PROPER WAY TO PLOW

STRAIGHT, WELL-TURNED FURROW IS SOUGHT BY FARMER.

Very Important That Soil Be Sufficiently Moist to Pulverize Nicely—Plowed Land Readily Absorbs Rainfall.

(By R. G. WEATHERSTONE) The pride of every good plowman is a straight, well-turned furrow; and yet its straightness is but a small part of its merit.

With land that is to be put into crop soon after plowing, as in the case of spring plowing, it is very important that the ground, if possible, be sufficiently moist to pulverize nicely, and that each day's plowing shall be harrowed at once.

verizes it more completely and checks the loss of moisture by evaporation. With the fall plowing of land that is not going to be put into crop until the following spring, it is not so important that the furrow-slice pulverize as completely, for lumps and clods that are turned up will crumble and pulverize by the action of rain, air, sunshine and frost.

Plowed land readily absorbs rainfall, and the loosely-turned furrows increase the storage capacity of the soil. Plowing is also the principal method by which grain stubble and other forms of organic matter are introduced into the soil.

HINTS FOR POTATO GROWERS

Determining Factor in Production of Maximum Crop of Tubers is Purity of Seed Stock.

Good seed is a determining factor in the production of maximum crops of potatoes.

All tubers showing discoloration of the flesh should be rejected. Purity of seed stock is an essential quality of good seed.

A more liberal use of seed will generally result in both increased production and profit.

The use of high-grade seed would increase the returns from the potato crop of the country by many millions of dollars.

A good storage place is essential in order to insure sound, firm seed at planting time.

KEROSENE IS CHEAP REMEDY

Not Only Good Lice Killer But Often Small Dose of Oil Will Cure Cholera in Chicks.

(By J. M. MARTIN.) If kerosene were not so common and cheap we would consider it a great poultry remedy.

I have cured my hens by the use of a small spring-bottom oil can, with which I injected a little oil into their nests.

If their heads are swelled about the swollen part with common vaseline. Continue this treatment about four days.

Kerosene is a good lice killer; so is hot salt brine.

Often a teaspoonful of kerosene will cure the cholera in chicks.

Bury Worthless Eggs. As you remove the worthless eggs from the incubator when a hatch is finished, keep them in a tight box until you can bury them.

Care of Hen House. Spray a light solution of carbolic acid over the walls of the hen house now and then.

PREPARING FOR CLOVER CROP

Often a Good Plan to Break Ground the Preceding Spring and Grow Fertilizing Crop.

If the aim is to get clover and grass on a thin soil it is often a good plan to break the ground the preceding spring and to grow a fertilizing crop during the summer that can be cultivated and then disked into the surface soil.

On very thin land I have gotten the finest clover sod in this way, says a writer in an exchange. Expensive way? someone asks. Well, any way of covering thin soil with a heavy clover sod is not inexpensive.

If one prefers, rape may be sown the 1st of September, and then the land fitted for clover in the spring without the plow. Leave the vegetable matter at the surface.

KEEP THE MACHINERY OILED

Usefulness of Implements is Greatly Increased and Amount of Labor Greatly Reduced.

One of the little things that is lacking on a majority of farm implements is a good and convenient system of lubrication. The common oil cup with open top or loose cap is sure to get filled with dirt and grit, which cut out the bearings, largely increasing the power required to operate the machine and greatly reducing its period of usefulness.

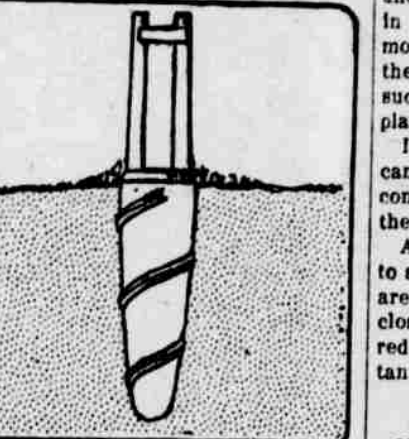
The hard oil cup, which holds enough oil to last a week or more, always is tight, and can be screwed down a little each day, thus insuring a clean bearing and a regular supply of grease.

The oil holes can easily be reamed out and threaded to the proper standard and the hard oil cups screwed into them. The amount of work and expense required will be returned many fold in the saving of horseflesh and the increased life of the machinery.

THREAD FOR CONCRETE POST

Idea Discovered Several Years Ago in Securing Telephone Poles Now Being Put to Use.

The latest way of setting concrete fence posts is to put screw threads on the lower ends of the posts and twist them into the ground just as a screw is driven into a board. Some one found several years ago if the lower end of a telephone post was pointed and a rope was coiled about it like a screw thread, the post could be screwed into soft earth easily.

crete fence post which was recently patented. When the post is molded, the lower end is tapered slightly and a spiral thread of concrete is formed as an integral part of the base. Greater lightness is secured in the post by molding the upper part in the form of three slender reinforced rods of concrete tied together with solid rings at intervals.

Best Soil for Alfalfa. Alfalfa seems to do best on sandy loam soils that have a good supply of plant food and are well drained, though it has been known to have grown in a heavy clay soil.

Free Range for Turkeys. Turkeys may have free range in order to do well. Do not keep them closely confined. If you have them regularly they will continue to come up at that time for their feed even if allowed to run free.

Low Vitality of Hogs. Coarseness in hogs indicates low vitality, sluggishness and slow feeding qualities.

GOOD SOIL TILLAGE LESSON

By Pulverizing Top of Land Two or Three Inches Escape of Moisture is Effectually Prevented.

A practical and successful southwestern man recently made this statement to the Interstate Farmer:

"I had a field of ordinary upland soil, and undertook to plow it about ten days after cutting a crop of wheat. I found it too dry to plow. I quit trying and got out the disk. I disked the surface of that field, but of course could not go deep. Two weeks later I went in with the plow, and found that I could do a pretty good job of plowing, though there had not been a drop of rain in the meantime."

The statement was questioned, but it was a fact.

When the first attempt to plow was made, the soil had dried out on account of the numerous cracks made by the effect of the sun and the wind. These cracks quickly extend as deep as the soil has been plowed. After they are formed, the moisture is permitted to escape through them and is carried away in the atmosphere.

This lesson is one of the most valuable that can be learned in soil tillage. It is a theory that works out perfectly in practice. Of course there must be moisture in the subsoil; otherwise, though the tops of the "chimneys" or cracks may be closed, the disk will not avail much, for there will be no moisture to rise, and consequently none to stop.

ALFALFA AS A SOIL BUILDER

One of Biggest Advantages of Plant is Its Ability to Increase Nitrogen Content of Soil.

(By D. W. FREAR, Colorado Agricultural College.) The great virtue of alfalfa is its ability to increase the nitrogen content of the soil. About 77 per cent. of the air is nitrogen. It is estimated that there are 35,000 tons over every acre of land, worth, at the present rate of 18 cents a pound, over \$12,000,000, if it could be used.

They take the nitrogen from the air and use it in their life processes and then give it up to the alfalfa plant in another form. Alfalfa plants remove a large amount of nitrogen from the soil, but the bacteria collect it such that a portion is left for other plants that follow.

All plants which have the ability to add nitrogen to the soil, like alfalfa, are called legumes. Some legumes closely related to alfalfa are sweet, red and white clover; some more distantly related are beans and peas.

Lacking Humus. Humus is the one factor that is lacking in practically all of our old tilled lands. Under the methods of farming generally practiced in the Northwest the drain on the humus content has been steady and persistent.

Milk Carries Germs. Milk may convey the active agent of some of our transmissible diseases. Cows having tuberculosis of the udder give off tubercle bacilli in the milk.

Secrets of Egg Getting. The secrets of egg production consist of a good supply of grit, good health, plenty of exercise, pure food, green food, fresh water, green cut bones, freedom from lice, regularity in feeding, cool houses in summer and warm ones in winter, and breeding only from the best-laying stock.

Cold Rains Hurt Sheep. Warm summer showers will not hurt sheep, but cold spring rains are quite different. If you are too busy to go after the sheep when you see a storm coming up, why not build them some sort of shelter out in the pasture field?

The same farmers' dogs came bounding off the fence to chew up something, and most of them got hold of the mastiff before they knew whether he was a poodle or an elephant. Manitoba is now commencing to produce considerable corn, chiefly for feeding purposes. In some cases, where the crop can be matured into the dough stage, silos could be used and would be a profitable investment. According to the Farm and Ranch Review, a correspondent visited a field of corn in southern Manitoba on September 28. The corn then was untouched by frost and it stood on an average eight and nine feet in height. The corn had developed into the dough stage, and the crop would easily exceed 20 tons to the acre. At many experimental farms, the same favorable showing of the corn crop has manifested itself. At the Brandon experimental farm this year several varieties, all very good yielders, matured into good silo corn.

## CORN CAN BE GROWN ON CANADIAN PRAIRIES

Considering the success with which corn can be produced, and the advantages to be gained by so producing it, should not it receive the serious attention of the western agriculturist? Corn is successfully grown in the northern part of Minnesota in similar soil and under the same climatic condition, and there does not appear to be any reason why like results should not be secured in western Canada. It is the opinion of many American farmers of experience that the corn belt is extending northward. The prairie provinces must gradually take up with mixed farming. More stock on the farms must be raised, and in consequence farming must to some extent be diverted from grain growing to other necessary crops. If crops suitable for wintering cattle and especially dairy stock are to be grown, why should not corn be one of these crops? In Ontario and in the United States we find it forms the main bulky food for wintering beef and dairy cattle. They would not be without this profitable plant. In fact, since its introduction almost twice as much stock can be retained on the same amount of land, besides considering its great value for keeping the land clean. Some may say that many crops that can be grown in Ontario and the States cannot be grown here, but not so with corn, even now we find scattered fields of corn in Alberta and Saskatchewan.—Advertisement.

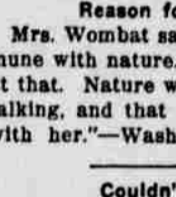


