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NECROLOGY

Allen, Glover Morrill. Feb. 8, 1879-Feb. 14, 1942. Curator of mammals and professor of zoology, Harvard University. Made important studies of animals domesticated, tamed or utilized by American Indians.

Altieri, Radames Andres. Nov. 11, 1903-Oct. 3, 1942. Professor of anthropology and director of the Instituto de Anthropologia of the Universidad Nacional de Tucuman.

Bailey, Vernon. June 21, 1864-April 20, 1942. For many years with the U. S. Biological Survey and author of many monographs and papers on Southwestern, especially New Mexican, biota and life zones.

Bishop, Carl Whiting. July 12, 1881-June 16, 1942. Curator of the Freer Gallery of Art and student of protohistoric archaeology in China.

Boas, Franz. July 9, 1858-Dec. 21, 1942. German-born dean of American anthropologists. Professor of Anthropology at Columbia University from 1899 to 1936.

Boule, Pierre Marcelin. Jan. 1, 1861-July 19, 1942. French paleontologist and archaeologist, and authority on Neanderthal man in western Europe.

Bryan, William Alanson. Dec. 23, 1875-June 18, 1942. Ornithologist and zoologist, director of the Los Angeles Museum of History, Science and Art from 1921 to 1940.

Ditmars, Raymond Lee. June 20, 1876-May 12, 1942. Curator-in-chief of the department of reptiles and mammals, Bronx Zoo, 1910-1942, zoologist and explorer of tropical regions.

Fawcett, Edward. May 18, 1867-Sept. 22, 1942. Authority on the development of the human skeleton, and dean of the faculty of medicine, University College, Bristol, England.

Grant, Elihu. July 12, 1873-Nov. 2, 1942. Professor of biblical literature at Haverford College, 1917-1938; Palestinian archaeologist (Beth Shemesh expedition, 1928-1933).

Howard, Edgar Billings. Feb. 28, 1887-March 18, 1943. Archaeologist and geologist, research associate of the University of Pennsylvania Museum and the American Academy of Natural Sciences.

Jackson, William Henry. April 4, 1843-June 30, 1942. "Pioneer photographer" and last survivor of the personnel of the U. S. Geological Survey of the Territories which operated in Chaco Canyon, Mesa Verde, etc. in the 1870s.

Jespersen, Otto. July 16, 1860-1943. Professor of English at the University of Copenhagen; philologist, linguist and phonetician. One of three men, each of whom wrote a book called *Language*.

Joyce, Thomas Athol. 1878-1942. Archaeologist and ethnologist, Keeper of the department of ethnography of the British Museum,

former president of section H of the British Association, and president of the Royal Anthropological Institute (1931-1933).

Keyes, Charles Rollin. Dec. 24, 1864-May 18, 1942. Geologist and paleontologist, editor of the *Pan-American Geologists*, and former president of the New Mexico State School of Mines, 1902-1906.

Knopf, Carl Sumner. Sept. 20, 1889-June 23, 1942. Biblical scholar, dean of the School of Religion at the University of Southern California.

Lillie, Gordon W. Feb. 14, 1860-Feb. 3, 1942. "Pawnee Bill" was a frontiersman, showman, contemporary of "Buffalo Bill," and former Indian Agent.

Magoffin, Ralph Van Deman. Aug. 8, 1874-May 15, 1942. Honorary president of the Archaeological Institute of America, and head of the New York University classics department from 1923 to 1939.

Malinowski, Bronislaw Kasper. April 7, 1884-May 16, 1942. Polish-born British ethnologist, authority on Melanesia, a member of the University of London faculty 1924-1939, and professor of anthropology at Yale University, 1939-1942.

Marett, Robert Ranulph. June 13, 1866-Feb. 18, 1943. Eminent British anthropologist, rector of Exeter college, Oxford, since 1928; student of philosophy and primitive religion.

Martin, Percy Alvin. Aug. 10, 1879-March 8, 1942. Historian of Latin America, professor of history at Stanford University, and Commander of the Order of the Southern Cross (Brazil).

Martinez, Julian. ca. 1888-March 6, 1943. Famous San Ildefonso artist who decorated the pottery modeled by his wife, María.

Merriam, Clinton Hart. Dec. 5, 1855-March 19, 1942. Founder, U. S. Biological Survey, originator of the life-zone classification commonly used in North America, early student of western American Indians.

Nampeyo. Celebrated Hopi potter of Hano, Arizona, whose age was ca. 82.

Norton, Roy. Sept. 30, 1869-June 28, 1942. Author, mining engineer, lawyer, newspaper editor, geographer. His explorations include the Sinai peninsula, North Africa and Alaska. Fellow of the Royal Geographical society.

Petrie, Sir William Matthew Flinders. June 3, 1853-July 28, 1942. Dean of Near-Eastern archaeologists, who labored 45 years in Egypt, and after 1926 at Gaza in Palestine.

Redway, Jacques Wardlaw. May, 1849-Nov. 6, 1942. Geographer and mining engineer who explored California and Arizona in the 1870s.

Reisner, George Andrew. Nov. 5, 1867-June 7, 1942. American Egyptologist in charge of the Harvard University and Boston Museum of Fine Arts excavations in Egypt and the Sudan, 1905-1942.

Robbins, Edmund Yard. Oct. 3, 1867-May 30, 1942. Educator, philologist, Ewing professor of Greek language and literature (1910-1936) at Princeton University.

Schoteluis, Justus W. Professor of ethnology and archaeology of the Escuela Normál Superior at Bogota, Colombia.

Schuchert, Charles. July 3, 1858-Nov. 20, 1942. Leading American paleontologist and paleo-geographer, and professor of historical geology at Yale University.

Seignobos, Charles. Professor of history at the Sorbonne, contributor to the "Historie de la civilization - -" series. Died in April of 1942 at the age of 87 years.

Smith, Sir George Adam. Oct. 19, 1856-March 3, 1942. Scottish Biblical scholar and authority upon Palestinian history and topography.

Taylor, Alice Bemis (Mrs. M. F. P. -). Founder and chief benefactor of the Colorado Springs Fine Arts Center and the Taylor Museum.

Tinker, Clarence Leonard. Nov. 21, 1887-June 7, 1942. Highest ranking U. S. Army officer of Indian blood (Major general, in command of the Hawaiian air force). Enrolled member of the Osage tribe, killed in the battle of Midway Island.

Ward, Charles Howell. Oct. 28, 1862-Jan. 18, 1943. Osteologist and collector of anatomical specimens, president of Ward's Natural Science Establishment in Rochester, New York.

Willard, Theodore Arthur. Dec. 10, 1862-Feb. 3, 1943. Storage battery inventor, Mayan research worker and fellow in Central American Research of the Southwest Museum (1932-1943).

Younghusband, Sir Francis Edward. May 31, 1863-July 31, 1942. British soldier, explorer and geographer who led a British expedition to the forbidden city of Lhasa in 1904.
