## HOW SCIENCE MAKES IN-VISIBLE LIGHT.

**Sun Shine and Fresh Air Are the Best Coalful Means.**

Recent research by scientists has resulted in discoveries as to the mysterious ultra-violet light. This new light is now being for nearly every purpose except illumination for it is invisible. It takes forographs, gives summer tan, bleaches flour, vegetables, cures skin diseases, sends wireless telegrams, makes chemicals, purifies drinking water, sterilizes milk, ages liquors and detects forgeries.

Although the sun is the only natural generator of ultra-violet rays, there another means by which this light can be produced in quantity. The best apparatus science has devised for this purpose is the mercury vapor lamp, especially the arch lamp when the electrodes are built of iron.

Ultra-violet rays are very deadly to bacterial life, and are of especial use in killing off the micro-organisms which cause diseases. So, besides the stimulating effect the sunlight has upon the human body, it has a great bacterial value. Hence the doctrine of fresh air and sunshine is eminently correct.

Sunshine through a window is not nearly so beneficial as direct sun light, as the ultra-violet rays have great difficulty in passing through glass.

## Mistreatment of Americans Will be Investigated.

Acting upon his instructions from Secretary of State Lansing, American Consul Edwards today called upon Andres Garcia, ranking Caranza official on the border, and filed a formal protest against the removal of the two Americans to Chihuahua City. At the same time, he made a request for immediate information as to the charges against them.

He also asked that an investigation be made of the charges against Albert Herold at Chihuahua City. Captain Scobell, British consul in Chihuahua, is acting for the United States in this case, because there now is no American consul in Chihuahua City.

## Greeting Between U. S. and Japan.

It is known by wireless that President Wilson and the Emperor of Japan will exchange tomorrow upon the occasion of the inauguration of a Trans-Pacific wireless services between the United States and Japan.

For the present, it was said service will be confined to San Francisco, Hawaii and Japan.

## New Mexico Was Wet All October.

According to the reports received from worthy sources October was a wet month all over the State. It is only in northeastern Union and Quay counties that a deficiency in precipitation occurred, while the greatest excess occurred over the lower Rio Grande valley and the southwest where it exceeded three inches, reaching five at a few stations.

## Official Canvass in California is Begun.

The official canvass of the vote cast last Tuesday in the presidential election is being made by the fifty-eight counties of the state.

while it is impossible to state when the final returns will be ready, it is estimated that total will be known before December.

## Cold wave Now Moving Towards Eastern States.

The cold wave from the rocky mountains region continued to move eastward today and freezing temperatures had extended southward to the Mexican border, where the troops felt their effect.

For the first time this year, El Paso and the surrounding valleys experienced freezing weather last night. The United States weather bureau office reported the lowest temperature during the night as 21 degrees above zero. Much suffering among the destitute Mexicans of El Paso and Juarez has been reported to the Associated Charities. Haymon Krupp, a merchant, today gave away coal to all destitute Mexican families who applied for it.

## PINK BOLL WORM IN NORTHERN MEXICO, TO COTTON-PRODUCERS

The ink boll worm is the most destructive of all cotton pests. The presence and probable establishment of the pest in the important cotton-growing Laguna District of the State of Coahuila, Mexico, within 200 miles of the Texas-Mexico border, has been determined by specialists in the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Amendments to quarantine regulations have been promulgated by the Secretary of Agriculture seeking to prevent the worm from entering the United States and every possible step will be taken by the Department to make the prohibitions effective and to safeguard the interests of the cotton producers of the United States in other ways.

Recognizing the possibility of introducing the pest into this country in cotton seed, seed cotton, and cottonseed hulls, the United States has prohibited for several years the importation of these products from all cotton-producing territory except 6 States of Northern Mexico. For the same reason cotton lint from such countries has been admitted into the United States only at certain northern ports and after fumigation.

## Physical Culture Is a Need to Valencia Students.

## How Hats Are Used to Find Drowned Men.

As a means of locating the bodies of four United States soldiers who were accidentally drowned in the Rio Grande recently an unusual experiment was tried and proved successful.

A hat was thrown into the water at the point where the men had last been seen and was followed down-stream until, after travelling about five miles from the scene of the accident, it came to an eddy where it moved about slowly for some time. This gave the searchers what they thought might be a clue and following a practice frequently used in searching for bodies, y charge of dynamite was exploded at the point where the progress of the hat had ceased. Immediately the bodies came to the surface.

The explanation of the experiment is that the Rio Grande in this region is tortuous and has many eddies. The searchers rightly assumed that the bodies would be carried down stream until they came to an eddy, which in this instance was indicated by the retarded progress of the hat.

## Albuquerque is Now Ready to Let Contract for Pavement.

The Central Avenue paving project was carried by the council the night before yesterday to the stage where the contract may be formally awarded to J. B. Laughling of Trinidad, Colo. Whose bid for concrete paving was accepted several weeks ago.

The council that night confirmed all proceedings taken by the city so far in the paving matter. This brought the proceedings to a point at which the contract may be let.

### BULL ASSOCIATIONS.

Cooperative Organization En-  
able Dairyman to Have  
Use of Pure-bred Ani-  
mal at Low Cost.

A cooperative bull associa-  
tion is a farmers' organization,  
the chief purpose of which is  
the joint ownership and use of  
high-class, pure-bred bulls. The  
association also may encourage  
careful selection of cows, obtain  
better prices for dairy products,  
introduce better methods of buy-  
ing and selling cattle, work for  
improved sanitary conditions,  
intelligently fight contagious  
diseases of cattle, and in many  
other ways assist the dairy busi-  
ness.

The owners of small herds of  
grade cows often feel that they  
can not afford to purchase valu-  
able pure-bred bulls. In conse-  
quence they buy scrubs, or  
breed their cows to a scrub bull  
or an inferior pure-bred bull on  
some near-by farm. One year  
a Holdstain bull may be used,  
the next year a Jersey, and oc-  
casionally a bull of no particu-  
lar breeding. The work of the  
cooperative bull association  
makes it possible for any farmer  
to own a share in a pure-bred  
bull of high quality.

A bull association in its sim-  
plest form may consist of three  
farmers who together purchase  
three good registered bulls of  
the same breed. Each farmer  
keeps one of these bulls for two  
years, and then the three bulls  
are exchanged to prevent in-  
breeding. For the same reason  
a second exchange is made at the  
end of four years. In this way,  
by paying the purchase price of  
only one bull, each member of  
the association has the use of  
good pure-bred bulls for six  
years. A larger membership in  
the association may either reduce  
expenses or

make possible the purchase of  
better bulls.

The ideal association is com-  
posed of a much larger number  
of farmers. It jointly owns five  
bulls, divides its territory into  
five "breeding blocks," and as-  
signs one bull to each block.  
As many as 50 or 60 cows may  
belong to the farmers in each  
block, and the bull is kept on  
some farm centrally located.  
The blocks are numbered from  
1 to 5, and every two years the  
bulls are moved forward to the  
next block. If all the bulls live  
and retained until each has  
made one complete circuit, no  
new bulls have to be purchased  
during a period of 10 years. As  
soon as the daughters freshen,  
evidence of the sire's true value  
begins to accumulate. This is  
the only true test of a bull's real  
value; but it is self evident that  
this test can not be applied un-  
til the bull approaches the age  
of 4 years. In ordinary farm  
practice bulls are usually dis-  
posed of before their true value can  
be known. The cooperative  
bull association makes it pos-  
sible to obtain several years  
service from bulls that transmit  
desired qualities and to elimi-  
nate all others.

The original cost of the five  
bulls and their annual cost of  
maintenance are usually divided  
among the members of the asso-  
ciation according to the number  
of cows owned by each. Rec-  
ords on file in the Dairy Divi-  
sion of the department show  
that the members of associations  
now organized are getting the  
service of these high-class pure-  
bred bulls at an average cost  
considerably less than they for-  
merly paid for the services of  
scrub bulls or registered bulls of  
doubtful merit. Many farmers  
in Maryland, Michigan, and  
Minnesota, when questioned re-  
garding the value of cooperative  
bull associations, estimated that  
the use of sires belonging to the  
association increased the value  
of the offspring in the first gen-  
eration from 30 to 80 per cent.  
The average of these estimates  
was 65 per cent.

The educational work of each  
association makes the members  
alert to prevent the introduction  
and spread of disease of any  
kind. The well-managed bull  
belonging to the members  
shall be tested for tuberculosis  
and takes every known precau-  
tion to prevent the introduction  
of contagious abortion.

It is greatly to the advantage  
of a cooperative association that  
it be incorporated under State  
laws. This facilitates the trans-  
action of business, equitably  
distributes responsibility, and

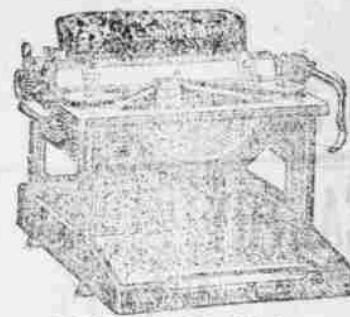

The Secretary of the Interior  
has authorized the sale at pub-  
lic auction, at the United States  
land office at Las Cruces, New  
Mexico, on November 22, 1916,  
of the property known as the  
"Ojo Caliente Reservation,"  
situated in Socorro County, New  
Mexico. It comprises five sec-  
tions of land on which were sit-  
uated the buildings of the ag-  
ency of the former Hot Springs  
Reservation.

There are 3,200 acres to be

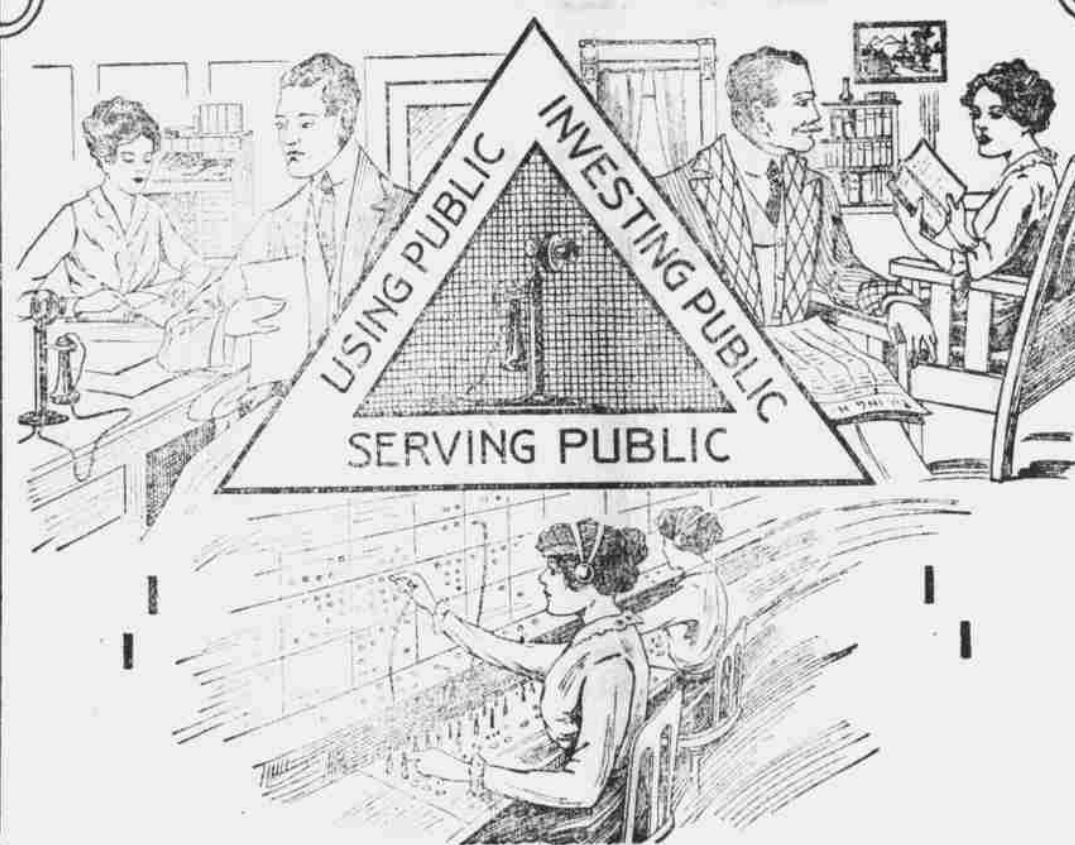
