalf of the commission, a statewide contest, open to the young women of New Mexico, and in which are offered, to the winner the honor of being queen of the 1916 New Mexico State Fair, railroad and hotel expenses in attending the fair, and \$100 in gold, to be presented on the day the queen of the fair is publicly crowned. To other contestants than the winner are offered honors as first maid of honor, and a chance of winning distinction as county maid of honor, one such maid of honor to be chosen from each of New Mexico's twenty-six counties, with the exception of Bernalillo county, which will not participate in the competition. In connection with the competition, which involves sale of admission tickets to the fair, each contestant has the opportunity of earning considerable sums of money in commissions on ticket sales, which will be paid to all who sell the tickets, except the winner of the capital prize.

The contest begins Sunday, July 2, and concludes Friday, September 15, and all who expect to enter the contest are urged to file their applications at once, in accordance with the following rules and regulations under which the contest will be conducted, and as given out officially by the state fair commission today:

RULES OF THE CONTEST

The New Mexico State Fair Commission proposes a popular election to determine the young lady who shall be Queen of the New Mexico State Fair, September 25-30, 1916, in contest under rules and regulations of a statewide contest, as given below:

The lady winning the honor shall receive \$100 in gold coin, her railroad fare to and from the State Fair, and her hotel expenses while attending the Fair.

The lady winning second place shall be declared First Maid of Honor to the Queen, and her railroad expenses and hotel expenses shall be paid by the State Fair Commission.

The lady receiving the highest number of votes in each county of New Mexico, in addition to and following the selection of the Queen and First Maid of Honor, as above stated, shall be declared Maid of Honor from the county in which she resides, and shall receive payment of her railroad and hotel expenses by the State Fair Commission, the same as the First Maid of Honor, whose election is by statewide vote.

OBJECT OF THE CONTEST

The object of this voting contest, hereby inaugurated by the State Fair Commission for the selection of Queen of the Fair, First Maid of Honor and County Maids of Honor, is to arouse still greater interest in the greatest State Fair the Southwest has known, and which opens at Albuquerque September 25th, to and the evening of September 30th. Following are the conditions and rules:

1. Votes for Queen and Maids of Honor are based upon sales of admission tickets to the State Fair grounds. Each ticket shall be sold at a uniform price of 50 cents, is transferable, and entitles the bearer to one admission to the State Fair grounds on any day during the Fair, without restriction. Each 50-cent ticket purchased in this contest entitles the purchaser to cast fifty (50) votes for the lady of his choice for Queen of the Fair.

2. To avoid entrance of an improper person into this contest each contestant shall be vouched for by the County Superintendent of Schools, the nearest postmaster or banker, of the county in which she lives, upon blanks which will be furnished by the State Fair Commission for the purpose, or by postal card or letter from such official, postmaster or banker.

3. Aside from this recommendation, which shall be a certificate of good character, this contest is open to every woman in New Mexico, with the agreement that the lady receiving the highest total number of votes in the whole state, on or before midnight, September 15th, shall be declared Queen of the Fair, shall receive her expenses in attending the Fair and \$100 in gold when crowned Queen of the Fair. The lady receiving the second highest number of votes in the state as a whole, shall be declared First Maid of Honor to the Queen and shall receive her expenses in attending the Fair. Twenty-three ladies receiving the highest number of votes, each in the county in which she lives (and excepting the Queen and the First Maid of Honor) shall be declared County Maids of Honor from her county of residence, and shall receive her expenses in attending the Fair.

4. Ladies living in Albuquerque and Bernalillo County are excluded from this contest; but a second contest will be inaugurated at a later date for "The Maid of Albuquerque," who will lead the parade on Albuquerque Day, and for her Maids of Honor.

5. Books of tickets, for sale by contestants, with voting coupons attached, will be furnished to each candidate, upon application to STATE FAIR COMMISSION, Queen of the Fair, Contest Manager, Albuquerque, New Mexico, accompanied by certificate of character as stated above. Complete instructions will be forwarded to each candidate.

6. The State Fair Commission hereby disclaims any responsibility for any money paid for remittance unless such money is remitted to the Commission. Any person who wishes may remit money direct to the State Fair Commission, Albuquerque, indicate for whom votes shall be cast and to whom admission tickets shall be sent, but such remittances must in all cases be accompanied by the full price of the tickets purchased, at 50 cents each. No contestant is agent for the State Fair Commission, and ticket orders and voting coupons will be recognized only when accompanied by the full amount of tickets sold.

7. This announcement is made simultaneously in each city and town in New Mexico having a daily or weekly newspaper, and the State Fair Commission will mail coupon books, receipts and blanks to those desiring to become candidates, in the order of their receipt, on and after July 2nd. No tickets will be counted which are received earlier than Monday, July 3rd, and no vote will be counted that is mailed to or delivered to the State Fair Commission later than midnight of September 15th. In order that remote districts may be fairly dealt with, tickets mailed before midnight September 15th, and so certified by the local postmaster, will be counted on receipt.

An instance of the public spirit shown in this campaign was given by a prominent merchant who had left the city for his summer vacation and was enjoying himself amid the cool breezes of Atlantic City. Learning from his home papers of the campaign that was being made for funds, he lost no time in wiring his subscription for fifty per cent more than he gave last year and at the same time made an appeal to other merchants to follow his example.

President Southard left this week for the northern part of the State in the interest of the Fair. In every county that he has entered so far, Mr. Southard has found the people enthusiastic regarding the Fair, and there seems no reason to doubt that there will be a bigger and better representation of counties in the exhibit of the resources of the State this year even than there was last year when such a splendid showing was made.

COMMISSIONS FOR ALL CONTESTANTS

1. No Maid of Honor will be allotted to any county in which less than two hundred (200) tickets are sold, and for which \$100 is received by the State Fair Commission. Each contestant other than the Queen, the First Maid of Honor and the County Maids of Honor, will receive a cash reward of ten per cent (10%) on all money remitted to the State Fair Commission, to be counted as votes for herself. Should a contestant other than those named above remit \$200 to the Commission, the lady for whom such tickets are voted would receive from the Commission a check for \$20. The same proportion will be maintained for larger or smaller amounts. DO NOT DEDUCT COMMISSIONS. THE STATE FAIR COMMISSION MUST RECEIVE THE FULL FACE VALUE (50 CENTS) FOR EACH TICKET SOLD BEFORE A TICKET OF ADMISSION WILL BE ISSUED OR VOTES CAST FOR THE CANDIDATE. COMMISSIONS ON TICKET SALES WILL BE REMITTED TO EACH CANDIDATE AT THE CLOSE OF THE CONTEST. A careful accounting system has been installed whereby each candidate will receive accurate credit for each remittance and full credit for all votes allotted to her by sale of tickets.

2. There is no limit to the number of tickets which may be purchased by any one person. There are six (6) days of the State Fair, and a person purchasing six tickets for \$3 may cast 300 votes for the contestant of his choice, and 50 votes for each ticket purchased.

EIGHTY UNIVESITY BOYS HAVE PROFITABLE JOBS FOR SUMMER.

Albuquerque, N. M., June 22.—Not only do a great many students at the New Mexico State University pay their own way in whole or in part, while the University is in session, but a surprising number of them find profitable employment in New Mexico during the summer months. Al. S. Hunt, secretary to President David R. Boyd has on his list seventy-nine University students who have found regular employment for the summer months, paying from \$60 to \$100 a month and in a number of instances over that amount. These latter will earn more than enough to pay college expenses for the coming University year, while all will be able to put aside enough to go a long way toward paying expenses for another year at the University.

Of the seventy nine listed with the President's secretary, three are with the border guard at Columbus; seven are in the forestry service, five as forest guards, one as a captain of forest guards and one as a forestry office man. Four have positions in mines, two having important positions in engineering work, one with the Chino Copper company and another with Phelps-Dodge & Co., at Hurley. Six are employed in stores, four in hotels, six have office positions, two are in post offices, three in banks, three are teaching in summer schools, or tutoring, twelve are on farms and cattle ranches, several have positions on University work, in campus improvement, on the University land survey, etc. Two are with newspapers. One is employed by the state taxpayers' Association. The whole list, in fact, have found profitable employment.
