Commissioners Proceedings.

(Cont'd)

The County Clerk is hereby instructed to draw a warrant in favor of Mr. Richard Pohl in the amount of \$100.00 for purchasing stamps for use by the several county officials. Said Richard Pohl is hereby instructed to take receipts of the amounts delivered to said officials.

The resignation of Filadelfio Salazar as Constable of Precinct No. 8, was accepted and Vidal Armijo appointed to fill the vacancy.

The accounts as shown on page 22 of the Warrant and Fund Record were allowed by the Board.

The Board then adjourned subject to the call of the Chairman. Special Session June 3, 1918.

The Board of County Commissioners met in special session on June 3, 1918. There were present, Hon. Manuel Sandoval, Chairman, Hon. Federico Sanchez and Hon. Manuel Garcia, members of the Board. Placido Jaramillo, Sheriff, Telesforo Mirabal, Deputy County Assessor, and J. M. Luna, Clerk of the Board.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was postponed until the next meeting of the Board.

The Board then adjourned and immediately convened as a County Board of equalization to hear protests and appeals of the assessments made by the Assessor for the year 1918.

Various persons appeared before the Board and made protests as to their assessments for the year 1918, the same being required by the Board to be made in affidavit form and the same to be placed with the return of each protestant to be acted upon by the Board when reviewing their respective returns.
