## EMPEROR FRANCIS JOSEPH IS DEAD.

### 68 YEARS OF GOVERNMENT MARKED WITH SUCCESSIVE TRAGEDIES.

### HE WAS THE BROTHER OF MAXIMILIAN. CALLED EMPEROR OF MEXICO AND THERE EXECUTED.

Francis Joseph, Emperor of Austria and King of Hungaria died the night before last at 9 o'clock at Shoenbrum castle, according to a Reuter dispatch from Vienna by way of Amsterdam.

Francis Joseph reined both Austria and Hungaria of more than 68 years. His Brother Maximilian was crowned as Emperor of Mexico in 1864 and shot in Queretaro in 1867; his sister was burned to death in Paris, and a niece in Vienna; Crown Prince Rudolph and Baroness Marie Vetsera are found dead in a hunter lodge and whether they were murdered or committed themselves suicide never shall be known; Archduke Johann Salvator, his favorite nephew and heir to throne, after death of Crown Prince, sails away on merchant ship and his fate is sunk in mystery; Empress Elizabeth is assassinated, and killing of nephew, Archduke Ferdinand by servants, plunges world into the actual tremendous war.

Archduke Charles Francis Joseph, grand nephew of Francis Joseph is heir to the throne and has been in command of the Austrian armies.

"If it can be arranged as to leave the site west of the depot outside of the city limits, well and good, but if not, the factory will be built outside of the present limits at a location to be decided upon later."

"The present members of the city board are ready and willing to do everything within their power to assure the factory."

## New Bank Institution in Carrizozo.

The announced new bank for Carrizozo has at last been a real fact. The new banking firm is entitled "The Lincoln State Bank." This bank incorporates under the now existing state banking laws with a capital stock of \$25,000. The papers' institution has been approved by the State Bank Examiner and full charter granted. Then the business in that bank will be open by January 1st, 1917.

## Skeptical as to Murder of Foreigners in Parral by Villa Band.

Some Americans who the 21st came from Parral have said they were skeptical of reports that all foreigners remaining there had been killed after Villa and his bandits occupied Parral. The such Americans said there were about sixty Americans and other foreigners in Parral, November 2nd, believing Villa would come there after taking Santa Rosalia.

## Inauguration of Governorship.

According to the constitutional law the inauguration of governor elect and other state officers elected on November 7, will take place the first week of January.

## LAWYERS LAUNCH FIRST SKIRMISH IN 8-HOUR Law Litigation.

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 22.

Legal skirmishing in the fight of the railroads of the United States against the Adamson eight-hour law was brought to a sudden issue today by a motion filed by the government in the United States district court here, which, it is expected, will result in a decision on the constitutionality of the law by the supreme court of the United States before January 1, when the law is to go into effect.

### DIRECTS MOTION AGAINST RECEIVERS.

"Prolonged litigation, should, if possible, be avoided, otherwise injury may result to the public and the railroads and their employees," the government says, in its motion as a reason for its action.

The government's motion, which was directed against Chiefs Alexander and Henry C. Ferris, receivers for the Missouri, Oklahoma and Gulf railroad, embodied two distinct requests of the court as follows:

### REQUESTS TO COURT.

"1. The government asks an immediate decision on the injunction petition filed by the receivers of the Missouri, Oklahoma and Gulf, in which the Adamson law was attacked, as unconstitutional and an order requested forbidding its enforcement. The government contends that the injunction petition should be dismissed because the law is constitutional, therefore leaving the railroad no basis in equity for its action."

## American Commissioners Attitude Amazed Mexican Commissioners.

Owing to the ambiguity of the conduct developed by the Mexican commissioners in the problems which have arisen between United States and Mexico, the American commissioners according to the instructions from Washington received, made unchangeable propositions, being of them that American troops will quit Mexico provided Carranza proves ability to control the country. Mexican commissioners ask enough time to give an answer. It is expected that this attitude of United States will bring a satisfactory solution to the difficulties.

## IT SEEMS RAILROAD STRIKE NOT POSSIBLE.

### Labor Leaders Expect Much from Congress.

### BROTHERHOODS AND FEDERATION MAY BE WORK TOGETHER.

Brotherhoods leaders left Baltimore undetermined as to what their next step would be. Their determination depends upon the railroads either put or not the Adamson law into effect at January 1st.

Labor and brotherhoods leaders are confident that the coming session of congress will provide something to reinforce the Adamson law.

Some efforts have been made to effect an affiliation between the American Federation of Labor and the railway brotherhoods.

Federation leaders think that primary object to the such affiliation is to bring about an universal eight-hour law.

## Something About the Living In U. S.

The high cost of living will probably affect the people of this country as seriously as never has been expected. Prices of commodities classed as necessities of life have increased from fifteen to forty per cent and wages are the same. The associated Charities announce great apprehension as to the needs of the poor in the coming winter. It is undoubted that while some people had profited greatly from war-order prosperity, there are many thousands who do not find their incomes are the level of the increased cost of living.

## NEGOCIATION FOR PEACE.

The movement for peace negotiations, according a well informed German paper is about to assume definite shape in the way to joint various neutral governments in order to call the belligerents asking them to send delegates to a peace conference.

## NATIONAL FARM LOAN ASSOCIATION.

The 20th of this month we  
attended the meeting held in  
the federal building of Albu-  
querque by the Board of Wash-  
ington and some farmers from  
several points of the State and  
we were so glad to know the  
subject of that meeting. We  
have the purpose to let know our  
readers all the matters in con-  
nection with the "Farm Loan  
Associations" and we start pub-  
lishing one of the items, which  
is as follows:

### NATIONAD FARM LOAN ASSOCIATION.

#### ORGANIZATION.

"A national farm loan asso-  
ciation may be organized in any  
community where 10 citizens  
owning land desire to borrow an  
aggregate of not less than \$20,-  
000. The land must be unin-  
cumbered or the proceeds of the  
loan must be used, in part, to  
remove any lien. Loans may be  
as small as \$100, or as large as  
\$10,000.

They must first make applica-  
tion, in writing, for a charter to  
the Federal land bank of the  
district in which the association  
desires to do business. This  
application must be signed by  
all those desiring to form the  
association, stating specifically  
the name under which they de-  
sire to do business, the amount  
each one desires to borrow, the  
estimated value of the security  
each one offers, the territory in  
which the association desires to  
do business, how the proceeds  
of the loan are to be used, and  
other details set forth in the  
blank forms which are furnished.

"The application having been  
signed, together with another

blank form furnished, called an  
"organization certificate," the  
applicants become a tentative  
organization and elect an agent  
to represent them, called a "sec-  
retary-treasurer"; they also select  
a committee of three, called a  
"loan committee." This  
agent will then receive, from  
each of the applicants, a sub-  
scription to the stock of the asso-  
ciation they are forming equal  
to 5 per cent of the loan they  
severally desire, which is not  
requested to be paid unless the  
loan is granted. That is, each  
borrower must subscribe for such  
stock to the amount of 5 per  
cent of his own loan and no  
more.

The application for the char-  
ter having been signed, the sig-  
natures must be acknowledged  
before a notary public or other  
qualified to administer oaths,  
and then it must be forwarded  
by the secretary-treasurer to the  
Federal land bank of the dis-  
trict.

"Upon its receipt the bank  
will send its agent to examine  
into the representations made in  
the application and, if found sat-  
isfactory, a charter will be  
granted.

"Upon the granting of the  
charter, the individuals signing  
the application become a body  
corporate, which gives it the  
right to do the business author-  
ized by the farm loan act, to  
extend its benefits to others by  
taking in new members from  
time to time, and to have suc-  
cession indefinitely. New mem-  
bers must be borrowers whose  
loans may be as small as \$100  
or as large as \$10,000.

Let it be plainly understood  
that farmers can organize at  
once, but they can not borrow  
money until the land banks are  
established.

#### MANAGEMENT.

"After the charter is granted  
the applicants no longer act in  
their individual capacity, but  
become merged as shareholders  
into a corporation, which has a  
separate existence created by  
law, under the name which has  
been chosen and set forth in the  
original application and organi-  
zation certificate. This corpora-  
tion will have directors and offi-  
cers selected by the sharehold-  
ers to do business in accordance  
with the by-laws which the  
shareholders make for their  
guidance. The active executive  
officer of the association will be  
the secretary-treasurer, and his  
duties are set forth in section 7  
of the farm loan act.

#### POWERS.

These associations are or-  
ganized for the primary purpose

of giving to each borrower the  
benefit of the combined credit of  
all its members to the extent of  
the capital contributed and the  
limited liability they each incur,  
and hence the associations are  
required to indorse every loan  
made to members. It is also  
through these associations that  
the borrowers will ultimately be-  
come the owners of the Federal  
land banks. The association  
decides whether any loan shall  
be made or not by refusing the  
application for every loan which  
is considered unsafe or even  
doubtful. No loan can be made  
unless it is approved by the loan  
committee after examination of  
the land offered as security.

The national farm loan asso-  
ciations are not limited as to the  
number of their members. After  
one is organized it may serve an  
entire neighborhood by receiv-  
ing new members. Each asso-  
ciation may obtain in loans for  
its members twenty times the  
amount of its stock in the Fed-  
eral land bank, no matter how  
large its holdings of stock may  
become by the growth of the  
association.

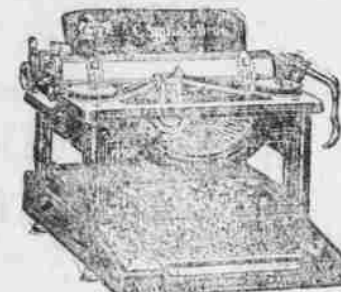
#### LIMITATIONS.

1. No loan may be made  
except upon the security of first

mortgages.  
2. The amount of the mort-  
gage can not exceed one half  
the appraised value of the land  
and 20 per cent of the perman-  
ent improvements thereon, which  
must be insured.  
3. The proceeds of the loan  
must be used for the extinguish-  
ment of preexisting indebtedness  
or for productive purposes, which  
includes the purchase of live-  
stock, fertilizers, equipment and  
improvements (see section 12  
farm loan act).  
4. Every mortgage must  
contain an agreement to pay off  
the debt (principal and interest)  
in fixed annual or semiannual  
installments.  
5. The amount of each instal-  
lment may be fixed by the  
borrower, but can not be less  
than sufficient to pay off the  
debt in 40 years, nor greater  
than to pay it off in 5 years.  
6. The rate of interest charg-  
ed any borrower can not exceed  
6 per cent per annum.  
7. The borrower can not be  
called upon to pay the debt ex-  
cept by the installments he origi-  
nally fixes, unless he defaults,  
but after five years he may pay  
off the whole or any portion at  
his option at any installment
