## THE MEXICAN VOLCANO.

The Mexican Volcano is now in the most serious eruption that has ever been developed yet.

The United States Government has shown its utmost patience and leniency in dealing with that unfortunate country, cursed as it has been with selfish, grafting and incompetent rulers. The limit of our patience has been reached and it would seem that the avoidance of war is well nigh impossible. In 1898, the peace-loving McKinley had confidently hoped to avoid a war with Spain until the Battleship Maine was blown up, and after that event, he entertained but the slightest hope that war could be avoided between the two countries.

The attack last week on a small detachment of General Pershing's forces, is very likely to result in rendering war inevitable, just as the blowing up of the battleship Maine did in 1898.

As every well informed person knows Mexico has no munition factories of any consequence, nor has she the skilled workmen with which to either construct or operate them, and as all of her arms have been obtained from this country, which have now been cut off, and as our navy can easily blockade her coast, it will be seen that Mexico would be entirely at our mercy.

### REPUBLICAN SUCCESS ASSURED.

The indorsement of Mr. Hughes by the Bull-moosers, has now made Republican success practically certain. It is very likely that Mr. Hughes will poll about 90% of the progressive votes which Mr. Roosevelt received in 1912. This would mean the addition of about 3,700,000 votes to the Republican ticket which renders the success of the Republican ticket almost beyond doubt.

President Wilson's habit of writing notes to foreign countries instead of maintaining a vigorous foreign policy, as was the case when we had such great Secretaries of State, as Root, Knox and Hay; has so disgusted the country, that every thoughtful American citizen is eagerly looking forward to the time when our foreign affairs will again command the respect and fear of the civilized world as it did in the good old days when the Republican party ruled the country.

## UNITED STATES AND MEXICO.

Paul C. Peterson, a distinguished graduate of the class of 1914, has applied for a commission as second lieutenant in the regular army, and will no doubt be appointed in a short time. A number of other graduates of the institute are being urged to file their applications for commissions, as the need of trained men who have had the advantages of both a military and an academic education was never so great in the army.

## WAR PRODUCES WORLD PARALYSIS.

More than a year ago we were agreed, most of us in United States that war was the most terrible calamity that could befall a nation. And we saw clearly, the most of us, that the impending ruin of Europe was due to over armament, the dependence of force and intimidation instead of international conciliation and justice. And before hatred was rife and international slander obscured the very heavens most men in United States welcomed the message of peace.

Now that more than a year of the great war has displayed to us the most awful catastrophe possible to human civilization, and has shown the imbecility of war lords and war-makers, too feeble even to think of stopping the war, they have blindly brought on, utterly incapable of positive action, we find that the world is paralyzed, and is stupidly and hysterically impatient with every influence that looks over peace.

This is a phase of the mortal damage of war; blind partisanship crowds of justice, and the call of human fellowship across the lines is smothered in the wages of hate.

## Federal Inquiry or Railroad Strike?

Faced by demands from the conductors, engineers, firemen and brakemen that would impose on the country an additional burden in transportation costs of \$100,000,000 a year, the railroads propose that this wage problem be settled by reference to an impartial Federal tribunal.

With these employees, whose efficient service is acknowledged, the railroads have no differences that could not be considered fairly and decided justly by such a public body.

### Railroads Urge Public Inquiry and Arbitration

The formal proposal of the railroads to the employees for the settlement of the controversy is as follows:

"Our conferences have demonstrated that we cannot harmonize our differences of opinion and that eventually the matters in controversy must be passed upon by other and disinterested agencies. Therefore, we propose that your proposals and the proposition of the railroads be disposed of by one or the other of the following methods:

1. Preferably by submission to the Interstate Commerce Commission, the only tribunal which, by reason of its accumulated information bearing on railway conditions and its control of the revenue of the railways, is in a position to consider and protect the rights and equities of all the interests affected, and to provide additional revenue necessary to meet the added cost of operation in case your proposals are found by the Commission to be just and reasonable; or, in the event the Interstate Commerce Commission cannot, under existing laws, act in the premises, that we jointly request Congress to take such action as may be necessary to enable the Commission to consider and promptly dispose of the questions involved; or
2. By arbitration in accordance with the provisions of the Federal law" (The Newlands Act).

### Leaders Refuse Offer and Take Strike Vote

Leaders of the train service brotherhoods, at the joint conference held in New York, June 1-15, refused the offer of the railroads to submit the issue to arbitration or Federal review, and the employees are now voting on the question whether authority shall be given these leaders to declare a nation-wide strike.

The Interstate Commerce Commission is proposed by the railroads as the public body to which this issue ought to be referred for these reasons:

No other body with such an intimate knowledge of railroad conditions has such an unquestioned position in the public confidence. The rates the railroads may charge the public for transportation are now largely fixed by this Government board. Out of every dollar received by the railroads from the public nearly one-half is paid directly to the employees as wages; and the money to pay increased wages can come from no other source than the rates paid by the public. The Interstate Commerce Commission, with its control over rates, is in a position to make a complete investigation and render such decision as would protect the interests of the railroad employees, the owners of the railroads, and the public.

### A Question For the Public to Decide

The railroads feel that they have no right to grant a wage preferment of \$100,000,000 a year to these employees, now highly paid and constituting only one fifth of all the employees, without a clear mandate from a public tribunal that shall determine the merits of the case after a review of all the facts.

The single issue before the country is whether this controversy is to be settled by an impartial Government inquiry or by industrial warfare.

### Survey of University Lands

Complete by and of  
the Summer.

Albuquerque, N. M., June 29—The economic survey of the vast land holdings of the University of New Mexico, begun more than a year ago, and carried on under the joint direction of Charles T. Kirk, professor of geology, and John D. Clark, professor of Chemistry in the University, will be completed during the present summer, probably by September 1st. Last year Professors Kirk and Clark, and a corps of student assistants surveyed the University lands in northern New Mexico. This summer they will cover the lands in the southern counties, the work taking them into Valencia, Socorro, Sierra, Grant and Luna Counties.

In addition to all salt bearing lands in the state, the University owns 300,000 acres of approved selections. This vast area has been much more difficult to appraise because it is scattered through almost every County in the state, in tracts of varying size. Different natural conditions have been encountered on almost every tract. The whole acreage has been divided into 40-acre sections. When the survey is complete every 40-acre parcel will have been carefully surveyed and platted and the field notes will contain complete information as to soil analysis, grazing resource, water, mineral prospects, timber stumpage, market availability—in fact a complete economic estimate which will enable the University authorities to estimate accurately the present and probable future commercial value of every acre.
