CARLSBAD'S NORMAL

Committee of Commercial Club Visit Roswell and Obtain Promises of Assistance.

TUCUMCARI, CLOVIS AND ARTESIA RIVALS

But Carlsbad Will Land Normal for the People Here are United.

The Roswell Morning News, of yesterday, contained the following regarding the proposed State Normal school for which a location will be chosen and an appropriation made at the next session of the legislature. Present prospects indicate that this city will be chosen as the site for the school if all pull for it as they should:

Carlsbad invaded Roswell Wednesday soliciting support in securing the eastern territory Normal school, an appropriation for which is expected to be made at the first state legislature.

The following committee appointed by the Commercial club to promote the desires of the City Beautiful for this school, composed of G. M. Cooke, chairman, Dr. F. F. Doepp, recently elected state senator, A. N. Pratt, A. A. Kaiser, and M. C. Stewart, joined S. I. Roberts, the district clerk here to tell the Roswell people just what they wanted and how they expected to get the new school.

Tucumcari, Artesia, and Clovis are the avowed competitors of Carlsbad for the new school. Members of the committee are sure they can place such inducements before the legislature which will result in the ultimate location in one of the most thickly populated sections of the new state.

Roswell and Chaves county are for Carlsbad, and it is assured that our senator and three representatives will give their vote and their power to locate the school to her friendly neighboring town.

Carlsbad has one senator and representative and promises to reciprocate with anything Roswell might desire if she will throw her aid and support for the school.

Clovis is the strongest competitor for the school, and says she will give a \$50,000 cash bonus plus the ten to forty acre site. The Carlsbad committee says they will not let the bonus stand in the way; and they will be prepared to offer a better site, and a cash bonus that will put all the other desirous towns in the shade.

"Carlsbad is an ideal city to locate such a school," prompted the members of the committee while talking enthusiastically about their desires. "We have an ideal climate, every metropolitan convenience without the burden of expense and danger of having the children from home in a metropolis."

Roswell is not making any fight for the Normal realizing she has the pride school of the new state in the New Mexico Military Institute.

They assembled to do honor to the national organization of which they are proud to be a part. They are students at a school established by the Presbyterian church for their benefit and are said to be diligent and obedient scholars.

A Trick Game.

Jennie loved to spring new games on her friends when they came to see her, so she eagerly awaited a little crowd the other day, all members of her class, who invited themselves up after school. One flew over the cuckoo's nest.

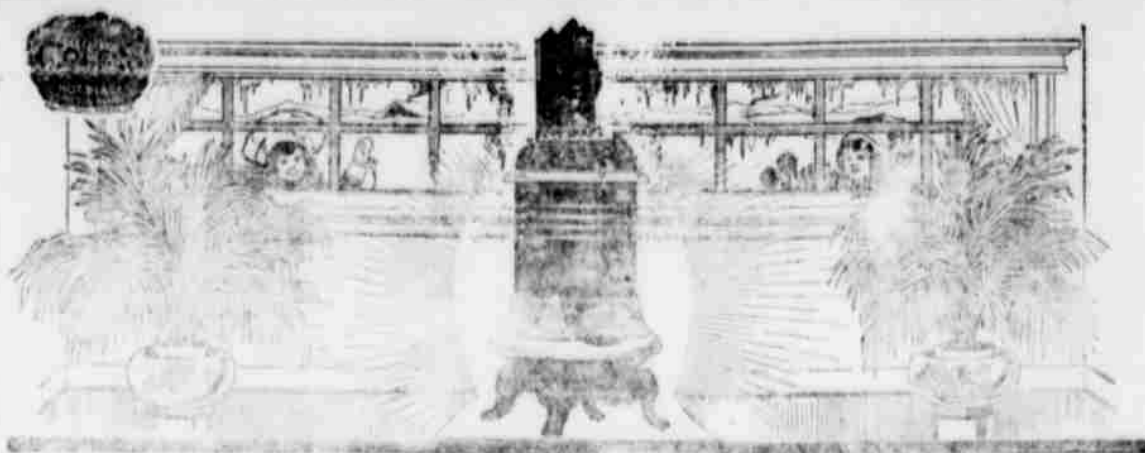
The one who was fouled at the last word was "It" and had to catch the others in the game of "tag."
