Commissioners Proceedings.

Adjourned Session May 20, 1918.

The Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment on May 20, 1918. There were present: Hon. Manuel Sandoval, Chairman, Hon. Federico Sanchez and Hon. Manuel Garcia, members of the Board. Placido Jaramillo, Sheriff, and J. J. Luna, Clerk.

Said Hon. Manuel Garcia having been appointed by the Governor of the State of New Mexico, to fill the vacancy existing upon this Board from County Commissioners District No. 2 of this County, due to the death of heretofore of the late Hon. Adolpho Dille, said Hon. Manuel Garcia having presented his appointment before the Board, and the same having been read thereupon, the Board proceeded to reorganize by the election of Hon. Manuel Sandoval as Chairman of the Board as heretofore.

Thereupon the Board proceeded in the regular course of business as follows:—

And now on this May 20, 1918, at an adjourned meeting of the regular April, 1918, meeting of the Board of County Commissioners of Valencia County, come Paul B. Dalies, Placido Jaramillo, Ignacio Aragon y Garcia and C. N. Wilson and present to this Board a petition signed by themselves and others, as inhabitants of the settlement of Belen, in this County, together with a plat of the boundary of the proposed village, and purporting to be signed by not less than a majority of the qualified voters thereof, praying that the territory described in said petition be incorporated as a village, pursuant to section 3764 et seq. of the compiled laws of New Mexico, 1915:

Whereupon it is ordered that said petition be filed by the Clerk to be finally acted upon at the next regular meeting of this Board, as provided by section 3766 of said compilation.

Action upon the petition of various residents of Precinct No. 27, presented before the Board by Mr. Jesus Maria Chavez of said Precinct, praying therein to the Board for the drainage of sewage water accumulated on each side of the main state highway passing through said precinct, was deferred until a subsequent meeting of this Board.

Be it resolved, that it is the desire of the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Valencia to aid as much as is within their power in bringing the present war to a firm and victorious conclusion and that they desire to place funds available at the disposal of the nation

during the present conflict.

Therefore, be it resolved, that a warrant for \$5000.00 be drawn by the County Clerk in favor of the First National Bank of Belen as the amount subscribed to the third liberty loan out of the sinking fund of the County of Valencia and that the County purchase an equal amount of the same fund in each successive issue while money is available in this fund.

Hon. Eugene Kempenich, Secretary of the New Mexico State Highway Commission appeared before the Board in behalf of the State Highway Commission and stated that permission had been given to the County of Valencia to use the funds derived under the provisions of Section 8 of Chapter 80 of the laws of the Special Session of 1917, for the payment of the motor truck purchased for road purposes.

Whereas, it is the desire of the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Valencia to avail themselves of the provisions of Section 14, Chapter 38 of the laws of 1917, which provide for construction and maintenance work on state roads;

Therefore, be it resolved, that the Board of County Commissioners hereby express their willingness to proceed under the provisions of this section and instructed the County Highway Superintendent to submit projects for cooperative work.

Mr. Paul B. Dalies appeared before the Board and inquired as to the proposed construction of the Rio Puerco bridge west of Belen. After reading correspondence from the State Highway Department, Hon. James C. Harvey, County Surveyor, was instructed to submit estimates for construction under force account at the meeting to be held on June 4, 1918.

Mr. Daniel L. Romero and Mr. Patrocinio Gabaldon appeared before the Board and presented a petition signed by various residents of Precinct No. 27, praying therein for the establishment and improvement of a certain road leading west through said precinct, from Sausal to the foothills. And the Board being fully advised in the premises, thereupon, the County surveyor was instructed to make a survey of this road and file a plat of same with this Board.

Mr. James C. Harvey, County Surveyor, appeared before the Board and presented a plat of the survey of the Valencia Southern

School road as ordered by this Board at their meeting held on April, 1918. The same was approved and ordered filed with the Clerk's records of this Board.

The County Clerk is hereby instructed to issue a warrant in favor of Mr. A. E. St. Morris, County Highway Superintendent to be placed by him to the credit of his checking fund, to be employed by him in road construction, and maintenance during the month of May 1918, and for changing the fences on the Los Chavez-Ladera Road and the Valencia Southern School Road to their respective boundaries as long said roads as recommended by the viewers in their report and as approved by the Board as

Public Notice of Delinquent Taxes.

The undersigned, Treasurer and Ex-Officio Collector of the County of Valencia, State of New Mexico, hereby gives notice that pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 80 of the laws of New Mexico, enacted at the third regular session of the Legislature of the State of New Mexico, he shall on the thirty first of August 1918 apply to the District Court within and for the County of Valencia, in the State of New Mexico, for judgment against any lands, real estate and personal property upon which Taxes are delinquent and unpaid in an amount exceeding the sum of twenty five Dollars, as shown by the tax rolls for the year 1917, and for an order to sell the same to satisfy said judgment; and that on the 28 day of September 1918, he will offer for sale at Public Auction to the highest and best bidder for cash at the front door of the Court House at Los Lunas in said County of Valencia, separately and in consecutive order each parcel of property upon which any taxes are delinquent and against which judgment has been rendered, for the amount of the taxes, costs and penalties due thereon, or so much thereof as may be necessary to realize the respective amounts due; And that at the date fixed for the sale of property upon which taxes in excess of twenty five dollars are delinquent he will proceed and offer for sale and sell at public auction to the highest and best bidder for cash, at the front door of the Court House at Los Lunas in said County of Valencia separately and in consecutive order, each parcel of property upon which taxes in the sum of twenty five Dollars or less are delinquent, as shown by the tax rolls of the year 1917, or so much thereof as may be necessary to realize the respective amounts due.

RESTORATION TO ENTRY OF LANDS IN NATIONAL FOREST.

Notice is hereby given that the lands described below, embracing 160 acres, within the Manzano National Forest, New Mexico, will be subject to settlement and entirely under the provisions of the homestead laws of the United States and the act of June 11, 1906 (34 Stat., 233), at the United States land office at Santa Fe, New Mexico, on August 24, 1918.
