NEUTRAL ENVOYS WILL TRANSMIT TEUTON PRO- POSALS TO ENTENTE

A general feeling of pessimism prevails in London regarding the peace proposals which the German government, in concert with its allies, announced today were being made.

One prominent official expressed himself to The Associated Press today as being very skeptical that the proposed terms would offer even a basis for negotiation.

This official said, however, that the note was a dramatic coup which would create interesting developments in the diplomatic situation and provide the first official peace overtures of the war.

The foreign office today informed The Associated Press that it is unable to discuss the German peace until the terms have been received. Meanwhile the attitude of the British government towards possible peace terms remains as frequently enunciated by the former premier and foreign secretary, (that the entente nations must continue fighting until Belgium and France are restored and immunity from German aggression in the future is guaranteed).

Emperor Charles Tells His Army Of Peace Overtures

Amsterdam, Holland, Dec. 13.-A Vienna dispatch says emperor Charles has issued the following to his army and navy:

"With God's gracious assistance and your loyal allies' endurance, we have created a situation in which our final victory is no longer doubtful. In endeavor to give back to our peoples, who have held out heroically, the blessings of peace I and my illustrious allies have attempted to bring about an honorable peace.

"Pray that the Almighty may bestow His blessings on this step, but I am convinced you will continue to fight with the same heroism until peace is concluded or the enemy is beaten crushingly."

Entente Keen to Learn Terms.

Wilson to be Peace Mediator?

Indications are that the various governments of the entente allies do not intend to act hastily in making joint response to the peace proposals of the central powers. It was pointed out in well informed quarters today that while each one of the allied governments might indicate its general attitude, consultation under the treaty binding them to such action probably would require two or three weeks.

MAY EXCHANGE PEACE VIEWS.

Although little confidence is shown in London or Paris that any result will come from the peace proposal of the central powers and the opinion prevails quite generally that the time is not opportune even to discuss terms, there is an undercurrent of feeling that something would be gained by making the world acquainted definitely with the objects of the belligerents. The attitude of the British governments towards the offer will be made known in the house of commons tomorrow provided sufficient time shall have elapsed to permit consultation with Great Britain's allies, and this statement is awaited with the greatest interest.

GRAND JURIES IN 3 CITIES TO ACT

Preparations for the transfer of the federal inquiry into the high cost of living to grand juries at Chicago, New York, Detroit and probably other cities were made today at the department of justice.

United States attorney Anderson of Boston, in charge of the investigation, devoted today to studying the information collected from various sources and reports to the department by its field investigators. It is understood Mr. Anderson will take with him a mass of data relating to the activities of alleged food and coal speculators when he leaves for Chicago.

Much of the information in Mr. Anderson's possession has not yet been dictated, it was said, for lack of time. Such data as he regards important probably will be placed before the various grand juries.

PRESIDENT STUDIES REPOT.

At the white house it was said that president Wilson was continuing his study of reports bearing on the subject and probably would see Mr. Anderson before the latter's departure.

TO DEMAND FOOD EMBARCO IN U.S.

Petitions demanding that an embargo be placed on flour, sugar, canned milks, tomatoes and wheat will be posted in every grocery store in 41 states for housewives to sign. if a resolution presented today to the executive board of the National Association of Retail Grocers and Merchants is adopted.

The petition was presented by Frank B. Connolly, of San Francisco, vice president of the association, who asserted that retail grocers are losing money on 60 percent of the products they sell.

Mr. Connolly said that a similar resolution, adopted by the California Retail Grocers' association, was placed on the counter in every grocery in the state and almost in every instance it was signed by customers.

The resolution calls upon President Wilson to place the embargo "in order to reduce the present high cost of living."

Maj. Gen. H. G. Sharpe Says Already the Deficit \$25,000,000.

Gen. G. H. Sharpe, quartermaster general of the army, told the house military committee today that the war department faced a \$25,000,000 deficit now on account of the extraordinary expenses of the border mobilization and predicted that if the national guard were kept there until June at a strength of 75,000 the deficit would be \$50,000,000.

LLOYD GEORGE ILL

LONDON, ENG., Dec. 11.-Premier Lloyd-George is ill. He was unable to go to Buckingham palace today with members of his cabinet to receive the seals of office from king George.

Official announcement was made that the premier was suffering from a severe chill and on the advice of his physicians he was remaining in doors today.

Premier Lloyd-George has sent the following to all members of the house of commons, it was announced officially today:

SERIOUS MUDDLE MAY ARISE OVER GOVERNORSHIP

A most interesting question has arisen over the governorship which doubtless will be determined by decision of the supreme court. Because of the illness of Governor-elect E. C. Baca, who is now on the Pacific coast and contemplates remaining there for some months, no arrangements are being made here for his inauguration, and it is said that Governor McDonald will continue to discharge the duties of the office until such time as Mr. de Baca shall be able to qualify.

This power Governor McDonald will assume under Article 20, Section 197, of the state constitution, which says: "Every officer, unless removed, shall hold his office until his successor has duly qualified."

REPUBLICAN CONTENTION

But it is understood that the republicans will contest, should de Baca not appear to take the oath of office, that the provision of Article 5, Section 69, of the constitution which says that the terms of all state officers shall begin on the first day of January next after their election, will displace McDonald.

It is intimated that an action will be brought to have the office of governor declared vacant, if de Baca does not come forward and take the oath of office, thus turning the executive power over

Hon. H. O. Bursum, Repub-
lican candidate for governor of
New Mexico in the recent election,
and defeated by Ezequiel De
Baca by 1,000 votes, was in the
city Wednesday and Thursday
of this week in company with
Judge M. C. Mechem, district
judge of Socorro, and Mr. Dodon,
a mining man of Hanover. Mr.
Bursum and Judge Mechem
are traveling in an auto and had
been to Hanover for the purpose
of inspecting some mining prop-
erty in that rapidly growing
camp.

That Mr. Bursum takes his
defeat with more than the usual
philosophy of those who stake
their political fortunes on the
hazards of little white slips of
paper is shown by his cheery
smile and warm handclasp.
When asked what he regarded
the leading factors in partial
defeat of the Republican ticket
in the state, Mr. Bursum said he
thought that Mr. Wilson's
popularity resulting from the
Democrat slogan "He Kept Us
Out of War" had more to do
with it than anything—Wilson's
strength carried thru the rest of
the ticket—that and the race
issue combined.

Although defeated for governor
Mr. Bursum has not lost interest
in beneficial legislation for the
state and spoke of many con-
structive measures that should
receive serious consideration at
the coming session of the state
legislature.

Mr. Bursum was especially
gratified at the handsome major-
ity he received in the rock-ribbed
Democratic county of Grant and
expressed his warm appreciation
of same desiring to thank his
many friends and supporters for

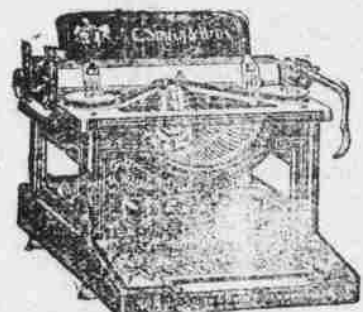

to Lieutenant Governor Lindsey
under provision of the constitution,
Article 5, Section 75, which
says:

"In case the governor is absent
from the state, or is for any
reason unable to perform the
duties, the lieutenant governor
shall act as governor, with all
the powers, duties and emolu-
ments of the office until such
disability be removed."

"If the court should declare
vacancy, the lieutenant govern-
or would automatically become
governor. But, if before such
decision was rendered Mr. d
Baca should appear and qualify,
and after that he should, because
of his health, not be able to

discharge the duties of the office,
Mr. Lindsey would become
acting governor during such
disability.

SAFETY DEMANDS FEDERAL CONTROL OF THE RAILROADS

Only Way to Meet Emergencies
of Nation, Says A. P. Thom.

STATES' RIGHTS PRESERVED

Principles Which Railways Hold Should
Govern Regulatory System in Inter-
ests of Public and the Roads—Com-
pulsory System of Federal Incorpor-
ation Favored.

Washington, Dec. 4.—That the inter-
ests of national defense require that
control of railway lines should rest
with the federal government and not
with the states was the claim ad-
vanced by Alfred P. Thom, counsel
to the Railway Executives' Advisory
Committee, in concluding his prelimi-
nary statement of the case for the
railways before the Newlands Joint
Committee on Interstate Commerce.

"We must be efficient as a nation if
we are to deal successfully with our
national emergencies," said Mr. Thom,
and we must appreciate that efficient
transportation is an essential condition
of national efficiency. If we are to
not and weaken our transportation
systems by state lines, by the perma-
nent imposition of burdens by unwise
regulation, we will make national effi-
ciency impossible."

States' Rights Would Not Suffer.
Mr. Thom cited many instances in
which shippers in one state were
harmed by selfish regulations
imposed on the railroads by
neighboring states. He pointed out
that federal regulation would be no in-
fringement of the rights of the states but
could be the means of preserving the
rights which they acquired when they
entered the Union, one of which was
the right to the free movement of their
products across state boundaries.

What the Railroads Advocate.
The principles which the railroads
believe should be incorporated in any
system of regulation were sum-
marized by Mr. Thom as follows:

1. The entire power and duty of regu-
lation should be in the hands of the
national government, except as to mat-
ters so essentially local and incidental
that they cannot be used to interfere
with the efficiency of the service or the
rights of the carriers.
2. As one of the means of accom-
plishing this, a system of compulsory
federal incorporation should be adopt-
ed, into which should be brought all
railroad corporations engaged in inter-
state or foreign commerce.
3. The Interstate Commerce Commis-
sion under existing laws has too much
to do and is charged with conflicting
functions, including the investigation,
prosecution and decision of cases. The
entire duties should be placed in the
hands of a new body which might be
called the Federal Railroad Commis-
sion. Regional Commissions should
be established in different parts of
the country to assist the Interstate
Commerce Commission by handling lo-
cal cases.
4. The power of the Commission
should be extended to enable it to pre-
scribe minimum rates and not merely
maximum rates as at present. This
could increase their power to prevent
unjust discriminations.
5. Justice to Public and Roads.
It should be made the duty of the
Interstate Commerce Commission, in
the exercise of its powers to fix rea-
sonable rates, to so adjust these rates
that they shall be just at once to the
public and to the carriers. To this end
the Commission, in determining rates,
should consider the necessity of main-
taining efficient transportation and ex-
penses of facilities, the relation of
expenses to rates and the rights of
shippers, stockholders and creditors of
the roads.
6. The Interstate Commerce Commis-
sion should be invested with the pow-
er to fix the rates for carrying mails.
7. The federal government should
have exclusive power to supervise the
issue of stocks and bonds by railroad
carriers engaged in interstate and for-
eign commerce.
8. The law should recognize the es-
sential difference between things which
restrain trade in the case of ordinary
mercantile concerns and those which
restrain trade in the case of common
carriers. The question of competition
is not the only fair criterion.
9. The law should expressly provide
for the meeting and agreement of traf-
fic or other officers of railroads in re-
spect of rates or practices. This
should, however, be safeguarded by
requiring the agreements to be filed
with the Interstate Commerce Commis-
sion and to be subject to be disapprov-
ed by it.

"My legal proposition," Mr. Thom
said, "is that the constitution as it
now is gives full authority to Congress
to regulate the instrumentalities of in-
terstate commerce in all their parts.
If the power of regulation is to reach
the public requirements, it must be co-
extensive with the instrumentalities of
commerce."

Mr. Thom explained that the roads
are not asking either of the Committee
or of Congress any increase in reve-
nues, but that they are merely asking
the perfection of a system which will
be responsible to any need that may
arise.
