County comission- ers proceedings.

Special session Feb. 11, 1918

The Board of County Commissioners met, there were present: Manuel Sandoval, Chairman; Federico Sanchez and Adolphe Didier, commissioners, Placido Jaramillo, Sheriff and J. M. Luna, Clerk.

The minutes of the two previous meetings were read and approved.

Project statement prepared by James C. Harvey, County surveyor, in conformity with the resolution adopted Jan. 7, 1918, for the construction of a road from a point two and one-half miles south of Belen to the Socorro County line, involving a total cost of \$21,578.15, was approved and signed by the Commissioners, and the Clerk was instructed to forward same to the State Highway Commission.

A petition of various residents from Pct. No. 11, was presented requesting the widening and establishment of a road described therein. The Board decided to appoint the following committee to interview the owners of the right of way, said committee to report at the regular session on April 1, 1918: Abel Vigil, Simon Aragon and Desiderio Perea.

Mr. Ignacio Aragon and Mr. J. F. Padilla, of the committee appointed to report as to the cost of opening a certain road in Pct. 27, Los Chavez, appeared before the Board stating that all the owners, outside of two, were willing to donate the right of way. The surveyor was instructed to proceed with the survey of this road and the committee requested to make final report upon completion of survey.

A petition signed by various residents of Pct. 27 requesting repairing upon a certain road was referred to the Co. Highway Sup't.

The Board ascertained the following to be the minimum values of taxable property in Valencia CoSnty for 1918.

Valley Lands

1. Agricultural lands with permanent water rights in actual cultivation not less than \$60.00 per acre.

2. Agricultural lands with permanent water rights not in actual cultivation not less than \$51.00 per acre.

3. Meadow under irrigation not less than \$36.00 per acre.

4. Meadows not under irrigation not less than \$30.00 per acre.

5. Bosque and grazing lands irrigated not less than \$18.00 per acre.

6. Bosque and grazing lands not irrigated not less than \$6.00 per acre.

Other Lands

7. Tracts of grazing lands not exceeding 160 acres containing springs, running water or permanent lakes not less than \$20 per acre.

8. Tracts of grazing lands not exceeding 160 acres containing wells or reservoirs not less than \$12.00 per acre.

9. Grazing lands without water not less than \$3.00 per acre.

10. Dry farming lands in actual cultivation not less than \$30.00 per acre.

11. Dry farming lands not in actual cultivation not less than \$21.00 per acre.

12. Coal lands not more than 12 miles from a railroad not less than \$105.00 per acre.

13. Coal lands more than 12 miles from railroad not less than \$45.00 per acre.

14. Mineral lands, other than coal, as per chapter 55, laws of 1915.

15. Railroad lands lying in alternate sections not less than 1.25 per acre.

16. Standing timber on any land not less than 1.25 per 1000 ft.

17. All lands not above classified not less than 1.30 per acre.

Fences not less than 25.00

for each wire per mile.

In east side addition not less than 30.00 each.

This motion was seconded by Mr. Sanchez and the contract was awarded to Sauer & Emblem for the said truck at a price of \$5951.80. It being understood that the amount of the war tax on same would be deducted in case shipment for County is taxed exempt.

Whereas, it is necessary to provide shelter for the motor truck purchased today and other road equipment, and it is the desire of the Board to erect a garage for housing the same, therefore

Be it resolved that the County Highway Supt. is hereby instructed to secure the services of a competent architect and have plans drawn for erecting an adobe building with concrete floor and cement foundation, not to exceed in size 25 by 35 feet.

Same to be erected upon property owned by the county in Los Lunas. Upon completion of the plans and specifications The Co. Highway Supt. is instructed to deliver the same to the Co. Clerk.

The Clerk is hereby requested to advertise for bids to be opened at the regular session April 1, 1918. All bids to be accompanied by certified check to the amount of 20 per cent of bid. Successful bidder to give sufficient bond to the county of half the amount of contract. The Board reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

The butcher's bond of Granville Powers was approved.

The official bond of Agustin Marquez as constable for Pct.

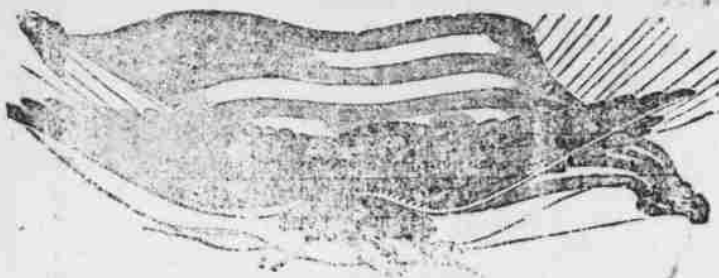

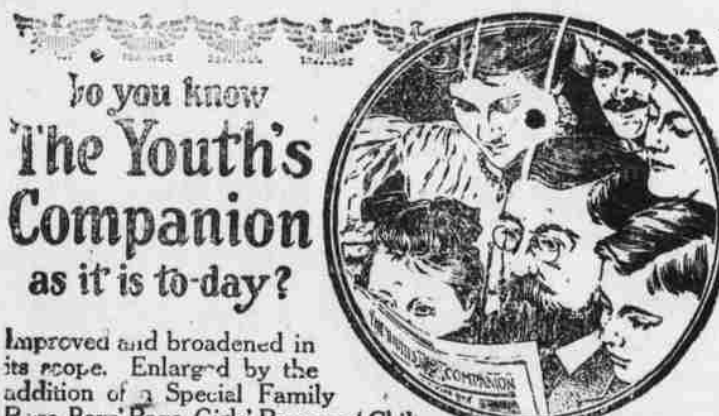

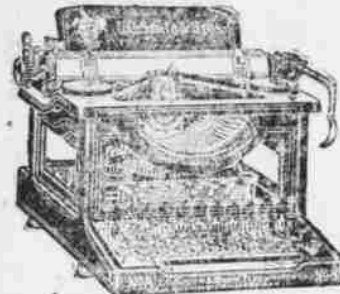
