**Horns Bought  
Registered Herefords**

Some Are Prominent Stockmen Of  
Gaines County But Do Not Want  
Railroad.

J. and Andy Williams were the latter part of last and the first of this week, coming down their ranch in Gaines County to some registered Hereford horns. These they were fortunate in securing from our stockman, G. Volcott. Of him they secured a head of three-year-olds, immediate delivery. We are sorry to be unable to give prices.

It is front of one of the one day while the Williams were here we listened with interest to Jim's reasons why he want any railroad to Seminoles. They are perfectly good ones from his point of view.

"Aston," said he, "for good sake let us alone for another year. If you will do that Andy will then help. We don't want any railroad out there now. We have got a dandy little ranch and we want to buy just a few sections adjoining us. You build that confounded price will go so high we'll be able to touch it."

Not only that but our own land is up so that we simply want to graze cattle on it, and want our ranch and we don't want to go out of the cow business. Why there is a fellow out there has eight or ten thousand bush of Indian corn piled around his field, raised thirty-five bush the acre and better. Do you use when farmers back east out about this that we shall be to hold the 9000 acres of land that we own? Not.

That land is so good that it will pay prices that will keep me from ever getting any more land but will force me to sell out and hunt a country, for ours will be a part of the past. Ours will then be a stranger country, and for the sake of Mike, none of that for me," told Jim fairly that we were to give these reasons, his words for his refusal to come to this railroad bonus. They having been here only about a week and not permanently located, Mr. Hester had him brought to his house where he received all the care and attention that both friends and physicians could offer, but Friday night he grew worse and death claimed him at about 1 o'clock in the morning.

Drs. Pate and Frederick, county hospital physicians of Calisbad were called in consultation, arriving Friday afternoon. Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Bench, parents of Mr. Bench were wired for but arrived Saturday afternoon too late to see him alive. A casket was secured at Lovington and the burial took place in the Lovington Cemetery Sunday afternoon. Later we learn that the baby of the deceased man is quite sick with pneumonia.
